Why Milk Sours.

thunder sours milk, but this is not so. The reason that milk sours is that plants, known as bacteria act on the sugar in milk, changing it into lactic or milk acid. One scientist, however, says this explanation is not satisfactory. He regards the souring of milk as a result of feeding on milk sugar by the lactic acid germs, leaving behind them what is known as sour milk. No matter what the true explana-

tion may be in detail, we believe that souring of milk is caused in some way by "germs" or bacteria which are microscopic plants that fall into milk from the air, and get in from many other places.

Like all plants, they must have air. suitable temperature, and moisture, n order to grow. The common plan preventing the milk going sour is to cool it to 50 deg. F. as soon as possible after milking and keep it cold until it is used. The reason for this is, the cold makes an unfavor able condition for these plants to grow, hence the milk remains sweet, though sometimes it takes on bad flavors, or develops disease producing germs. In order to prevent this, we "pasteurize" milk in order to kill the germs present, by means of heat. If it is cooled and kept cold after heat-

BLACKHEAD OF TURKEYS

(Contributed by Ontario Department of

▼HE disease of turkeys commonly known as blackhead (entero-hepatitis) is one that has caused untold and the summer annex, the Lake havor to the furkey-raising industry in North America. It is responsible for more sickness and deaths among turkeys than all other diseases combined. It has practically stamped out turkey-raising in many districts. It is an infectious disease primarily affecting the intestines, more particularly the caeca (blind pouches) and later the liver. It is caused by

"Entamoeba maleagridis," a minute unicellular animal organism to see which a high power microscope is necessary. This minute organism is picked up with the food on infected soil. On reaching the caeca with the passage of food it penetrates the mu-cous lining where it induces inflam mation, congestion, thickening of the caecal walls and ulceration. The contents of the caeca thicken into a cheesy or hard dry mass mixed with blood and broken-down epithelial tissue from the mucous lining of the

While this condition of the caeca is developing some of the entamoeba make their way to the liver, where they establish themselves and multiply. The areas of the liver tissue in which the entamoeba establish hemselves soon become necrotic, that is they degenerate and die. On post-mortem examination these crotic areas are very noticeable as whitish or gray, round to irregular, flat or slightly sunken patches in the liver tissue. Sometimes as much as sixty per cent, of the liver tissue will be composed of these necrotic areas

Needless to say the congestion an ulceration of the casea and the ne-crosis of the liver interfere very materially with the functioning of hese organs and as a conseque the affected bird becomes listless mopy, loses flesh and the head loses its bright colored appearance, becoming dull in lustre and dark in color which condition is responsible for the common name of the disease-black-

Turkeys are liable to contract the disease at any age; they, however, mostly become infected when young. Many die as poults from an acute attack of the disease; others have the disease in a chronic form and live to maturity, but these are never thrifty and always look poor and miserable when compared with healthy birds.

There is no known cure for the disease. Turkeys that show the sympand the muscle meat in fair condition, it may be used for human con umption as there is little or no danger of man contracting the disease or suffering ill effects as a consequence, particularly, if the meat is well cooked. The texture and flavor of the meat, however, will not be so desirable as that from a healthy bird.

Immediate killing of affected birds is recommended because the drop-pings from such are liable to be heavily infested with the organisms that cause the disease. These being scattered around will naturally spread the disease. It is from the droppings of affected birds that the land gets contaminated and other birds

contract the disease.

If affected turkeys are out on free range it is practically impossible to control the spread of the disease amongst others of the flock. Il, however, they are kept in colony houses and small runs there is a chance to practice hygienic measures which will limit the dissemination of the causal organism to these small areas which can be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected after the sick birds have

been disposed of.

The ordinary domestic fowl is liaole to suffer from the same trouble but usually much less acutely than the turkey. In fact, the domestic fowl may harbor the parasite without showing any signs of ill-health For this reason blackhead is found more common amongst turkeys that run with flocks of domestic fowl than amongst those which are kept by themselves, hence turkeys should not be allowed to run with other fowl.— D. H. Jones, O.A.C., Guelph.

Handling Asparagus After the Cut Handling of beds of asparagua after the cutting season is compar-atively simple. The first thing necessary is to slop all cutting no later than the first of July. At this time give the bed a thorough cultivation and a heavy coat of manure to the depth of about four to six inches. The addition of commercial fertilizer at the rate of 800 to 1,000 pounds per acre made up largely of nitrogen and phosphorous will be a great help to it. Then allow the bed to grow until the fall, being sure that it is Mixture to keep down the asparagus ust and destroy the usparagus heeboth in the adult and larval tage. To this poisoned Bordeaux bould be added a sticker made of in or soap as the spray will not adhere to the smooth surface unless this is done. In October when the berries are turning red all the tops should be cut off and burned to remove and danger of asparagus rust or larvae being carried over to next year. The final preparation in the fall is by ploughing toward the row. This will give drainage during the winter time, thus drying out the soil much earlier in the spring when the burrows will be throw back and the burrows will be throw back and the bed gets a much earlier start.—

NATURAL GAS DEVELOPMENT

The first discovery of natural gas in the Province of Alberta of which we have record, took place in May, 1884, at Alderson, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 35 miles west of Medicine Hat. The railway constructon gang, boring for water, struck a heavy pocket of gas at a depth of 1,300 feet. A little later in he same year, gas was also discovered at Cassils, 6 miles further west, but while this well soon choked, that at Alderson continued to flow for

many years.
In 1890, Medicine Hat, then but a small town, sank a well and found a small supply at 700 feet; four years later another attempt was made, and history tells how at the eleventh hour, with money all spent—facing bankruptcy—and despair and gloom in the hearts of the mayor and city council, a sensational flow was un-covered at a depth of twelve to thirteen hundred feet. The cheap, apparently unlimited fuel supply, both for commercial and domestic purposes, is largely accountable for that city's growth and present prosperous

There are several known gas fields in the Province of Alberta, but as yet only two have been utilized for commercial purposes to any considerable extent, namely, the Medicine Hat and Bow Island Fields. Bow Island lies on the railway line about half way between Mediicne Hat and Lethbridge, 180 miles south-east of Cal-



SOMETHING ABOUT MILK Mysteries and Marvels in Its Production and Life.

Milk Is Secreted-Thunder Does Not Sour Milk, But Bacteria Does the Business-Agalactia, or Absence of Milk, Occurs More Frequently With Cows Than In the Females of Other Live Stock.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.) CONDITION known as "aga-

lactia," or absence of milk in the mammae at the time of parturition, probably ocurs more frequently in cows than n females of other classes of stock. It may occur in a female in any condition as regards general health, genral care and surroundings. The auses, or conditions to which it is due, are not well understood. It occurs even though pregnancy has been apparently normal and has reached full term. It is probably more frequently seen in females which have not bred for a long time, or in those which have produced their first young, though themselves aged. While it may occur in an animal under any conditions, there are conditions that appear to predispose an animal to the trouble. In such cases there appears to be a want of which may have been caused by previous or present chronic disease the udder, a chronic lessening in bulk, called "atrophy" of the udder, exhaustion following disease, severe

ural debility, emaciation, etc. The mammae is usually small and soft, and attempts to milk produce only a few drops of a yellowish fluid. In some cases followed by a few drops Dr. D. V. Curey, M.O.H. of a whitish, watery fluid. Treatment sists in feeding liberally on easily digested milk-producing food, massaging the udder frequently and stripping the teats three or four times daily. Great attention should be paid to the digestive organs in order to keep them as normal as possible, and the patient should be kept every succeeding Tuesday and Friday so that she will take considerable at the same hours until further noexercise. The writer's experience has been that the administration of drugs is non-effective.

In many cases the gland becomes perfectly inactive, and remains so until after the next parturition, when, in most cases, it becomes normal .- J. H. R., O. A. College, Guelph.

ENRICHING THE SOIL

Some Hints Upon the Wise Use of Artificial Fertilizers.

Fuller Use of These Fertilizers Likely -Their Application Must Be Handled Intelligently - Study Your Own Soil Closely-General Farm Hints.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of

THE use of artificial fertilizers in this country is bound to increase. These materials are, however, expensive and those intending to make use of them should make an effort to inform themselves regarding the conditions under which they will give the best results. Too many people are using fertilizers without fully realizing that they carry plants food and that the real object in applying them is to supply needed available food for the

To intelligently make use of these be considered. First the needs of the soil, second, the needs of the plant, and, third, the nature of the materials to be applied.

It should always be kept in mind that the soil carries immense amounts of plant food, but that only a small quantity of this is rendered available during the growing season. The acids formed by the decay of the organic matter in the soil is the chief natural agency operating to ter into a form that may be taken up by the plant. The organic matter is also the source of nitrogen to the plant, and it increases the water holding capacity of the soil as well as improves its physical condition. Consequently every effort ought to be made to maintain or increase the amount of decaying organic matter. Otherwise the crop will be grown largely from the added fertilizers and not from the plant food of the soil! It is for this reason that it is sometimes stated that if you commence to use fertilizers you must

continue their use. However, no matter how much we try to render available the immense stores of food in the soil, we cannot bring it about fast enough to supply the needs, especially of heavy feed ing crops, such as the mangels, tur nips and garden crops. Hence the need of manures. Stable manure cannot always be got in sufficient quantities to fulfill requirements, nor does it always furnish the needed plant food in the right proportions

Stable manure is essentially nitrogenous fertilizer. Hence if used in large quantities it will force big turity. Consequently, a plentiful supply of stable manure would help the tory for tomatoes, sugar beets, or other crops that must be brought to What these plants need is On the other hand, plants like lettuce, spinach, etc., are grown for their leaf and stem and maturity is not a necessary point, hence a soluble form of nitrogenous fertilizers may even be added after heavy applications of

manure with good results. The manufacturer of mixed fertient crops, but the farmer or gardener should strive to inform himself regarding his soil and crop needs that he may be able to select the form

General Farm Hints.

Put a plant or two of rhubarb in the cellar which should be kept at a temperature of 60 to 70 degrees in sand, which is kept moist and in the dark so that it will produce stems and no leaves. Do some reading or gardening work for this year, bu more especially think over the failures of the last.

If the roads are in good shape get your manure out and spread. A dressing of 8 to 10 loads per acre will keep the orchard in condition. If buying in the larger cities, order early as the car situation is serious enough to delay shipments.

Light pruning of apple orchards taking out the small wood with the long-handled pruners, may be carried out during bright weather. Grape trimming may also be looked after when the weather is suitable.
