





This was the sig-nal for cries of "Down with Lindsay Crawford," and the timely dropping of the curtain doubtless saved him from being forcibly handled. 



Leaving Bay Bulls yesterday morning St. John's was reached at 8 o'clock last night much to the delight of all hands. 

Condition.

There is nothing which spoils the appearance of a stamp collection more than a heavily postmarked or torn copy. Of course in a matter of this kind a collector should use his own discretion, but I would not advise the inserting of a bad copy in one's collec tion except as a space filler until a better copy is obtained.




