In the commune of Carbone 21 persons had been killed and 19 wounded. Castelsano was nearly levelled with the ground, and 400 persons had perished. The same misfortune befel Sarcerio, where 30 persons perished. Marate, partly destroyed, deplores the death of one person. The other communes of Lagonegro, where the houses generally have suffered, and, above all, the churches, are, Maratea, Lauria, Castelluccia Rotonda, Vigianello, Sant' Arcangelo, Calvera San Martino, Castronuovo, and Senise. No information of the number of the dead in these places has been received, and the general and I fear too well founded, impression is, that many thousands have perished. Indeed, I have heard the dead, wounded, and missing calculated at 22,000, and I think it not at all improbable.
