Hamburg makes the following statement at the request of the captain of the steamer Sultan: The Sultan made an unusually rapid passage and sighted Borkum light beween 1 and 2 o'clock on Saturday morning. The weather was hazy and soon became very foggy. The engines were eased to dead slow, and the steam whistle kept sounding every few seconds. The captain and chief officer were on the bridge and two hands looked out forward. Suddenly the green and masthead lights of a steame were seen two points on the starboard bow and the captain of the Sultan thought the approaching steamer would keep her course

and go clear. It was noticed, however, that she suddenly ported and came around rapidly. It was too late to do anything but stop and reverse, which was done. By
the time the engines revolved once the
captain noticed the other steamer's port
light coming rapidly towards the Sultan.
The next instant with the great way she
had on she caught the Sultan's bowsprit in
her port fore rigging, taking her right
around. There was great consternation
aboard the Sultan as it was feared a so
much larger vessel would sink her. The
Sultan's crew hailed the Cimbria to stand
by, but no reply was received. The vessels
parted in the fog and a few seconds later
the mate of the Sultan saw the Cimbria
coming up on the other side. He called to
the German master to go full speed astern.
This was done and the Cimbria again crossed
the Sultan's bows and then disappeared. An
examination of the Sultan showed the upper
part of her hawse pipe was driven through

where the crew had a narrow escape. The
Sultan remained on the scene five hours.

ANTILL-STARRED MONTH It is not often that formidable disaster on sea and land follow one another so closely as have the frightful calamities which go to make up the recent chapter of accidents The first month of the year is not much experienced as many disasters as would make a good showing for a six months' or a year's summary. On January 7 the City of Brussels collided in the Mersey and eight men perished. The holocaust at Milwaukee occurred on the 11th, when seventy-five people were destroyed by fire. Then followed the fire in the Planter's hotel St Louis, at which three or four lives were lost. The burning of the circus at Berditscheff in Russia on January 13 was acco panied by a terrible sacrifice of human life, one hundred and fifty persons having been consumed. The two disasters of Friday last go to swell the abnormal list. At Tchaehifi on the Southern Pacific railway it is reported that eighteen persons were roasted to death, and although the number of bodies lost by the collision of the Cimbria is not yet definitely known, it seems that between two and three hundred souls have perished by that disaster. With the exception of the people who perished at were travelers, some on resting over the night at the hotel in which they happened to find themselves quartered. ecently compiled show that accidents by rail are more than a hundred times less numerous than they were when traveling was done by stage and horses; and the introduction of steam on the ocean has very largely lessened the number of marine ers compared with those that previously resulted from extended voyages under sail. 
