House of Assembly Proceedings.

Following the secret sitting of both branches of the Assembly yesterday, the House opened as usual. Mr. Grimes presented the report of the Select Committee appointed to draft the address in reply to the speech from the throne, which was adopted. But before the motion for adoption was passed, Mr. Walsh, M.H.A. for Placentia and St. Mary's, criticized the speech from the Throne and stated his reasons for not being on the Government side of the House. He paid a tribute to the late leader of the Government, Sir E. F. Morris, but deeply regretted that after 30 years of public service the good works performed by him should have been sullied at his close. He was prepared at any time to seek a mandate from those who sent him to the House as their representative and would accept their verdict.

He referred to the part the brave boys of Placentia had taken in the Empire's battles, and stated that the Society over which he was President in 1914 had sent 115 of its rolls to the front, and he felt delighted and proud of his constituents who had proven themselves loyal subjects of the Empire. He strongly condemned the action of the Government in introducing a Bill to extend the life of Parliament, as in his opinion they had not the confidence of the people.

The Prime Minister in moving the second reading of the Military Service Act, stated that he intended simply to outline the principle of the bill and that the various sections would be fully discussed when the House went into Committee.

Mr. Currie supported the measure as he thought it the only fair way to provide reinforcements. Having only then received a copy of the Bill it was impossible to comment on the details. He criticized the Government's attitude in the matter, which he said was to make political capital out of the measure because it had been fathered by those in opposition to the Government. Explaining the Bill for the extension of Parliament, Dr. Lloyd said that while opposing the extension of Parliament last year, he was in favour of it this year, admitting that he had not the experience then that he had acquired since. Mr. Currie said that the Government's desire to carry out the conscription measure was an excuse and not a reason. Judging from the Premier's remarks it was not the intention of the Government to enforce the act till sometime in the fall or if they did it to discriminate in the classes that were to be called up.

Mr. J. R. Bennett, Minister of Militia, was fully convinced that the country was prepared for the conscription Bill, to which he gave his unqualified support. Referring in complimentary terms to the Patriotic Recruiting Committee and the soldiers work, he thought that the work of the former in the past and the latter in the present had been simply wonderful. The Bill was a fair one and he had much pleasure in supporting it. He hoped that by May he would have at least 1,000 men overseas. The ranks were again being fitted up as barracks, and at least 800 men could be quartered there.

Mr. Coaker, in a brief speech, stated that he supported conscription, but was associated with those outside who were opposing it. Up to a few days ago he stood for an election but had since changed his mind.

The following Bills were also read: "An Act respecting the establishment of a Permanent Maritime Customs Fund." "An Act to amend the Education Act." "An Act to amend the Inflammable Substance Act, 1916." "An Act applying to the Maritime Conventions Act, Patents Act, and the keeping of dogs Act."

The second reading of the remaining bills on the order paper was deferred until to-day.

The Daylight Bill which had been passed by the Upper House was introduced and read a first time.

Notices of questions by Messrs. Currie and Walsh were tabled. At 6.30 the House adjourned until this evening at 3 o'clock.
