ELECTION IN MARCH NEXT

LONDON TIMES DECLARES IMPERIAL HOUSE WILL BE DISSOLVED EARLY IN THE NEXT SESSION.

LONDON, July 22.—The Times announces that it is anticipated in official circles that parliament will be dissolved early in the next session and that a general election will occur in March. In connection with this announcement rumors were current yesterday that Premier Balfour intended in October to resign and to be succeeded by the Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's fiscal program and that thereupon Chamberlain of the Exchequer would resign, which, of course, would virtually compel Mr. Balfour to resign also and recommend a dissolution of parliament.

GERONIMO, INDIAN METHODIST.

Famous Chief and Twelve Warriors Baptized While Prisoners.

Fort Sill, I. T., July 21.—Geronimo and a dozen of his Apache warriors have joined the Methodist Church, having been baptized in the presence of a large crowd of Indians and whites. With the Comanches sitting on one side of the table and the Apaches on the other, each tribe with its interpreter standing in the foreground, repeated the words of the preacher. At the close of the sermon Geronimo and twelve of his warriors, prisoners at Fort Sill, went forward and asked to be received into the church. In the afternoon the baptismal ceremonies occurred.

POOR OLD MAN

Windsor, July 21.—John Q. A. Neal, living on Parent-avenue, has been restrained by the Windsor police from removing his wife's body from its grave. The old man is slightly out of his mind and his wife's body has been in the open grave. Magistrate Bartlett is of the opinion that the old man is crazy and has ordered the police to have the grave resealed.

GENSUS TO COST \$1,150,000.

Hon. Sydney Fisher Gets One Item of Estimates Passed.

Ottawa, July 21.—(Special.)—In the House Sydney Fisher was no more fortunate than usual with his estimates. Only one item passed during the evening. He stated that his census would be finished next year, at a total cost of about \$1,150,000. The vote of \$150,000 for the Quebec arsenal was taken up. Sir Frederick Borden informed the committee that the amount required to increase the capacity of the cartridge factory from one million to six or seven million rounds per annum. The item carried, and the house rose at midnight.

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PLEADS GUILTY TO PEONAGE.

Fletcher Turner Ends Trial and is Fined \$1000.

Montgomery, Ala., July 21.—Fletcher Turner, the wealthy Tallapoosa County farmer defendant in the peonage case, entered a plea of guilty in the circuit court today to the charge of forcing Holmes case and to pay a fine of \$1000. Turner was tried before a jury in this case, and the jury failing to reach a verdict, was discharged a week ago. There were two other indictments pending against Turner, set for trial today. When the jury was organized to begin the hearing Turner entered a plea of guilty in the original case, with the understanding that the two remaining ones were to be nolle prosequitur. Three-fourths of the fine was remitted.

### ANARCHISTS IN UNIONS.

Chicago, July 21.—According to Chief of Police Francis O'Neil, instead of living in wait for kings and presidents, the modern Anarchists join labor unions, at the same time preaching their inner circles. According to the chief's information, they preach the doctrine of discontent and direct every effort consistently to the same end, while the great mass of labor, organized and unorganized, remains in ignorance of the true state of affairs.

The chief said today: "Anarchists and certain labor leaders are merging their interests and aims. There are to be no explosions, no shootings. They are working toward a universal strike, and certain labor leaders have already been thoroughly infected with the most radical ideas."

## LOCAL FIRM GETS CONTRACT

### New Rock Crusher Will Be Supplied by the Westinghouse Company for Hamilton.

Hamilton, July 21.—(Special.)—The Board of Works took only two hours in clearing up a very lengthy order paper tonight. There was very little on it of importance. Three tenders for motors to run the new rock crusher were received. Two of these, the Canadian General, Peterboro, and R. Pringle & Co., Montreal, were for 30 horse-power machines, quoted, respectively, at \$600 and \$750, f.o.b., were made. The Westinghouse Company, a local firm, quoted a 37 1/2 horse-power motor at \$720, and secured the contract.

John N. Land offered to sell the city about seven acres of quarry land in rear of the Springer premises for \$1450, but the chairman said he had a plan ahead for securing stone at a very much cheaper rate, and before any more quarries are bought he asked permission to make full inquiries, promising a report next Monday evening.

Ald. Finlay asked why both road rollers were not at work. It is being whispered about that the reason is that the chairman could not find a Conservative to run the machine. The chairman said the only reason was that he had been unable until today to find a competent man for the job. The roller will go to work at once, and a Liberal will run it. The Cataract Power Company offered to furnish power to run the rock crusher at \$500 per annum. Nothing definite will be decided until it is known whether the new 20-horse-power quarry will be used, also Ala. Birrell strongly advocated that the board stick to its original intention and use the quarry for the purpose it was bought for. The cost of the crusher will be charged up to the good roads fund.

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### Caused a Lot of Talk.

Magistrate Jelfs delivered a judgment this morning that has stirred up a considerable amount of talk. He fined a young man, 80 or one month in jail for breaking his contract with Farmer J. Elton Smith, of Danforth. The farmer had taken advantage of his ignorance of the country and hired him for \$8 a month, with each month \$1.75 in advance. Then he claimed that the farmer had treated him badly. He admitted that he owed the farmer the money, but he said he was not going to pay it back if allowed to go. The magistrate said he could not act in this way, and inflicted a fine of \$30.

### Married on Drunken Frolic.

In a case which has caused a great deal of talk, a man with a wife, ran away and added another wife to his care. He made a drunken marriage when he was before the magistrate this morning. He said he did not know what had happened when he was drunk. He promised not to do it again, and the magistrate let him off on deferred sentence, since he was not a married man. As soon as the prisoner was turned out of the dock, wife No. 1 can overtake and claim him with smiles of joy.

### STATEMENT OF COMPANY AND REPLY BY THE UNION

#### Causes Leading Up to Strike of the Moulders Given to the Public.

The Canada Foundry Co. has issued a statement touching the strike of the moulders. They say that they have been paying higher wages than the foundries of Montreal and Hamilton, and the men have a shorter week, notwithstanding living is cheaper in Toronto than in Hamilton and Montreal.

In reply the moulders say the nine-hour day has been granted in 61 cities of the United States and Canada, including 10 shops in Toronto. Under an agreement the moulders could not strike until a conference was held, but before the conference was held some of the foundrymen were at Ottawa urging the passage of the Loughheed bill, making it a criminal offence for an international officer to come to Canada. The foundrymen asked their international organization to order the international officers to send their striking moulders back to work. The international officers ordered the men back to work pending a settlement, and did not insist on another settlement, as claimed by the foundrymen.

As a number of communicating and reciprocal statements in regard to labor conditions at the Canada Foundry Co. have appeared from time to time, we secure to you the following facts before the public:

The iron moulders' Union had an agreement with the foundrymen not to go on strike without first endeavoring to settle matters by a conference of three representatives from each side. The local union disregarded this agreement, and the men went on strike early in May. After being out two weeks their head officers persuaded them to go back to work, and a conference was held on the 8th and 9th of June, which resulted in a disagreement, as the union representatives insisted on 50 hours per week for moulders and 25 cents for coremakers. ## KING EDWARD IN DUBLIN CITY TAKING A HOLIDAY

Decorations Surpassed Everything Previously Attempted—People Crowded the Streets.

Kingstown, Ireland, July 21.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra, accompanied by Princess Victoria and their suites, arrived here at five minutes past 9 o'clock this morning on board the Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert. Immediately after the yacht took its position in the harbor the royal salute was fired by thirteen vessels of the home fleet. A heavy rain, which had been falling since an early hour, ceased at 9 o'clock, and the sky cleared, giving promise of fine weather for the royal entry into Dublin.

Thousands in Streets. Thousands of persons lined the streets and warves, awaiting the arrival of Their Majesties. A note of mourning was sounded amid the general rejoicing. It came from the great hall of the Roman Catholic church of St. Michael's, which was tolled solemnly in memory of the Pope.

Decorations. The streets were lined with the Victoria and Albert in a royal barge to the Victoria Dock, where they landed at 10 o'clock. They were received by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, the Earl of Dudley, and a number of officials, and were conducted to a pavilion where an address of welcome was read in behalf of the Kingstown municipal council.

In reply to an address here King Edward said he shared in the sadness of multitudes of his subjects over the news of the Pope's death. His Majesty also remembered the kindness which His Holiness had so recently received him, and the interest which Pope Leo took in the welfare of the English people.

New Era Opening. The King added that his visit came at a time when a new era is opening in Ireland.

A special performance, which had been planned for the Royal Theatre in Dublin on July 24, has been countermanded in consequence of Pope Leo's death.

Immediately after the ceremony the matter will be the subject of a report to the Navy Department. During the spring the two boats at the station, Adder and Moccasin, were put through daily tests and manoeuvres, and have become very proficient.

On Saturday target practice was in order, and the Adder was taken out for a period of 22 minutes submerged at a depth of 30 feet. She then rose to within 8 feet of the surface and fired a torpedo at a target at a range of from 500 to 700 feet, it being a good line shot. The Moccasin was put through a similar test, and submerged at a depth of 15 feet, fired a torpedo at a target at a range of 1200 yards. It was an unusually fine shot, and, to the surprise of all, it went thru the target.

The range was taken from the Adder's cope sight. Lieut. Finney being in command. These two boats have been running submerged at a depth of from 30 to 40 feet, and have stayed below the surface for an hour at a time.

WILL COMPANY PAY SHARE?

Civic Authorities Fear G.T.R. Will Back Out of Esplanade Proposal.

The civic authorities fear there may be trouble with the G.T.R. before the agreement re John-street and Front-street crossings and Esplanade paving is signed.

By the draft agreement recently drawn up, and apparently accepted by the company, the company was to provide protection for the above named crossings according to the order of the City Engineer, and were also to pay their share of the cost of paving Esplanade-street from John to Berkeley.

Now the company, it is feared, will take a different stand. They want the Railway Committee of the Privy Council to be the judge of what is "adequate protection" for the crossings, and they also want a definite statement of the company as to whether they agree to pay a share.

Unless the company stand by the draft agreement the city will oppose the granting of an order giving the company power to cross John-street at Front and into their property, where the old Parliament Buildings stand.

CAR MEN GET DEMANDS.

Ten Hours a Day and Some Increase in Wages.

Montreal, Que., July 21.—(Special.)—It will be gladly learned that the car men on the Lake Superior, eastern and Atlantic divisions of the C.P.R., who have been represented for some time in this city by their committee, have reached an amicable settlement with the company.

A schedule of rates, rules and wages has been arranged, which, while not as advantageous as the men had anticipated, yet they have accepted. Ten hours a day from 7 o'clock in the morning until 6 at night, has been adopted to govern all workers in the shops, with time and a half for all work performed after the regular hours, on Sundays and on Dominion holidays.

As regards the wages there will be an average increase of from one cent to one and a half cents per hour. The most inferior class of labor is that performed by the car cleaners, and they will receive 18c an hour. From that point the wages will be scaled up to those of the carpenters, who will receive twenty-two cents an hour.



GAMEY CASE RECALLED BY SENATORS AT OTTAWA

Senator Ferguson, However, Withdraws His Bill re Extra Employment of Judges.

Ottawa, July 21.—(Special.)—Senator Ferguson's bill respecting the extra judicial employment of judges was debated in the senate today. Senator Dandurand paid a high tribute to the Canadian judiciary and justified the reference of certain questions to that tribunal.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell admitted that a judge held a high position. He wanted to keep them in that position. He pointed out that the judge to whom the Caron charges were referred merely reported the evidence, and their impartiality was not impugned.

In the late case in Toronto certain witnesses were disallowed, as certain parties only heard them say other people knew things. In the Parnell case, Sir Mackenzie said, Michael Davitt took seven days to make his declaration, yet Gamey was stopped because he was making a speech.

Continuing, Sir Mackenzie asked if any one supposed that Judge Britton entered on the Treadgold Commission unprejudiced by the statements which he had made himself.

R. W. Scott said the appointment of judges to enquire into the Gamey charges was the result of the existing state of things. Gamey was a higher judge in Ontario than Chancellor Boyd. But for the Gamey charges this bill would never have been thought of. The bill was a censure on the Ontario government and on the government here, as Judge Britton's appointment had been called in question during the debate.

Senator Frost declared that there was sound precedent for the reference of the Gamey charges to a commission of judges. The widest scope had been given the investigation. Senator Frost asserted his unshaken faith in the judiciary of Ontario. Gamey, he said, was being held up as a paragon of virtue, and it was degrading to the public to see him set up against two of the best judges in Ontario.

Senator Scott said no Conservative had endorsed Mr. Gamey, nor would they go into power on the strength of Gamey. He had not been higher in Ontario than Chancellor Boyd. But for the Gamey charges this bill would never have been thought of. The bill was a censure on the Ontario government and on the government here, as Judge Britton's appointment had been called in question during the debate.

Senator Perrier said that there were very few connected with the Gamey case who could pose as paragons of virtue. It had been a sad show. He, coming from the lower provinces, had been struck by the superior quality of the superior of Ontario, but this had been striking revelation. The judges appointed to enquire into the case would be challenged for cause by a jury in the same matter. If that were not a scandal, what was it? He remembered the Canadian Pacific scandal and the Liberal papers' remarks at that time. As there had been repetition of affairs very detrimental to the high standing of the judiciary, he would vote for the bill.

Senator Ferguson, after a brief refutation of some of the arguments advanced against his bill, asked leave to withdraw it. The bill was then dropped.

A young man named McCormick was engaged in moving hay when in some way his arm got caught in the machine cutting it so badly below the elbow that amputation was necessary.
