





## "The Pompadour" Maker of History

"The Pompadour"! What vision of elegant daintiness, of aritificial loveliness, of gallant courtliness, what a warm, close fragrance of violets and pot-pourri, what a murmur of rustling silks and sweet tinkling of harpischords does not the name conjure up! Jeanne Antoinette Poisson Le Normant d'Etioles, Marquise de Pompa-Sour-she carried her history in her Pame. Born in 1721, and baptized as the legitimate daughter of Francois Poisson-who had to fice the country later for embezzling money of the bankers, his employers—she was educated at the expense of her reputed mant de Tournehem. She was bred from the first to her destiny-by her mother. She was to be un merceau de roi, and she accepted De Tournehem's nephew, Le Normant d'Etioles, an undersized, hed-haired, honest youth (together with half the former's fortune) as a step only to this end. She queened it in the financial world of Paris, and daily, a Diana on horseback, she sought to waylay the King on his hunting expeditions. Finally at a ball given by the City of Paris, they met. Louis, charmed by her beauty, was captivated by her wit, and "la petite Etfoles" had won the highest prize in the land.

"One Of Us."

It was unparalleled. Never before had one of the bourgeoisie attained the position of maîtresse en titre. The Royal Family, the Ministers, the ladies of the Court, the Jesuits, even the rabble, were bitterly against this upstart. She fought them all and won. She dominated the King who made her Marquise de Pompadour, she ingratiated herself with the Queen, who made her lady-in-waiting, and soon she was making and unmaking Ministers, selecting Ambassadors, and appointing Generals.

She was perfectly equipped for her task. Her acting—she had her own private theatre—harping, singing, dancing, harpischord playing, and riding were perfection and her literary and artistic taste unerring. Voltaire, her poet-in-chief, said, "She is one of us." She protected Montesquieu, encouraged Diderot, rescued Marmontel, discovered Boucher, and patronized Van Loo and Greuze. To the imagination of a woman she joined the brain—almost—of a man. Her library was notable for the serious works in it, and she read them all.

Porcelain And Militarism.

While founding the Sevres porcelain factory on the one hand, she could, on the other, establish the Ecole Militaire. She conducted all the royal business. And then the woman peeped through, and because Maria Teresa had written her a courteous letter, she changed the whole policy of France, allied it with its old enemy, Austria, and embarked on the

disastrous Seven Years' War.

That brought the end. When there was nothing left to fight, she ceased to live. At the age of forty-two, she dressed in full Court costume and died, a jest on her lips. To the priest who was leaving her deathbed she said: "One moment, Monsieur.le Cure, we will take our departure together."

### Schooner Owners Decline to Prosecute the Fishery Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-The question we wish to ask is: is the Fishery a benefit to the

country or not? Can the affairs of the country be carried on without it? If it can by all means find the industry that will take its place at once, before those who have been struggling to keep it going in poverty cease their efforts and depart to find a living elsewhere in America. If the affairs in Newfoundland were looked after in an effective and honest way, it. would be the best little country under heaven. All we ask is a chance and fair returns for our fish. We have put forward the suggestion of a bonus simply to make the price give us something nearer a living wage, but we feel certain that if taxes were reduced and we could purchase our lines and twines and other supplies at a reasonable rate the fishery could be carried on profitably and we should not think of giving it up.

The fisherman is not the only one who would derive a benefit by the successful prosecution of the industry. It affects every man, woman and child in this country. The cooper, blacksmith, carpenter, cordage factory, tinsmith and every other tradesman is directly interested in it. It is the mainstay of the country's welfare. and if it is going to be allowed to fall into decay what will the result be? What will happen when we old men give it up as we intend to do under present conditions, even though it means going to a foreign country to make a new start? It is the only thing we can do, as our vessels are of no use for any other purpose. It is useless to expect to get men to crew them when they cannot make more than two hundred and fifty dollars to support their families even when he returns with a full load.

We, the undersigned, are schooner owners and skippers, and we have agreed not to prosecute the codfishery the present summer under present conditions.

Literary Forgeries HOW GREAT SCHOLARS WERE FOOLED.

(By KENNETH LYON) Hardouin, the Jesuit, once observed that in his opinion the ancient classics were the work of mediaeval monks Colour is lent to this paradox by the astonishing activities of literary forgers. There are in existence letters from Euripides, Themistocles, and Socrates and the tyrant Phalaris, believed for centuries to be authentic till the English scholar, Bentley, in the sixteenth century, proved them to be forgeries. It is disappointing to learn that Æsop's Fables were not Æsop's at all, but were given their present

a lost author Uranius. So miraculous was Simonides's skill in imitating ancient Greek writing that it deceived the great German scholar, Dindorf, who had the text published at Oxford with a Latin preface by himself,

In 1860 Simonides announced the discovery of a manuscript of St. Matthew's Gospel "written by Nicolaus the Deacon in the fifteenth year after the Ascension." Fragments of other Gospels followed, together with parts of Zoroaster and the log-look of Alexander the Great's admiral. The learned world was thrilled and in 1863 it took no less a body than the Royal Society of Literature to condemn the discoveries finally as forgeries.






