FORESTS AND CIVILIZATION We might have had some real forestry here in the State of New York if we had been sufficiently advanced in the art of living; if we had had the interest in the public welfare and the perception of our historical state. public welfare and the perception of our obligation to coming generations, which are necessary to the development and persistence of civilization. The entire Adirondsck Wilderness should have been held permanently in the possession of the state. Then a rest school of the state of the woods, and young mere applied have been trained in the practice and have been trained in the practice. could have been trained in the practice of this art, and they could have been employed in the care of the forests and woodlands of other portions of the country. The whole tract of 8000 square miles was originally heavily wooded. The timber could have been cut, off as the trees matured, and, of course, should have been so cut off. Nothing could be more absurd than the notion that trees should never be utilized or removed. Whenever a tree has come to its best it should se cut down, and its wood applied to some useful purpose, so as to obtain its value, and in order to provide for a succession of generations of trees, and thus for the permanent life of the for-

If the Adirondsck forests had been thus intelligently managed and administerd they would now have been for a long time yielding an increasing revenue to the people of the state The whole pop-ulation would have been greatly benefit ed by the reduction of taxation. Every man and woman in the state would have been richer today—would have had more of the means of subsiftence and of confort and happiness than at present Every child in the state would have been born to a better inheritance and n born to a better inheritance, and inte more favorable conditions than now The forests would have been better now than ever before, and they would have gone on increasing in value to the peo ple of the state, with the increasing density of population, and on account of the exhaustion of the timber-supply in re gions fit for agriculture.

The Adirondack region is not fit for agriculture. No part of it is suitable for any other than forest-conditions, and these should have been maintained for-It is indeed impossible to disturb these conditions very extensive ly, or to remove the forests permanentwithout destroying the region itself and annihilating everything that makes it of any value. I doubt if an instance of more obvious and complete adapta-tion of a region to a special and particu-lar use can be found in the whole world. Nature made this region for the permanent and everlasting growth of forests, and this sole and exclusive adaptation to

Tens of thousands of acres, entirely unfit Tens of thousands of acres, entirely unfit for any use but forest-growth, have been stripped of trees, and by cultivation and pasturage have been rendered incapable of reproducing the only crop for which the land ever had any adaptation. It is strange—if anything in human folly is strange—to see so many people persist in this effort to "farm" where the soil is so meagre, and the country so high and cold, that no profitable return for their labors is possible. The thin film of soil disappears after a few years, leaving only the bare, inert sand or gravel, and as most of the "farming land" here is rolling or hilly the slopes soon begin to break down and wash away. Great gullies are formed, which grow wider and deeper every year, till vast waterless tracts of shifting sand, or of clay and gravel, varied only by rock-ledges and boulders, stretch before the unhappy traveler where once grew noble forests fed by perennial springs.



Shoes are one of the expenses ut culet that may be reduced only by care A worn out shoe is not possible of reno-vation; no amount of skill will make it pass as new. The only possible way to save in shoe-leather is to care properly for the shoes while wearing them. A writer in the Brooklyn Eagle makes some very wise suggestions about the proper care of shoes.

"Particular attention should be paid,

in every home, to the care of shoes. Where there are children there is gener ally an accumulation of shoes partly worn and wholly worn, and these ate all thrown in the bottom of the closet together and must be assorted when wanted. Peach Pot Pie.—Put into a baking dish, lined with paste, some sliced peaches; sprinkle them with soft white sugar and a little pewdered cinnamon. Let it bake slowly for three hours, until the lines capalies. When cold it is very dejuice candies. When cold it is very de-

Frozen Peaches. - A quart of canned or fresh peaches, a heaping pint of gran-ulated sugar, one quart of water. Boil the sugar and water twelve minutes, add

Worcestershire Sauce. - Take one galton of ripe tomatoes, mash and simmer in three quarts of water. Boil down and strain in a sieve. Now add to the juice two tablespoonfuls of girger, two of mace, two of whole black pepper, two of salt, one of cloves and two of cayenne pepper. Let summer until reduced to one quart. Pour in half a pint of best vinegar, strain through a hair sieve; seal tightly in half

Sweet Pickled Peaches. - Make a syrup of five pounds of sugar and one pint of vinegar; let it come to a boil; skim off the froth as it rises. Pare ripe peaches, seven pounds without the skins—never leave the skins on—stick three cloves in each peach, put them in the syrup as soon as it begins to boil, and let them book until a broom splint will run through them easily. Skim carefully, and when cooked add broken-up stick cinnamon to taste. Put in a covered stone jar. If the fruit rises to the surface, place a china plate in the jar to keep the fruit under the syrup; other-wise it will turn dark.

Tapioca and Peaches.-This may be made with canned peaches or from the fresh fruit, pared and coddled whole in a little augar. Soak half a pint of tapioca for a whole morning, or over night, in a half pint of cold water. Fill a baking dish about two thirds itsdepth with the peaches taken from the syrup; sprinkle with sugar and bake from twenty to thirty minutes; add half a pint of the peach syrup to the tapices and put it on to boil, adding one gill of boiling water and one gill of sugar. When it is clear pour it over the peaches and bake slow-ly for half an hour. If eaten cold, serve with sugar and cream; if hot, with "fairy butter.

Peach Jam or Marmalade Peel and stone enough finely flavored, fully ripe peaches to weigh four pounds when thus prepared. Crush the fruit and boil quickly for three quarters of an hour, stirring frequently. When partially boiled the fruit may be pressed through a sieve, which will greatly improve the jam, but this is not absolutely necessary. When the fruit has boiled three-quarters of an hour add two pounds and a half of white sugar; skim off the skum as it rises, and boil five minutes; add the
