

EXERCISE AS MUCH AUTHORITY AS IN EARLY DAYS.

However-Once Was a Veritable Czar.

"I am master of all I survey; my authority none dare dispute," might have been said with truth by the master of a ship fifty years ago, as he stood on his quarterdeck, and gazed around him over the decks of his vessel and at the crew and passengers before him. In those days no czar exercised more autocratic authority over the liberty, and in some cases the lives, of those under his authority than did a sea captain aboard his vessel, for under the marine laws of that day he was both judge and jury and his acts while at sea were seldom, if ever, disputed. Under changed conditions, and the coming of steam, his power has been lessened in many directions, although today the captain is still master of his ship in every sense, and those aboard it are obliged to obey him, the marine laws prescribing severe punishments for a failure to obey any lawful command given by the master to one of his crew.

"By the common law," says an old English authority, "the master has authority over all the mariners aboard his ship, and it is their duty to obey his commands in all lawful matters relating to the navigation of the ship and for the preservation of good order. In cases of disobedience or disorderly conduct he may lawfully correct them in a reasonable manner. His authority is analogous to that of a parent over a child, or a master over an ap-Conceding the principle that it is prentice. An Old Notion

Still held by some women is that it is impossible to make good pastry from flour made of Manitoba Hard Wheat. Consequently they buy hard wheat flour for bread and soft wheat flour for pastry, and go to a good deal of unnecessary trouble.

The bombarding began immediately, and lasted for nearly two hours, during which time all of the windows in the church were demolished. A large number of friends of the bridal couple were present, and no one dared to leave the

church. Finally the groom slipped out the door and ran to the Crescent pharmacy, 968 Crystal avenue, where he telephoned the police department. The gang followed him to the drug store, but the clerk locked the doors on them after letting the preacher inside. They surrounded t's store and attempted to batter down the back door, swearing that they would hang the groom. In the meantime one of the gang had procured a rope, and a noose had been tied in it preparatory to

carrying out the threat. The patrol wagon at the Kansas City Kan., police headquarters was immediately dispatched to the scene with all of the available police officers, in

charge of Sergt. Pal Richardson. In the meantime the bride had managed to get from the church to the drug store, and while the hoodlums were bombarding the back door of the place Patrolman John Carr escorted the couple out through the front door and placed them on a street car bound for Kansas City.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 6.—An official communication, embodying the whole Government programme, was published last night.

The programme embraces courts-martial for political crimes, and an increase of the penalties for revolutionary propaganda, and expresses a firm determination to preserve order. It also promises a liberal measure of reforms, and that useless restrictions

on Jews shall be abolished forthwith. Measures are promised in the direction of greater provincial autonomy. Zemstvos will be introduced in Poland and the Baltic Provinces.

An income tax will be instituted. Reforms in the police and other public service also are promised. The communication which was issued after protracted discussion by Premier Stolypin and the council of ministers, leaves the situation but little

The one thing evident is that the Premier intends to carry out broad reforms on one hand, and to pursue a policy of repression on the other. A general meeting of Octrobists and peaceful regenerationists will be held at the end of September.


