

Public Notice

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alternatives as regards the method of payment:-

(a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Resesrve men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

The following form is to be compiled and forwarded direct to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, Newfoundland, at the earliest possible date:-

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.

In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to obtain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.







Whether the Assembly, as it is at present constituted, can legally pass such a measure I leave to the decision of the legal fraternity and those best qualified to pass judgment on the matter. But I do believe that a large majority of the people of this country have no wish or desire to see their heritage barteror desire to see their heritage barter-ed away in any such manner. It is a well known fact now that a majority of the members of the F.P.U. were opposed to the union of parties be-tween Morris and Coaker last July, and the leader of that organization found it extremely difficult to pacify the more radical members of his union on that account. He impress-ed upon them that a coalition of parties was brought about (1) for National reasons, and (2) to save the country the expense of a general election.
This coalition government has now been in power for nine months, if we except the shuffle which took place when Sir Edward Morris resigned the Premiership and Messrs. Squires, Gibbs and Bennett left the Executive. Mr. Coaker seemed very anxious to impress the country with the fact that the new government was not a "coalition" but a "National" one. Let us examine its record and see whether it is entitled to the name and whether they deserve the further extension which the Act now before the House which the Act now before the House asks for. What have they done? They claim to have passed the Business Profits' Tax which will bring in \$350, 000 extra revenue to the exchequer. The public contend that not only ald they have passed this Act, but they should have gone further, and introduced, last Session, an Income Tax Bill, as well. In this the people are backed up by the merchants against whom the Profits Tax Bill was aimed. They claim to have kept up the price of fish. This claim, to every intelligent person in the country, is absurd. They had no more to do with keeping up the price of fish than the man in the moon. If they kept up the price of fish why did they not keep down the price of pork, flour and salt at the same time? They further claim credit for appointing a Tonnage Committee and adding to the already over-taxed burdens of the country the expense of a Ministry of Shipping. What has this much advertised Tonnage Committee done? They conducted one of the most disgraceful transac-tions ever attempted by public men in ian Government. The public are now waiting for the fullest information bearing upon this matter. They al-lowed a steamer to bring motor cars for their friends while foodstuffs and cattle feeds were left behind to rot.
To-day people have to sell their horses and kill their cattle for the want of oats, hay and other feeds, yet this same Tonnage Committee permits a steamer to come here bringing a half cargo of room-papers. These are only minor instances of their incapacity in handle the question intelligently.





ABOUT THE RAID. DOVER, Eng., April 25. One of the most thrilling incidents of the British naval raid on Zeebrugge last Tuesday, was the rescue by two American-built monor launches o nearly 200 members of the crew of to the Bruges Canal. The feat was accomplished under a heavy fire and the actual transfer was made in less than five minutes. Two of the three block ships which passed inside the Mole reached their objective and swung broadside across the mouth plans, two motor launches dashed in rom the sea through the enemy bar rage at express speed and drew up alongside. All the time shells were falling, some striking the block ships and causing numerous casualties, but the crews upheld their traditions for coolness. As the last of these who were able, reached the launches, two muffled explosions tore great holes in the bottoms of the block ships. The vessels settled quickly. At the same instant the heavily laden launches were dashing seaward and again they passed through a barrage to the waiting British destroyers. One launch delivered 99 men to a destroyer. The clock-like precision essential to the success of the operation made it imossible to evacuate all the dead and wounded on the block ships, but the participants declare that the loss of participants declare that the loss of personnel in this feature of the enterprise was remarkably small. The casualties on the block ships sunk at Ostend were still lighter. Twelve from the crew of one of the Ostend block ships got off in a lifeboat and rowed four hours before being rescued. For two hours of that time they were under a heavy enemy fire, mainly that of machine guns, but they suffered only one casualty.

the House opened as usual. Mr. nes presented the report of the the address in reply to the speech But before the motion for adoption was passed, Mr. Walsh, M.H.A. for Placentia and St. Mary's, criticized the Speech from the Throne and stated his reasons for not being on the Government side of the House. He paid a tribute to the late leader of the Government, Sir E. P. Morris, but deeply regretted that after 30 years of public service the good works performed by him should have been sullied at its close. He was prepared at any time to seek a mandate from those who sent him to the House as their representative and would accept their presentative and would accept their

He referred to the part the brave boys of Placentia had taken in the Empire's battles, and stated that the Society over which he was President in 1914 had sent 115 of its roll to the front, and he felt delighted and proud of his constituents who had proven themselves loyal subjects of the Emthemselves loyal subjects of the Empire. He strongly condemned the action of the Government in introducing a Bill to extend the life of Parliament, as in his opinion they had not the confidence of the people.

as in his opinion they had not the confidence of the people.

The Prime Minister in moving the second reading of the Military Service Act, stated that he intended simply to outline the principle of the bill and that the various sections would be fully discussed when the House went into Committee.

as he thought it the only fair way to provide reinforcements. Having only then received a copy of the Bill it was impossible to comment on the details. He criticized the Government's atti-tude in the matter, which he said was to make political capital out of the measure because it had been fathered by those in opposition to the Govern-ment. Explaining the Bill for the ex-tension of Parliament, Dr. Lloyd said that while opposing the extension of Parliament last year, he was in favour of it this year, admitting that he had not the experience then that he had acquired since. Mr. Currie said that the Government's desire to carry out the conscription measure was an excuse and not a reason. Judging from the Premier's remarks it was not the intention of the Government to fall or if if they did to discriminate in

the classes that were to be called up.
Mr. J. R. Bennett, Minister of Militia, was fully convinced that the country was prepared for the Conscription
Bill, to which he gave his unqualified
support. Referring in complimentary terms to the Patriotic Recruiting Committee and the soldiers work, he thought that the work of the former in the past and the latter in the present had been simply wonderful. The Bill was a fair one and he had much pleasure in supporing it. He hoped that by May he would have at least 1,000 men overseas. The rinks were again being fitted up as barracks, and at least 800 men could be quartered

Mr. Coaker, in a brief speech, stated that he supported conscription, but was associated with those outside who were opposing it. Up to a few days ago he stood for an election but had since changed his mind.
