### March of the Blanketeers.

On March 10, 1817, a body of weavers, said by the Government to amount to ten thousand men, but by Bamford, the author of the "Life of a Radical," not to have exceeded four or five thousand, met in St. Peter's Field, Manchester, and commenced a mach southward, their intention being to proceed to London, to present to the Prince Regent, in person, a petition describing their distress Bamford, who had been consulted condemned the project as wild and likely to bring trouble on the petitioners. He believed that they were instigated by spies sent out by the Government, in order to find an opportunity of justifying their arbitrary measures. But the poor deluded people assembled, "many of them having," says Bamford, "blankets, rugs, or large coats rolled up and tied knapsack fashion, on their backs. ome had papers, supposed to be petitions rolled up, and some had stout walking-sticks." From their blankets they afterwards acquired the name of Blanketeers." The magistrates appeared and read the Riot Act, and the and constables, although three or four hundred fled in the direction of their intended route, pursued by a body of Yeomanry. ### Mountains of Pulpwood at the Mills

BANGOR,-"The dullest winter is more than 40 years" is what employment agents say of this season in the Maine lumber woods and men familiar with the industry say that less than half the usual quantity of pulp wood and only a few million feet of long logs will come down the Penchscot this spring, while like conditions prevail all over the state.

There are no small operators in the woods and the big pulp concerns, heavily overstocked with wood cut last year and earlier, have this winter curtailed operations 50 per cent.
FOR FIRST TIME IN 86 YEARS.

From present indictions less than 10,000,000 feet of long logs will come down to Banger this year, and it is said that for the first time since Bangor boom was established, 80 years ago, there will be no rafting there this season. In the flush days of the lumber trade, when Banger sent away from 180,000,000 to 240,000,000 annually, this boom employed hundreds of men at sorting out and rafting the logs of different owners to the saw mills at and below the city. In recent years the volume of business has steadily dwindled, until this season, it is said, only one small mill have any logs to raft out here.

The slump in woods operations has sent wages down with a hang from the fabulous war-time rates. Two years ago men were getting as high as \$3 and \$3.50 a day for work that now commands only \$1 to \$1.25 a day, and whereas in war time and even in 1919 and 1920-21, there were more jobs than men, this winter there have been three men to one job. It is a lean and hungry time, indeed, for the axemen.

As late as July, 1920, alien laborers, who never owned a good suit of clothes until they came to this country, were swaggering around Exchange street contemptuously rejecting offers of \$2.50 to \$3 a cord for chopping cordwood or sawing pulpwood. They had wads of money, were feeling rich, and picking their

### BOTTOM BEGAN TO DROP OUT.

Then, early in the fall of 1920, the bottom began to drop out. Peeled pulpwood fell from \$31 a cord to \$21, and rough from \$23 to \$13, while, with an overstock on hand everywhere, cutting operations were sharply curtailed. Wages went down rapidly, but the bottom was not reached that year, as much as \$1.75 a day being paid in the fall of 1920. The slump continued in 1921, and in the fall of that year the most that any woodman could get was \$1.25 a day, while a great majority of those who were lucky to get jobs at all went in at \$1 a day, with time out and board charged for sickness.

Spruce lumber, which at one time in 1919 reached \$63 to \$65 per 1000 feet, now is quoted at \$40 to \$45 for dimensions and \$32 to \$40 for randoms, while pulpwood is a drug. When the boom was on, every farmer in Maine who had a wood lot, and countless small operators, went to work at cutting four feet stuff for the pulp mills, expecting to get fat prices. These people, for the most part, still have the wood on hand, and as two or three seasons out of doors usually makes the wood dozy and unfit for pulp material they are likely to keep it. The whole eastern section of Maine is dotted with piles of pulp wood, for which there is no demand, the big manufacturers having mountains of the same stuff heaped up at their mills.

The great mystery of the time in

Maine is: "Why, knowing as they must have known that the war boom was certain to collopse within a year or two, did the big pulp concerns pile up several years' supply of wood at top prices?"

No one as yet has been able to answer that question.—Sunday Her-


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
