



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

For the sake of making this completely damnifying criticism clear to our readers, we will elaborate it in an instance which is typical of many existing cases in St. John's. Suppose two firms do the same business on the same capital, say \$250,000, and suppose they make exactly the same pro-The first firm is registered (unold conditions) at the full capital, \$250,000. The second is registered at \$100,000, while the remaining \$150,000 stands at the credit of the partners and appears as a loan to the business. On that loan the Act allows interest, \$9,000, to be charged and the profits to that extent to be tax free. The first firm is allowed nothing free of tax. Here, then, we have two con-cerns, doing identically the same busciness, using identically the sam capital and making identically the same profit, yet paying very different taxes! 


