General Statement.

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OYOLA COLLEGE, incorporated by Act of the Quebec Parliament, is conducted by the Fathers of the Society of Jesus. By an extension of the Papal Constitution Jamdudum of Feb. 2nd 1889,

Students graduating after satisfactory examination at the College are accorded by the Laval University the degrees for which they shall have qualified.

System of Education.—The educational system is substantially that of all Jesuit Colleges. It is elaborately set forth in the *Ratio Studiorum*, and deserves the attention of all earnest men, by the unparalleled success it has achieved for centuries in the schools of the Society both in Europe and America.

Education is understood by the Fathers of the Society in its completest sense as the full and harmonious development of all the faculties. It is not, therefore, mere instruction, nor communication of knowledge. In fact, the acquisition of knowledge, though it necessarily accompanies any right system, is a secondary result of education. Learning is the instrument of education, not the outcome. Its outcome is culture, mental and moral; and such studies, sciences or languages, are chosen as will most effectively further this end. Hence the preference given to the classics over all other subjects, as the fittest instruments in this intellectual and moral growth. But this preference is not exclusive. The importance of mathematics, as an instrument of education, has not been underestimated. They have due recognition ; and progress, as well as thoroughness, in this branch, is a requisite for promotion to a higher class.

It is, however, to be remarked that though the educational trend of the present day is almost entirely in the direction of the natural sciences, the Jesuits have not allowed themselves to be influenced by this tendency. looking upon it as one dangerous to the best interests of education ; and they, with all disinterested educationists. who have of late years treated of this breaking away from the traditional methods, see in it not only the ruin of genuine culture, but the mental deterioration of the race that is subjected to such discipline. They feel confident that the prestige which this new system now enjoys is only that which everything novel and startling at first obtains. The Jesuit system of education aims at developing, side by side, the moral and intellectual faculties of the student. The Fathers would send forth to the world not men who have acquired superficial information on a great variety of subjects, but educated men, men of sound judgment, of keen and rounded intellect, of upright and manly conscience.

Classical.—In the Classical Department, the *Ratio* Studiorum is observed, and the studies given in the subjoined schedules are pursued. The full course requires seven years, three of which are spent in the Grammar classes and the remainder in the regular collegiate course.

Business Training.—Application is often made for a special training which will fit the student immediately for business. Experience, however, proves that but a very sorry substitute for education is to be found in the almost exclusive development of a single faculty. The most successful business man is not he who has learned merely to read, write and cipher, but he who has first had all his powers developed by a liberal education ; and who is thus enabled to bring a ten-fold mental activity to mercantile pursuits. The details of business life can be learned only by practice; but these once mastered, previous superior training makes itself felt. Instead, therefore, of confining themselves to any special drill, commercial or other, the Fathers aim at the full development of the whole man, and to this end utilize all the educational energies of the classics, mathematics and the natural sciences.

Study of English .- One of the principal objects ever kept in view in reading the Latin and Greek classics, is to make use of them as an invaluable aid to the study of English. The student, having once shown by an exact literal translation that he fully understands the author, is required to express, in pure, idiomatic and elegant English, every shade of meaning conveyed by the text. This kind of translation is given not only in writing, but also orally, in order that fluency of language may be acquired along with propriety of expression. Finally, the student's version is compared with English translations of acknowledged excellence, and points of resemblance or difference carefully noted. The plays of Shakespeare, the works of other poets, and the masterpieces of English orators and prose writers, are made the subject of critical study and analysis. Moreover, an English essay, narration, description, or other composition, in prose or verse, is written by every student once a week.

Mathematics.—One hour a day is devoted to Mathematics. In the Arithmetic and Algebra classes, the special matter of the previous year is always repeated before the student is allowed to advance. The classes in the Mathematical Course are arranged so as to correspond, as nearly as may be, with those of the Classical Course. In this way both courses end together in Rhetoric, and proficiency in both is requisite before entering Philosophy. Ereitch.—No one who has any idea of refined education to-day, will deny the expediency of a thorough knowledge of French. The lists of subjects presented at the great university examinations throughout the world always give this language a prominent place. Moreover, the peculiar circumstances, in which we Canadians are placed, make a knowledge of French well-nigh indispensable to professic al and business-men. The Fathers have, therefore, included this subject in their curriculum, and look upon it as one to which more than ordinary care should be devoted. For this reason a thoroughly competent French Master controls these classes.

Moral Training.-The College authorities are convinced that without religion there can be no perfect education in the true sense of the word, that is to say, no complete and harmonious development of the intellect and heart of man. They hold, furthermore, that religious truth. being definite and certain like any other truth, is as susceptible of being taught as languages mathematics. Hence the catechism is a text-book in every class, and regular lectures are given on it every week. Besides, the lives of great men, found in the masterpieces of classical literature, ever furnish the masters with topics from which lessons of true morality may be drawn; and thus the student is continually kept in presence of the noblest ideals that the world's history has furnished, and is spurred on to imitate them by the admiration he teels for their glorious deeds.

Elimsical Culture.—In view of the full development of all the young man's faculties, his physical culture is by no means overlooked. This feature of Education was, perhaps, too much neglected in the past, and the sad results have more than once been vividly depicted by the victims themselves. Hence, out-door exercise and games are encouraged and even insisted on. Military and physical drill, under a competent and responsible instructor, forms a much appreciated adujact to the common recreation.

Examinations.—There are two examinations in the year, one in January, the other in June. At any time during the school-year, and particularly at the first examination, should a boy be found capable of passing to a higher class, he will be promoted, and such promotion will be equivalent to the honours of the class from which he has been advanced.

Monthly reports of progress in studies, conduct, attendance and class-standing will be sent to parents or guardians.

NOTE.—When Loyola College was opened as a separate institution, the lower classes only of the Classical Course were transferred from St. Mary's College. We are now in a position to state that a new class will be added each year, until the course is complete.

Bemarks for Zarents.—In case of absence from class for a day, or for part of a day, a note from the parent or guardian will be required.

As the progress of students largely depends on regular attendance at school and application at home, the boys should not be kept from school without good cause and parents should exact of them a suitable preparation of their tasks by private study. Too frequent absence, except in case of sickness, shall be regarded as sufficient cause for dismissal.

The College authorities claim the right, whenever they judge necessary or expedient, to moderately punish students guilty of misdemeanour or serious violation of College discipline. **Begulations for Boys.**—All must be present at or before 8.30 a.m., when at the sound of the bell they repair to the Chapel for Mass.

Class begins at 9 o'clock. During class hours strict silence is to be observed, not only in the class-rooms but also in the College-halls.

All must be clean and neat in person and apparel, polite and obedient to the officers of the College, and respectful to their companions. To secure this neatness in person and dress, a rigid inspection will be made every morning at the beginning of school, at which is noted any neglect of this rule.

Any injury done to the walls or furniture of the College will be charged to the offender's parents.

Bolidaus.—Every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon, all Church and Civil Holidays, a short vacation at Christmas and the months of July and August.

N.B.-Boys will not be kept at the College during either the Christmas or Mid-summer vacation.
