



#### THE WAR!

Three Points -A Rumor that Ladysmith has been Relieved.

The London Daily Telegraph's corresondent, under date of the 17th says :-"I am permitted to wire from Spear man's Farm that Gen. Lytteton yesterday afternoon ferried and forded Potgieter's Drift and seized, with little opposiion, a line of low ridges a mile from here. During the night a howitzer batery was carried across. Today from Mount Alice, near Swartz Kop, naval guns and howitzers effectually shelled the Boer position, which is strong. General Warren also today crossed the Tugela six miles further to the west, near Wagon Drift, with all arms, in the face of a hot

and heavy fire from Boer cannon and rifles. He has effected a most satisfactory lodgement two miles further on tovard Sproon Kop." A despatch to the Daily News from pearman's Farm describes Lord Dunonald's advance to Swartz Kop Hill, ommanding Potgieter's Drift, and says : Gen. Lyttleton's brigade was sent to hold a position on Swartz Kop Hill.

A rumor that Ladysmith had been relieved reached the British, who sent up ringing cheers as this was taken for an advance. The great kopje was carried at the point of the bayonet and the Boers retreated to the next kopje. The British advanced speedily and the Boers relaxed slightly. The latter did not show such tenacity as pr viously. Apparently the Boers were short of ammunition.

The War Office has received the following from General Buller dated Spearman's Camp, Jan. 21 6.55 a.m. In order to relieve the pressure of General Warren and ascertain the strength of the enemy in their positions in front of Potgieter's drift, General Lyttleton made a reconnaissance in force yesterday.


