There is general dissatisfaction with the plan followed this year of remitting taxes on homes owned by former soldiers and assessed for less than \$3,000. Ald. John Ashton, in particular, is opposed to it on the grounds that it gives assistance where it is least needed.

"The men who own their own homes are not the ones who need assistances only able to rent a house," he said. "Under the present plan, if a man is assessed for \$3,000 he gets a remission of \$79. If he is assessed for only \$1,000, he gets only two-thirds of that amount, and if he is assessed for only one-third that amount. If he doesn't own a home at all he gets nothing. Under that plan the men who have the most gets the most, and I certainly don't think it is fair.

Allies Will See That Ex-Kaiser Does Not Stroll From Holland

The Hague Nov. 23.—Former Emperor William of Germany could go to Corfu only with the consent of the allied powers, the Associated Press was informed at the foreign office today. This information was elicited by an inquiry relative to reports that the former emperor's villa on the Island of Corfu was being repaired, and that he was expected to go there soon. The Dutch Government has given assurance to the Allies that Count Hohenzollern will be guarded at Doorn.

"Even if former King Constantine, brother-in-law of William, were to regain the Greek throne," said an official today, "and should actually invite him to resume his residence in the old Castle of Achilleion, it would be only by the consent of the Allies that we would let him leave the prescribed area at Doorn. Nothing of this kind has been taken up with the Allies."

So far as the former German crown prince is concerned, the Dutch Government is under no obligations to prevent him leaving Holland, if he wants to go; but there is an impression at the foreign office that the entire story relative to Corfu is a fantasy.

LARGER STAFF **NEEDED BEFORE** PLAN ADOPTED

Lack of Accommodation For Pupil Nurses Prevents Increasing Number, Stated.

NEW HOME DESIRED.

House Committee Recommends Bylaw For Funds Be Submitted To Electors.

Although full sympathy for the nurses-in-training at Victoria Hospital in their efforts to secure better working conditions was expressed at a meeting of the trustees held Monday night, when a report of the house committee when a report of the house committee was presented, it was felt by them that the patients in the institution must receive the first consideration. While it is the intention of the board to do all within its power to bring about certain conditions asked in a petition presented to the board ten days ago, it was its belief that the nursing staff must be enlarged before the program could be satisfactorily carried out.

Soon after the petition was received by the board the house committee, consisting of two members of the board, was instructed to investigate conditions at the hospital and to meet the nurses so that their grievances could be heard. During last week the house committee met a delegation of nine nurses and the petition was discussed. As the result of the investigation and the conference the following report and recommendations were laid before the members of the board:

"The house committee, having considered the request of the nurses-intraining, find, on comparison, that the rules in force compare very favorably with those of other hospitals, and conform with the standard adopted by the Government for a uniform system for all Government subsidized hospitals.

"We quite agree that every opportunity should be given to pupil nurses to attend divine service, at least once each Sabbath, as heretofore, subject always to an emergency arising, or conditions affecting the proper care of was presented, it was felt by them that

always to an emergency arising, or con-ditions affecting the proper care of

fully sympathize in their hope "We fully sympathize in their hope of having an eight-hour service permanently installed. This has already been under consideration for sometime and put into partial execution, but has been found to require a considerable addition to the number of pupil nurses to make it workable.
"Further freedom for enjoyment in the Nurses' Home is not practicable, owing to lack of accommodation, as the claims of those needing more time for rest and study have also to be considered.

Increasing public school accommodation by creating two new school districts and adding two rooms to Tecumsesh school will be considered by the board of education at its next regular meeting, December 7. 

According to Mr. Talbot, prisoners should work on farms or in some other industrial enterprise, road-building for instance, at rates of wages equal to union or standard wage scales, minus the actual cost of paying guards to watch them.

Through the long, dreary winter from the windows of the county buildings one may see calling at the court house to visit prisoners the wives and children, faint and sickly from lack of nourishment, sometimes actual starvation. Something should be done, claims Mr. Taibot, to remedy the state of affairs under which society houses and feeds the lawbreaker and leaves his dependent family to face starvation or beg upon the streets.

Jimmy Hurls Percentage Ball To Weakest Points of Batters.

Who would you name as one of the

martest pitchers ever in baseball? Right off-hand you would say Christy Mathewson, would you not? In the Mathewson, would you not? In the opinion of Ty Cobb, Jim Bagby of the world's champion Indians, is entitled to the honor. This is what Ty has to say about the Cleveland flinger, who won 31 games last season.

"Bagby is the smartest pitcher I ever faced, and I'll tell you why. He hasn't a very good fast bail nor a very good curve. He has a pretty good slow ball, with 'almost perfect control. Bagby knows he hasn't enough natural ability to fool batters, so he makes a study of them. He knows the strong and weak points of every batter who faces him, and he pitches to their weak points. If a batter is weak on a low curve, that is all he will get from Bagby. If the same batter should get a hit off a low curve, it does not make any difference to Bagby, nor does he change his tactics. He knows in the long run by pitching low curves to this batter the percentage is all in his favor, and that is all he will pitch. Nothing will swerve him from his course.

"They'll get a lot of hits off Bagby, but he wins because he is pitching bercentage baseball—pitching to the weak points of each hitter and not the strong points. He has perfect control of what stuff he does command and can put it any place he wants to.

"Bagby is an instance of what concentration and practice will do for a pitcher."


