



The Evening Chit-Chat

When your babies ask to let them blow soap bubbles, what do you answer? Do you say, "Oh, dear, I hate to have you, because you mess things up so and get yourself all wet?" Or do you go with willing alacrity and get the clay pipes down from the pantry shelf and fill the basin with nice soapy water.

According to the latest discoveries of health experts that is what you should do.

Nay, more than that. If the babies forget to blow soap bubbles you should instill the desire into them, just as often as you possibly can.

For what do you think? Blowing soap bubbles has been discovered to be a splendid lung developer.

At one of the largest tuberculosis camps in the world, the doctors have given their patients orders to blow soap bubbles an hour every day. At a certain time in the morning all the patients are seen starting out with their clay pipes and their basins.

So if you want your children to have fine healthy lungs you must encourage them in blowing "bubbles soft and fine" as often as possible.

From what I remember of my own delight in the beautiful iridescent things and the fun of competing as to who could blow the biggest, or the one which would last the longest, it seems to me that shouldn't be a very difficult task.

I wonder if there is a family in which the necessity of putting to death some family pet or stray cat or dog does not occasionally arise. Probably not.

Wherefore, I am going to pass on a little receipt for doing this unpleasant task as kindly as possible, which the cat specialist whom I quoted the other day is anxious to have made public:

"We have arranged a method of putting cats to sleep in such a way that they actually go to sleep without a struggle and without suffering.

"We believe that cats need air to die, as well as to live, so we put a little chloroform on cotton and let the cat inhale it. By the way, this is usually done at night when the cat has had a full meal and is ready for sleep. Contrary to the universal opinion cats will sleep at night if trained that way. So we give it a very little chloroform, and the cat inhales it—good judgment is used in the giving. Then the cat lies down and gets ready to sleep, and we give it a little more of the vapor. Soon we hear labored breathing from the unconscious cat, and we put a generous amount of chloroform on cotton, throw it in and close the box.

The heart action stops very gradually by this way. The little body shows that there has been no suffering but that death simply comes while the body sleeps."

MORRIS'S FINANCIAL DOPE!

A gross misrepresentation of the cost of the branch lines of railways, already contracted for or promised, is to be found in the report of the Premier's speech at the Burin Exhibition.

We invite our readers to read and judge for themselves.
 Here is a quotation:
 "By the first of November the new Branch Line of Railway to Bonavista will be opened, and the districts of Bonavista and Trinity will be opened up and brought into direct daily communication with St. John's and the rest of the island. Within a year from now the important districts of Placentia & St. Mary's and Ferryland will also be connected by railway. We are now engaged in building the branch to Heart's Content and that will be opened next year and we have yet three other branches to construct, namely, one to Bay de Verde, one to Bonne Bay and one to Fortune Bay. The Railway to Fortune Bay will possess a particular and special interest for the District of Burin, because when that railway touches the waters of Fortune Bay at Terrenceville, it will cross over to Boat Harbor, Placentia Bay, and then go up the Shore through the splendid agricultural land around Boat Harbor, Bay de L'eau, Baine Harbor, Rushoon, Red Harbor, Jean de Bay, Spanish Room, Rock Harbor, Marystown, Mortier Bay, Burin, Corbin, St. Lawrence, Lawn, Lamaline, Fortune and Grand Bank, Grand Bank being the terminus of the Fortune Bay branch.

By a successful loan of four million dollars at three and a half per cent, which I raised last year in London, at ninety-seven and a half, the highest rate ever obtained by the Colony before, we have been able to build all these railway branches, and pay the interest on them out of our regular revenue, and after all this we still have a surplus left, which we have given back to the people in the shape of all the public utilities which I have named."

In the first place, the Bonavista Branch will not be finished and paid for, even by November 1st. The Trinity Spur Line, which has been begun will not be anything like finished, and the Station at Trinity will not have been built.

In the second place, the Southern Shore line has not been anything like brought to a finish.

In the third place, the Heart's Content Branch has only just been begun.

In the fourth place, the Bonne Bay Branch has not been begun.

In the fifth place, the line to Fortune Bay has not had the first sod turned.

In the sixth place, the extension of the Fortune Bay Branch through Baine Harbor, Rushoon, Marystown, Mortier Bay, St. Lawrence, Lamaline, Fortune and Grand Bank, was not contemplated by the Government when they put the Branch Railway Act through the Legislature.

In the seventh place, there is no authority in that Act for the building of a railway branch to St. Mary's and legislative powers will have to be sought to carry out the Premier's promise.

In the eighth place, there is no power in that Act enabling the Government to build a railway from Carboncar to Bay de Verde.

In the ninth place, more than one third of the loan had already been spent in January for the work done on the part of the Bonavista Branch that had been done up to December 31st last.

How then could a Premier, responsible to the Crown and the people, the introducer of the railway resolutions, the floater of the loan, declare not only in speech, but in cold print, that out of that loan "we have been able to build all these railway branches, and pay the interest on them out of our regular revenue, and after all this we still have a surplus left which we have given back to the people in the shape of all the public utilities which I have named."

Does the author of this statement wish to be taken as a serious financier, or as an unscrupulous politician administering a dose of pepper mash? Electors are now beginning to appraise him at his intrinsic value, and to pepper him with cheers for Bond. They are, however, keeping their Cayenne pepper to give him a hot time at the General Election.

Chafe made a search and found the clothes in a stable in the centre of the place, but it was impossible to discover amongst such a crowd of railway navvies who the thief was.

Sunday night past a pair of pants was stolen from the store of Adam Savoy. The place was entered about 10 o'clock and between midnight and 1 a.m. Monday Byrne and Chafe located the thief in a camp about a mile from the place. He at first denied the theft, but was locked up and later owned up, and next day directed the officers to where he had hidden the property in the woods. He was brought before Magistrate Freebairn and fined \$20 or 30 days. He paid the fine.

You will notice that the sale is to be, not by auction, but by tender. Why is this? In the first place, Mr. Editor, I object to the hole and corner method in which this sale is being conducted. If it were advisable to sell this fine property it should be sold in the open market and to the person who would give the best price, and not given away, as it certainly will be, if the sale is conducted as at present proposed. But in the next place, as a resident in the West End and as a citizen, I most strenuously object to the sale of this property at all. Here we are to-day with a Lunatic Asylum and a (would-be) Poor House, with inmates packed like herring in a barrel. Something will have to be done with regard to the extension and enlargement of both these institutions, and yet the Government propose to part with a most valuable property adjoining the present Asylum and practically adjoining the property purchased for the proposed Poor Asylum, namely, Bowcock's Farm. An annex to the present Asylum could be built on the Rae Island property and almost worked by the one staff and under the one direction and management. They could sell this property now and before they are turned out of power (office) purchase a place from some heeler for a large sum, which would require separate management and furnish a fine lot of jobs for those of their friends wishing to get in out of the wet before the deluge of 1913. In the next place, even if the property were not required at present for either an Asylum or Poor House purposes, before long, if there is any humanity or decency in us it will be required either for a Reformatory or an institution where the deaf, dumb and blind may be educated by the State and turned into a class of Producers instead of a charge upon the public charities, as many through no fault of their own are to-day.

This place must not be sold, or rather given away. Even if it is not wanted at present for any of the purposes for which it is bound to be required within the very near future, in the meantime let the Government open it up as a park where the poorest, as well as others can come out on a Sunday, holiday or any day, at a very small cost, and enjoy the same advantages of the balmy country breezes as those who fly over the country in their motor cars and gilded coaches.

Now, Sir Edward Morris, if you want to do something, and if you are the friend of the poor; if you think so much of your West End constituents, here is an opportunity to do them untold good. If you are going to give the place away, give it to the citizens of St. John's. You will get many more votes in this way than any other. Citizens, I ask you to watch and see what happens.

I have no hesitancy in saying that this Rae Island property has not any equal in this city as a most suitable place for any institution to be built. Here it is with a river on either side providing ample water for the requirements of any institution, situated on the railway, making it most convenient for the marketing of its produce and the filling and conveying to its requirements. It contains about twelve to fourteen acres of the very best cultivated land, surrounded by a perfect grove of the finest trees, giving those who may wish a chance to escape the heat of the sun when required and at the same time permitting plenty of sunshine to grow crops equal to anything produced in Newfoundland. What better place could there be for an institution?

MANY PROBLEMS

BEFORE THE CONFERENCE.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Divorce, Socialism, labor unions, and wealth, were some of the subjects concerning which emphatic opinions were expressed by speakers at the sessions of the Ecumenical Methodist Conference in this city to-day. The general topic in hand was "The Church and Social Success."

In connection with the consideration of its various phases, a novel proposition was made to the nearly 500 delegates in the form of a resolution presented by the business committee, calling for the creation of what would be practically a world's welfare commission.

Action in the matter was deferred, but the expectation is that before the close of the present conference there will be created a permanent international Methodist commission composed of fifty delegates from the Eastern division and an equal number from the Western, to gather information respecting the various Methodist Churches and their problems, to promote a closer union between them.

The King vs. John Collier.

Mr. W. R. Howley, K.C., for John Collier moves on his own affidavit for postponement of the above case on the ground that there are two necessary and material witnesses, who reside at Port au Port and are unable to be here on the day set for the hearing—one being ill and the other cannot get here on Friday. He also moves that the case be postponed till December.

The Deputy Minister of Justice, Mr. Hutchings, K.C., opposes application. The case is adjourned till Friday, the 27th, at 11 a.m.

George Summers vs. Joseph Perford.

Mr. Kent, K.C., states the plaintiff's case to the jury and examines several witnesses, who are cross-examined by Mr. Furlong, K.C. The plaintiff's case was closed.

A Schooner Lost.

We learn by the Scher, Beatrix that in one of the storms which occurred recently that the new schooner *Daisy*, owned by Joshua Dee was lost at Deer Hr., T.B. where she had come for a frame for a house. The vessel had her sails blown away in the gale, dragged her anchors and went ashore. The crew escaped and secured their clothes and effects. The vessel, we understand, was insured in the *Brigus* scheme. The hull is still there filled with water. She was of 42 tons burden and Mr. Martin stripped her of her running gear.

AGAINST BEAM TRAWLING

Gloucester's Master Mariners' Association at a crowded meeting recently, began, what some speakers called, a "vigorous war against the invasion of the beam trawl method" of fishing in this country. Speeches denouncing the use of the steam trawl were made by most of the fishing captains now in that port who contended the beam trawl, scooping in big, little and immature fish, was a most destructive agency which would seriously affect the nation's fish supply. Tons of small fry which might develop into marketable fish, they claimed, were destroyed and thrown away. The efforts of the Government to restock the ocean, it was pointed out, would be more than neutralized. The present method of trawl fishing, they said, was amply sufficient to secure a catch and had the advantage of saving the small fry.

It was voted that the association representing the operative fishermen of New England strongly condemn this method of fish destruction and urge upon the Government the necessity of enacting prohibitive legislation. A committee composed of Capt. Henry M. Atwood, Capt. Carl C. Young, Capt. John A. McKinnon, Capt. John W. McFarland and Capt. Chas. H. Hartly was appointed to consider and report the most expedient manner of securing the desired legislation to Congress.—Fishing Gazette.

Horse Bolted.

At 1 p.m. yesterday Mr. J. J. Henry's horse bolted from the mattress factory at Henry Street, and dashing down Bell Street and McBride's Hill collided with a passing team on Water Street, at Bank Square. J. Tilley, the driver of the express, was thrown out but was not seriously hurt. The express was broken up.
