

since he became famous and James Jeffries was the new champion of the world. It is well to remember here, however, that Jeffries was over 12 years the junior of Fitz, and the outcome may have been different if there had not been such a disparity

in the combatants ages. Jeffries next fight took place October 25th, 1899, his opponent be ing Thomas Sharkey, the sailor fight er, before the Coney Island Club and was witnessed by over ten thousand people, and lasted twenty-five rounds, the referee awarding the decision to Jeffries on points. After the contest Jeffries said: This was the hardest fight I ever had, and I never expect to go through such an experience again, for I believe I learned enough in this fight to knock out any man

The boiler maker's next exploit wa that of knocking out Jack Finnegan in half a round, or a minute and a half. Then the ex-champion, James Corbett, issued a challenge and a fight was the outcome, Coney Island again being the scene of the contest This fight lasted twenty-four rounds and Corbett being knocked out Jeffries added another \$20,000 to his already well-filled coffers. Then followed another fight with Gus Ruhlin, and a second contest with Fitzsimmons on July 2nd, 1902, the latter being defeated in the eight round. Next came Corbett who was beaten for the second time in a battle lasting a little over 9 rounds, Corbett declaring that Jeffries was the best fighter, in the world. Jack Munro was the next to fall before the onslaughts of this wonderful specimen of humanity, the fight being held at 3an Francisco on August 26, 1904, the contest lasting less than four minites. Munro received one blow that nearly sent him over the ropes, and t was said that when Jeffries deivered the knock-out blow it was the rfeatest relief imaginable to his oponent, who was nearly scared out of his life.

With his victory over Munro Jefries cleared the slate of the last of is rivals, and in 1905 announced his etirement from the ring. He bought farm and devoted all his time thereo up to the signing of the agreement with Johnson. He had conquered all he pugilists of repute in the world, nd it may be said of him as of another famous warrior: "This was the greatest Roman of them all.

JACK JOHNSON.

was born on March 31st, 1878, a Jalveston, Texas, where his father wned a ranch. In his young days t is said that Johnson had a great version to fighting, and it was his ister who had the task of fighting his attles. One day his mother told him e was old enough to see after himelf, promising to give him a whipping he did not defeat his next adverary. Jack took the lesson to heart nd duly subjugated that next boy 'his may be taken as the starting oint in the boxing career of Johnon. Experience soon worked an aprovement and Jack became the hampion of Galveston his native lace.

Johnson is said to be a well edu-

ated man, and is a fine singer. He ever worries-"cares not for the norrow so that the world goes well or the day." He has no system in raining for his big fights. But that ces not say he neglects his preparaion, for he is a hard worker. He is decided believer in studying the adividual, and troubles very little bout restrictions and limitations. Ie has the usual long walks, on the oad, while ball punching, shadowighting also receives attention. He ats what he likes and as often as he ikes. He is an all-round athlete, and is a graceful figure skater he would be hard to beat. As a runner there ere not many professionals who could hold there own with him, while n the art of swimming he is an exert. He is 6 ft. 1/2 in. in height. cales 14 stone and has a reach of 74 inches. A favourite diversion of is when he is in training is to let a couple of men hold on to his neck, by vhich medium he swings them cund and round. Johnson's strength s so phenomenal and spontaneous hat he is unconscious of its extent. Despite the number of contests he nas engaged in, Johnson bears no nark of his trade, which speaks volimes for the effectiveness of his de-'ence. In forty-eight contests Johnson has been declared the winner, and it is only on account of the "ne lecision" practice which prevails in the States that he has not a greater number of victories to his credit. Of the two nominal defeats he has sustained the referce's decision was so glaringly wrong in one that the spec tators laughed when they heards it; the other decision was given against him on a foul; but he again met his opponent and decisively defeated him. Seventeen of his victories were won by clean knock-out blows. To follow Johnson in the sixty-eight contests which he has fought would make this article unduly long. We have enleavoured to give a personal sketch of him, and we now leave our readers to form their own opinions. Hoping that the best man will win in the fight at Nevada to-day







Friedberg, Hesse, June 22.-A desperate attempt at robbery which occurred here late to-day resulted in two deaths and the wounding of several persons. A bomb was exploded at about half-past four o'clock in the hall. In the meantime a black masked robber entered the adjoining branch of the Imperial Bank and attacked the manager, who resisted The robber then drew a revolver and shot the manager in the neck. He seized a quantity of bank notes and some gold and fled. Having gained the street he mounted a bicycle and dashed off. A great crowd, attracted by the explosion, pursued the desperado, who fired repeatedly. One boy was killed and two others were injured. The police jumped into an auto and sped after the man, finally overtaking him, when he fired his last shot into his temple, falling dead in the street. He was recognized as a chaffeur named Barnstein.

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
