

When a man lets his hair grow long and goes in for poetry he is apt to rise into a world inhabited only by himself, where he lives very happily in admiration of his own charms. There he communes with himself and becomes enamored of his thoughts and the sound of his voice. This seems to be the case of Sir Edwin Arnold. He has been interviewed from Hiogo to Halifax and back again, and Sir Edwin speaks grandly and impressively. He does not conduct his auditor through 'the barren labyrinths of 'The Light of Asia' or attempt to astound him with weak stanzas from "The Light of the World," but prefers the more pressic pastime of discussing current affairs. He got hold of a reporter in Montreal and with Yokohamean impulsiveness told him that Canada need not fear the cholers this year, that the winter frosts would be a bar to its entrance; in other words, that it is a summer disease. If Sir Edwin would look into the reports he would find that the disease ravaged Russia all one winter, and that Canada had a deadly struggle with it fifty years ago in the winter months. Having become possessed of this information he will see that it would be nonsense to induge in any more rubbishy talk of that kind. Among the precautions that are taken by the people of the South during the prevalence of a yellow fever epidemic is the wearing of small buckskin bags containing gum camphor. These are suspended from the neck in such a manner that they rest against the skin over the chest. A bit of camphor carried in the mouth while one is in a sick room is also sometimes used by nurses and physicians. Sulphur likewise encased in bags, carried in the pocket or sprinkled in the stockings, has frequently been used in cholera, diphtheria and other epidemics. The consciousness that one has a possible preventive of contagion on his person is calculated at least to allay apprehension, which in itself occasionally probension, which in itself occasionally provokes an attack of the disease.

Mr. Smith said there are no pasture lands in these countries, consequently very few cows. All milk was supplied from dairies, and sold at 15 cents a quart; cows being valued at \$110 apiece.




