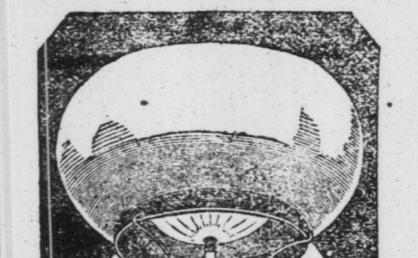

THE readers of this journal are hereby informed, that Fredericton is the Capital of New Brunswick, and that York Point, and Marsh Bridge, and Reed's Castle, and MacEvoy's, and the old Bell Tower, and Partridge Island, all remain just as they were!

**GORDON BROWN HAS SPRUNG A LEAK.**

When Senator Brown presided over the columns of the *Globe*, that paper was not so garrulously given as it is now. When in opposition it contented itself with assailing the policy of its opponents whether that policy was right or wrong—except on one occasion—but it never was rash enough to promulgate a policy of its own. This was not because the astute Senator lacked individuality enough to make up his mind, or that he was not enough of a dictator to say what was right and which was wrong, but it was because he carried a very large bump of Scotch caution under his hat which would as often suggest the expedient as the right. But now as we have said it is different with the *Globe*, because Mr. Gordon Brown has become leaky. He cannot keep a secret if he were to be put on the spit for telling it, and he is out now telling the country the privacies of his camp and exhibiting the kind of weapons his party are going to use in the next onset. He holds nothing back, but gives the country all, and at the same time the Government the opportunity of appropriating in a modified form any of his party's measures that may be worth adopting. Here is a brief of the policy of the Liberals as propounded in a leaky moment by Gordon Brown:

"The present customs tariff to be abandoned for the one hitherto in force."  
That is the tariff that put our country at the mercy of foreigners and drummers, and put our own manufacturer at the feet of the outsider!

2, 3.—The abolition of the Senate and of Provincial Legislative Councils—

A piece of characteristic impudence so far as relates to Provincial Legislative Councils. The *Globe* here in leaking, leaks even more than its total absence of prudence and political propriety would suggest. It shows that our Local Legislatures under the new Koran, are to be taken under the thumb of the Dominion Government. We want to see our Legislative Councils swept away, but we want to see our own Legislatures deal with the matter. For that is our business, and not Gordon Brown's nor the *Globe's*, nor the central parliament's. As for the Senate, we can see no reason for its abolition, and under the Confederation its position with regard to the central Legislature is quite different from the position of our Local Chambers in regard to our Provincial Legislatures. As Sir Leonard Tilley stated to a Star reporter, the abolition of the Senate is a Grit idea, because Grit principles are sadly at a discount in the Senate.

4.—Construction of Pacific Railway without too heavy a taxation."  
That is, the *Globe* and others have discovered a mine of cheap steel, and have possessed themselves of Aaron's rod, at whose point hills will level themselves,

and gorges be filled up. Of course the *Globe* couldn't oppose this policy—though Mr. Blake has—because the last good deed Mr. Brown did before dying, was to approve of Sir Charles Railway policy. Such evidence of conversion to conservative principles, well entitled the great Senator to the posthumous tribute paid him by both Sir John and Sir Charles.

"5 A Liberal Land Policy in the North-west."  
Which must mean to give away the lands for nothing. This would be in keeping with "No 4," which provides for constructing said road "without too heavy a taxation!!!"  
"6 Permanent Civil Service."

This would not refer to heads of departments, because the Grits, just before allowing this policy to leak through them, commenced by decapitating their own leader!!  
"7 Sound specie basis."  
Brass!  
"8 That Public Works shall be let by public tender, not by private arrangement."

Yet once upon a time there was a steel rail transaction in the Grit camp—the Carillon and section B. scandals! There, too, looms up through this picture of Tory wickedness which the *Globe* insinuates, a large hotel in Neibing, built of slabs, and further on we see a peice of land, that exhales the story of small but wicked frauds—this land is at Kaminitiquia!!! The Grits ought to cork up Gordon Brown, for he is quite too leaky now to be servicable.

**HOW IT WORKED IN CALAIS.**

SOME of the the Reform Club people, are now quite competent to judge of the practical working of the Maine Liquor Law in Calais, for they were over there on the 4th, and came away leaving some of the temperance orators, some of those who have denounced honorable people from the platforms, in the hands of the Calais lock-up keepers.  
It is true enough, for his Lordship Bishop Medley, that the temperance cause is a sad one indeed if it is only to be vivified by such alimant as burnt cork shows, and to have at its head such apostles as those who exhibit blue ribbon on their coat to-day, and ditch-mud on it to-morrow. It is like paying a premium on degradation to take a man from among the hogs on the street to-day and set him on the platform to-morrow as an expounder of morals and as a teacher of the people. Cases of this kind may serve now and again as a stimulus to the degraded and the drunken, but the practice should always be the exception, never the rule. Let those who have soiled their humanity by lying in the ditch with the dogs, show by years of better deeds that they are truly reformed, and that their fit of morality is not a mere getting off their spree. Then when they come upon our platforms, we cannot alone pardon their vile English and natural slang, but we can be edified instead of being scandalized. But while their clothes reek with the filth of the street, and their faces give expression to the foulness of their own degraded selves, let them keep from the sight of sober and proper men and women.

It is scarce three years ago, since this very city went mad over a vulgar fanatic named Banks McKenzie. They howled every evening in the Halls and the Churches, and now and again carried torchlights. Every man and every maid carried a knot of blue ribbon, and we unto the man who had hardihood enough to refuse to put it on. Even spurious Newfoundland dogs were it about their necks instead of brass collars, and horses flaunted it gaily from their headstalls: while over every shop door in the city was put one of two mottoes: blue ribbon or Ichabod. The fanatics would not trade where blue ribbon was not to be found, and would scarcely look at you upon the street if you appeared without a ribbon. Now the froth has ceased to fizz, and there is not an inch of blue ribbon to be seen the city over. Where is Joseph McLeod and Thomas Temple and Captain Cypher, who told the people they would "never put off that ribbon," because it was the *true blue*. Are they now ashamed of what once they so gloried in? Has the color faded or has their virtue fled? If the ribbon was good to wear three years ago, and represented a thing that was eternal, why not wear it now? Why not hang it on the dogs' necks as in those crazy dog days we speak of? and set it fluttering from horse's headstalls? yea why not fair maidens, as then, now adorn their bosoms with a knot of blue, just where the locket of their lovers is—not. This is no attack on either dogs, or horses, or fanatics, but it is the truth. When the writer, in the midst of the tornado, prophesied the day would come when there would be no blue ribbon to be seen, one of the orators just reclaimed from the ditch, amid deafening applause threatened to ride him on a rail. Now then where is the blue ribbon?

The *Freeman* calls Father McWilliams a "gushing Tory," because he invited Sir John McDonald and Sir Leonard Tilley to his picnic at Bath. Of course the *Freeman's* Editor is a man who has never had any clerical influence used in his behalf! Characteristic.

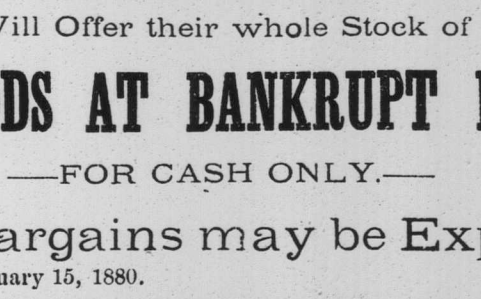


