HOW LA PRESSE STRIKES BACK When Charges Are Made That the French-Canadians Are Not Loyal. Montreal, Oct. 20.—(Special.)—La Presse has a very moderate article to-day regarding the Ontario allies of the French-Canadians: "We know," says La Presse, "that the Conservatives of the sister province can be depended upon, but the position of the Toronto News is a strange one. It would make little sense if it is the evening edition of The Mail and Empire, and the antecedents of that paper are well known. It was formerly the organ of the Conservative party, but Mr. Bunting having had an attack of francophobia he was repudiated by Sir John Macdonald, who remained faithful to his allies from this province. Mr. Riordan, however, who is the present proprietor of The Mail and Empire, always stuck to Mr. Bunting and supplied the funds. It is, therefore, strange to see Messrs. Riordan and Douglas accusing French-Canadians of disloyalty, when this same newspaper was the chief promoter of the policy of commercial union with the United States and even the antagonist of the policy of the days of the Union and his anti-British campaign. At that time The Mail sent an agent to New York with the object of becoming the chief factor in that movement and The Mail's words, 'So much the worse for British connection,' are not forgotten in loyal Quebec. It is no more than right that we should bring those things home to our insulators of to-day and it is also well that the Conservatives of Ontario should understand that we do not refer to those men who form the greater portion of the party. 'But, after all,' La Presse continues, 'it was only a simple cloud this anti-French feeling in Ontario, for already the clear sky is everywhere visible. 'The Toronto World, for instance, while strongly criticizing the Government, has never been unjust to our race and the most sympathetic expressions are found in its columns.'

COL. SCHNEIDER IS DEAD.

He Went to Paris to Fight a Duel With Capt. Caignet Because of Dreyfus' Case.

Vienna, Oct. 18.—Colonel Schneider, the former Austrian Military Attache at Paris, whose name has been prominently connected with the alleged treason of former Captain Alfred Dreyfus of the French army, and who, it is generally understood, fought a duel about Oct. 13, with Captain Caignet, a French army officer, as a result of statements made by the captain at the Rennes court martial, is dead.

A despatch from Paris, Oct. 13, said that a representative of the Intranseant, the newspaper edited by M. Henri Rochefort, asserted that while seeing a friend off on the Orient express, the evening before, he observed Col. Schneider being held to the train, accompanied by physicians and with blood flowing from a wound in his side. The colonel is reported to have said at the time: "I recently returned from Switzerland to fight a duel with Captain Caignet on account of his evidence regarding me before the Rennes court-martial."

BURNED AT THE STAKE.

Joe Ledore, a Negro, Suffered Death Deservedly If the Reports

St. Louis, Oct. 20.—A special to the Post-Dispatch says a posse near St. Anne's, Texas, last night captured Joe Ledore, a negro, who confessed that he and Bob Anderson, on the preceding night, went to the house of J. H. Gambrell, at St. Anne's, tied Gambrell's wife to a bed, and then, after placing a feather mattress on them, poured oil on the pile, cremated the family and abled the house. Ledore was burned at the stake. Bob Anderson was caught and paroled before he was dead, because information which may clear him was received.

RELATIVES GET ALL.

Application was made in the Surrogate Court yesterday for power to administer the estate of the late James A. Lillo, who died last month worth \$400. The estate consists of property on Spadina-avenue and Huron-street, stock in trade valued at \$254, cash, \$350; equity in liquor license, \$225, and household goods, \$20.

CONTRIBUTION OF CONSUMPTION.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 20.—The State Board of Health has received a communication from the Board of Health of Michigan, stating that twenty clerks in that state, who were working over several volumes of records, were taken ill with consumption and had died. The books were examined by a bacteriologist, who found them full of tubercular bacilli. NOW IT'S FIXED FOR A WHILE.

Modus Vivendi Regarding Alaska Boundary Has Gone Into Effect, So Washington Announces.

AMERICAN INTERESTS CONSERVED.

Yet Canada Has Not Been Unjustly Treated—But We Get No Port on Lynn Canal.

Washington, Oct. 20.—Mr. Tower, the British Charge here, called at the State Department to-day, and handed to Secretary Hay a note formally accepting for his Government the proposition for the temporary adjustment of the Alaskan boundary of yesterday. With that act the long-expected modus vivendi, relative to the vexed boundary question, went into effect. This result has been brought about through the direct negotiation of Secretary Hay and Mr. Tower, after several failures in the past through commissioners and ambassadors.

CONSERVED AMERICAN INTERESTS.

The State Department is confident that it has conserved every American interest in the arrangement without unjustly treating Canada. The divisional line on the west pass, by which the Dalton trail is reached, is placed 22 1/2 miles above the international water mark, so the Canadians are not allowed to reach any point on the Lynn Canal. Moreover, there is no permission given for a free port, or even for the free transit across American territory of Canadian goods, except of mines' belongings. These matters may figure later on when it comes to a permanent boundary line, but they are not touched upon in this modus.

SOME OF THE DETAILS.

The modus vivendi follows the precedent established by Secretary Evarts in his note to the British Government on the boundary on the Stikine River, in Alaska, by an exchange of notes. The line on the Chilkoot River is 22 1/2 statute miles from the head of navigation. Chilkat inlet, on Lynn Canal, is the Chilkoot River, 12 statute miles farther inland, and the whole valley of Porcupine Creek, is included within the American line. On White and Millhook Passes, the line is fixed at the summit or watershed, being the point which divides the waters of the two rivers into the two countries. The line on the Chilkoot River is 22 1/2 statute miles from the head of navigation. Chilkat inlet, on Lynn Canal, is the Chilkoot River, 12 statute miles farther inland, and the whole valley of Porcupine Creek, is included within the American line.

THE OFFICIAL TEXT.

"It is hereby agreed between the Governments of the United States and Great Britain that the boundary line between Canada and the Territory of Alaska shall be as follows: The line shall be the Chilkoot River, from its mouth to the point where it crosses the international boundary, and thence north to the head of navigation. The line on the Chilkoot River is 22 1/2 statute miles from the head of navigation. Chilkat inlet, on Lynn Canal, is the Chilkoot River, 12 statute miles farther inland, and the whole valley of Porcupine Creek, is included within the American line. On White and Millhook Passes, the line is fixed at the summit or watershed, being the point which divides the waters of the two rivers into the two countries. Advantages to the States. Some of the more important advantages that accrue to the American side through the settlement of the boundary question are as follows: The settlement of the boundary question will save through a study of the map which is attached to the notes. This map shows the head of canoe navigation, as the British sought to do. It has been located several miles above the town, directly at the junction with the Chilkoot River of the important tributaries Kichik. This maintains the Indians at Klukskwah under American jurisdiction without question, and also provides a natural and unobjectionable boundary line such as is always sought by topographers in the shape of a considerable river. Then, when it comes to the point of departure from this river, the Kichik, the line has been prolonged to the source, so as to include in American territory the mining town of Porcupine, and the head of the Porcupine section. Nothing has yet been decided as to a resumption of the negotiations for the Commission, but with the boundary question removed from the agenda of the Commission, it is likely to follow before Congress meets.

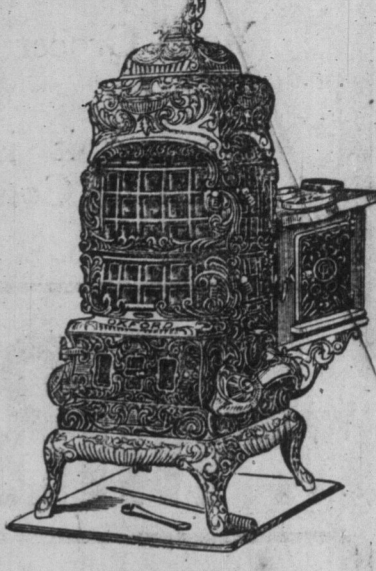

Major Denison.
Major Denison, an old Toronto boy, is
expected to be with the contingent, but not
with the Toronto party.

Major Septimus Denison. who will in all
probability be Col. Otter's choice for
adjutant of the contingent, comes of good
old fighting stock. He is second in com-
mand at Wolsey Barracks, London, Ont.,
and is considered one of Canada's ablest
militiamen. About ten years ago Major
Denison was an alderman in Toronto, his
native city.

Captain Mason.
Capt. James Cooper Mason, who com-
mands E company of the Royal Grenadiers,
is one of the most popular officers in the
regiment. At the age of 16 years he en-
listed with the Q. O. R. as a private. At
the end of three years he was corporal in
E company. He then entered the Royal
Grenadiers, where he was rapidly advanced
in rank.

He holds the Canadian and Northwest In-
termediate championships for rowing and
has several other distinctions. He is an
all-round athlete, having demonstrated his
ability at various times as a crack shot,
excellent swordsman and clever boxer. In
manner he is cool and determined and com-
mands the respect and obedience of his
subordinates.

Capt. Mason is assistant adjutant in the
Home Savings and Loan Company, a posi-
tion which he has occupied for some years.

THE CHOOSING OF THE MEN.

All Day Long Hundreds of Volunteers
Presented Themselves for the
Contingent Inspection.

PHYSICAL AND MEDICAL TESTS.

Col. Otter Superintended, While
Surgeon-Maj. Nattress Asked the
Boys Searching Questions.

The first recruiting office ever opened in
Toronto for foreign service set to work at
the Armouries yesterday morning. The
novelty brought hundreds of people to the
spot and these, with some 200 recruits,
were gathered at the Armouries doors a
couple of hours before they opened. Very few
uniforms were to be seen and numbers of
men had come without their breakfasts.
The press were admitted by the officers
through a side door, and found, besides
a long line of Queen's Own men, who,
while their comrades of other corps were
fairly late in getting to the doors, were
already lined up before the room set
apart for Surgeon-Major Nattress.

"They were in uniform and the first on
the spot," said some officers in explana-
tion, "and we let them in by side en-
trances."

At 9.30 the University-street doors swung
open and let through more Queen's Own
ladies and big groups of Grenadiers, High-
landers, Thirteenth (Hamilton) men, Duf-
ferin lads, the 12th Yorks and men of the
94th, the 44th, the 10th and the 51st
Greys.

Officers on Duty.
Among the officers who poured in were
Major Denison, Capt. Barker, Q.O.R.,
Lieut.-Adjutant Wilkie, R.G., Capt. Don-
ald, Major Henderson, Constables, Col.
Cosby, Major Wilkes, Col. Farewell, Sur-
geon-Major Nattress, etc.

The recruits, pale with excitement, were
all lined up against the walls on two sides
of a square.

At about 10.30 the famous colonel galloped in.
He wore his new style German cap and
dress uniform, and his high-top boots,
shining like a looking-glass when he
mounted horse at the barracks, were be-
gotten with mud.

Dr. Nattress was now hustled into the
examination room, and the colonel dis-
mounted, and, pipe in mouth, faced the
applicants.

Breadth Not Depth.
"I don't care for depth," declared Colonel Ot-
ter some days ago, and he found plenty of
out right answers. You need to hunt for
the spavined, weak-backed recruit, but
found lots of chunky, husky fellows who
could be all right in the long run, or
able without delay to throw bridges across
a stream when the regular engineers had
been picked off by the enemy.

The Queen's Own were lined up, 53
strong, and, after looking them over on
general principles, he asked the boys to
answer the questions of age, business, etc.,
twenty were sent in to the doctor.

Col. Farewell, 20 out of 46, the 13th
5 out of 8, the York Rangers 6 in 17, the
Dufferin Rifles 7 in 8.

Col. Farewell's regiment, the 34th,
one was thrown out for being too short,
and another for being too fat.

All the colonels, of course, being human,

peared in their favor. Adjutant Major Denison,
within a week, he was recommended to

In case some of the rural battalions do not send their full quota, the vacancies will be filled from the city regiments by those who have qualified.

The Armouries presented a busy appearance last night. Several hundred people thronged the galleries and the ground floor, all watching with the keenest interest the movements of the soldiers. There was no weekly parade of the Highlanders, owing to the Thanksgiving manoeuvres.

Captain Hendrie was present and joined in the fun. Lieut. Cosby presided, and in handing the prizes to the various winners, complimented each on his work. A short program was rendered.

MANLY FREEMEN ARE UNFIT.

Medical Health Officer Reports Seventy Per Cent. of Men and Only Seven Officers O. K.

GUNS FOR TORONTO VOLUNTEERS.

Contingent Sent Off Committee Met and Devised Ways and Means for the Occasion.

The report of the Medical Health Officer upon the general fitness and physical condition of the men has at last been issued and a gloomy state of affairs it reveals. The brigade is shown to be in a deplorable condition, physically, and only about 70 per cent. are really fit for the ordinary duties of a fireman. The officers also are in a wretched physical condition, and out of 28 of them only 7 could pass the examination of Dr. Sheard, which was not unnecessarily strict.

The men examined were divided into three classes. The first class were put such as were in a perfect condition of health, whose muscles, heart, lungs, etc., were in good order. Their undergoing and maintaining satisfactorily such an amount of effort as could reasonably and ordinarily be demanded in the performance of a fireman's duties.

They Might Qualify.

The second embraces such as are not fully up to a proper standard of average physical fitness, qualifying them for anything but the most sedentary work, but could be brought to such a condition of fitness by properly regulated exercise, training and habits.

In the third class were placed only such as appear to be not only unfit for ordinary work, but in such a state that they could not be brought to a condition approaching fitness to attempt any amount of ordinary work, which a fireman must be capable of standing.

The Classification.

Altogether there were 134 men examined and they are classed as follows:

First class 89
Second class 33
Third class 30

In the face of these facts Dr. Sheard says he does not consider the fire brigade up to a proper standard of physical fitness, and a careful and critical examination of the classes materially aids in throwing light upon the cause. The first fact is that out of 20 officers of the brigade, including foremen, only one is found in the first-class, 9 in the second, and 9 in the third and 1 resigned.

Another Crematory.

The Board of Works yesterday considered the complaint of the residents on Claremont-street, who are for a while to have their meat cattle from being driven along that thoroughfare. They draw the board's attention to the fact that the street is thickly populated and the damage that is done to the boulevard, etc., is becoming a serious matter.

Another Crematory.

The joint report of City Commissioner Coatsworth and Street Commissioner Jones, advising the establishment of a central crematory on the Waterworks lot at the foot of Peter-street, was discussed at some length, and finally referred to a sub-committee consisting of Ald. Crane, Davies and Hubbard to report upon.

New System of Ventilation.

The sub-committee re the ventilation of sewers brought in a report recommending that the City Engineer should erect three hollow poles at different points to carry off the smell, and that a six months' trial be given to the scheme.

A Nuisance Remedied.

The motion of Ald. Crane that the City Engineer be instructed to see that contractors do not pour the street up unless they are prepared to go on immediately with the work, was carried unanimously.

Scarlet Fever Prevalent.

Medical Health Officer Sheard reports that typhoid fever is prevalent in the city. There are three cases at Moulton College, three cases in a family near High Park and also several patients at the Western Hospital. He cannot attribute the disease to any particular cause.

A Generous Offer.

The Reception Committee, together with the commanding officers of the city corps, yesterday afternoon presented to the Toronto officers with a revolver.

Will Be Given Revolvers.

Chairman Graham said he had conversed with a number of commanding officers, who all thought that it would be an appropriate and thoughtful act on the part of the city if they would present to the Toronto officers with a revolver.
