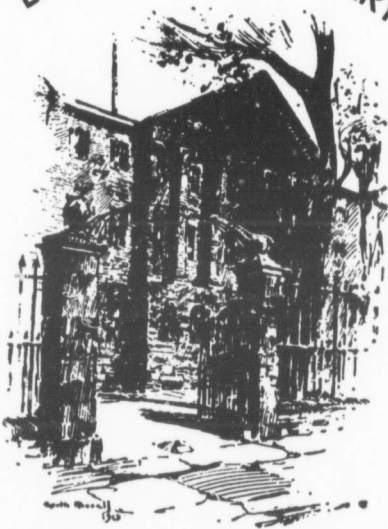

Explanation of Astronomical Characters.

THE PLANETS.

☉ The Sun. ☾ Moon. ☿ Mercury. ♀ Venus. ⊕ The Earth. ♃ Mars.
♃ Jupiter. ♄ Saturn. ♁ Georgian.

SIGNS OF THE ZODIAC.

♈ Aries, or the Ram. ♉ Taurus, or the Bull. ♊ Gemini, twins. ♋ Cancer, the Crab. ♌ Leo, the Lion. ♍ Virgo, the Virgin. ♎ Libra, the Balance. ♏ Scorpio, the Scorpion. ♐ Sagittarius, the Archer. ♑ Capricornus, the Goat's-horn. ♒ Aquarius, the water-bearer. ♓ Pisces, the Fishes.

☿ Conjunction, or planets situate in the same longitude. When a planet is in conjunction with the sun, or any other planet, they pass the meridian at nearly the same instant ☐ signifies planets situate quarter of a circle, or 90 deg. distant; when a planet is ☐, or 90 deg. distant from the sun; if East from the sun, it will pass the meridian at 6 o'clock, in the evening; if West, at 6 o'clock, in the morning. ☽ This mark denotes Opposition of planets, or when they are half a circle distant; when the Moon is full or b'd she is in ☽ to the sun, and all planets when in ☽ to the sun, pass the meridian at midnight. Perigee signifies, when the moon or any planet is in that part of their orbit which is nearest to the Earth. Apogee, denotes a planet to be in that part of its orbit which is most remote from the Earth.—N. B. the ☽ when in her Perigee and Apogee, has a most visible influence on the Tides, the former having a tendency to elevate, the latter to depress them more than their usual height.

Eclipses for 1818.

THERE will be but four Eclipses this year, two of the SUN, and two of the MOON, in the following order:—The first will be of Moon, April 20th, in the afternoon, partial and visible as follows: Beginning of the Eclipse 6 hours 58 minutes; Ecliptic 8 sh. 0m.; Middle 8h. 8m.; End of the Eclipse 9h. 18m.—Digits eclipsed 5^o 32' on the ☽'s south limb. 2d, The second will be of the Sun, May 5th, in the morning, at 2h. 29m. invisible. 3d, The Moon will be Eclipsed 1.4.5 digits from her north limb, on the morning of the 14th of October, visible, as follows: Beginning of the Eclipse 12h. 40m.; Ecliptic 9 h. 16m.; Middle of the Eclipse 1h. 26m; End 2h. 11m. The last will be of the Sun, October 29th, at 1h. 15m. afternoon, invisible here on account of the ☽'s being considerably advanced in southern latitude.

Moveable Feasts.

Septuagesima Sunday, Jan. 18. Quin. or Shrove Sunday, Feb. 1. Ash-Wednesday, or 1st day of Lent, Feb. 4. Mid-Lent Sunday, March 1. Palm Sunday, March 7. Easter day, March 22. Low Sunday, March 29. Rogation Sunday, April 26. Ascension Day, Hol. Thurs. April 30. Whit-sunday, May 10. Trinity Sunday, May 17. Advent Sunday, Nov. 9.

VENUS will be the Morning Star until March 12th, Evening Star until the 26th Dec. then Morning Star to the end of the year. This planet will have nearly immersed in the sun's rays at the commencement of the year, and being then in that part of the orbit which is further from the Earth than the Sun, she will be hardly visible before the 1st of June, when she may be seen in the evening a short period after sun-set; she will gradually increase in splendour until the 15th of Dec. when she will be so near her inferior conjunction with the Sun as to be hid in his rays during the remainder of the year.

JUPITER will make his most splendid appearance, during the months of June and July; he will be in that part of the Heavens which is opposite to the sun on the 30th day of June, and will pass the meridian at midnight; the time of his continuance above the horizon, or from his rising until he sets will be nearly equal to the length of the night.

SATURN will shine with the greatest lustre during the latter part of August, and the whole month of September; he will be in opposition with the Sun the 7th of Sept. and will pass the meridian at midnight; his diurnal arch above the horizon will be nearly equal to the length of the night.

The GEORGIAN planet will be in opposition to the sun on the 9th of June, and will pass the meridian at midnight, with 22 deg. of southern elevation above the horizon.

HOOPING-COUGH.

THIS Disorder so prevalent at this time, cannot be too well understood—the following extract from a celebrated work, we think deserves particular attention.

EDIT. N. S. CAL.

“The Hooping Cough at first resembles a common cold, tho' it is from its commencement attended with a difficulty of breathing, and the eyes are protruded from their sockets. It generally attacks children, to whom if mismanaged it frequently proves fatal. Hence the necessity of parents to pay unremitting attention to those circumstances which aggravate the complaint. But if the cough become so violent that respiration is occasionally suspended and when the patient breathes again, is accompanied with a shrill hooping noise, no time should be lost to remove him to a different air, whether it be more or less pure, provided it is at some distance from his former residence. The diet in this disorder, should

always be light but nourishing, and if no fever prevail, white meat may be allowed in very moderate quantities. So as to divide the usual dinner into three or four different portions, and to give neither cold nor hot drinks, but toast and water with a little wine of which the chill is taken off; gruel; decoctions of sago; tapioca; arrow-root, &c. If the cough be attended with febrile symptoms, medical advice should be procured, but in ordinary cases we would advise a gentle emetic and afterwards to apply the following liniment to the pit of the stomach. Take one scruple of tartar emetic, dissolve it in two ounces of spring water, and add half an ounce of the tincture of cantharides. This embrocation was originally prescribed by Doctor Struve, and has from experience been found of superior efficacy to the patent or quick medicines advertised in the daily papers. A tea spoonful of it ought

every hour to be rubbed on the lower region of the stomach with a warm piece of flannel, and the wetted part should likewise be covered with flannel. A gentle previous vomiting, however is necessary to promote the absorption of the linament. Should febrile symptoms attend this complaint, and the child be strong, the loss of a little blood will be highly useful in moderating the violence and frequency of the cough.—Purges of calomel and rhubarb or jalap, are also very proper to be occasionally administered. During the operation of these medicines diluting drinks ought to be given. A gentle emetic of vinegar of squills sweetened, given early every other morning, for several days will tend greatly to moderate the violence of the cough.—Children bear the operation of emetics in a surprising manner in this disease. In the decline of the disease generous diet, riding in a carriage, together with the use of *LAC AMMONIACUM* and Peruvian Bark, are highly useful.—A plaister of Burgandy Pitch applied between the shoulders is also beneficial in moderating the cough—Three or four drops of Laudanum given twice a day in a spoonful of mint water, produce a good effect in the decline of the complaint, by abating the coughs which sometimes continue merely from habit—A change of air is indispensably necessary to moderate the violence of the cough.”

TO CURE SMOKY CHIMNEYS.

Put on the top of the chimney a box, in each of whose sides is a door hanging on hinges, and kept open by a thin iron rod running from one to the other, and fastened by a ring in each end to a staple. When there is no wind, these doors are at rest, and each forms an angle of 45° , which is de-

creased on the windward side in proportion to the force of the wind, and increased in the same ratio on the leeward side. If the wind be very strong, the door opposed to the wind becomes close, while the opposite one is opened as wide as it can be.—If the wind strikes the corner of the box, it shuts two doors, and opens their opposites. This scheme has been tried with success in a chimney which always filled the room with smoke, but which, since adopted, has never smoked the room at all. The expense is trifling, and the apparatus simple.

TO STOP CRACKS IN GLASS VESSELS,

The cracks of glass vessels may be mended, by daubing them with a suitable piece of linen over with white of egg, strewing both over with finely powdered quicklime, and instantly apply the linen closely and evenly.

TO TAKE THE SMELL OF PAINT FROM ROOMS,

Let three or four broad tubs, each containing about eight gallons of water, and one ounce of vitriolic acid, be placed in the new painted room near the wainscot; this water will absorb and retain the effluvia from the paint in three days, but the water should be renewed each day during that time.

THE USE OF GARLIC AGAINST MOLES, GRUBS, AND SNAILS,

Moles are such enemies to the smell of garlic, that, in order to get rid of these troublesome destructive guests, it is sufficient to introduce a few heads of garlic into their subterraneous walks. It is likewise employed with success against grubs and snails.
