# LIGHTS OF SOCIETY IN VICE HAUNTS

Fashionable Philadelphia Society Shaken to Its Center by Disclosures.

Philadelphia, July 5. - The Tender-

oin of this city has been practically

wiped out by the tremendous raids made upon its disorderly places by the police on Saturday night, and Philadelphia is stirred as it had not been stirred efore for a quarter of a century. For in this raid, in which 105 resorts were entered and 568 prisoners were captured, there were men and women whose names adorn the blue book of society, who are well known figures in Newport, New York and Paris, and who had to use all their finesse and influence to keep their highly-respected ames from being trailed in the mire. That there will come an aftermath o divorce and scandal few who are cognizant of the facts can doubt. Of the 568 prisoners taken more than 400 are still in jail. They consist of clubmen, lawyers, business men whose names are known throughout the city sports and highflyers, young scions of ociety from the Germantown section, and, in some instances, their sisters, and their cousins, and their aunts. All of today there has been a struggle to obtain bail and to cover up scandals. Absolutely no mercy was shown. Rich and poor, old offenders and young were scooped up in the same net and carted away to jail. The police were frank in their brutality. They realized that they were killing their own graft, and the incidental slaughter of half a hundred fine old Quaker reputation was meat and drink to them.

It was a curious sight to see men o yealth and influence in the city walking up to the magistrate courts proffer bail for relatives or friends caught in the raid. In not a single instance did the men or women prisoners of good repute give their real names. As is always the case in a raid, the women got by far the hardest treatment. A man of prominence would be called to the bar only to give a fictitious name and fade away with a \$10 fine In every instance the woman, no mat ter of what family or reputation, was looked upon as an "inmate," and fined \$300. In nine cases out of ten ther was no bail forthcoming, and the bette ones were led, weeping, back to their cells. Many of them were of good families, many were married, many were

There were heart-breaking revelations when they were forced openly to attempt to get bail. 





London Capitalists Interested. Others in Toronto and Hamilton, in Creamery Concern.

The largest creamery concern yet ormed in Canada is being organized inder the name of the Canada Produce Company, Limited, capitalized at \$250,-000. Certain London capitalists are in terested, together with others in Monreal, Hamilton and Toronto. A Dominion charter has been applied for.

The company will operate a creamery in the vicinity of Montreal, having daily capacity of 20,000 pounds of butter. It will export butter largely to Great Britain, where the price has improved of late, and will ship also eggs and poultry. The company will introduce the system of collecting cream at a centralized creamery, which has been instrumental in building up the dairy business in the Western States. Cream will be expressed by farmers within a radius of a hundred miles. The head office will be in Montreal.

Most of the capital stock has been subscribed, and the company will probably commence operations soon after receiving a charter. When the proposed creamery is fully established
