MAUBEUGE FORTRESS \$298,279,650 FALLS TO BRITISH; SUBRCRIBED TO HAIG GAINS A HOLD VICTORY LOAN ALONG THE SCHELDT More Than \$150,000,000

Last of the Great French Strongholds Taken By the Germans In Early Part of War Has Been Recaptured.

London, Nov. 9 .- The British forces have captured the fortress of Maubeuge, Field Marshal Haig announced today. South of Maubeuge, the British are pushing eastward and are well beyond the Avesnes-Maubeuge road.

The text of the statement reads: "The fortress of Maubeuge has been captured by the Guards and 62nd divisions. We have made good progress south of that

town and are well east of the Avesnes-Maubeuge road. "North of Tournai we are established on the east bank of the Scheldt about Herinnes and Berchem." (These two towns are about nine miles apart.)

Maubeuge was the last important French fortress in the hands of the Germans. Before the war it was considered a fortress of the first class, and guarded the Namur-Charleroi route into France Deplorable Conditions Are Reby the way of the Sambre River.

The town is situated on both banks of the Sambre, and was founded in the seventh century. Several famous battlefields of French wars prior to 1800 are in close proximity to Maubeuge.

Maubeuge was taken by the Germans, after heavy fighting with the British and French, late in August, 1914. The town is within a few miles of the Belgian border south of Mons, which is thirteen miles northward by rail. Namur is about forty miles eastnortheast of Maubeuge, and Charleroi is about midway between

> INSUBORDINATION IS REPORTED AMONG THE GERMAN NAVAL TROOPS

Kaiser Still Considering, While Kaiser's Empire Seething With Revolt While Allied Armies Are Within Short Distance of the Enemy's Territory.

NO WORD RECEIVED YET.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 9 .- So far as the American Government was advised late today no word had been received by Marshal Foch from the German high command since the courier of the armistice envoys started back through the battle lines last night with the surrender terms and the ultimatum for their acceptance by 11 o'clock Monday morning.

New York, Nov. 9.—The Associated Press this morning says: Germany's answer to the ailled terms for an armistice is not expected to reach Marshal Foch's headquarters until the middle of this (Saturday) afternoon at the very earliest. The courier left for Spa, the German headquarters, immediate ately after the terms were delivered and the enemy had been given 72 hours in which to send his answer.

Few details of the terms have been divulged, nor have any of the dramatic elements of the scene at the allied commander-in-chief's headquarters reported. You never can tell when a hero will happen—or where. And you never can tell who will turn out to be a hero—who will meet the great chance, and rise to it. When all is done the world may never hear of a splendid deed, or the deed may win only the meagre mention of a casual line in the dispatches. The great war has brought forth legions of heroes—heroes known to the world before the war threw its spotlight

It happened at the Marne, where so many things in this great war have happened.

In 1914, with the battle cry, "They shall not pass," the gallant Frenchmen under Gen. Foch threw the Boche back on the banks of the Marne in the first great battle of the great war.

The early spring of 1918 saw the big German drive which carried the Boche forces over the Marne and dangerously far to the south of it. But the late

LEAF OFF TREE PLANTED BY "HINDY" RECEIVED IN CITY

A letter received Friday from France A letter received Friday from France contains an interesting inclosure, the leaf of a tree planted by Hindenburg in 1915 at Montigny to celebrate the sinking of the Lusitania. Beside the tree in the grounds of a sanatorium, which the Germans used as a Red Cross hospital, stands a small monument erected at the same time to commemorate the dastardly event.

In the letter a vivid description is given of a scene witnessed a few days

before.

"At our last position," says the writer, "I witnessed 3,000 civilians returning after being German prisoners for four years, and it was the most pitiful sight I've ever seen. They were either old men and women, or young girls and boys. They looked to be too hungry to walk and from the expression on their faces they had forgotten how

"I saw them a couple of hours later going down the lines after having a hot meel, and you would hardly have recognized them as the same people. They were all smiling and throwing kisses to all the soldiers they saw. They were the happiest people I have ever seen."
