If you would have paneles this summer sow the seed at once. These gay, impertinent little blossoms with so much individuality grow and serminate more rapidly at this season when the nights are still cool than later. Many people make the mistake of sowing their seeds in June.

even the least bit of shade from fence, tree or house. They demand much sun and all the full sweep of the wind. If planted at this time they will be in full flower by June 30. And if you keep all withered flowers removed you will have a wealth of blooms until late fall.

If you coak the seed for 24 hours in cool water previous to planting you will hasten their season of flowering ten days, which more than pays for a moment's work.

This is the time to retrench, but even the dog fancier can't always curtain his expenses.

Rake it quite level before attempting to sow the seed.

Sow the seed in drills, covering them not more than four times the diameter of the seed. Firm the soil well above them. A general mistake is to cover them too heavily—in other words, plant them too deep. The seed germinates in fr. eight to ten days. During this period they must be kept damp. Never at this time pour water over them directly. Better cover them with newspapers that have been previously seaked in water and filter all water through this medium for the first ten days. This method hastene their period of germination.

As soon as they are up and large enough to handle they should be thinned out and transplanted into their permament home. Set them nine inches apart each way.

Thorough cultivation should be given them from the start. Weeds and paneles never make amicable neighbors, and it will resolve itself into the survival of the fittest, which means that the weeds, if permitted to remain, will win and the paneles develop into indifferent, sickly specimens. During warm weather the beshould be cultivated every day, and in prolonged dry spelie twice a day.

Have three cupfuls of cooked spa_hetti ready and put it in a baking d.:h with the meat, in layers. Pour over it a cupful of tomato juice and cover with buttered crumbs. This is very good with the sausage alone, omitting the peef.

OYSTERS ARE GOOD.

Oysters are very good baked with apaghetti. Cook one-quarter of a bax of spaghetti. Buy 25 oysters and scald in their own liquor. Butter a baking dish and put in a layer of the spaghetti and one of the oysters until they

are all used. Thicken two cupfuls of milk with two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch and add a tablespoonful of butter. Pour over the oysters, cover with buttered breadcrumbs and brown in a hot oven.

Spaghetti and cheese is a very good supper dish. Put a layer of the cooked spaghetti into a dish, cover with grated cheese and another layer of the spaghetti, and so on till the dish is full. Pour over it enough thin white sauce to cover, cover with bread crumbs and bake. It will add greatly to the zest of the dish if a half teaspoonful of powdered mustard is added to the white sauce.

BATTLING THE HOPPER PLAGUE

Manitoba and Saskatchewan Working Hard

To End the Menace to Their Crops.

Winnipeg, May The Govern-ments of Manitoba and Satskatche-wan are fully alive to the danger of the grasshopper menace to the west-irn crops. In Saskatchewan last fall-grasshoppers laid eggs in from 40 to 50 rural municipalities. The eggs

rashoppers laid eggs in from 40 to 10 to 10 rural municipalities. The eggs aave been examined carefully during the last few weeks by the provincial field experts, who state the young are beginning to emerge.

The Saskatchewan Government Department of Agriculture, in an effort 10 fight the menace, has purchased 50,000 gallons of molasses, 90 tons of arsenic, 1,000 tons of bran, and two carloads of lemons, most of which has reached Regina. Large quantities have already been transported to the needy places.

Unless a good battle is waged it is robable that in two weeks' time the two varieties of the pest most dangeroes may get ahead; these are redegged locusts and the clear-winged tocusts, now beginning to be hatched. An Manitoba the locusts are reported in Melita district in millions. That we have caused concern, but there is no need for panic, and the hungry state of the hoppers leads the Government to think that, as in the state of Kansas, early vigilance will defeat the danger. No effort is being spared in any of the provinces to deal with the situation.

Soft or Piebald Wheat

(Experimental Farms Note).

It is well known that, when grown on certain soils and especially in certain seasons, wheat instead of being dark and translucent, is pale or spotted with patches of light color. If this condition is very marked, the wheat is called "soft," and if it is less evident the term "plebald" is often used. In Kans: and some other states the phrasa, "yellow berry" is employed to designate the same condition. There is considerable misapprehension in regard to softness in wheat. Some varieties, such as Pelude for instance, are extra hard in their nature and very seldom produce soft kernels, while others, such as White Russian, are essentially softer. But most of the popular sorts, though usually hard in character, become soft under special conditions of soil and climate. Even the extra hard wheats of the Durum class, such as Wild Goose, sometimes show softness.

Quack, Couch or Twitch Grass

(Experimental Farm's Note).

This weed is a perennial, propaga-ted by seeds and creeping root-stalks, persistent in all deep gloughed lands and in all crops, having, great power in spreading and choking out other plants.

The permanent means of bringing this weed under control is to adopt for the area infested a sort rotation of crops or cropping plan which includes a hoed crop, once in three or four years. A short rotation of three years duration is preferanble since there is a hoed crop and only one crop of hay in a three year period conditions which tend to give the pest the least chance of flourishing. Another suitable rotation is one of four years duration of one year each in hoed, grain, clover and timothy hay crop. For timothy hay or pasture areas the procedure is as follows.

Allow the plant to exhaust its substance in the production of a hay crop, which should be cut and removed as soon as the head is formed and before it is in bloom. BULGARS JOIN WITH THE TURK

Pouring in to Aid in Opposing Greeks.

Constantinople cable says: The new Thracian Government at Adrianople has dismissed all the old officials. Former sub-governor, Erddjument Ekran Bey, who has arrived in Constantinople, said to-day that Bulgarlians are crossing into Turkey in large numbers, and joining the Turks, who are preparing to resist the Greeks. Bulgarians, according to Ekran Bey, will form the backbone of the forces opposing the Greeks, but he declared Co., Jafar Tayar, who was the Turkish commandant at Adrianople, has 20,000 Turkish soldiers available. Turkish Nationalists have seized the village of Koum, Kalep, at the southern entrance to the Dardanelles, and are either defeating the Sultan's troope, or are persuading them to desert to the army of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, the Nationalist leader at various soupporter of the Sultan in Anatolia, has been seriously wounded, and his chief of staff hanged by Nationalists near Gouve. At Eski Chehir and other points along the Anatolian raliway, the Nationalists are bringing in unwilling recruits in groups of five or six with fron rings locked about their necks and conneted up by chains with fellow shirkers.

Frequently draft evaders have broken heads and bandazed arms and legs as a result of rough treatment by the guards, whose bayonets are fixed. Only Moslems are conscripted, the Nationalists declaring Christians to be untrustworthy.

A National Highway.

The Rotary clubs of Northern Ontario have joined forces with the Canadian Automobile Association in urging the construction of the important link of the trans-Canada Victory Highway lying between the great lakes and Winnipeg.

Recently eighty delegates representing the district extending from Fort William to Winnipeg met in conference at Dryden and formed the Canada Colonization and Highway Association. It was pointed out that the only difficult new construction necessary to the completion of the Fort William-Winnipeg highway will be encountered in the rocky, broken country between Scovell and Vermillon. It is said that the proposed trunk road will open up some fifty thousand acres of rich arable country and induce settlement and development. Lateral roads would rapidly be constructed. While the trunk road, it is estimate i, would cost approximately five million dollars, it would do for this great country what the Assouan dam has done for the Nile basin — make it not only habitable, but richly tributary to the nation. With the completion of this road, but one considerable gap will remain to be closed in the trans-Canada Victory Highway — that on the north shore of Lake Superior, Port Arthur and Fort William, and the "Soo," the western terminus of the Great Northern Highway.

Money for Imperials.

Some 50,000 residents of Canada who served in the Imperial forces during the war will be entitled to share in the appropriation voted by the Canadian Parliament to supplement the gratuities they receive from the British Government and bring them up to the Canadian scale. Some of the Imperial veterans are enquiring when they may expect a distribution of the fund. The Government is now engaged in the preparation of an order-in-Council setting forth the manner in which the gratuities will be distributed. Furthermore, the Government will need as a guide in the distribution of the money a concise record of each soldier's service. This, it is stated, is not available in Canada. An Imperial soldier with three years' service, it is understood, receives from the British Government about \$160 as a gratuity. He would be entitled to about \$400 additional from the sum appropriated by the Canadian Parliament at its last session.



SPRING SEEDING IS NEARLY DONE

Recent Rains Have Helped the Grass.

Fruit Prospects Are Encouraging.

The following a summary of reports made by Agricultural Representatives to the Ontario Department of Agriculture
Grass has been improved by recentrains and warmer weather, but some representatives still regard pastures as being much behind, compared with average conditions at this time of year. Spring seeding and planting is being pushed along vigorously. In some counties the grain crops are practically all in.

The land is said to be working well for the sowing of roots, speaking generally An increased acreage of sugar beets is assured in the southwesten portion of the province.

A considerable acreage of potatoes has already been planted, but potato seed was never harder to procure, and it has been very high in price.

Fruit prospects, taken all together, are encouraging. Orchard trees of all classes are blossoming more or less freely, and although some raspberries have been frozen back, even they are making a fair renewed growth. Strawberries are looking well.

Cattle are in good health, but as a rule are rather thin on account of the backward condition of pastures.

Bees did not winter well. Haldimand reports that many aplaries have lost more than half of their colonies.

Farm help is still very scarce, although many farmers have got along with their spring work much better



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
