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

The Evening Chit-Chat
By RUTH CAMERON

"I hear that shirring is coming back into style," I said.

"I thought that a most mild, inoffensive remark, and was accordingly quite surprised when the dress-making lady who was squatting on the floor hanging my skirt with the aid of a mouthful of pins, nearly swallowed them in her effort to say something.

"Never!" she ejaculated, as soon as she had managed to extract sufficient of them to make speech safe and possible. "Never, I hope, Miss Cameron. Of all the ugly, inartistic things you can do to a dress, shirring is the worst. There is nothing attractive about it. If the material is pretty, shirring hides it. If the material is homely bunching it up like that makes it more so. The only possible use of shirring is to show that you could afford to have some poor dressmaker put a lot of work into your gown."

Did I quail before this tirade that I had aroused? No, indeed; I was delighted. I realized the value of having gotten the dressmaker lady nicely started to talk on a subject on which she is such an authority, and did my best to spur her on to tell some of the other inartistic and foolish mistakes women make in gowning themselves.

And here are some of the pearls of dressmakerly wisdom that she let fall.

"Never let a yoke line slant up in the slightest degree. That is absolutely fatal. The line should be straight or bow slightly downwards."

"In making the new overskirt dresses, if you have a coat of the same, be sure either that the coat covers the overskirt or that it cut well above it, and that the skirt follows the line of the coat."

"Many of the shirt waists, even from the most expensive houses, do not have the shoulder seam far enough back on the shoulder. This is a very bad fault, as it makes the back much less straight."

"The broad bands on the skirts at the knees that so many people are wearing are absolutely impossible. They make your figure look sawed off and your feet look enormous."

"Nothing is uglier than a long sleeve. Never mind, even if your arms are thin. They will look better bare than in the inartistic long sleeve. Have the sleeve just below the elbow, if that is painfully thin, but have it stop there."

"Dutch necks are absolutely impossible. I don't care if everybody on the face of the globe wears them. They are not good style. They look as if you had either forgotten your collar or were trying to crawl out of your dress head first. You should either have a distinctly low neck or high collar. Half breeds aren't accepted in good society."

"Never make a princess dress with out making the sleeves large and full. For some reason that accentuates the fine slender lines of the princess effect."

"Touches of black velvet on a light dress are extremely inartistic."

"A belt of separate color spoils a figure. A belt of the same color as the waist is poor taste, and of course makes you short-waisted. If you want to look trim and have the best figure possible to you, always have the belt the same goods as the waist and, if possible, stitch it on."

The Big Fight Between Jeffries and Jack Johnson.

To-day the eyes of the sporting world are focused round Nevada, where the great fight for the championship of the world is supposed to be in progress. The aspirants for the mastery in the domain of pugilism are James J. Jeffries, who has been termed "the Emperor of the boxing arena," and Jack Johnson, a colored fighter who wrested the title of "champion of the world" from Tommy Burns in a fourteen round battle in Australia in 1908.

To give an extended sketch of the careers of both aspirants for the championship is not the intention of the writer; but rather to deal with the most important points in the lives of each as they are known to him.

JAMES J. JEFFRIES was born in Carroll, in the State of Ohio, on April 15, 1875, but subsequently his family removed to Los Angeles, Cal., where young Jeffries was apprenticed to the boiler-making business. He is 6 ft. 1 in. in height, weighs nearly 16 stone and is said to be able to deliver a blow at an impact of 1,900 pounds. He is not reckoned a clever boxer, but he has developed a generalship in the ring far above the ordinary. Dr. T. H. Andrews demonstrator of Anatomy at a Philadelphia College, examined Jeffries after he had won the championship from Fitzsimmons, and gave out the following statement regarding him:—"I can very consistently say as a result, that of 2,500 men I have examined as a surgeon, including many of the world's most famous athletes Jeffries is emphatically the best specimen of muscular manhood I have ever seen." It was in 1896 that Jeffries first tried his hand seriously at boxing, and he soon became famous through having defeated every man he met with one exception—Gus Ruhlin—the referee in this case declaring the fight a draw. Then came the fight which made Jeffries famous in his line and gave him a purse of \$20,000 (?). He challenged Bob Fitzsimmons—the then holder of the title—and the fight took place on July 9, 1899, before the Coney Island Athletic Club before thousands of spectators. Jeffries entered the ring in this contest weighing 15 stone, 8 pounds, Fitzsimmons somewhat lighter, weighing about 12 stone. This battle lasted 11 rounds, Fitz going to the floor unconscious for the first time

Riding For a Fall.

Judging from the majority on the first division on the King's Accession Declaration Bill, and particularly from the substantial assent of Mr. Balfour, Premier Asquith will have little trouble with the bill. At one time all office holders, except the King, were subjected to this form of test. Nowadays, however, the King is the only office holder subject to this form of test.

It looks as if the Asquith Government will meet with more opposition on account of the Budget than from the King's Declaration Bill. The Nationalist party dislike parts of the Budget as heartily as the Unionists dislike other parts, and there appears to be as little doubt that this dislike is widely prevalent in Ireland, and that the O'Brien party are trading on it to the disadvantage of the Redmondites. It would be the irony of fate should the Budget bring down the Liberal party after all the agitation against the Lords for referring it to the people. And that may happen. But then, what about the Veto Bill, whose passage Redmond regards as a first step to Home Rule. The situation creates a dilemma for Redmond, and maybe that is the meaning of Lloyd George's present proposal. The future outlook may be so dark and difficult that Lloyd George is riding for a fall.

Fish struck in fairly plentiful at Indian Harbor last Thursday and the prospect looks good with all its contents. A schooner belonging to Mr. Hisecock, of Brigus, was lost at the White Islands last week. She ran ashore in a thick fog. The crew were brought up to Comfort Light by the s.s. Invermore.

Dr. Whidden, who had been on the Labrador all the winter and returned by the Invermore, covered the coast in his travels from Cartwright to Okak.

Capt. Bartlett's crew were landed at Turnavik by the Invermore. The crew of the s.s. Invermore saw the Beothic passing Cape Harrison last week, water from Cape Charles down to Indian Harbor.

A large number of schooners bound to Northern Labrador were hung up on the southern part of the coast at Dead Island and Sanderly built at June the 29th on account of heavy up winds.

The traps had to be taken in and laid on shore all the week from the 21st to the 28th of June on the Labrador from Horse Harbor to Battle Hr. The fish appeared to be just striking in at Battle Harbor on the 29th of June. That day boats had from two to three quintals on hook and line.

Fish was reported abundantly plentiful in deep water from Cape Charles down to Indian Harbor.

Fire Destroys House.

At midnight Saturday, the residence of Mr. Thos. Bates, accountant at J. D. Ryan's, was burned to the ground at the Bay with all its contents. Mr. Bates intended moving down there to-day and had most of his furniture there. He resides there with his children. He recently built an addition to the place and had a small insurance upon it. A lot of furniture destroyed in it. Mr. Bates loss must be about \$1000. It is thought that some man going over the road took shelter there out of the rain Saturday night and in smoking accidentally fired the house. The police are investigating the matter.

Poor Fishery on the Labrador.

The s.s. Invermore, Capt. Parsons, returned from her second trip to Labrador yesterday. The ship went as far north as Turnavik, arriving there June 28th. The weather was stormy all the way down the coast and for a whole week the sun could not be seen. Two or three schooners only had got below Cape Harrison, and a crew on the upper part of the shore had not reached their destination. At Bolster's Rock, Shannahan of Harbor Grace had about 40 qtls. From Emily south to Battle Harbor there was a fairly good sign in some of the harbors but the bad weather had held up operations. Traps had from five to ten quintals at several places, and when the weather settled good fishing was confidently expected. The D. P. Ingraham was met at Hawke's Harbor last Friday. The fishery on the French Shore is to date almost a failure.

St. Patrick's Parish.

At a meeting of the General Committee of St. Patrick's Parish held yesterday morning, presided over by Rev. Dean Born, the chairman reported that he had deposited \$2,388 in the bank to the credit of the fund for rebuilding the church. The General Committee will meet in future every fortnight. A monthly statement will be also made of the receipts and expenditure. After several other matters of minor importance were disposed of the meeting adjourned.



A Disgraceful Act.

About 11.40 Saturday night the
nurses and other attendants at the
General Hospital were thrown into a
state of excitement when they heard
a man walking over the roof of the
main building of the Institution and
believed, and correctly so, that a
thief was trying to enter the building.
He evidently climbed to the roof by
means of one of the ladders at the
side of the building and was watch-
ing his opportunity to enter and loot
the place.

When the outcry was raised, Dr.
Bert Tait, who is now in charge of the
Institution, was called from his room,
and was going through the wards to
ascertain if the marauder had enter-
ed the place, when he saw a man go
through one of the corridors and
quickly vanish into a cupboard or
small pantry near Miss Hannaford's
room. The police by this time had
been telephoned for, and in the mean-
time Dr. Tait had beard the man
who stood in the cupboard and secur-
ed from him 6 bunches of keys which
he had purloined and with which he
could gain access to every room in
the building especially to that of the
Matron, Miss Southcott, where there
was a deal of money and valuables.
The doctor then thought to detain the
man until the police arrived, but put-
ting his hand in his pocket as if to
draw a weapon and threatening at
the same time to shoot the medico
he ran away and made for his
home.

He was by this time re-
cognized by some of the nurses as
John Sullivan, of Georgetown, who
had been in the hospital ill for several
months, and was only released on the
28th April past. He was concern-
ed in the robbery of a slot meter
and was given a long term in the
Penitentiary from which institution
he was transferred to the hospital.
While in the hospital it was noticed
by the Matron and others that the
man was of a prying disposition,
visited all the rooms and paid special
attention to the cook's department.

appear evident that he was by so ac-

sign on the building. Officers Hum-

the man's house, and finding him
home arrested him. It is now be-
lieved that the man went to the
hospital in the evening and secreted
himself in the building to await an
opportunity to steal at night, and
that the party heard on the roof was
an accomplice whose name the other
stoutly refuses to impart to the police.
The finding of the man created much
excitement amongst the patients.

Survey Ship Arrives.

The Norwegian Fishery Survey
ship, Michael Sars, Capt. Iversen, ar-
rived here at 1 a.m. yesterday to re-
plenish her bunkers. The vessel is
engaged in scientific research con-
nected with the fisheries and left
Norway for her cruise about the lat-
ter part of March, proceeding to Fly-
mouth, England, and thence to the
Azores. Sir John Murray, an Eng-
lish gentleman and one of the princi-
pals in the expedition left the vessel
to come here via New York. The
cruiser visited the Banks and other
fish resorts on her work and struck
a severe storm on the Grand Banks,
about a week ago being badly buffe-
red. Her rudder was somewhat dam-
aged but beyond that there was no
other very serious damage, while the
storm progressed a big sea ran but
the vessel proved herself a good sea
boat. She has on board five scientific
gentlemen from Norway, Professor
Gran, Dr. Melland Nawsen, Dr. Koef-
od and Dr. Njord. The cruiser is the
property of the Norwegian Govern-
ment, built in 1906 and is a ship of
226 tons gross. When the ship
coals and refits she will sail for Nor-
way via Scotland and should arrive
home in August. Sir John Murray
the gentleman alluded to above is a
Canadian by birth and is one of the
greatest authorities on marine life
alive to-day. Mr. Tasker Cook, Nor-
wegian Vice Consul is looking after
the supplying of the vessel.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Milk jars in which milk has soured can be most quickly cleaned by putting first under a hot water spigot, then filling with cool water in which has been dissolved a liberal quantity of washing soda.

In spite of printed directions on cans, it is never perfectly safe to put a sealed can in hot water to heat. It is best to turn the contents out in a saucepan, otherwise an explosion is possible.

To make delicious oatmeal gems, mix a cup of oatmeal in a cup of sour milk, let soak over night and then add one teaspoonful of soda, a well-beaten egg and half a cup of sugar. Stir in flour enough to make a batter.

To soften and perfume the bathing water, mix together four ounces of alcohol, one half ounce of ammonia, and one dram of oil of lavender. A few drops of the mixture is sufficient for a bowl of water and is very refreshing.

If a glass stopper sticks, put around it a little olive oil and in an hour or so, if it still sticks, place the whole bottle in warm water and tap the stopper gently on either side. It is sure to come out.

A creamy-coffee custard can be made by stirring a pint of hot strong black coffee into a quart of custard still warm. Beat hard and serve in glasses with or without whipped cream on top. Cool the custards on ice.

For green corn fritters, cut the kernels from a dozen ears of corn and scrape the cob. Add two table-spoonfuls of flour and the yolks of three well-beaten eggs. Season with salt and pepper and fry in deep fat or butter.

To use up the dry ends of American cheese, grate them or run them through the food chopper, season with salt, pepper and paprika, and then moisten with cream, sweet or sour. Let it stand a day and use like cream cheese.

When doing fine embroidery it is better to baste the goods tightly against a piece of white oilcloth than to use embroidery rings. There will then be no fear of stretching the ma-

terial and the work may be handled easier.

The Russian plan in making iced tea is first to pour the hot tea over the grated rind of a lemon, then to pour it, still hot, over a large lump of ice, and to serve it in glasses half filled with finely shaved ice.

A Dutch supper may be made very attractive by using yellow tulips in a blue jar for a centerpiece, wooden shoes to hold the salted nuts, Delft blue shoe-shaped place cards, a bare table with blue d'oyleys, and brass finger bowls.

If it is desired to cook rice so that the grains will remain separate, wash it thoroughly, toss it gently in water that is at a galloping boil, remove it at the end of 40 minutes, drain it, cover it in a dish, and finish the cooking in the oven.

Marry Prince of Wales to German Princess.

Berlin, June 27.—It is rumored that the Kaiser and Kaiserin wish to marry their only daughter Princess Victoria Louise of Prussia to the eldest son of the King and Queen of England.

The Princess will be 18 in September, and is one year and three-quarters older than the Prince of Wales, but the Kaiserin is several months older than the Kaiser, and their second son is married to a Princess nearly three years older than he.

Potsdam court circles hope that the Prince of Wales will accompany his royal parents on their first official visit to Germany, and that he may then meet his third cousin, the Princess.

The European princes most eligible for the hand of the Kaiser's daughter are Roman Catholics, and the Kaiserin, who has brought up her daughter as a Protestant, would rather see her marry even an obscure Protestant prince than a Roman Catholic king.

The union with England's future King would probably go a long way to prevent hostilities between the two countries.

Robber on Bicycle.

Attempting to Escape, Kills a Boy and Shoots Himself.

Friedberg, Hesse, June 22.—A desperate attempt at robbery which occurred here late to-day resulted in two deaths and the wounding of several persons. A bomb was exploded at about half-past four o'clock in the hall. In the meantime a black masked robber entered the adjoining branch of the Imperial Bank and attacked the manager, who resisted. The robber then drew a revolver and shot the manager in the neck. He seized a quantity of bank notes and some gold and fled. Having gained the street he mounted a bicycle and dashed off. A great crowd, attracted by the explosion, pursued the desperado, who fired repeatedly. One boy was killed and two others were injured. The police jumped into an auto and sped after the man, finally overtaking him when he fired his last shot into his temple, falling dead in the street. He was recognized as a chauffeur named Barnstein.

The Flag of Denmark.

In the year 1219, King Waldemar of Denmark, when leading his troops to battle against the Livonians, saw, or thought he saw a bright light in the form of a cross in the sky. He held this appearance to be a promise of divine aid, and pressed forward to victory. From this time he had the cross placed on the flag of his country and called it the Dannebrog, that is, the strength of Denmark. Aside from legend, there is no doubt that this flag with the cross was adopted by Denmark in the thirteenth century, and that at about the same date an order, known as the order of Dannebrog, was instituted by which only soldiers and sailors who were distinguished for courage, were allowed to belong. The flag of Denmark, a plain red banner, bearing on it a white cross, is the oldest flag now in existence. For three hundred years, both Norway and Sweden were united with Denmark under this flag.—The Housekeeper.

Killed Two and Perished in Rush.

Ocella, Ga., Man Barricaded in Home, Fires on Sheriff's Party—Troops Ordered Out.

Ocella, Ga., June 27.—Barricaded in his home near here, W. S. Botwick, who last night killed the two officers and seriously wounded three others, was himself killed in a rush on his house to-day.

With Botwick in the house were six of his children, all small and some of them girls. Four officers were sent last night to arrest Botwick, and he opened fire on them as soon as they neared his home. Steve Davis, the Ocella chief of police, and Deputy Sheriff Sheffield were instantly killed. Chief Joseph McInnis was fatally wounded and Deputy T. C. Bass was shot and seriously hurt. Troops were ordered out and surrounded the house. The children were taken unhurt.

Baseball Kills a Policeman.

New York, June 23.—Gregory Darcy, a Staten Island policeman, is dead from injuries he received two weeks ago when he was struck in the stomach by a pitched ball. Darcy was catching. A pitched ball went through his hands and struck him in the pit of the stomach; he fell to the ground unconscious, but recovered temporarily and went on with the game. Two days later he reported sick and grew steadily worse.

Tests in Paper-Making

House Authorities Government to Seek to Find New Methods.

Washington, June 4.—An appropriation of \$30,000 has been made by the House to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct experiments in making paper from various plants and woods. This provision was made in an amendment to the Sundry Civil Bill.

Under this provision the Secretary is to "test such plants and woods as may require tests to ascertain if they will be suitable for making paper."

Politics in Pyrenees.

"One day," said a Parisian, "I arrived with my wife at an inn in the lower Pyrenees. It was during an electoral campaign. The place pleased me. Two days passed. At the moment of my departure I asked for my account. The innkeeper responded: 'You owe nothing. The Count de V., who is the candidate, has paid everything in this district for fifteen days. So I remained at that inn fifteen days without paying a sou.'—(From 'Cri de Paris'.)"
