The Hadson's Bay Zompany is building a replice of their inst post in this region. It was known as "Kootenay House" and was built by the intropid astronomer and exclorer, David Thompson, in 1806 on the shore of lovely Lake Windermere. I heartily agree with the stand on the Temperance question, which the Advocate took, in your last issue




