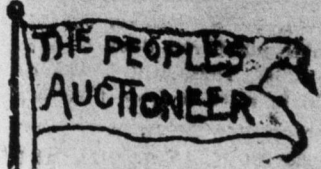

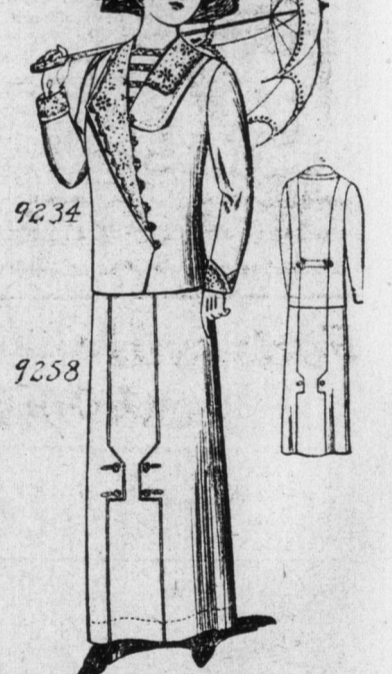

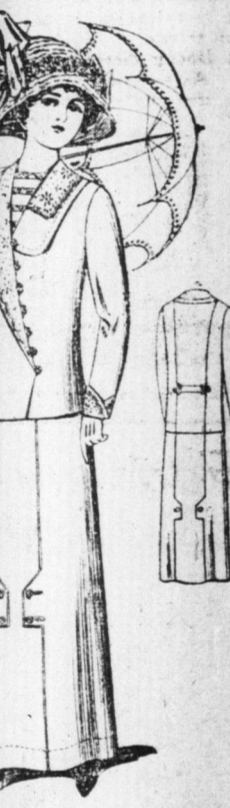

Promoter Goes to Prison.
Sentenced to a Year and Fined \$500 For Using Mails to Defraud.
New York, June 19.—William T. Wintemute, of Summit, N. J., promoter of the Gold Run Mining and Tunnel Company, of Colorado, was found guilty in the United States District Court to-day of using the mails to defraud.

He was sentenced by Judge Ought to pay a fine of \$500 and to serve one year in prison. Fayette B. Tiffany, a Denver lawyer, who was indicted with Wintemute was found not guilty. Wintemute was arrested in the summer of 1910. He was believed to have received a total of \$1,500,000 from 700 persons in this country and England. His contention on trial was that he believed all the claims made by him in circulars, of the value of the properties in question to be true. Among Wintemute's English victims were Lady Tankerville and her niece, Miss Louisa Elout, and some of the most damaging testimony against Wintemute were the letters and cablegrams sent by him, congratulating them on their investments in Gold Run, and urging them to buy more.

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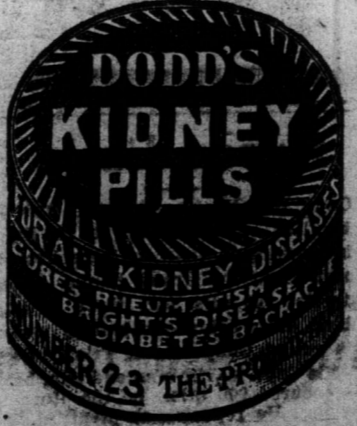

The Cold Storage Concession.

We learn from the Guardian that Mr. Piccott, the Minister of Fisheries, expects to go around the coast on a vessel belonging to the Booth Fisheries Company, which has taken over the Cold Storage concessions made eighteen months ago to Messrs. Trefethen & Lord. The object of Mr. Piccott's mission is to point out to them the grounds where halibut is to be found. According to the Government press, the Booth Company is interested in testing the extent and capacity of the halibut grounds for supplying New York, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, Toronto and Montreal with that fish. We hope their experiments will come up to the expectations held out, for if the fish are there, there is no doubt about the market, and the transportation problem if conducted on a scale indicated by the markets mentioned would not prove insoluble. The Sydney Record has the following. It will be observed that halibut is not the only fish the Booth Company intend to handle.

"Captain Johanson, of the Booth Fishing Company, was in Sydney yesterday afternoon on his way to take part in the investigation into the Newfoundland inshore fishery conditions. In an interview with a representative of the Record he stated that he expected to be engaged in Newfoundland waters for the whole summer and the investigation, which he said was certain to have a most important bearing upon the island's industry, was to embrace every class of fishing carried on in the inshore waters—cod, mackerel, halibut, etc.

"On the Pacific coast" Captain Johanson added, "our experience has been that it is a failure to practice beam-trawling from steam vessels. We tried it, and soon found that the only profitable way was to fish with handline from dories which go out and away from steamers. I am satisfied that the beam trawling will deplete the fisheries. Expert investigation has already established this and on the Pacific this so far accepted as a fact that no legislation is necessary to prohibit beam trawling with the object of conserving our systems are so patent that any other is not now thought of.

"Now we are going to make experiments of Newfoundland and if our methods are successful, the advantages will be mutual to ourselves and the island fishermen. The consumers also ought to receive some benefits for if our Pacific catch can, after being sent across the continent compete with your fishery products under present practices, we ought to obtain with our methods results which will be appreciated."

Greene and Carnell were apprised of the matter, got a description of the men from one who saw them go down on the wharf, but as they had left some time before the officers arrived, they could not locate them Saturday night. If ever men deserved punishment these do and it is hoped they will be found and get their just deserts.

Icebergs Are Numerous.

Like Capt. Parsons in the Boathie, Capt. Barbour of the "Fogota" stated yesterday to the Telegram that he never saw more icebergs in all his experience of travelling north as he did on this trip. From Twillingate to St. John's they cover the ocean in thousands. Many of them are veritable mountains of ice and though the weather was fine and clear at night mostly all the passage a strict look out on the vessel had to be observed to avert the danger of collision with them. Steamers and sailing vessels if the weather were foggy would navigate the coast at present at great risk.

Fogota's News.



Friday last. The weather has been bad the past week or ten days and the men cannot fish as well they would like to. At Grate's Cove also the past two weeks little has been done owing to high wind and sea. The traps which were out during the herring school have been taken in to be cleaned and renovated preparatory to putting them in the water again when the caplin strikes the shore.

Accident to Railroader.

At 11.30 a.m. yesterday a flat car and engine arrived here from the Trepassey branch line bringing Mr. Barron of Hr. Main who was the victim of a painful accident Saturday evening when working on the construction train near Cape Broyle. Godden, Rector of St. Thomas' Church, preached yesterday morning and during the progress of his sermon referred in heart stirring terms to the lamented death of the late Canon Temple, whose long and active service of fifty years had endeared him to episcopals throughout the island. The railway men say it is impossible to keep boys clear of the tracks, threats of punishment and warnings of the danger they run do not deter them. A good strong fence would do much to keep the boys out.

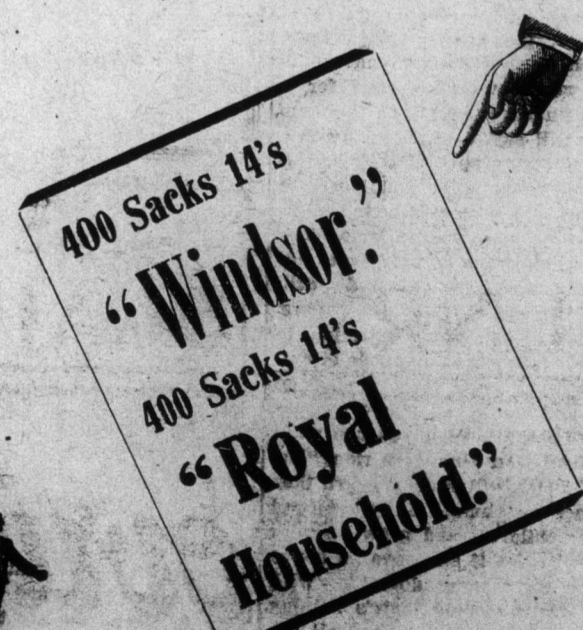

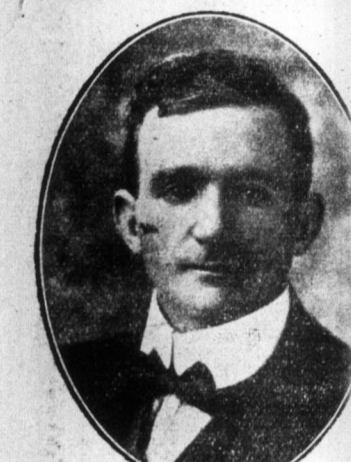

Taft Has Been Nominated.

Special to Evening Telegram.
CHICAGO, June 23.
With nearly 350 Roosevelt delegates declining to vote, and hastening away at adjournment time to tender Roosevelt a nomination at Newport on July 15th, the Republican National Convention, at the end of a long session on Saturday night, re-nominated William Howard Taft for President, and James S. Sherman for Vice-President. Taft received 561 of the 1,078 votes in the Convention, or 21 more than a majority. The decision of the Roosevelt people, under the direction of their leader, to refrain from voting, left no other candidate near the President. The announcement of the Taft victory was greeted with cheering by his adherents. When it became certain that Taft would be nominated without difficulty, the leaders in control of the Convention decided to give him as a running mate his companion on the ticket of 1908. All others dropped from the race, and Sherman was the only candidate regularly placed before the Convention. A motion from New Hampshire to make the nomination by acclamation was declared out of order, and there were many scattering votes on the roll call that ensued. The Convention, amid confusion, adjourned, sine die. The detailed vote was as follows:—
