

GREAT BRITAIN WILL MAKE PROTEST ON THE CANAL BILL THURSDAY

Communication is en Route; Will be Met in New York by Britain's Agent

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The formal British protest against the Panama canal bill will reach Washington Thursday. The incoming mail steamer bearing the communication from the British Foreign Office will be met in New York by A. Mitchell Innes, the British charge, who will bring the protest directly to Washington for submission to Secretary Knox.

As the state department has already decided that in its present condition the subject is not one admitting of diplomatic treatment, the protest will be merely acknowledged and transmitted immediately to the senate and house, probably accompanied by a special message from President Taft.

Some officials believe that if congress will content itself with action upon so much of the canal bill as provides for the creation of an operating force for the waterway, the subject may be digested.

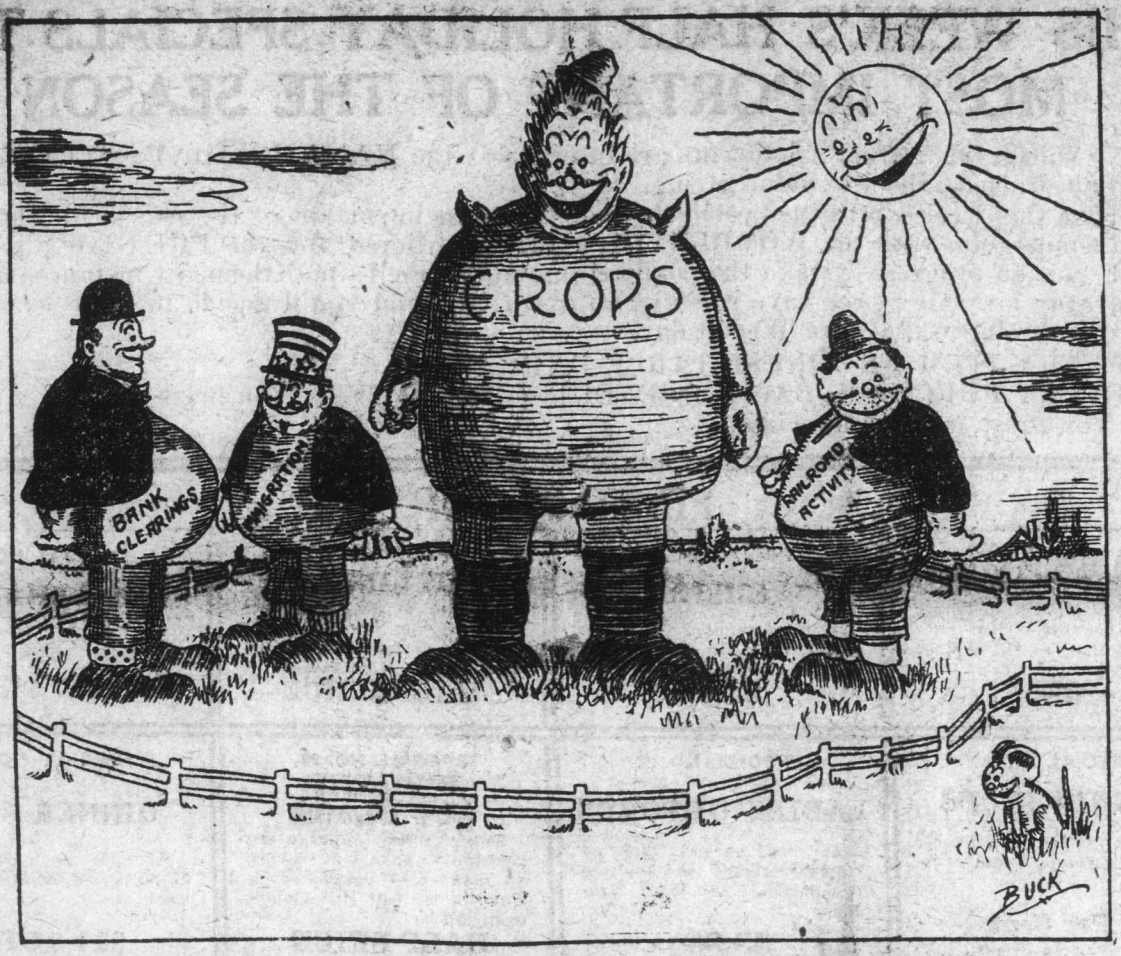
OWNERS OF PROPERTY MAY COMPEL THE CONTRACTORS TO MAKE GOOD

Building is Owned by Association; Site the Property of Canadian Pacific

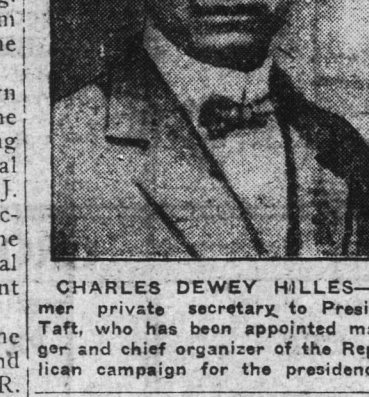

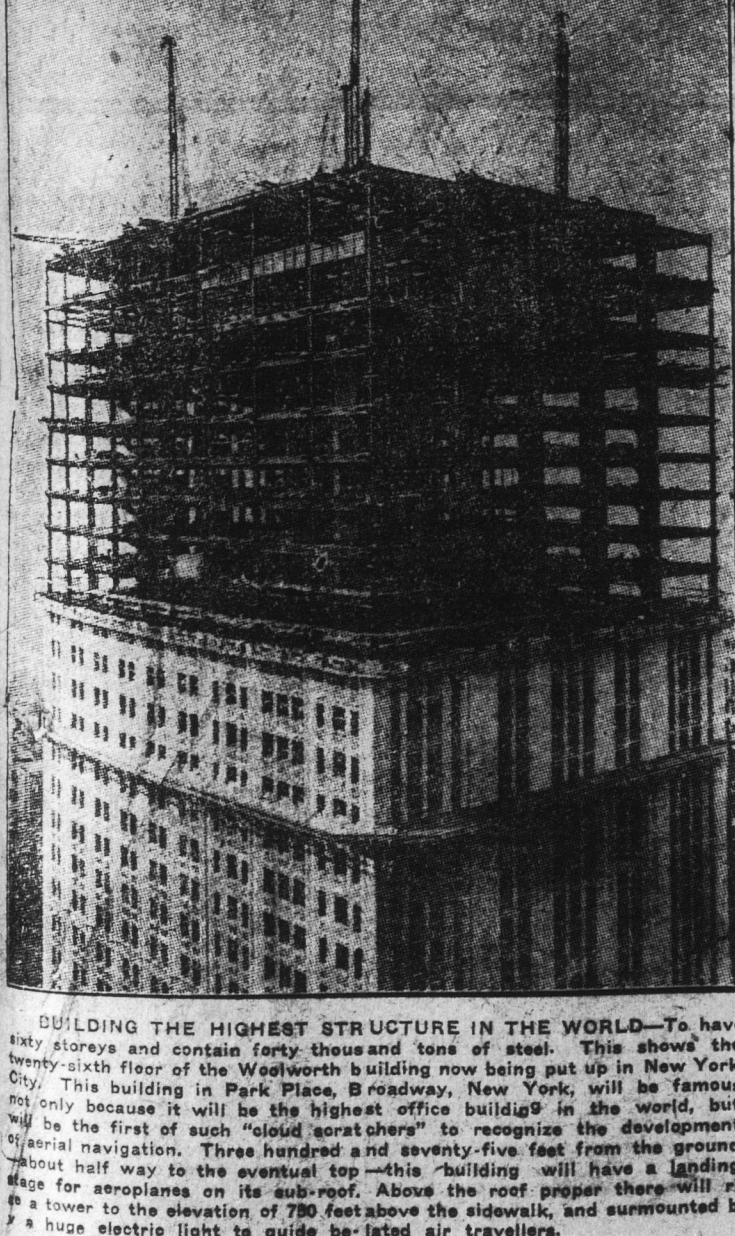
Stanley Committee Makes Two Reports but Both Condemn Great Oligarchy

Washington, July 16.—Although it is assured the Re Stanley committee's long investigation of the steel trust will result in at least two reports to Congress—one by the Republicans and the other by the Democrats of the committee—it was disclosed today that both sides will agree to recommendations that the United States Steel Corporation be dissolved, and endorse the anti-trust suit against it.

BUILDING THE HIGHEST STRUCTURE IN THE WORLD.—To have fifty stories and contain forty thousand tons of steel. This shows the twenty-sixth floor of the Woolworth building now being put up in New York City. This building in Park Place, Broadway, New York, will be famous not only because it will be the highest office building in the world, but will be the first of such "cloud scrapers" to recognize the development of aerial navigation. Three hundred and twenty-five feet from the ground about half way to the eventual top building will have a landing stage for aeroplanes on its sub-roof. Above the roof proper there will be a tower to the elevation of 730 feet above the sidewalk, and surmounted by a huge electric light to guide by fated air travellers.

New York, July 15.—The American learned yesterday that eight new trans-Atlantic liners are now being built for exclusive use in the Canadian trade. The four big companies which are building two each are the White Star line, the Allan line, the Canadian Pacific and the Cunard Steamship Company. P. A. S. Franklin, vice-president of the International Mercantile Marine, was recently in Montreal for several days, and his visit there at this time was reported to be in connection with the White Star interests in Canadian shipping. "The liners to be built for the White Star are to be of the same type as the Laurentic and Maestric, and will replace the Canada and Teutonic. The Cunard line's new steamer, Ascandia, has already completely successfully her maiden voyage from England to Montreal, and her sister ship will be launched early next year. It is predicted that the Canadian Northern will not be slow in following the example of the other big concerns, as it is a matter of common belief that Canada, more than any other in the world, will be the country of the future, and the best field for investment by shipping interests. An official of one of the companies already building steamers for this trade told The American yesterday that the ideal steamer for this service is the two-cabin boat, having accommodations for second class and steerage passengers only. Nevertheless, citizens of Calgary as is evidenced by their interest, are not prepared to let the matter drop with the dismissal of the official or officials responsible, but are determined to see that they are protected from loss, as is provided for in the city's contracts.

BANBURY CROSS NO MORE

(From the Buffalo News)
London.—The story of Banbury is departing. It is no longer necessary to go to Banbury to eat Banbury cakes; they can be bought in London. The old cross near to the old lady, "who rode on a white horse," and the inmates of countless nurseries, has been replaced by a modern apartment house, but still the pride of Banbury remained.

Only at "Ye Olde Reindeer Inn," Banbury, could the old club room be seen, and now that is going, and the folks of Banbury are angry because they think it is being despoiled for the gratification of American antique hunters. Lenny & Co., who have bought the Globe Room, say there is no truth in the rumor of its being sold to America, though it may go there some day.

The old Reindeer Inn itself bears the date of 1822 and is full of quaint panelled rooms, with waving irregular ceilings and unexpected beams, and its courtyard is the Globe Room, which, with its beautiful stone mullioned window, paneled walls and its plastered ceiling, is said to contain the finest Jacobean work in the country. The date 1637 is carved on the panelling, and it is in this room that Cromwell is recorded as holding a council just before the battle of Edgehill.

Mrs. Pearson, the landlady of the Old Reindeer, is deeply distressed at the sale and dismantling of the room. "People used to come and visit it from all parts, and such nice visitors, too," she said to a visitor. "Crowds of Americans came, as well as Colonial and English people. I could not believe it was going till the workmen actually came and began pulling it down."

UNITED STATES HEADS THE WORLD'S CRIME LIST

Laxity in Punishing Murder is Crying Evil Says Commander Eva Booth

There are No Brain Storms in England; the Criminal is Given Swift Justice

Boston, Massachusetts, July 16.—Laxity in punishing murder is the crying evil, says Commander Eva Booth, one of the reasons why the United States heads the world's crime list.

During an interval between speeches at open air meetings one night recently Miss Booth found time to point out a few of the deductions which she has drawn from her years of work among the erring. The commander of all the Salvation Army forces in the United States is a womanly personality, not a whit less feminine because of the military insignia on the sleeves and collar of her gown. But her remarkably deep, resonant voice took on the ring of quality of a war bugle when she spoke of the sense with which murderers gain leniency or complete acquittal in this country.

No Brain Storms in England

"The laws against murder are practically the same here as in England or other foreign countries, but here there are too many loopholes for the criminal," she said. "In England we never hear of brain storms. An Englishman knows that if he commits murder he is a hundred to one he will be punished. The American knows that if he commits murder it is a question of a good lawyer, often of 'emotional insanity'—he knows, in short, that there are a dozen chances for his escape. He realizes, too, that even after his conviction he may secure a commutation of sentence for any one of half a dozen reasons."

"Look at the Doctor Crippen case—how quickly that was disposed of in the English courts. Then look at any number of American murder cases which have been hanging on for years. Statistics show murder and suicide to be gaining. Of the arrests for murder you will find 75 and 85 per cent. are attempted murder in their own country of foreigners who have not been long enough in America to learn the language. We are getting a class of people who add to ignorance a different sense of proportion. They do not value life so highly as the Anglo-Saxons do—it's not so great a thing to out with a dagger and kill a man for some slight offense."

Commander Booth's brown eyes glowed when she was asked whether America seemed worse or better these last few years. "There is more effort for good today than ever before in the nation's history, and parallel with that she replied, "No country can prosper so quickly without causing an enormously greater amount of temptations for evil. If American had advanced morally as greatly as it has advanced commercially, it would be an example to the world."

"In some ways America is better; in some ways it is not improved. The great thirst and rush for money is not likely to inspire higher and cleaner living. Yet, even during the stress of money making, conditions of a whole have advanced. Never before have there been so many good American hearts eager to help the American poor and unfortunate. Fifteen years ago there were no Salvation Army industrial homes, people's hotels, or alum settlements. And all the other churches are more alive today to the need for doing active work. But even now the work is sadly inadequate. There are known—besides the unknown—to be 30,000 women of the streets in New York City. Should these women reform, there are home accommodations for only 260 penitents."

Stocks Rose as a Consequence of the President's Official Announcement

FARMERS WILL RUN THEIR OWN ELEVATORS NOW

Grain Growers Lease Fort William Terminal and Manitoba Government System

Organization Has Grown Immensely in Five Years; New Departures

Winnipeg, July 16.—Some idea of the strength of the Grain Growers' Grain Company, the organization of western Canadian farmers whose shareholders are holding their annual meeting here today under the presidency of T. A. Creer, can be gathered from the statement of the year's trading, which shows a net profit of \$121,614 for the past year, against \$69,000 the previous year and but \$79 five years ago. The paid-up capital is \$486,000, and after paying a ten per cent dividend, the directors recommended that \$60 be added to the reserve fund, which now totals \$290,000.

The president pointed out that this progress had been made, despite the difficulty in handling last year's crop, owing to the low grades, tough wheat, and traffic congestion.

The president said that the company had practically closed with the Canadian Pacific railway, a deal whereby they would lease the big terminal elevator B at Fort William, and with the Manitoba Government for leasing its extensive system of international elevators, both of which projects the meeting would be asked to ratify. The latter project is a \$1,000,000 venture to contain three hundred million feet in anticipation of the time when they would go into the business in behalf of their shareholders.

Speaking of future development, Mr. Creer favored the local unit method, as practiced by the farmers' elevators of Minnesota and the Dakotas, whereby other classes of merchandise were successfully handled by the country elevators. It was necessary to secure the best results to maintain the grades all the year round, and lumber, binder twine, and implements could be profitably handled during "the summer months." He advocated the securing of a good coal area, as coal and lumber were rapidly going under the control of combines. He favored selling wheat and other grain through a co-operative system, and there was no reason why in time the successful merchandising of the British co-operative societies should not be duplicated.

The company might further secure connection with a mortgage corporation and secure cheap money for farmers. The money power in Canada, he said, was becoming a menace, and the difficulty might largely be overcome by co-operative credit societies.

DEFECTIVE WATER SYSTEM MAY AFFECT INSURANCE

Insurance People Say City's Consumption of Water is Enormous
Inspector Thinks City Should Have Special Engineer for Water System

Proposed reduction in fire insurance rates asked by Calgary from the Western Canadian Underwriters' Association may be hindered through defects, principally leakage, in the city's water system. The city admitted inspector has reported a reduction in view of the splendid record of the Calgary fire department, but Inspector H. Stainforth of the Underwriters' Association points out that the consumption of the Calgary water supply is astonishing. He says that the system is taxed to capacity daily, and recalls that water supply is one of the elemental factors of insurance risk.

Mr. Stainforth declares that as Calgary has only 60,000 inhabitants, it is absurd to suppose that the entire daily capacity of the gravity system, namely 3,500,000 gallons, or about 120 gallons per capita, is being used for domestic purposes. The only other explanation feasible, he thinks, is leakage.

The fire underwriter inspector says that for a city of 60,000 people the supply for domestic purposes should be 6,000,000 gallons, and for fire purposes the same quantity. Illustrating what Calgary will require before many years, he says that a city of 120,000 population needs for domestic purposes 8,000,000 gallons a day. In other words, the present system is already in utterly inadequate, and will be impossible in a few years. Mr. Stainforth says the city should have a waterworks engineer who should devote his entire time to the problems of the water supply.

The board of trade appointed a committee to continue the inquiry into reduction of the insurance rates. The members are: W. H. Berkinshaw, chairman; W. G. Fowler, and P. D. McLaren.

DEAD MAN THEIR LEADER

EXPERTS SAY GROWING WEATHER DOES NOT BE BETTER FOR THE CROPS

(Continued From Page One)

of the grain is headed out, the sunshine does not help the situation. Erskine reports wheat all headed out except late fields; good length and very healthy looking; oats the same, barley well headed and looking well. No flax sown.

Gadsby reports crops in fair condition. Most alfalfa, flax well headed out. Flax in first class condition and doing well.

Rains Revive Withered Crops. Heavy rain over the province for the past week have helped to revive the withered condition of the crops. The early sown grain is mostly out in head, though the straw is not long. Hilkirk reports wheat looking good, but little progress since the previous week, owing to rain; oats coming along well; barley fine, but needs warm weather; flax reported all looking well. More rain than needed, but nothing has ever had in district.

Miller reports grain in good condition and every evidence of the finest crop there has been in the country. Heavy dew weather has been fine for growing crops. No more rain needed. Red Deer reports heavy rains all week. Too much moisture in parts, but no grain rot except in turning out. There will be as much straw as last year. All hay ground very well. Sunshine needed.

Windsor reports weather for the past two weeks all that could be desired for the growing crops. Plenty of moisture, and prospect of biggest harvest ever had in district.

Storm reports heavy rains Monday and Saturday last week. Crops are all headed out, but are very well with plenty of straw. Straw is improving in length. More sunshine needed.

Frost Was Harmless. At Cheshire, the much rain for the low lands, but most of the grain is looking good and nearly all headed. Some frost Saturday night, but no grain rot except in turning out. Big crop and early harvest. Cluny correspondent says growth of all grain is rather slow on account of dull, rainy weather, but the dry weather from now on good crops are assured.

Gleichen agent writes: All grains are looking good, mostly headed. Some flax is in full bloom, and barley is coming along fine. Several local showers reported during the past week. Local showers all week. South of Bow Island crops are a week late.

Blackie, the correspondent says: "Crop conditions could not be better." It is a pity that the weather is still so gloomy. Wheat is nearly all headed. Plenty of rain. Warm weather needed. Some reports of damage to crops with all grains are doing well.

Chesham correspondent writes: "Have seen July 17. A cold day, followed by cool weather, made conditions ideal for maturing the crop. Examined a piece of winter wheat on the demonstration farm and found the heads fully developed."

Warm Weather Desirable. Carmarthen reports crops will bring them along fast. Most of the grain is headed out. No hail reported since spring and winter wheat is being sown. Oats and barley growing fast. Plenty of rain. Gramon reports that grain set back by the hot weather in the season, but the very hot weather is showing signs of being over. High river reports all kinds of grain in good condition, though some of the low ground is beginning to show signs of too much rain. Warm weather would insure an early harvest and heavy yields.

The Mackay correspondent writes: "Some farmers say they have had too much rain, but others say the continuing rain does not do any harm. One farmer declares his intention of cutting his fall wheat on the 15th, and estimates a yield of about 25 bushels per acre. Oats still shows signs of the wheat that was headed rapidly growing again, and will make a good crop of grain feed. Oats good, though in several cases it is rather thin."

All Grain Growing Rapidly. McCreary reports grain growing rapidly and nearly all spring wheat headed. Nanton says all grains looking good, with plenty of straw. A small percentage of fall wheat on the decline, straw turning yellow and the heads not filling properly, especially caused by a heavy frost working on the roots. The crops so affected will probably give one-half yield. Spring wheat was never so good. Oats fine and heading. Two or three weeks of hot weather would make a great improvement.

Purple Springs reports all grain looking good. Rainey correspondent writes that fall wheat is in excellent condition. The early drought had a tendency to shorten the straw. Spring wheat and barley are heading and flax looking good. Oats are heading, and prospects of excellent crop. Staveley reports everything looking good. Warm weather is needed. Spring Coulee reports fall wheat in fine condition. Spring wheat and oats fair. Woolford says "Crop conditions are good. Plenty of rain."

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Winnipeg, July 16.—Some idea of the strength of the Grain Growers' Grain Company, the organization of western Canadian farmers whose shareholders are holding their annual meeting here today under the presidency of T. A. Creer, can be gathered from the statement of the year's trading, which shows a net profit of \$121,614 for the past year, against \$69,000 the previous year and but \$79 five years ago. The paid-up capital is \$486,000, and after paying a ten per cent dividend, the directors recommended that \$60 be added to the reserve fund, which now totals \$290,000.

DEFECTIVE WATER SYSTEM MAY AFFECT INSURANCE

Insurance People Say City's Consumption of Water is Enormous
Inspector Thinks City Should Have Special Engineer for Water System

Proposed reduction in fire insurance rates asked by Calgary from the Western Canadian Underwriters' Association may be hindered through defects, principally leakage, in the city's water system. The city admitted inspector has reported a reduction in view of the splendid record of the Calgary fire department, but Inspector H. Stainforth of the Underwriters' Association points out that the consumption of the Calgary water supply is astonishing. He says that the system is taxed to capacity daily, and recalls that water supply is one of the elemental factors of insurance risk.

Mr. Stainforth declares that as Calgary has only 60,000 inhabitants, it is absurd to suppose that the entire daily capacity of the gravity system, namely 3,500,000 gallons, or about 120 gallons per capita, is being used for domestic purposes. The only other explanation feasible, he thinks, is leakage.

The fire underwriter inspector says that for a city of 60,000 people the supply for domestic purposes should be 6,000,000 gallons, and for fire purposes the same quantity. Illustrating what Calgary will require before many years, he says that a city of 120,000 population needs for domestic purposes 8,000,000 gallons a day. In other words, the present system is already in utterly inadequate, and will be impossible in a few years. Mr. Stainforth says the city should have a waterworks engineer who should devote his entire time to the problems of the water supply.

The board of trade appointed a committee to continue the inquiry into reduction of the insurance rates. The members are: W. H. Berkinshaw, chairman; W. G. Fowler, and P. D. McLaren.


