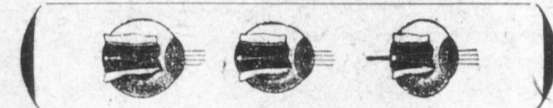

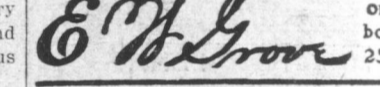
Heiress Weds an Elevator Boy.

In Boston the other day the first steps were taken toward the formation of a Servants Girls' Union.

This union plans to demand for its members an eight-hour day, not less than nine dollars a week, and exemption from all but certain duties definitely agreed upon as servant girls' duties.

I can plainly imagine how the average housewife, who is already paying nearly double what she did fifteen years ago for domestic service, shudders at this news.

Get a housewives' union first. What will its purpose be? To keep down wages and lengthen hours, you ask?

No, I didn't mean exactly that. Tell you what I mean. Over in Germany there has recently been formed a "League of Politeness."

Its members pledge themselves to politeness to all, rich or poor, insignificant or great, with whom they come in contact. And by politeness the women mean not just polished manners, but that finer, deeper politeness which has been beautifully defined as meaning, "To do or

say the kindest thing in the kindest way."

Well now, why can't the housewives' union be a sort of league of justice and kindness--a do or say-as-you-would-be-done-by league?

Its members would promise to treat their maids so justly and kindly that they should have no excuse for belonging to any hostile union.

To define requirements in regard to work, to regularly in regard to pay, to liberality in regard to time off, to justice in regard to complaints, to humanity and readiness to put themselves in her place, in regard to all relations with their maids the mistress who belonged to this union would be required to pledge themselves.

Perhaps it might be well if they were also obliged to sign a written pledge something like this: "I will promise to always keep in mind that my maid is not a housework machine, but a woman like myself, with the same longings for happiness that I have, and to do all in my power to give her a fair chance for that happiness."

Not to be accepted as a member of this union would, of course, be a public disgrace.

Does it all sound so very absurd to you?

I hope not, for if you are the kind of woman I think you are, I am sure you are already a silent member of this unformed league, and only waiting for its formation to give it your public support.

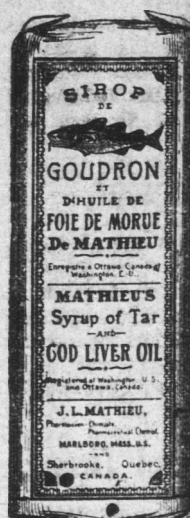

That Wonderful Change

Editor Evening Telegram. Mr. Editor.--In my last letter, which you were good enough to give a place in your paper, I promised to take notice of more of the "great blessings" (1) which this "wonderful change in the Government" has brought to us.

Well, Sir, I would next notice that our fire fighting system has been completely remodelled and it was altogether unnecessary for the Super. of the St. John's force to look over the apparatus used abroad or the equipment, for if he had only paid a visit to this little town and had taken stock of our up-to-date equipment, then he might have gone back and had the very latest "made to order" ladder outfit and all the paraphernalia. Sir, we have a new bell, not "Big Ben" but "Big Jim" equipped with some kind of electrical device by which an alarm can be sounded from Victoria, and any one can press a button anywhere to summon the brigade; said button is usually concealed in a cork. The fire hall is a model of elegance and comfort and affords a splendid sanatorium for the weary and distressed, and even sympathizers of a former Government are not refused the luxury of a rest and a game of pool even a place on the management, but of late some of the members have made a kick that would do credit to a Sable Island pony, and wish to have none but the members' friends for offices of emolument.

Now, Sir, I am reminded of the Agricultural Society which was formed here last spring and which has been the means of scattering untold blessings everywhere around the district. The "lavish" distribution of seed last spring just saved the situation for the poor Labrador man. Why, Sir, that seed barely averted a famine. For while canker and other queer diseases had taken hold of the usual potatoes planted, this new agricultural seed, and so much of it (1), scattered everywhere broadcast, just chased away "all" vegetable disease. Of course it was treated a la "See More" and sold at 5c. a gallon, with the distinct understanding that the gallon was to be returned in the fall. The members "amateur" of course, undertook very generously to look after this seed distribution at his store and are too magnanimous to seek compensation.

Those Sable Island ponies are the admiration of the Bay; they are so spirited and yet such graceful stepping animals that you must admire them; and of course the seed distributor, who is a horse commissioner as well, had to pass judgment upon this special breed and bring them to the pink of condition for sale or distribution. One of the distinctive features of this class of pony is that they thrive upon any old thing--sawdust or shavings, or even peat, and only 50c. per day per head is a very small charge for their keep. We have no ponies in this part of the country to compare with those Sables (2) in point of cheap feeders, but quite a number of our own good hardy serviceable stock has been exported to Cape Breton during the early winter, and yet any fine day a few others can be seen on the roads drawing good loads of firewood, etc.

Then, again, Sir, there were some "bills" brought here and they were specially attractive (3) because prize winners they must have been, but we hear they did not take kindly to the parties for whom they were intended and the district will lose the services of this very necessary agricultural adjunct from which such prolific breeding was expected as to knock the bottom out of meat prices and so lessen the poor man's burden.

Then again, Sir, we had some exceptionally fine pigs imported by our Society, but strange to say those pigs, unlike the ponies, would not thrive unless specially dieted, and to save expense (3) when they reached a certain age they were converted into that ery necessary adjunct to the cabbage pot--pork (partly owing to the abnormal yield from the cabbage seed). Mr. Editor, there is no reason or any one to get the idea into their head that any voter who marked his ballot for the Liberal candidate last election even got the odor of that rolling pot.

Through the efforts of this Agricultural Society, Sir, our whole neighborhood has been transformed into model farms and ranches, and every housewife is vying with her neighbor to grow a nice plant or make a pound of fresh butter, expecting the two dollar prize at this year's exhibition. I notice, Sir, that we have a new officer, not to dole out pauper relief, but to distribute "pensions" and, Sir, this official is provided with a brand new up-to-date office. The only thing wanting is an electric light, so that the old and infirm might be taken right up in his august presence and receive their magnificent (?) Government gift from this affable and obliging official, who has quite a raise in pay just equal to the Old Fisherman's Pension, \$50.00.

THE AGRICULTURAL WASTE.
In another part of this issue will be found the way some \$6,170 of the Fund for Agricultural development was distributed among Messrs. Seymour, Downey and Devereaux. This scandal was exposed in the House of Assembly by the Leader of the Opposition, Sir Robert Bond, on Wednesday last, when he showed that the Marine Agricultural Policy was working out in the direction of destroying the sound foundations laid in 1908 and of providing jobs for members of the House who were neither scientific nor practical agriculturists.

An itemized statement of amounts paid to these three members of the House of Assembly was furnished by the Minister of Agriculture in answer to a question propounded by Mr. Clapp, the member for the District of St. Barbe's.

LOOKING AFTER THE MUMMY.
Another scandal was unearthed in connection with the Museum. It will be remembered that one of the charges made against the late Government was that a Museum had been built to house a mummy. Now it appears the Government have made three new appointments in connection with the Museum. The curator has been given a Secretary and two assistants to help him.

THE TIMBER GRABS.
On Thursday last in the House of Assembly, in discussing the Bill to amend the Crown Lands Act, Sir Robert Bond said in reference to the action of the Administration:

"Since the present Government came into power they have approved applications for immense areas of public-so-called timber lands. Since January 1, 1910, they have approved applications for

Fifty Million Acres, or seventy-eight thousand one hundred and twenty-five square miles of timber areas. The fees that were payable upon that vast area under the Act of 1903 amounted to Three hundred and twelve thousand five hundred dollars, but, I observe from the statements tabled by the Department of Agriculture that only Fifty-nine thousand two hundred and sixty-four has been paid by the applicants leaving a balance due to the Crown of Two hundred and sixty-three thousand two hundred and thirty-six dollars.

Unless this Bill becomes law Fifty million acres of land now held by speculators and land grabbers must revert to the Crown, because of non-compliance with the law under which the applications were approved. Let this Bill become law and those Fifty million acres may remain locked up in the hands of the speculators and land grabbers for the next three years."

He also declared:—
"The object of this measure is so apparent that I am amazed it was ever brought forward. It is an Act purely and simply in the interest of the speculators and timber grabbers who hold in their possession to-day the whole of the timber areas of Newfoundland and of the Labrador as well."

Further, he says:—
"I can perceive nothing but injustice and inequity running through this bill. If it becomes law it will work an injustice upon the people of this country, by locking up our public lands in the hands of speculators; by depriving this country of the revenue that should flow from those lands; by fostering and aiding monopolistic combinations which have proved the curse of every land where they have held sway."

The greatest indictment of all, and one to which we direct the attention of the Premier, the members of the Executive Council, the members of the Legislature, His Excellency the Governor and the electorate at large is the following:—

"If it becomes law it will be inequitable, because it will have become such by the vote of those members of this House who have a personal interest in the timber areas held under license, and therefore a personal interest in this legislation.

No serious attempt was made in the House of Assembly to meet this challenge. We shall wait to see what the Premier and his colleagues do next week. Yesterday we asked for a Royal Commission to take evidence on oath, as to those interested in the grants of Crown Lands and in the companies who have taken them over. Such an evasion as appears in the Daily News will not satisfy us.

We turn now to another matter, somewhat akin to the feeling of the Agricultural trio, Messrs. Seymour, Devereaux and Downey. It may not be known that there is another trio who have been thriving as well as the new Brussels sprout. The members of this trio have been doing well out of duties assigned to them in connection with the purchasing of the rights of way for the Bonavista Branch railway. The members of this favoured trio are the Hon. C. H. Emerson, M.H.A. and member of the Executive Council; Mr. Goodison, M.H.A., and Mr. Jordan Milley, who was in the Morris team for Twillingate District. Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, March 10. That the army now being massed on the Mexican border has before it the prospect of an immediate invasion of the Southern Republic may be confirmed at any time, as within the next 48 hours the forward movement may take place. From San Antonio the troops will penetrate Mexico at El Paso, Eagle Pass and La Redo. The marines will be landed at Tampaco and Matamoros. The first object of the expedition will be the crushing of the rebels in the Chihuahua province. Torreon will be used as the base of supplies, with Monterrey as a sub-base for the march on Mexico city, should such become necessary. The military campaign is in the instruction of Foreign Governments, which have demanded protection by the United States of the billions of dollars invested in Mexico. The movement has also the sanction of President Diaz and his Government. The revolution is gaining in strength in Mexico, and a revolutionary government will be established in Lower California. Lower California commands Magdalena Bay, which the United States would like for a naval station, being a point in the fortification of the Panama Canal. Japan's desire to secure Magdalena Bay also furnishes a motive.

Special to Evening Telegram. TORONTO, March 10. About 5,000 persons assembled in Massey Hall last evening to protest against the Reciprocity Agreement. A strong resolution was passed unanimously condemning the pact. The meeting was non-partisan. It is intended to inaugurate a campaign of education and peaceful agitation against the Reciprocity proposals. All the speakers with one exception were Liberals. The sentiment was overwhelmingly in accordance with the views presented by the opponents of Reciprocity.

Special Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, March 10. The Census Commissioner says he believes the census of Canada taken this summer will show an increase in the population of the country over that of the last official census of 1901 of at least 50 per cent. According to his estimate the census will show the total population of Canada to be near 8 millions in 1911.

Special Evening Telegram. MOURMELON, France, March 10. In a monoplane flight with two passengers Nimrod established a new record for speed. He covered 110 1/2 kilometres (68 1/2 miles) at a speed of 64 miles an hour.

In the Assembly.

Resolutions of Condolence Passed on the Death of Mr. E. H. Davey, M.L.A., for Burin. The House of Assembly opened at 3 p.m. yesterday. His Honour the Speaker presiding and most of the members being present. The surroundings took on a funeral aspect, the blinds to the windows being drawn and the countenances of all present indelicated the sorrow which filled their breasts over the loss of a close friend and popular fellow legislator in the person of the late Mr. Edward H. Davey, representative of the District of Burin. Perfect silence reigned and the officials in the Chamber went about their several duties with noiseless feet. After the minutes of the previous session had been read, and many spectators had quietly taken their places, the Premier (Sir E. P. Morris) who it could be seen was much affected, rose to officially announce to the House the death of their brother member, and to move Resolutions of Condolence. Sir Edward in a voice saddened by emotion referred to the sad circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Davey who for many years had been respected and valued representative in the Assembly. Parry had done so suddenly and unexpectedly as it had to the surprise of all. It was comparatively only a few days before that Mr. Davey sat in his accustomed place and took an active and prominent part in the deliberations of the Legislature, none present then could imagine that the Angel of Death would so soon convey to him the dread summons which all must receive one day. The vacant chair in the Assembly Chamber was a sad reminder of the death of a worthy man, and proclaimed to all present the personal and public loss sustained. A small community like this could ill afford to lose a man of such sterling character and great worth as the deceased. Mr. Davey was not alone prominent in all the work of the denomination of which he was Church Warden for many years, but in the councils of the Synod, in the Vestries and in the School Boards and in works of philanthropy, charity, social reform and remedial legislation, he was an earnest and zealous worker. By his demise a void has been created which will not be easily filled. As a business man the deceased possessed a character remarkable for thoroughness, and he was noted for faithfulness in carrying out his obligations even though such performance entailed loss. His wise counsel and mature, unbiased judgment must be a loss to the Legislature and the District he so well represented and the party he so faithfully followed would find it difficult to replace him. Sir Edward had known Mr. Davey from boyhood, and during his occupancy of a seat in the Legislature had been associated with him as a member of the same party, so that he could speak with intimate knowledge of the excellent traits of character which he possessed. His death would mean a great loss to the people of the Anglican Communion. After the great fire of 1892 he resumed the burden of responsibility restoring the Cathedral to its present imposing proportions and it will stand as a monument to his energy and ability. He never gave an opinion or a vote without thoroughly mastering the subject matter which such vote affected. He studied to discover his duties and having made up his mind never deviated from the path of duty. Sir Edward spoke of his connection with the Anglican, S. O. E. and S. U. F. Societies and the important part he took in their deliberations and guidance. His loyalty to the Throne and British Institutions was referred to. Sir Edward feelingly referred to the great sorrows which afflicted the deceased in the last years of his life, which did not pass lightly by but helped break his big generous heart. The greatest of these griefs was the death a few months ago of his wife. Sir Edward expressed the hope that the deceased had gained the reward that must follow a life of usefulness and of devotion to duty. As a token of respect to the deceased he then moved the adjournment of the House until Monday next, coupling with the motion the following Resolution:—

RESOLVED: That this House desires to place upon record an expression of regret at the death of MR. EDWARD DAVEY, a member for this District of Burin, by which the House has lost a valuable Member and the community a greatly esteemed and useful citizen. RESOLVED: That the sympathy of the Members of the House be conveyed to the relatives of the deceased by their bereavement. SIR ROBERT BOND'S TRIBUTE TO HIS DEAD COLLEAGUE. "It is with feelings of the deepest sorrow that I second the motion so pathetically proposed by my learned friend the Premier, that this House do record a sense of the loss it has sustained by the death of Mr. Davey, late member elected for the district of Burin. His demise has come to me as a very great shock, although when I last met

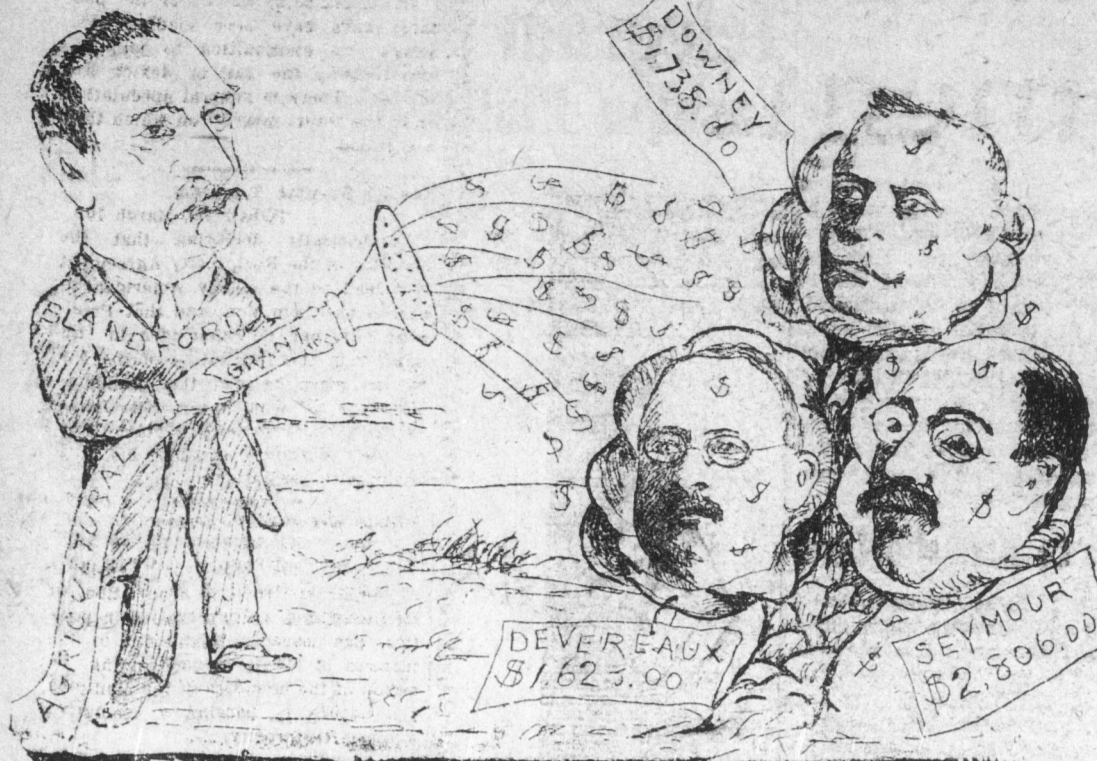

The second case was that of a woman whose affliction was due to excess of a secretion of thyroid in the blood. She was treated with serum from a goat, the thyroid gland of which had been removed. She rapidly recovered.

Dr. Robertson says those unbalanced by politics (3) usually recover. He states that the cures effected to-day would have been considered miraculous twenty years ago.

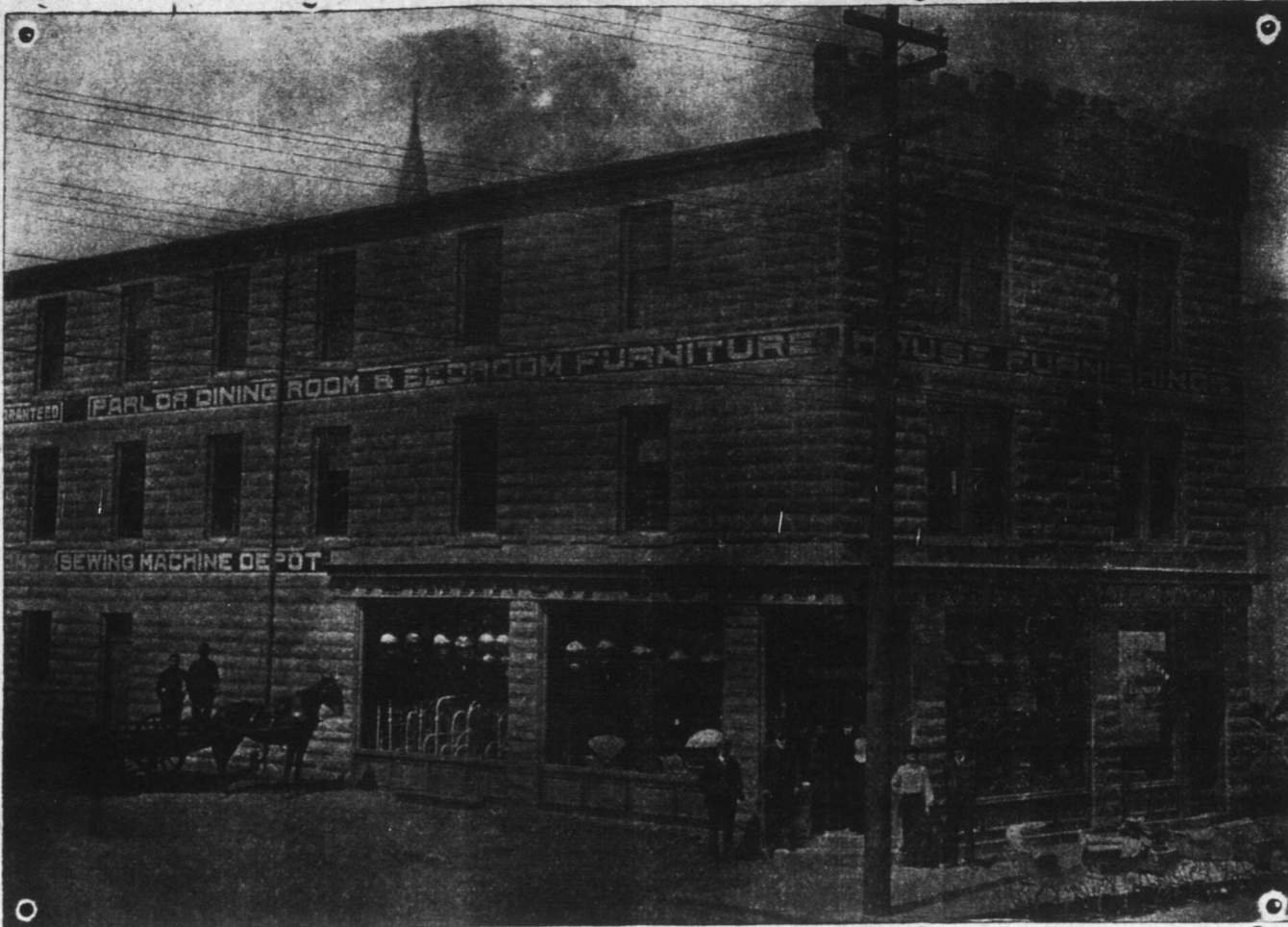
Messrs. R. D. McEneaney & Sons schr. Clara is soon to be towed to the West Coast where she will load fish for market.

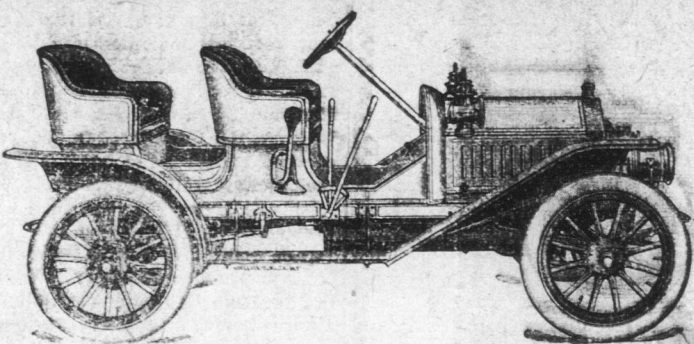
