### Town and County News

HOLMAN TROUPE.—This popular

PRESENTATION.—Mr Alex Addison,  
who has been for the last thirty years  
Treasurer of the M. C. Institute, was,  
on Friday evening, the 29th ult.,  
presented by the members of that in-  
stitute with a beautiful and costly Tea  
Service, as a small token of the apprecia-  
tion in which his services are held.

CURLING MATCH.—Owing to some  
misunderstanding the match between  
the Guelph and Hamilton Clubs did not  
come off here on Saturday. But the  
Fergus Club, who had also come down  
to play, had a match with the Hamilton  
men, when the latter won the match by  
nine shots.

GALT JANUARY FAIR.—The Reporter  
says that at this Fair on Wednesday  
the supply of cattle was not large—say 120  
head, but the demand was much better,  
and but few head were not sold. Buy-  
ers seemed to come principally from our  
provincial cities, and there was but little  
United States demand. Prices rang-  
ed from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 per 100 lbs, although  
most of the cattle were bought by the  
head.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE.—The Rev J.  
B. Mullin, of Fergus, will deliver a  
lecture in the Temperance Hall, Guelph,  
on Wednesday evening first, at 7:30 p.  
m. Subject, "Demetrius and his Craft-  
men," and will have special reference to  
the present agitation respecting the  
liquor traffic. Admission free. The  
public are cordially invited to attend.  
Mr Mullin is an eloquent lecturer, and  
will, no doubt, handle his subject in an  
able manner.

THEFT IN CLIFFORD.—Constable  
Colquhoun left Clifford on Friday for  
Guelph; having in custody a young man  
named Herman Meyer, convicted on that  
day before Robt Caldwell, Esq., for steal-  
ing \$25 from Mr. Frederick Meyer, tanner,  
in that village. He was apprenticed to  
prosecutor, and is respectfully connected in  
Goderich. By the energy and tact of  
constable Colquhoun \$23 of the money was  
recovered.

AN OLD SETTLER GONE.—We have  
to record the death of Mr A W Blyth,  
Marden, which took place on Sunday  
afternoon. He has not been in good  
health for some months past, but was  
able to move about until Friday last,  
when he was seized with a sort of paral-  
ytic stroke, which rendered him in-  
sensible from that time till his death.  
Deceased was well known to the public,  
having kept the Hotel at Marden, on the  
Elora Road, for many years.

ACCIDENT IN GUELPH TOWNSHIP.—  
We regret to learn that Mr John Rennie,  
of Guelph Township, met with a serious  
accident on Thursday evening last. He  
was on his way home, accompanied by  
his sister Mrs Lillie, and when coming  
down the little hill near his own gate,  
the bolt which attaches the shafts to the  
cutter came off, the horse became fright-  
ened, started off and threw them out.  
Mrs Lillie fortunately escaped without  
any injury, but Mr Rennie had three of  
his ribs broken near the spine, and was  
also badly cut on the head and right  
temple, and over the eye. Though  
thus badly injured he held on to the  
lines, and prevented the horse from run-  
ning away. Some people coming up im-  
mediately after, he was conveyed to his  
house, and Dr Herod sent for, who set  
the ribs and dressed the wounds. We  
are glad to learn that he is doing as well  
as could be expected, but he will be con-  
fined to his house for some time.

## TOWN COUNCIL

The Council met to-day at 10 o'clock.

Present: The Mayor, Messrs. Massie,  
Higinbotham, Heffernan, Mitchell, Al-  
lan, Stewart, Robertson, Bruce, McCrae,  
Howard and Walker.

Mr. Massie presented a Report from  
the Finance Committee. They recom-  
mend that no action be taken in regard  
to the petition of Dr. Tuck, also that  
the petition of Mark J. Patterson be not  
granted.

Mr Bruce presented the report of the  
License Committee. In reference to the  
complaints reported about certain tavern-  
keepers refusing to give accommodation  
to immigrants, they found on inquiry  
that their houses were full, one of them  
particularly had two large families liv-  
ing in the house, besides other boarders,  
and could not give accommodation to any  
one; also that one hotel keeper offered to  
hire conveyance to send said immigrants  
to their friends. They suggest that the  
matter be left over in the hands of their  
successors, so that the statement of the  
immigrants may also be received before  
the Chairman finally report on it.

Mr Allan presented the report of the  
Central Exhibition Committee, giving  
full statement of the amount expended,  
which is \$9,365 15.

The Mayor presented the report of the  
Cemetery Committee; during the year,  
35 burial lots, and 47 lots of land for  
single graves have been sold, and 8 lots  
given to single graves for indigent per-  
sons. There have been 124 interments  
in the Union Cemetery, and 26 in the S.  
George's Cemetery, making the whole  
150. The Committee have planted a  
large number of ornamental trees—in all  
619—at a cost of \$263 13.

The above reports were adopted.

On motion the Mayor vacated the  
chair, and Mr Massie took the same.

Moved by Mr Higinbotham, seconded  
by Mr Heffernan and carried unanimously:  
—That the thanks of this Council are  
due and are hereby tendered to His  
Worship the Mayor, Richard Mitchell,  
Esq., for the efficient manner in which  
he has performed the duties of Mayor  
and chairman of this Council, during the  
past year.

The Mayor acknowledged the compli-  
ment, after which the Council ad-  
journed.

## The New Council.

The New Council met for organization  
at 12 o'clock, when the members after  
making the requisite declaration, took  
their seats. The following are the

The only members absent were Messrs.  
Kennedy and Bell.

The Clerk read the report of the  
Market House Committee, which should  
have been presented at the meeting in  
the forenoon. Total expenditure \$2024.  
47, being \$249 47 over the appropriation,  
which they recommend be placed to  
their credit. The report was adopted.

The Mayor, in commencing the busi-  
ness of the year, said that in order that  
the business might be transacted in a sat-  
isfactory manner, it would be necessary  
for the members to conform to the rules  
of the Council as far as they possibly  
could. There was a slight deficiency  
this year in consequence of the expendi-  
ture connected with the Central Exhibi-  
tion, and the Council would require to  
be very economical, or they would be  
obliged to increase the taxation, which  
was not a pleasant alternative. He  
hoped the members would work together  
harmoniously and do all they could for  
the benefit of the Town.

The Mayor appointed Mr W S G  
Knowles as Auditor.

On motion of Mr McNeil, seconded by  
Mr McMillan, Mr Wm Hart was ap-  
pointed the other Auditor.

On motion of Mr Howard, seconded by  
Mr Crowe, the following were appointed  
a Committee to draft Standing Com-  
mittees for the year, and to report at the  
evening session:—The Reeve, Deputy-  
Reeves and Messrs Robertson, Allan,  
McNeil and Kennedy.

The Council then adjourned to meet at  
half-past 7, in the evening.

## Guelph Horticultural Society.

The annual meeting of this Society  
was held in the Queen's Hotel on the  
afternoon of Saturday. Comparatively  
few were present: Mr A Strowger, Presi-  
dent, in the chair. The following are the  
officers for the present year, Mr James  
Goldie, President, Mr Chas Sharpe, vice-  
President, Mr Geo Murton Secretary-  
Treasurer. Directors, Messrs Geo Elliott,  
James Anderson, John Card, A Strowger,  
D Sorby, Geo Smith, Geo Ba'kwill, Jno.  
Stewart, John A Wood, Messrs Allan  
and Baker, Delegates to the Provincial  
Exhibition, Messrs Stone and Allan,  
Auditors. The following report was  
read and adopted.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

The Directors of the Guelph Horticultu-  
ral Society have nothing special to call  
the attention of the Members to during  
the past year, but are happy to say that  
the Society is still in a progressive state.  
As will be seen by the financial state-  
ment a larger amount was received from  
members than for any previous year,  
showing an increased interest in the  
Society on the part of our amateur and  
professional gardeners.

At a meeting held on the 6th of May,  
1871, for the purpose of making out a  
prize list for this year's Exhibitions, and  
also settling the time for holding the  
annual spring and fall shows, it was  
resolved not to fix the day for holding  
the spring show until the season was  
further advanced, as so much depends  
on an early or late spring; for the suc-  
cess of the Exhibition. But it was un-  
animously agreed to hold the fall show  
on the 12th of September. The prize  
list was then carefully revised, and  
several alterations made, after which it  
was passed and a copy ordered to be  
filed with the Society's papers. At a  
subsequent meeting held on the 10th  
June, it was agreed to hold the first show  
on Wednesday the 28th, at which a  
very good display of Horticultural pro-  
ductions was made. Your Directors  
were much pleased to see an increase in  
the number of Window Plants shown,  
and hope another year to see a still larg-  
er increase in that department.

The display of Fuchsias, Geraniums &c.  
was good, and called forth the com-  
mends of the Judges, and will be so-  
on by their remarks. Bouquets and cut  
flowers, such as roses, pansies, sweet-  
williams, carnations, &c., also were fine.

The fruit show did not come up to  
our expectations, especially in straw-  
berries, of which we generally have a  
large display of magnificent fruit, but  
on account of the unfavorable weather and  
other causes the show was small, and the  
samples inferior. Other small fruits  
were pretty well represented.

In vegetables the show was superior  
to any previously held at this season of  
the year, especially, potatoes, peas and  
cucumbers. The following report by the  
Judges will convey an idea of what they  
thought of it:—

"The Judges have pleasure in notic-  
ing a box of seedling Peas, which are  
very fine. They are also much pleased  
in congratulating the Directors on the  
success of the Exhibition. In plants the  
display was very good, especially in  
and Dianthus, very fine and very choice  
stock. In vegetables, Peas and Potatoes  
are superb, the whole are excellently  
arranged and reflect great credit on the  
management.

The fall show was held on the 12th of  
Sept., and owing to the unusually dry  
Summer was not as good a display as  
we looked for at our fall show. Still our  
members did their best to keep up the  
credit of the exhibition. The show of  
greenhouse and window plants was  
about equal to previous fall exhibitions,  
but the display of geraniums far sur-  
passed anything in that class ever shown  
before; especially the collection of  
zonata or tricolor geraniums, which is  
a new feature in our show. In cut  
flowers and bouquets the display was  
good considering the fearfully dry and  
hot Summer—in fact much better than  
could be reasonably expected under the  
circumstances. In fruit the show was  
fine. Plums (although not as numerous  
as we have seen them) were exceedingly  
good. In peas the display was better  
than we have seen before; many speci-  
mens pronounced very good indeed.  
This fruit has largely increased in this  
country of late years, and we feel con-  
vinced that good healthy trees to start  
with, and proper care in cultivation after  
the year can be grown here with reason-  
able success. Some varieties do not  
grow as well here as in other localities,  
but many of the best sort do well. Such  
for instance as the Bartlett, Louisiana,  
Bon Jersey, Flemish Beauty, Howell,  
Juchesse d'Angoulême, Bourne Die,  
&c. Apples did not make as good a show  
as usual, owing in a great measure to  
the dry season and to the ravages of the  
codlin moth. This pest seems on the  
increase here, and its depredations on  
our apple crop—some varieties being  
almost useless on account of the worms  
in the fruit. Many experiments have  
been tried for their destruction, but few  
have had any marked success, and until

**PREVALENCE OF SMALL POX.**

This virulent and loathsome disease seems to be spreading far and wide. It prevails to an alarming extent in many parts of Great Britain and Ireland. It has for months been working silently and insidiously in some of the principal cities in the United States. Lately it gained a foothold in Montreal, where not only the poor and badly housed, but the well-to-do portion of the community have been attacked, and not a few become its victims. And it is feared that with the approach of warm weather the scourge will extend its operations, and spread from town to town throughout our borders.

In the face of this threatened plague it becomes our authorities, and all who have physical well being of the community at heart to take early and effectual means to prevent the spread of the disease, or at least mitigate its terrible effects. It will not do to stand idly by till the scourge is upon us, and then begin to institute sanitary measures. Then it will be too late, for when it once gains a firm footing, no means, however powerful, will expel it till it has run its course. And there is all the more urgency from the fact that the disease in its present form has assumed a most malignant type, and is therefore not to be trifled with.

It is an old saying that cleanliness is next to godliness, and there is no case in which it has more meaning or truthfulness than in reference to small-pox, which finds its sustenance on uncleanness, and thrives best in the midst of squalor and filth. Its home and favourite haunts is in the dark and dirty lanes of the overcrowded cities and towns in Europe, where wretchedness and want and misery abound, and there it yearly sweeps off its victims by thousands. We have no such pest-houses in our towns—no such crowding together of houses, or huddling together of families. Still much may be done to improve our sanitary condition. Our back lanes and streets should be cleaned of the accumulations of putrid garbage which is generally allowed to lie all summer, giving out noxious and disease-breeding odours which is as foul and unhealthy as the most deadly miasma. Out-houses, water closets, sinks and every other place which requires cleaning should be attended to ere the fierce summer heat is upon us. And having done all this, we can console ourselves with the reflection that if it do come, its ravages will by these means be mitigated, and in no small degree the disease robbed of its terrors.

**EDITORIAL ITEMS.**

A CAVALRY SCHOOL is to be organized by the Dominion Government, with Col. Forsyth as Commandant, and Major Gray, as Adjutant. Cadets will be allowed 75c per day for maintenance during instruction. By proclamation in Saturday's Gazette the meeting of the Dominion Parliament is further prorogued until 27th February, not then to meet for the despatch of business.

THE deaths from small-pox in Philadelphia during the week were 216, a decrease of 20 from the number of last week.

**Large Fire in Ypsilanti.**

London, Jan 15, 5 a.m.—It is expected that the Prince of Wales will have sufficiently recovered from his illness to be able to drive out from Sandringham in the course of a week.

The press generally approve of the projected laying of a new cable from the English coast to that of the United States, and agree that cheaper rates than those at the present time will be an incentive to the business community and the press of both countries.

The *Idia*, of Bath, has been wrecked on the Irish coast. New York, Jan 15—A letter to the *Times* from San Domingo says that it is reported there on Government authority that the Government made overtures to the English and Italian Governments for a triple alliance as a protection in the event of the negotiations for annexation to the United States fail. Germany was also solicited to become a party to the alliance but refused, and the other two powers have, it is stated, agreed to the proposal.

Baez has been making an extended tour through the country, and everywhere received with enthusiasm.

New York, Jan 15—A special to the *Times* from Washington states that Freeman Clark will to-day, introduce a Bill into the House to provide for special payments.

A Washington special to the *Tribune* says there is a rumour afloat which gains considerable credence among politicians, to the effect that the President will at once after the Senate Committee returns from New York and submits its report make a clean sweep of all the principal officials connected with the New York Custom House, filling their places with men of prominence in business an eminent integrity who have not been active in behalf of either.

Detroit, Jan 14—Cornell & Co's large paper mill at Ypsilanti was completely destroyed by fire on Saturday about midnight. Loss \$100,000.

For three evenings he loitered thus in the quiet, secluded road which leads over the heights from the town of Dunoon to the shore of the Holy Loch, and failed to meet the man of whom he was in search. Thus evening after evening had they spent in boating on the loch, or wandering through the green and silent seclusion of Glenmessaer and Glenlean, or sauntering through the mossy hollow of Gleninnan to the crystal waters of Loch Eck, and down to the grander shores of Loch Long; or, as we find them now, loitering with slow, contented step by the sedgy sides of the lily-covered Dunlokin, while the hush of evening peace rested on the summer landscape, and their own pure world of love and joy encircled their hearts.

Oh it was a season of delicious rapture and ecstasy. Did they not fear for its continuance? Did they not—knowing, as they might have done, how different it was from the ordinary lot of humanity—did they not mistrust its unbroken smile of peace, and dread the gloom of an approaching storm? Blame them not very much if they failed to anticipate the coming evil, or strove to fortify their hearts by consciously preparing

for suffering—blame them not greatly, we say, if they gave themselves wholly up to the joys which surrounded their young, deep, unsullied love, and under the soft, tender influences of these joys led themselves to believe that "tomorrow would be as this day, and even more abundant." If they erred in this it was an error natural to their youth and guileless affection, and, alas, it was an error for which they were soon heavily to suffer. To-night they are wandering with the same sense of happiness and the same oblivion of change, yet are they about to enter the shadow of utter gloom and eclipse. They have reached the very edge of it even now, for this, though they know it not, is the last evening of their sweet enjoyment, and the morrow is to bring them agony and woe unspeakable. Even now, though they dream not of the fact, a pair of eyes are watching them from the other side of the loch, animated by a spirit of mischief, and, on the high road beyond, the agency is approaching which that spirit is to invest with a terrible power against them.
