ADVANCE ON PETROGRAD MADE BY ANTI-BOLSHEVIK ARMY

Commander of Rumanian Forces Gives Word to Inter-Allied Commission-Chief Allied Food Administrator Refuses To Send Any More Supplies To Hungary Unless Assured They Will Not Be Seized by Rumania's Soldiers.

Budapest, Aug. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—As a result of the first day's conference between the inter-allied commission, Constantine Diamendi and Gen. Marghason, commander of the Rumanian troops here, a promise was made by the Rumanians that they would cease requisitioning food in Budapest and certain other localities. What guarantees were given for the carrying out of his promise is not known at present, nor is it clear when the Rumanians will leave the city.

Capt. Thomas C. Gregory, chief allied food administrator in Central Europe, appeared before the conference and said he would not assist in sending food to Hungary if the Rumanians were go ing to requisition it.

### SUPREME COUNCIL SENDS ANSWER TO

RUMANIAN NOTE Paris, Aug. 14.—The supreme council in its response, drafted today, to the reply of the Rumanian Government to the note of the council regarding the occupation of Budapest, does not ask the Rumanians to leave Budapest immediately. The council advises Rumania that the inter-allied military commission at Budapest will discuss mooted points with Rumanian officials there.

The reply of the council, which probably will be sent to Bucharest tomorrow, is looked upon as having been designed to facilitate negotiations without causing a breach.

Western Farmers Demand an **Amount Equal to Minimum** Price in U.S.

Winnipeg, Aug. 15 .- Declaring that i imperative in the interests alike o the consuming public and the producer to make the amount of the advance or the Canadian wheat crop of 1919 at least equal to the minimum price now being paid in the United States, the executive of the council of agriculture has sent a statement to the Canadian wheat board elaborating the resolution forwarded by the council to the Dominion | Government on August 1. The farmers of the West, it is pointed out, in claiming such an advance are doing so unde the shadow of threatening financial calamity. They must, it is asserted, receive it if they are even to meet the heavy expense involved in the cost of production during the current season. The point is emphasized that the Government would be running no risk of loss, while actual conditions bearing upon the supply of wheat, it is said, justify no other methods.

### DRUNKEN SAILORS ALLOWED STEAMER TO DRIFT AFTER PUTTING OFFICERS IN IRONS

American Vessel Carrying Several Thousand Cases of Whiskey Is Picked Up in Atlantic-Negro Stokers Caused Trouble.

London, Aug. 15.—A wireless dispatch received at Queenstown from the British tank steamer War Khan says that the tanker had picked up another steamer in mid-ocean, finding the crew drunk, the captain incapacitated from injuries and some of the other officers in irons. The crew of the War Khan arrested the mutinous crew of the other steamer and supplied enough men to take the steamer to Brest, where it was bound. The name of the steamer on which the crew mutinied could not be deciphered from the wireless dispatch

### PRINCE RECEIVES A **WARM WELCOME BY** ST. JOHN CITIZENS

LOYAL ADDRESSES

St. John, N.B., Aug. 15.-A roya welcome was extended to his royal highness, the Prince of Wales, as he set foot for the first time on Canadian soil at 11 o'clock this morning. The weather was not auspicious, rain commencing to fall shortly before the prince left his ship, but the adverse conditions in no way affected the warmth of his reception, nor lessened the enthusiasm of the greetings extended to the heir of the British throne. It was eminently fitting that the prince's first glimpse of Canada should be the city founded by the loyalists who had sacrificed so much to remain beneath the British flag, and the heartiness of the welcome showed that the same spirit still animates those who have come after them. From all parts of New Brunswick and from farther distances great numbers had flocked to join with the citizens in their welcome to the prince, and dense crowds thronged the streets and occupied every point of vantage along the route taken by the prince and at various places where he stopped for the ceremonies arranged in his honor.

# SINN FEIN DEMONSTRATION

First Time Such Drastic Action Has Been Taken in Historic City Since the Siege of 1689-Orangemen and Unionists Determined Not To Permit Parade, Which They Term Anti-British.

Londonderry, Ireland, Aug. 15 .- Troops manned the walls of Londonderry today for the first time since the historic siege of the city in 1689, as part of the military effort to prevent the Nationalist and Sinn Fein "lady day" demonstration set for today. The demonstration had been forbidden by the British commander, General Hacket-Pain.

Orangemen and Unionists, it is said, have declared their determination not to permit the holding of the parade, which they termed anti-British.

IRISH MEMBERS LEAVE FOR HOME.

London, Aug. 15.—A number of members of the House of Commons representing Irish districts left for Ireland last night after it was announced that the Government had decided to suppress all Sinn Fein and kindred organizations in County Clare as the result of increased disorders there.

A proclamation declaring all Sinn Fein organizations and Irish volunteers in County Tipperary to be unlawful was issued from Dublin Castle on July 7.

Those who have watched what once were deserts blossom like the proverbial rose, know what water in constant supply means to parched lands. And those who have seen the often truly marvelous means by which our engineers have accomplished the miracles in our own country stand before the gigantic dams and other works in awe.

Other lands are not so fortunate. In Egypt, for instance, where the turbid Nile flows between what would be a desert, were it not for that river and it periodical overflow, the water in dry seasons is brought to the land by painful means. Men use ancient buckets to dip it up in comparative ten-spoonfuls, or employ one of the oldest of irrigation methods. Lifting water by means of wheels that give a somewhat constant flow, they toil by day and by night that they may grow their food.

But Egypt isn't the only country that resorts to such primitive means. Even in far-away China the same method may be observed. In some sections of Africa the like is to be seen. But this seems natural in these lands of com-





### HENRY FORD IS AWARDED SIX CENTS DAMAGES

Receives But Nominal Sum in Suit Against Chicago Tribune.

PLAINTIFF SATISFIED

Motor Car Manufacturer's Counsel Declares Ford Has Been Vindicated.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Aug. 14. -A jury tonight awarded Henry Ford eix cents damages against the Chicago Tribune for calling him an anarchist. Orvy Hulett, foreman of the jury, said that they took "nine ballots that I can remember," the first one, according to Leonard Measel, another juror, standing 8 to 4 in favor of awarding Mr. Ford some damages.

Something "Does the award of six cents about express the feelings of the jury as to the case?" Mr. Hulett was asked. "It just about does. That expresses our judgment."

Attorney Alfred, J. Murphy, for Mr.

Ford, said: 'The important issue in this case has been determined favorably to the plaintiff. He has been vindicated.

"Money damages were entirely subordinate, and were not sought by Mr. Ford. He stands not only vindicated, but his attitude as an American citizen has been justified after a trial which raised every issue against him which ingenuity and research could present. His friends are entirely

Satisfied."

Weymouth Kirkland, of counsel for the Tribune, said:

"We consider it a victory for the reason that Attorney Alfred Lucking, in closing for Mr. Ford, stated that anything less than substantial damages would be a defeat for his client."

Toward defraying his expenses in the case. Henry Ford will receive not more than \$50 from the Tribune, the state law providing that in a case where nominal damages are awarded not more than \$50 costs can be assessed against the losing party.

Patrick Jones, residing on any side alley of the said city, being a perfectly good citizen of the United States, can purchase from her Uncle Sam's army stores a can of beans, or a can of peas, or perchance some rashers of bacon, at a price so far below the average retail figures that even after she has paid the postage, she is away ahead in the little transaction. Beneath the Canadian coat-of-arms, which gives a fine touch of dignity and authority, notice is given of a "SALE OF SURPLUS MILITARY AND NAVAL STORES." Moreover, the statement follows that these stores cover a wide range of articles, drygoods, camp supplies, food, hardware, scrap metal junk, cloth, new and second-hand clothing, equipment, hardware, tents, blankets, camp supplies, etc.: flour, jam, canned evaporated milk, tea, coffee, etc.; condemned clothing, junk, old brass, metals,

leather, rubber, etc.

leather. rubber, etc.

The list includes many things that could be used to advantage by individual consumers who would welcome the opportunity to buy them at an advantageous price.

But, perhaps the Canadian Government is going to follow the democratic example of the United States in this respect, and thus help to an extent within its immediate power to do some cutting of the throat of the High Cost of Living Bugbear, and aim knockout blows at profiteering.

The next section of the advertisement dashes any such hope to the ground. It distinctly states:

"SALES WILL BE MADE BY SEALED TENDER."

No mention is made of "bargain prices" since the advertisement has not appeared in the general press, the inference is natural that it is intended to reach the eye of "the trade." It is also obvious that an opportunity will be afforded for the unscrupulous who have already made a war profit to buy back by tender then turn round and sell again at profit.



### Commerce Board Has Just Issued Its First Order

Manufacturers, Dealers, Etc., Must Answer Questions Put To Them.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—The board of commerce held its first session today and issued its first order, a formal pronouncement setting forth that any pronouncement setting forth that any person who operates, controls or manages any cold storage plant, packing house, cannery, factory, mine, warehouse or other premises in which any necessary of life is prepared, manufactured, produced or held or who in any manner deals in any necessary of life, must, in response to the written request of the board, furnish all the information asked for. The order further sets forth that, should anyone fail to comply with the board's order, the board may send investigators to get the information.

The affect of the order, in addition, is to abolish the office of cost of living commissioner and reinstitute the system of investigations instituted by Mr. O'Connor.

The statement issued by the board

"Rigorous Compliance.
"Rigorous compliance with the requirements of the new act and the board's order will be enforced.
"All the records made under the pre-"All the records made under the previously prevailing investigation system will be secured and taken over by the board, and in addition, as soon as the board can make the arrangements and before the lapse of many weeks, the full board will in joint session, visit all the principal cities of Canada and conduct there open inquiries into cost and price conditions and the means of remedying these conditions. Only such delay will ensue before the board sets out, as is imperatively necessary in order to enable intelligent inquiry.

"In the meantime, the board is organizing its personnel and preparing its itinerary.

"When the intended sittings are held they will be open to all who wish to complain or testify, or defend allegations made. No formality whatever, nor any notice will be required. Afterwards, from the information on hand and to be gained while on its itinerary, the board will take such action as should seem proper by way of general remedy. Special remedies will be applied as the occasion for the application arises."

No witness was prepared to state that the fire was of an incendiary nature.

The fire commissioner adjourned the inquiry sine die, and stated that full investigation into the origin of the fire would be continued.
