Visit of the Governor-General. We are sure that the people of Guelph and surrounding country will be pleased to learn that the Governor-General intends to visit Guelph on Friday, the 21st inst. finishing his trip in the North • West, he purposes visiting Chicago on the 14th or 15th inst., and from thence will return to Canada by way of Detroit. He will then make a tour of the principal towns in Ontario, finishing up at Niagara, and from thence cross over to Toronto. The Mayor has called a special meet-ing of the Council for Tuesday night, when arrangements will be made for giving his Excellency a reception worthy of the town. We are sure our citizens will heartily co-operate with the Council in this matter.

How the Ballot worked in East Eigin.

It seems that the system of voting by ballot worked admirably at the East Elgin election on Thursday The ballot boxes, furnished by the Government, are of black walnut : there is a door at the top, secured by a lock, and in the door a slit through which the ballots are deposited. The slide covering the slit is worked by a spring, and by pressing a small knob the slide is put to one side, and when the ballot is deposited it goes back to its place. The key hole is covered by a strap, and that again is secured by a padlock which fastens at the side. A seal on the strap completes the closing of the box. It will thus be seen that every provision is made to en. sure security, and ballot stuffing is impossible if the agents of the can. didates don't wilfully shut their eyes when the voting is going on. When the box has been properly locked and secured it is handed to the Returning Officer, and is not opened till the voting is concluded, when the ballot papers aré taken out and the returns made up.

Only one elector is admitted at a is recorded a ballot paper and an envelope are handed to him. While he is making out his ballot paper, another voter may be admitted to have his name recorded, so as to lose no time. When the elector makes out his ballot paper he hands it to the deputy returning officer who drops it into the box, and the elector passes out by another door. By good management fifty votes may easily be recorded an hour, or four hundred in the time allowed for voting, from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m. The new system presents a marked contrast to the old one in the total absence of noise or disturbance at the polling place. There is nowrangling, no coaxing, no coercion. The elector quietly walks out again. The new law does not allow the agents of candidates to make known to their friends outside the n.m.es of the electors who have or who have not voted, but this can easily be ascertained by checking the rames on the lists as they pass in to vote. Parties bringing up voters can therefore be kept posted, and everyone who requires looking after can be attended to.

crop, owing to the want of rain and, the unusual lateness of the season together. In Kentucky the weather is reported favorable during the last two weeks, but the most encouraging estimates do not go beyond one fouth of last year's crop. As a consequence, the grades of leaf that at the end of May sold from \$4\$ to \$5\$, had by the end of June advanced to from \$7\$ to \$8\$; while grades bringing from \$7\$ to \$8\$ while grades bringing from \$7\$ to \$8\$ at the former time brought \$12\$ at the latter. European dealers have taken the slarm, and a Liverpool house not long ago informed its customers that it could not fill their orders, giving as a reason the feet that holders of stocks had withdrawn them from the market. Liverpool agents in receipt of consignents are instructed by their principals to prepare to hold back during the entire year, in anticipation of a great scarcity and high range of value in 1875. The season is now far advanced, and thepolicy of the large dealers to compel a rise is so general and so pronounced, that a year or more of unusually high prices for tobacco may be considered a certainty. —Mail.

The duty on tobacco collected at the Pott of Montreal, for the year ending 30th June, amunts to \$120,511. The quantity of tobacco and cigars imported through the Port of Montreal from the 1st of July, 1873, to the 30th of June, 1874, was 17,359,825 cigars, weighing 204,211 lbs., on which duties were collected to about \$11,152,455; 10,451 lbs. of cult tobacco were received, the duties on which amounted to \$233,230; 33,876 lbs. of plug tobacco were imported the duty collected being \$665,490, the total revenue amounting to \$12,051,175.
