LONDON, Dec. . 5.-(Ass'd Press).-The whole of Great Britain is immersed in the political campaign. Ryan v. McIntosh—F. H. Thompson, K.
C., for plaintiffs, on appeal from judgment, of Britton, J., dismissing their action. J. M. Best (Seaforth), for defendant, contra. Judgment: (Per Falconbridge, C.J.): Unless we can say that what defendant did, or failed to do here was negligence per se, this judgment cannot be disturbed. If there had been a jury, could they have been directed to find one way or the other? Surely not. The case must have been submitted to them, and if they had found in favor of defendant, could we say that they were wrong? Here a judge of great practical experience has found that the defendant was not guilty of negligence. His opinion ought to be treated with some deference. His finding is not based on misapprehension of any fact or facts as was pointed out in Beal v. Mich. Cent. Ry. Co., 14 O.W.R., at p 782. Here the facts are clear, are not in dispute and were fully grasped and apprehended by the trial judge. We think, therefore, on principle, that we ought not to interfere, unless we thought he was clearly wrong, but we are also of opinion that the judge has come to the right conclusion. Appeal dismissed with costs (Per Teetzel, J.): With very great respect I am compelled to differ from the conclusion of the trial judge, for I am of opinion that the admitted facts establish a clear case of negligence against the defendant Ernest Mo-Ryan v. McIntosh-F. H. 


