

The arbitrators appointed some time ago, to settle the differences that had arisen between the city of London and London East, in connection with the proposed amalgamation of the latter municipality with the city, have filed their award. They estimate the assets of London city at \$1,926,753; liabilities \$1,630,618, and the assets of London East at \$88,999; liabilities \$61,806.

Pacific coast people are delighted to learn that mackerel have been discovered in the Pacific Ocean. The captain of a bark at Portland, Ore., reports that on his last voyage from Honolulu, about the middle of June, he sailed through an enormous school of mackerel. Not having any suitable fishing gear he was unable to procure any specimens, but he says the fishacted precisely like a school of mackerel in the North Atlantic.

they obtained an extension of 4, 6 and 7 months. The firm dissolved about 1st March, 1885, Bradley retiring; since then Snow has been the only member. Liabilities are estimated at \$7,000, judgment held by his father for \$2,000. An offer of 20c on the dollar has been made.

The prospects for an abundant harvest in Manitoba and the North-west, according to reports just gathered by the Canadian Pacific Railway, were never brighter than at present. In from a fortnight to three weeks in most districts, the grain will be ready for the sickle. No damage worth speaking of has been done by storms. The average prospective yield of wheat is placed at from 20 to 30 bushels, of onts at from 35 to 50. Vegetables and roots also promise well.

The granite and marble company in which several Ottawa capitalists are chiefly interested is considering the advisibility of establishing polishing works at Ottawa. There are as yet no polishing works in Ontario, the granite used for monumental and other purposes being polished elsewhere and simply lettered there. The company claims that its granite is the best yet found, and is richer in color than even

the famous Scotch granite. They have now at Kingston, Navy Bay, 20,000 pieces ready for shipment.

In connection with the failure of Trapp Bros., New Westminster, B.C., referred to some weeks ago, it appears that the stock valued at \$30,000 was held by one Dean, under a chattel mortgage for \$17,000. This sum was paid into court by Turner, Beeton & Co., H. Shorey & Co. and Gault Bros., the other creditors agreeing thereto. R. Harvey was appointed receiver to the estate, which is fully able to meet all the liabilities, and which will be handed back to Trapp Bros. when all claims have been settled.

This statement of the insolvent hardware firm of J. S. Neill, Fredericton, N B., is not pleasant reading for the creditors. The figures are as follows :- Stock on hand \$20,000; book debts about \$16,000, of which it is said no more than \$8,000 will be realized; bills receivable (not discounted) \$2,000; real estate (over and above mortgages) \$3,000. Total \$33,000. From this must be deducted \$13,000 given as preferences in the trust deed, leaving the assets

A new telegraph pole has been invented by F. N. Gisborne, Ottawa, Ont. The pole is constructed of malleable galvanized iron, and is only 11 inches in diameter at the top and 21 at the bottom, and weighs less than 50 pounds. The bottom of the pole sets in a claw, upon which the earth is closely packed to a height of about 2 feet: then another plate is put into place, and the earth packed upon it to the level of the ground. Through this second plate the pole runs. The claw plates, by being thus placed and packed, take a firm grip of the ground at once, so that the pole becomes solid immediately after being placed which is only atrained by the ordinary wooden pole after it has been in the ground for at least a year. At a recent test they showed great strength. It is the intention to use these poles in the North-West, where the cost of transportation of the ordinary wooden pole is very great.

years past sheep-raising has been on the decline in Ontario, and that now the majority of farmers only keep a mere handful of sheep, compared with what was bred some years since. It claims that this has been due to the low price of wool and to the fact that cattle and sheep will not thrive together on the same pasturage. The Free Press contends that sheep pay better now than when long wool was worth 35c to 40c per lb, owing to the enhanced price of mutton. The amount of the clip, it says, is disputed. A shortage of from fifteen to twenty-five per cent, however, is believed in by most dealers. No rapid or decided advance in values is looked for, but rather a gradual and slow hardening in prices. A number of manufacturers have bought freely, and are stocking up for the future. The leading demand is for fine and medium wools, with long sound staple.

by a Halifax detective on the charge that he " did unlawfully and maliciously cast away and destroy the vessel or schooner Smiling Water." The Smiling Water was a little schooner of 54 tons, owned by Mr. Henry Cook, of Halifax, and fitted out by him for a trading voyage along the coast, on which she sailed about the 1st of May last. The vessel was insured for \$1,200 and the cargo for \$2,500, in the Ocean Marine and other offices. When the Smiling Water was lost and the insurance was claimed, something about the circumstances of the case aroused the suspicions of the insurance men that all was not right, and the arrest of the captain followed. At the preliminary hearing the mate, Thomas Young, swore that the captain gave him \$25 to scuttle the vessel, and after coming out of Isaac's harbor he bored holes with a centre-bit under the cabin floor and let in the water, some of the crew afterwards assisting to make her sink faster by chopping holes in her deck and sides. Efforts will be made by the insurance companies to prove that a portion of the cargo was lauded previous to the sinking of the schooner.

THE LONDON CHAMBER OF COM-MERCE.

No. 2.

Before resuming our notice of Sir Charles Tupper's recent speech at the Canadian Section of the London Chamber of Commerce, we think it desirable to correct a misapprehension, which we have noticed, which is that he contemplated, what we may term an Imperial tariff, common to the United Kingdom, and its dependencies. His own language is sufficiently clear: "I do not suppose "it is possible to have the same tariff. "Responsible Governments must frame

"their tariffs according to their own in-

" terests from day to day, but why should

" they not have the one tariff within the 'Empire and another outside it?" Sir Charles Tupper attaches little or no importance to the most favored nation clause, on the ground that "it operates "only between this country (Great Bri-"tain) and foreign countries." Without discussing the bearing of the various commercial treaties, we must point out, that for the very same reason that Canada could not venture to discriminate against the United States, Great Britain would not, by discriminating in favor of her own dependencies, invite retaliation from the various foreign nations with which she trades, and, moreover, as her settled policy, as recently stated by Lord Salisbury, is not to protect her own agriculturists or manufacturers, it is very unlikely that she would reverse it to protect a colonial trade.

Sir Charles Tupper holds that such an arrangement would not only be practicable, but that it is "one which would be obtained without much difficulty." We feel assured that Sir Charles is laboring under a complete delusion on this subject. His next topic was "state aided emigration," and his argument for aid from the British Exchequer, was that large sums had been paid out within the last year to assist emigration from the British Isles to the United States of America, and that while the great outlaying dependencies of the Empire require immigrants, it is a mistake to aid them to go elsewhere. As regards Canada the difficulties in the way of aiding emigration to the West, and of preventing the emigrants from settling in the United States, if they prefer it, would be found insuperable, and we very much fear that the result of recent efforts in that direction has been to create a prejudice in the public mind against immigration. The scheme developed by Sir Charles Tupper would be open to serious difficulty. It is in substance the appropriation of five millions of dollars "for the "purpose of carrying on a never-ending "system of emigration. And this should " be done not by giving money, but by "lending it to persons who were adapted " to become successful occupiers of the "soil." We own that we have little confidence in the success of this scheme.

The next subject treated was one on which there will be little difference of opinion, viz., the Colonial Exhibition of 1886, and we hope most sincerely that the anticipation of Sir Charles Tupper will be realized, and that the exhibition will be worthy of Canada. The reference to the tariff, the details of which the Canadian section was invited to examine,

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was very brief. We learn that even its framers "do not regard it as perfect," and Sir Charles said to the London merchants:—"I shall be glad to hear any "suggestions from you of means to im" prove it or which may tend to be in "any way mutually advantageous." It was not surprising that the foregoing remarks were received with shouts of "hear, hear." It is simply impossible that the members of the London Chamber of Commerce can approve of a tariff framed avowedly to discourage imports, and supposed o have been inspired by Canadian manufacturers.

The next subject treated, which was truly said to be of great interest to commercial men in the United Kingdom, was "bankruptcy law reform." After noticing the application made to Sir John A. Macdonald when in England, by the Associated Chambers of Commerce, and the assurance which he gave, that the subject should receive the early and careful consideration of the Government, Sir Charles mentioned that he had himself made the admission, which we give in his own words, that "the Government of "Canada were defeated in an effort to "retain the bankruptcy law on the "Statute book," and he "pointed out "some of the causes which had made it " impossible for the Government to with-'stand the very wide-spread hostility "-aroused this question." He then referred to the notice of the subject in the Governor General's opening speech and to the bill of the Member for Montreal. He said that "the Government "actually sustained a defeat in its effort "to retain the bankruptcy law on the "Statute book," and they thought "the "best means to carry out their object," was to have the Bill referred to a special committee selected from the best commercial men on both sides of the House. Sir Charles Tupper proceeded:-"The "measure has since been made a Govern-" ment Bill, and I am quite certain that " the Government will make every effort " to carry it substantially through Parlia-" ment, and thus meet the very strong " claims that the commercial men of this "country (Great Britain) have for an "improvement in the Canadian bank-" ruptcy law."

We own that we read Sir Charles Tupper's remarks on this important-subject with a good deal of surprise. We had been under the impression, we ought perhaps to say, the delusion, that the Canadian administration had never been able to agree on any measure on the subject of insolvency. We never before knew that the Government had taken

any action in the matter, or made the Bill of last Session a Government Bill. We certainly do not recollect that any language, similar to that which we have quoted from Sir Charles Tupper's speech; has been used by any member of the Government either in or out of Parliament.

If others have been as careless, as we frankly admit we have been, a good deal of surprise will be felt, for we know that there are wide differences of opinion among commercial men in Montreal, and doubtiess elsewhere, as to the Bill reported from the committee last Session, and which we learn on high authority is now to be brought forward with the entire weight of the Government. It would be interesting to examine the division lists on the occasions when "the Government were defeated in an effort to retain the bankruptcy law," and to ascertain how the members of the Government voted on the occasion. We shall be very much surprised indeed if the names of some members of the administration are not found in the majority which we are told by Bir Charles Tupper "defeated the Government."

THE SASKATCHEWAN SCARE.

The above is the title of a contribution to the London Fortnightly Review, from the Marquis of Lorne, the late Governor General of Canada, and we feel assured that it will be generally received by the people of the United Kingdom as a reliable account of the recent insurrection in the North West. It seems desirable at a time when the writers in New York and Chicago newspapers, who cannot be deemed to be well acquainted with the state of affairs in the North West, are nevertheless offering opinions with the greatest confidence, and when there is in Canada considerable agitation on the subject among certain classes of our mixed population, that due consideration should be given to the views of the distinguished nobleman, already referred to, who, it must be admitted, is not only strictly impartial, but who during an extended tour in the North West had the most favorable opportunities for arriving at a correct opinion as to the alleged grievances of the Metis. Our object is simply to place the Marquis of Lorne's views before our readers as well as those of the parties who appear to dissent from them.

The fact is beyond dispute that a considerable number of the Metis or Half-breeds residing in the North West took up arms against the established Government in order to procure the redress of real or imaginary grievances. It has been

stated, at a public meeting held in the city of Montreal a few days ago, by the Hon. Mr. Luflamme, who held the portfolio of Minister of Justice in the Mackenzie administration, that the rebellion was justifiable. His words as reported in the Star are "but Riel was innocent of * the crime of which he was accused, and "the Metis had been fully justified in "rebelling against the Government "authorities in the North West," and again "the half-breeds had taken up arms and tought for their just right," In the issue of the same Star there is a petition from certain electors of the Town of Lachine in which it is stated that "the " proof adduced clearly demonstrated "that there exists a good deal of doubt " as to his (Riel's) mental condition, and " in consequence upon the legal responsi-"bility by reason of his state of mind" Again in the same petition it is said that circumstances " clearly show that the re-"bellion, of which Louis Riel was the "head, was a piece of folly." At the Lachine meeting the spokesmen were Messrs. Girouard, M.P., and Royal, M.P., but a reference to their speeches will show that they entertain very opposite views from those expressed by Mr. Laflamme.

Strange as it may seem, there is in the same issue of the Star the copy of a paper signed by six priests, the object of which is to entreat the sympathy of the French speaking people of Canada with the people who were "led astray" by Riel, who is said to have acted as he did "to gain his own selfish ends." We shall leave to those who deem it consistent with propriety to seek by public demonstrations to influence the action of the Executive Government in a case requiring the gravest consideration, in view of the public interest, to settle among themselves the grounds on which they think that their appeal for elemency to the convict should be urged. We shall endeavor as briefly as possible to place before our readers in his own words the opinions entertained by the Marquis of Lorne on the late rebellion. The Indians and the Metis are noticed separately. Of the former, after asserting that the Canadian system has been better than that in the United States, it is said that the Canadians "might have avoided the enmity of all the savage bands as successfully, as they have the hostility of most of them, had it not been for the French half-breeds, who in their movement dragged their Indian cousins along with them.

In regard to the claims of the Metis, which are said either to extenuate those

who took up arms, or to justify them, Lord Lorne writes: "It may at once be " said that most of the Metis claims were "wholly inadmissible. They: received "too much after the rising at Fort "Garry, and they have been encouraged "by Riel to believe that a repetition of "their offence would again meet with the "lenient amiability which was shown in "the clemency of the Canadian Govern-"ment, when influenced by Sir George "Cartier. Riel should have been shot " for the murder of Scott in the first in-"surrection." Again, "the present "rising is the direct consequence of the " misguided confidence, which has per-"mitted him to re-enter the country." Again "The gist of the demands lately "made by the half-breeds is that they "should be all treated now as were their 'friends in Manitoba in 1870. Many in-"deed who sold their land almost as soon " as granted in that Province, and moved "thence Northward, asked to be again "dowered with the same amount they "had before received. There were a " comparatively small number who were " outside of Manitoba and in the occupa-"tion of farms."

It appears that Poundmaker acted as guide in 1881 to Lord Lorne's party, and at that time seemed to be quite loyal and anxious for peace among the Indian tribes. His band cannot, Lord Lorne thinks, number two hundred, and he expresses his conviction that "the good " policy of the Government will prevail "over the present difficulties when the "lessons they teach of an ample gen-"erosity in times of transition have "been fully appreciated, and the fire "brands who have 'set the prairie on "fire,' shall have been 'justified' in "whatever manner the wisdom of the "Government shall determine. The "Dominion has granted the Metis all "that justice demanded, policy may " exact yet more, and patriotism in Can-"ada should help the Government in the "discharge of an expensive obligation." We have thought that our readers would be pleased to have the views of the various parties who have taken an interest in a most important question placed fairly before them.

THE SUGAR INDUSTRY.

There is perhaps no branch of trade involved in so many difficulties at present as the sugar industry. The planters in the British sugar colonies complain, and with reason, that the system which is generally adopted in the countries which produce beet sugar, of granting bounties

on exportation, has been destructive to their principal industry. Their recent demand for retaliation in the form of countervailing duties has been unsuccess ful, but it is to be inferred from Lord Salisbury's reply to their application that if his party should be successful at the ensuing general election there will be a change in the fiscal policy of Great Britain. In Canada great efforts have been made to encourage the growth of the beet, and the bounties granted by the United States to their refiners have been met by retaliatory duties which though for a time adequate for the object, seem to have been countervailed by increased bounties. There are in the United States many who advocate the free admission of raw sugars under reciprocity treaties substantially like that now subsisting with Hawaii.

In our present issue, we publish an interesting communication from the pen of Mr. Henry A. Brown, of Soxonville, Massachusetts, formerly Special Treasury Agent for the U.S., and who though a decided protectionist of American industries, against the cheap labor of Europe, and an opponent of reciprocity treaties in general, frankly admits that as in Canada the cost of labor approximates to that in the United States, it is an exception to the rule. In point of fact, Canada does not seek reciprocity in manufactured articles for the obvious reason that it could not discriminate against Great Britain so long as it is a dependency. There really is no valid objection against reciprocal free trade in those natural products which are exported by both countries. Mr. Brown's paper is chiefly taken up with the sugar industry, and as he treats of the cultivation of beet, and gives some interesting statistics, we have no doubt that his present contribution will be read with the same interest as former ones from the same pen even by those who do not share his opinions.

NEUTRAL MARKETS.

The Hamilton Spectator is of opinion that "there are ample grounds for thinking it is not true" that "the manufacturers of a country where a protective policy prevails' cannot compete in neutral markets with the very article which they have excluded from their own. The reason which our contemporary assigns for his opinion is that, although the United States "have practically excluded foreign breadstuffs from their markets," yet they nevertheless "com" pete pretty successfully in neutral

"markets for the sale of their surplus " grain and flour:" Again, the Germans, while excluding sugar from their home market, "compete successfully in neutral markets." In both the cases cited the articles exported are the natural products of the exporting countries. The import duties are merely nominal, just as import duties on cotton, iron, and woollen manufactures or coal would be in Great Britain. The Spectator's illustration of sugar is anything but a happy one. The general upinion is that the United States sugar refiners are enabled to send their goods to a foreign market owing to the large bounties paid to them on exportation out of the public chest. We had no reference in our former remarks on the subject to natural products, such as breadstuffs, which are a leading article of export from the United States, and the price of which could not be affected by import duties. Our specific reference was to manufactures, but perhaps our meaning will be more clear if we refer specifically to an important article of manufacture which is common to Great Britain, the United States, Canada, and several other counties. The avowed object is to find a foreign market for Canadian cotton manufactures, and it is admitted that Canadian manufacturers of cotton are unable to compete in their own markets with the cottons of Great Britain without protective duties. Our position is simply that, under such circumstances, they cannot compete with British manufactures in neutral markets. The Spectator's illustration as regards iron only proves that Belgian and German iron-masters must export some special descriptions of goods which are not produced in Great Britain. It is admitted that "Great "Britain sells more iron in neutral mar-"kets than any other country, probably "more than all others combined," and we hold that it is simply impossible for foreigners to compete in her own markets with similar goods. Our object was not to discuss the question of protection but to point out that articles which require protection cannot be exported with advantage.

THE NEW LIFE INSURANCE ACT.

Certain late changes in the wording of the new life insurance Act appear unimportant to the general reader, but not so to him who is directly interested. The alterations in subsection 5 of clause 5, suggested at the last moment by the assessment advocates of the Bill, and adopted as of little or no consequence, are worthy of a few remarks. The subsection reads as follows, the words in italies marking the changes introduced:—

"No portion of any moneys received from assessments for death claims shall be used for any expense whatever, and every notice of any assessment shall truly specify the cause and purpose thereof."

A little consideration of this section will show how important it is to the assessment companies. Were it not for this provision made by the few short words, italicised, the special assessment of Canadian members of the Provident Mutual. who have been persuaded to enter the new company, would be impossible. Besides this it implies, what the former draft of the Bill did not, that assessments may be made for expenses or other purposes, notwithstanding by-law number seven which says that, "the annual dues for expenses shall be limited to \$2 on each \$1,000, payable annually in advance," and the statement in section 5, article XI. of the constitution of the Mutual Reserve Fund Association,-"On the first days of February, May, August, and November (or at such other periods as the board of directors may determine) an assessment shall be made upon the entire membership......for such a sum as the executive committee may deem sufficient to meet the existing claims by death," and so on; 25 per cent of the net receipts therefrom to be set apart for a reserve fund, and "no part" of the reserve fund " shall be used for expenses."

But the chief officers of the Mutual Reserve Fund system which, as Prof. Cherriman said, is "still in a state of experiment," have been gathering wisdom by experience,-learning how the thing should be run, -explain that the liberty to levy assessments for any purpose whatsoever is in the interests of the members who pay the assessments rather than of the officers themselves. For example, in cases of fraudulent death claims, and these according to the special report of the New York commissioner, are not by any means few and far between," it might happen that the \$2 per \$1,000 expense fund did not prove sufficient to pay for legal defence, it would therefore clearly be more in accordance with economical management to assess for such expenses than to allow the claims to pass for lackof means to pay for contestation, in which latter case the members would be obliged to submit to still further assessments in order to pay them, and it is not likely that the officers would be willing to contribute the wherewithal out of their own pockets. Other expenses, such as taxes, are also to be provided for out of special assessments. The yearly \$2 per thousand it will be seen is exclusively for expenses of management. It will now be seen how important are the few little words added to subsection 5 of clause 5 of the new Act in extending the liberties of those who conduct the new system. As the by-laws and constitution of the New York concern may be amended with facility, it is not improbable that the public may witness further improvements in the system according as it emerges from the state admitted by Prof. Cherriman.

SUGAR TARIFF PROBLEMS AND HOME INDUSTRIES.

In view of the inevitable approach of a triangular tariff struggle in Congress, it is wise to consider the gravity of our commercial and industrial situation, lest we plunge rough shod into the great international race for trade supremacy, pitted as we are against countries whose chief trade advantages over us consist in their ability to employ labor for what would prove starvation prices or worse in this country, and quickly lead to revolution.

In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1884; the total duties levied on imported merchandise consumed in this country, was \$3.41 (three dollars and forty-one cents) per capita; the total amount of foreign merchandise consumed was \$667,575,389 or \$12.01 per capita, average duty thereon 28 44-100 per cent; this does not indicate burdensome taxation on imported merchandise consumed by the well-to-do people of this country.

Two conclusions are inevitable; even if all other conditions were equal. American producers and manufacturers cannot profitably compete with the cheaper labor of Europe, and the semi-starvation prices paid in most foreign countries, and it would be idiotic to horizontally reduce duties on all manufactured imports; it would then become impossible to compete at home with foreign labor, much less in foreign markets.

These conditions follow us in negotiating reciprocity treaties with other countries, with the single exception of Canada, where the cost of labor approximates the prices paid in the United States; treaties of the Hawaiian type will inevitably subject this country to increase of imports and loss of revenue without a corresponding increase of sales of American merchandise, because we cannot prevent England and other European countries from flooding sugar producing countries with cheaper merchandise than we can produce.

The United States have abundant nor-

mal capacity for profitably producing all the sugar required for home consumption; that we have not already done so under a high sugar tariff only proves that, as a nation, we have never earnestly set about producing sugar; this is evidenced in the diversion of capital to enterprises whereby other industrial and mineral resources and the great railway system of this country have been rapidly developed.

With legislation wisely adjusted enough beet sugar can be profitably produced in California, Oregon and Washington Territory alone, to fully supply our consumption, while Louisiana, Texas and Florida can profitably produce a million of tons of cane sugar per annum, as readily as they now produce a moiety; and sorghum sugar and syrup can be profitably produced in the U. S. in quantities limited only by the demand of consumers.

Wherever adequate brains, capital, energy, improved machinery and skill, have been persistently applied to sugar production in this country, profitable results have been obtained; without the aid of the aforesaid adjuncts failure is inevitable; to offset our high priced labor, our raw sugar material can and must be made to yield 85 per cent of juice and 10 per cent of sugar instead of the 40 to 60 per cent of juice and 5 or 6 per cent of sugar obtained by the old process of sugar making.

One large central factory thoroughly equipped can produce far more and better sugar at less aggregate cost than twenty or more small sugar houses can obtain from the same quantity of raw material; it is possible in this country to double the average sugar product from raw material, and reduce the cost of producing sugar pro rata; this has readily been done in Europe and in California.

Many Louisiana planters have profitably produced 3,000 lbs. of sugar per acre of cane; with diffusion and improved machinery they and all other planters can obtain a much greater yield of sugar. The small beet sugar factory in California, under able management, profitably produced 3,000 lbs. of refined sugar per acre of beets in the crop year 1884-5, obtained 10 per cent of refined sugar per ton of beets worked, and made 2,500,000 lbs. refined sugar.

Sorghum seed pays the cost of raising sorghum; thus sugar and syrup can be produced from sorghum at the bare cost of working the cane and juice; although sugar cane and beet juices greatly excel in crystallizing qualities. Excellent sorghum sugar is being made in many States, as a hundred samples before me attest.

The actual consumption of imported

sugars in the U. S. increased from 1,575,-893,944 lbs. in 1875 less 24,152,148 lbs. exported, to 2,562,719,593 lbs. in 1884 less 76,122,813 lbs. exported; or from 35.31 lbs. per capita in 1875, to 44.76 lbs. per capita in 1884; with this enormous demand for sugar food, in excess of what we produce, and having a normal capacity of sugar production adequate to supply our entire consumption, we have without good cause circumscribed this boundless source of national industry and wealth.

Congress will find it no boy's play to guard the interests of sixty millions of consumers of sugar food, protect our sugar refining industries, without which consumers would be at the mercy of foreign producers, and beyond question foster our sugar producing industries, in the face of European production, cheap foreign labor, increasing consumption, and an imperative home demand for cheap sugars.

Neither heavy duties, nor general "free trade," nor desertion of our sugar producing industries, nor one-sided treaties with foreign countries, are at all desirable or requisite for the correct legislative solution of this momentous sugar question, which I, of course, but gently touch at present on topics named in this connection.

THE LATE MR. A. MOKENZIE FORBES.

There has been a wide-spread feeling of regret among the various gentlemen connected with the business of insurance at the rather sudden death of Mr. A. McKenzie Forbes, senior partner in the firm of Forbes & Mudge, agents for the Queen. Mr. Forbes was of Scotch descent but was from the Isle of Man. first employed in the Bank of British North America, but was appointed agent for the Queen in 1859, on its establishing offices in Canada. In 1875, Mr. H. J. Mudge became joint-manager, and is at present in charge of the business. The funeral, which took place on Saturday last, was most numerously attended, and among others by the representatives of the various insurance companies.

A case of grave importance to Life Insurance Offices was decided after a protracted trial on Thursday. Isaac Lotinga insured his life in the Commercial Union Assurance Company, and afterwards, as a coroner's jury believed, poisoned himself. The Company therefore refused to pay, alleging in addition that the deceased was an habitual drunkard. The evidence on the latter point was conflicting; but the Judge—Mr. Justice Hawkins—betrayed in his summing-up a belief that Lotinga had poisoned himself, and that he was a man who drank immensely, though he could bear an

unusual quantity of liquor. The jury, however, would none of it. Their impression was obviously the popular one,—that an Insurance Office should enquire at the time of insurance, and then pay its policies, and should regard suicide from insanity like a stroke of lightning, and a habit of drinking like any other disease brought on by the habits of the assured. That, no doubt, is the wise course for Insurance Offices to take, especially in their calculations; but it lands them in this perplexity. If they do not resist payment in case of suicide, they are pro tanto encouraging a crime. So, however, is the Legislature, which has just abolished the Crown's right to seize the property of suicides, and we suppose it is necessary to accept the now invariable verdict of insanity. Of course, in insanity there is no crime; and the Offices must consider suicide, like a fall caused by apoplexy, as a result of disease.—London Spectator.

CROP NOTES .- A fine sample of new barley was exhibited in Guelph, Ont., last week. The Guelph Mercury says :- Now that the farmers have commenced cutting their wheat in this section, they find that the rust has made worse ravages in the crop than was expected. Heavy dews at night and a burning sun during the day, has caused this result. Between winter killing, speedy ripening and rust, the fall wheat, as a rule, will not be more than average crop in this section, although some fields which have escaped these blighting influences will give an exceptional yield .- London Advertiser. -The wheat harvest is in progress in several parts of the country, large fields having been cut in Dorchester and Westminster that present a remarkably fine appearance. Spring sent a remarkably line appearance. Spring wheat also promises well, and the oat crop looks unusually heavy. On many farms haying has been completed in good order. A citizen of Brantford who has recently travelled through Brant county reports that in a large number of fields the wheat, especially the late variety, is budly rusted. He thinks the heavy raise and the attempt heat was neverable for rains and the extreme heat are answerable for the mischief .- In the Stratford district, according to the Beacon, the hay crop has mostly been secured in good condition, and the machines are cutting away at the full wheat. The numerous self-binders that have been introduced this year will greatly reduce the expense and labor of harvesting. Reports from all quarters say the prospect of all the cereals was never better, so that although prices may be low, the money result to the farmer will be satisfactory.

LAKE MISTASSINI.—News has reached Quebec of the arrival of a special courier at Lake St. John with the official report of Mr. Low, the officer now in charge of the Mistassini exploring and surveying expedition, conveying the intelligence that when this courier left Mr. Low was on the point of starting for Rupert's house, on James' Bay, having, completed, it is alleged, his survey of the great lake whose real size has so long been shrouded in mystery. It is said that Mr. Low claims to have established that the extreme length of great Mistassini is only 120 miles, and its average breadth 20 miles. The accuracy of Mr. Low's claim will be at once challenged, conflicting as it does with the positive statement of Mr. Frank Biguell that he navigated last year for 120 miles, and even then had nol reached what might be termed the body of the lake, as it evidently went on widening and he could see nothing before him but sky and water, as well as will the equally empathic assertion of a forme factor of the Hudson Bay company at Mistassir

post who affirms that he navigated it for 150 miles and then saw nothing to warrant him in the belief that he was nearing its end, but mther the contrary.

Thomas Bell was arrested recently on a warrant charging him with appropriating \$10 from his employer, Mr. R. Forsyth, of the Canadian Marble Works. The history of this man is a rather curious one. He had been in the employ of Mr. Forsyth for some twelve years, during the greater part of which he acted as timekeeper in the marble works. Recently, however, he was promoted to the position of book-keeper and collector to the establishment on Bleury street. His chances of stealing there were remarkably good, as Mr. Forsyth trusted him completely, and he had the collecting of all accounts. The temptation, it is alleged, proved too much for him, and he commenced appropriating small sums to himself; on one occasion keeping \$200. His mode. of working was very simple, he collected money gave a receipt for the amount, but forgot to credit the payments in the books. In this way he stole, it is said, some \$1400. He is given a good character and it is probable the affair will be amicably settled.

Guessing Match.-At the annual Grocers' Picnic held at St. Hilaire, Wednesday last, a novel and attractive feature was introduced, viz.: a guessing match. The affair was gotten up by the well-known firm of Messrs. Chase and Sanborn, who undertook all the arrangements and gave three costly prizes. A jar containing about two-pounds of Standard Java Coffee beans, numbering 6,500 was placed on the ground, and Mayor Beaugrand was requested to withdraw as many as he chose, so that it would be impossible for any one to know the number left. He withdrew 66, leaving 6,434, and the jug was then covered up so that the guessing would be entirely at ran-don. The competitors, of whom there were about 1800, estimated the number from 340,000 down to nothing. Miss A. McKenna was de-clared the winner, Miss Ctark second, and O. J. Spirie third.

The Central Railway.—Mr. T. Beatty, M.P., has been elected president, and Mr. L. A. Billy, vice-president of this company. The contract for the construction of the road, which will run from Brandon to Battleford, has been awarded to Herber, Palmer & Co., of New York. The line will be completed from Brandon to Rapid City this fall. Authority has been given President Beatty to carry on negotiations for obtaining money in New York and London. The directors have been authorized to issue bonds for \$3,000,000, and to execute a mortgage securing the same on the government limits and the railway.

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The latest Muskegon enterprise is the shipping of sawdust. Gow, Majo & Oo. have received an order for a large quantity, and are at present loading the schooner S. Morrison with between forty and fifty tons. Mr. Gow states that there is a domand for 50,000 tons of sawdust to be shipped to the Terra Cotta Lumber Company of Pullman. The sawdust is mixed with clay and burned in kilns something like brick. When this process has been finished the material is ready for use, and is used in buildings in place of lath.—(Muskegon News.

AT A meeting of the creditors of J. Scott & Co., Chatham, held at Toronto, the firm made an offer of 50c. secured, payable in 4, 8 and 12 months and 10c unsecured, the latter payable in 15 and 18 months. It is probable that a settlement will be arrived at on this basis.


CHEMICALS AND DRUGS .- Business in heavy. chemicals has ruled quiet, but from enquiries received the fall trade will be fully up to the average. Borax could probably be bought at 10c to 12c, and we reduce our inside quotation for alum to \$1.75. In view of the fact that caustic soda is being sold in lots of one to one hundred drachms, we have adopted a wider range of prices and quote from \$2.121 to \$2.50. Other changes will be found in our price list. Dye stuffs .- Sumac \$95 to \$100 per ton for prime brands. Cutch firm at 61c. Extract of log-wood 73c; chiplog-wood 13c to 2c. Archil 27c to 30c per lb. for concentrated. There has been a seasonable demand for drugs, at about former prices. Glycerine has developed a strong tone recently, which has resulted in a sharp advance of three cents. Best German, which lately sold at 15c to 17c, is now up to 18c to 20c, with an upward tendency at the advance.

COAL AND WOOD.—The coal trade has been quiet and wood has been dealt in only in a small way. We quote American authracite at wholesale as follows:—Stove \$5.65, nut \$5.35, and egg and furnace \$5.15. Ordinary distributing prices, according to quantity, are: stove, \$5.75 to \$6; chestaut; \$5.50 to \$5.75; egg and furnace, \$5.25 to \$5.50. Gape Breton, \$3.10 to \$3.20; Pictou, \$3.30 to \$3.50, as to mine, Scotch steam at \$4 to \$4.10; Welsh anthracite, \$4.50 Cord-wood dull. Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4 Whatf prices about 50c lower.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- The butter market has developed no new features during the past week. A few sales of choice creamery for export have been made at 19c but there is no export demand for dairy butter at present prices. Choice table butter finds a local outlet. but for the ordinary run of stock there is nothing in prospect except perhaps a moderate call for the lower ports trade. Farmers are holding on to their product, or, perhaps the truth is, they are too busy to sell and would rather lose something on stale goods, later on, than spendtheir valuable time in a butter deal. Cheese has been dull and lower. Stocks are accumulating in the country but importers are indifferent and fight shy of the July make. Orders in the market are at low prices and the ship-ments promise to be below the average. Hold-ers asked 74c and 74c for fine goods but a straight bid of 7c would probably be accepted, and in fact sales were made at that price.—
French cheese sold at 54 to 6c. Provisions.—
There has been a moderate demand in a jobbing way. Eggs sold at 11c to 14c, as to quality.

Day Goons.—The staffs of wholesale houses, are busy entering and packing orders coming to hand for present and forward delivery. Salesmen on the road continue to report favorably. Remittances, since the early part of the month, have again fallen off, and until the

farmers get their stuff harvested no great improvement is looked for. Considerable paper fell due in the woollen trade this month, but was well-carel for. Improvements in mannfacture are enabling Canadian woolens to obtain a wider sale than heretofore.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—Old ground flour continues to sell slowly at easy prices but fresh is scarce particularly low grades which are firm; sales of fine occurred at \$3.40. Manitoba strong bakers' has changed bands at \$4.45 in round-lots. Generally speaking, a fair business has been accomplished on local and lower ports account. There has been an improved demand for bag flour. In grain, there were sales early in the week, of 20,000 and 40,000 bushels of Red Winter wheat at 93c, but subsequently the weakness in the West checked business and remaining orders were withdrawn. The best bid for Red Winter in store is now 90c. Peas and oats close steady with little doing. The following cablegram was received to day:—Wheat tirm, poor demand, offerings moderate, corn firm. A despatch from Chicago said:—Wheat again heavy, under local bear pressure, and free selling of long wheat.

Pism and Ous.—There have been fair receipts of dry cod which have sold at \$3.75 per quintal. Reports from the Labrador fisheries are more satisfactory, but the catch on the Cape Breton coast continues poor. Cape Breton herrings are still firm at \$5. Canned mackerel \$3 to \$3.10. Canned lobsters \$5.60 per case of 4.doz. Canned salmon unchanged, Oils are glendy with only a moderate demand.

Freights.—Agents of "outside steamers," to arrive soon have contracted to take grain at 1990 per qr. to Liverpool and Glasgow; regu-

lar liners are obtaining 2s. Cattle space has been secured as low as 35s but rates to-day are 40s to 50s. Phosphates 6s. Deal freights 4 6s 3d to London by steam; to Liverpool 45s. Lumber to River Plate \$13 per 1000 feet. Butter and cheese to direct parts, 25s per gross top.

GREEN FRUITS.—A fair business has been done. Apples have declined and are weak at \$2 to \$3 per brl. Bananas \$1.50 to \$2 per bunch. Oranges \$5.50 per box. Lemons, \$7 to \$8 per box; \$9 to \$10 per case. Bartlett pears, \$5 to \$6 per half brl; \$9 to \$10 per brl. Canadian peaches, \$1 to \$1.50 per basket; American \$2 to \$3 per crate. California fruit was quoted as follows:—Bartlett pears, \$6 per box; plums, \$2.50 per box; peaches, \$3 per box and grapes 20e per lb. Concord grapes have sold at 11c and Delaware at 14c to 16c. Raspberries \$c to 10c per quart. Blueberries have changed hands at 55c to 90c, as to size of box, and the receipts have already reached 2,500 boxes a day. Two cars of water melons arrived to-day and were held for \$25 per 100.

GROCERIES.—The volume of business is increasing, but we have no change to make in prices. Teas.—Buyers are still wanting low grades, but supply is limited. Cablegrams from Japan state that choice and choicest are up 2de and medium dc. Sugars are unchanged but firm. There is a scarcity of bright goods. A local refinery has shut down temporarily and claims that it will not sell except at higher prices. Fruit is dull and the cholera in Spain has demoralized the market. Since the above was written, granulated sugar has advanced 1-8c and is held for 63c by the leading refinery, A cablegram from London,

dated August 11th, says:—Cane sugar firmer, with increased, demand. Advance in beet checks business. Stock in four ports United Kingdom August 8, 6300 tons under last week, or 312,483 tons, against 293,221 tons same time last year. Java No. 15, 17s; Fully fair refining Muscovado 15s; Austrian and German beet, 83 test, 15s. 6d. The market for raw sugar is higher in New York. For refined there has been a good demand, and the market has ruled strong and generally higher for all grades, with the supply closely sold up. There has been some business on export account, but the advanced prices asked are rather above buyers' limits. Transactions include about 1000 bbls: Gubes at about 65-8 cents, and 2000 do. Granulated up to 6½. Tea.—Advices from China and Japan report settlements equal to last season for all descriptions, although the shipments of Blacks to date are somewhat smaller.

HAY, STRAW AND FEED.—The receipts of new hay were moderate and sales occurred at \$8 to \$10 as to quality, the latter for extra choice. Straw scarce and firm at \$6 to \$8. Pressed hay is steady at \$16 to \$17 per ton straw in bales, \$8 to \$9 per ton; shorts quiet at \$17 to \$18 per ton; brau, \$14 to \$15, the former for Montreal and the latter for Uppe Canada; moulie, \$24 to \$26, as to quality buck wheat, 65c per bushel.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—Clips and lambskin are higher but otherwise there is no chang and the remarks of last week will apply thides. There has been the usual demand fitallow at ruling prices as quoted.

a few sales of choice at 10c and we quote 5c to 10c as to quality. In New York, most of the trade has been in grades to be held at 8c to 9c, choice being quoted at 10c.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—The demand for pigiron is confined to small parcels and there is a total absence of speculation, both here and in the States, in spite of the low prices ruling. In nails and general bardware, business is light, and makers and holders do not expect to ship much this month. Prospects are considered good as stocks of both are reported to be low throughout the country. The last mail brings little that is really new about the British markets and prices current are unchanged. Holders are, however, unwilling to concede even a fraction and there is a better tone in North Britain. Makers of manufactured iron say there is a little more doing. The steamship owners have met to devise plans for advancing freights, and this is likely to stimulate enquiry from this side. Lead is firm and is worth 3½c per lb. A cablegram quotes £12. 5s f.o.b. Liverpool. Sheet lead is also firmer at 4c. Generally speaking, the volume of business is equal to that of last year, while some firms report an improvement. Warrants are cabled 2d lower at 41s 4d. Middlesborough No. 3 foundry is at 31s 104d. Ingot tin in London is weak and £1 lower at £92 5s. Best. selected copper is at £43 10s, Chili bars 2s 6d lower at £43 5s, and soft Spanish lead at £12 5s.

LEATHER, BOOTS AND SHOES.—A steady improvement is noticeable, the larger business transacted by manufacturers having quickened the demand for leather, which is still bought simply as required, there being a total absence of speculation. Work at the factories is going on briskly and a greater harvest of orders is expected later in the season. Payments were a subject of complaint with some houses last week but we have since been informed by several of the leading men in the trade that money has come in quite freely enough to please them and they feel no disquietted whatever concerning the storekeeper's, who are a little behind, as there is reasonable cause for it, the farmers being too busy to pay much attention to their bills.

Live Stook.—Export cattle have been in good demand, and sales were made at 4½c to 5½c; last year shipping cattle were worth 5½c to 6c at this season. Sheep for export sold at 3½c to 4c. Live hogs, 5½c to 5½c. Butchers' cattle, 4c to 4½ with light supply. Galves, \$4 to \$6 cach. The British markets have slightly improved; receipts have been heavy but the better qualities found a fair demand. Prime Canadian steers were ½c higher at 18½c. The exports of beef to date from Montreal were 7,974 quarters, against 7,446 last year. The

total exports of cattle to date have been 36,546 head, an increase of 7,859 head compared with 1884, an increase of 6,676 compared with 1883, and an increase of 18,341 compared with 1882. The total exports of sheep to date were 25,777 head, an increase of 1,267 compared with 1884, a decrease of 14,612 compared with 1883, and a decrease of 18,329 compared with 1882.

Wool.—The market is fairly steady but beyond that little can be said, the trade passing being only moderate. Our quotations are said by leading dealers to require no revision.

Business on the whole is fair for this season of the year although in some departments quietness prevails.
