MINUTES

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE,

Held in the Town of Peterboro', Ont.,

JUNE 13th to 21st, 1883.

THE TENTH SESSION of the TORONTO CONFERENCE was opened in the George Street Church, Peterboro', on Wednesday, the 13th day of June, 1883, at 9 a.m., beginning with the Conference prayer-meeting.

The President, the Rev. ALEXANDER SUTHERLAND, D.D., occupied the chair. The 753rd hymn was sung, and the Secretary, Rev. W. H. LAIRD, read the 92nd Psalm.

The prayer-meeting continued until 10 o'clock, and was a delightful commencement of the Conference Session.

The SECRETARY called the Conference Roll, and 165 brethren answered to their names.

The Conference proceeded to ballot for President, whereupon the Rev. GEORGE COCHRAN, D.D., was elected.

The Rev. J. D. CLARKE was elected Secretary.

The PRESIDENT made suitable acknowledgment of the honour conferred upon him.

The SECRETARY also suitably expressed his thanks to the brethren for his election.

On nomination of the SECRETARY, the Revs. W. H. EMSLEY and R. N. BURNS, B.A., were appointed Assistant Secretaries, and the Rev. E. BARRASS, M.A., Journal Secretary.

On motion of Rev. J. B. CLARKSON, M.A., it was *Resolved*,—"That this Conference desires to express its deep sympathy with Rev. T. D. KEOUGH in his great affliction, and that a telegram be sent to our esteemed brother conveying this intimation of respect and condolence."

Votes of thanks were passed to the retiring President, Secretary, and Assistant-Secretaries, Journal and Assistant Journal Secretary, and the Members of the Statistical Committee, which were suitably acknowledged.

The following telegram was received from the London Conference:—

"The London Conference sends greetings to the Members of the Toronto Conference—see 2nd Thess. 1st ch. and vers. 11 and 12—'Wherefore also we pray always for you that our God would count you worthy of this calling, and fulfil all the good pleasure of His goodness, and the work of faith with power: That the name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be glorified in you, and ye in Him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ.'

QUESTION—Who have died since last Conference?

THE REV. WILLIAM PRICE,

Was born in Birmingham, England, and in connexion with the British army, his father being at that time of the Ordnance Department. The date of his nativity was the 8th of December, 1818. He, with his parents, still in connection with the military, came early in his life to Upper Canada, and spent his boyhood and youth in Barryfield, adjacent to Kingston, where he received the thorough elementary English education which is usually imparted in the regimental schools.

The family attended the "British Wesleyan" church in Kingston, usually known as the "Lower Chapel." About the time of the consummation of the first union, that is to say about 1833-34, William was converted through the religious opportunities connected with that sanctuary, then about fifteen years of age.

He possessed naturally an easy, valuable gift of speech (although he always spoke in somewhat measured accents), which gifts displayed themselves in his prayers and relations of Christian experience. These capabilities, along with his fervent, youthful piety, procured for him exhorter's license, and soon after employment as a missionary school-teacher, first at St. Clair, and afterwards at the Muncey Mission, so early as 1836; in which employment he continued for the best part of three years. At both these mission stations, there is reason to believe, he served the cause of religion, and developed his improvable talents by preaching as a local-preacher in the white settlements around.

His first circuit labours were under the direction of a

District Chairman, having the Rev. Sylvester Hurlburt for his immediate superintendent, on an extensive wild mission, including Lake Simcoe, Barrie, and Coldwater, where they had charge of several bands of Indians, besides extensive new settlements among the whites. This was during the ecclesiastical year 1839-40.

He was received regularly on trial at the Conference of 1840, and appointed alone to manage the Walpole Circuit. But at the Special Conference, held in October of the same year, consequent upon the dissolution of the first Union, a change in several of the Stations was necessitated, and Brother Price was removed from that interior position to be the colleague of the notable Thomas Bevitt, in the important Brantford Circuit, he (although of English Wesleyan antecedents) having cast in his lot with the Canada Conference.

He was then a young preacher of more than average talents for the period, he also having become very assiduous in cultivating his mind. The result was he received appointments in immediate succession to three important towns, now cities, London, Hamilton, and Toronto. The chronicler of Canadian Methodist annals says of him in those promising days of his career, "He had a good, but plaintive voice, deliberate delivery, and was pathetic, sometimes very impressive, in his pulpit efforts. He was destined to be useful in some marked revivals." At the close of his term in Toronto, he married a daughter of one of the oldest, and most respectable Methodist families of the place, that of Mr. John Doel. Mr. Price's circuits for several years thereafter were among the very best, such as

Yonge Street, St. Catharines, Chatham, St. Thomas, and Prescott. For the next eleven years his circuits were not quite so conspicuous as before, albeit he was two out of three years Chairman of his District.

He had during the thirty odd years of his active ministry the honour of winning many souls to Christ.

He was constitutionally sensitive, and at length became somewhat depressed and despondent. Declining health induced him to take a superannuated relation so early as 1871. Having come into the possession of ample worldly means, he could choose a residence to his liking, which was always respectable. Part of the last years of his life, his family home was first in Owen Sound, then in Toronto, and lastly Brantford, though he himself spent many months abroad in search of health.

The following is the authoritative report of the closing events of his life:—"He died," says the Rev. Manly Benson, "in Brantford, of apoplexy. Previous strokes had so injured his mind, that for many years he was not responsible for his conduct. His death was sudden, with only half an hour's premonition." This occurred on the 14th of December, 1883, at the age of sixty-one."

Thus, with Francis Paythress, John Robinson, Booth Newton, and some other early labourers, he has passed from under a clouded intellect, "at the evening time," we trust into the light of heaven.

"No further seek his merits to disclose,
Or draw his frailties from their dark abode ;
There they alike in trembling hope repose,
Upon the bosom of his Father and his God."

THE REV. WM. STEER.

Father Steer was one of a band of devoted Englishmen who, immediately after the Union of 1833, reinforced the ranks of our Canadian Methodist ministry. They proved themselves to be, without exception, men of more than ordinary piety, ability, and strength of character. But one of them now remains with us,—the Rev. John Douse.

Mr. Steer was a Yorkshireman, born in the quaint old town of Wakefield, on the 29th of August, 1798. His father was a respectable merchant of that place, possessed of the means to give his son a good education and to fit him for his chosen profession of the law. Both father and mother were faithful members of the Church of England, and trained their son to strict attendance upon all its services. He was made familiar with its doctrines as expounded in the catechism, and was habituated to the observance of the strictest morality, and of the privilege and duty of private prayer. But to the higher religious life of personal, conscious communion with God, they seem not to have been able to lead him.

When twenty-two years of age he was brought to the great crisis of religious life. Through some words spoken by a clergyman of the Church of England, he was convinced of his need of saving grace; and shortly after, in August, 1820, he found peace in believing. Of this great change he writes as follows:

"On Thursday morning I found the salvation of God. Never shall I forget the manifestation of God to my soul. He appeared to me as the infinitely great and glorious God, worthy to be praised 'from the rising of the sun to the

As I gazed upon the glorious object now seen for the first time since I had a being I felt that I cordially loved Him for His own holiness, and my heart enjoyed exquisite delight. Then the question arose in my mind, 'Am I converted?' To this my judgment answered promptly in the affirmative."

In what way Methodism was related to his conversion we are not informed; but about two years later he united with the Wesleyan Methodists. He was now in the practice of law, a profession chosen prior to his conversion; but under the influence of a strong conviction that God called him to the work of the ministry, he accepted the office of a local-preacher, and served an apprenticeship of seven years' faithful service. At the end of this time, in March, 1834, he was chosen by the Church for the work in Upper Canada, and at the Conference in June following, was received on trial and stationed in Kingston. For twenty years he faithfully discharged the duties of a Methodist itinerant, the last two years in failing health, and the last but one in temporary superannuation. In 1856 he was permanently superannuated, and located in Grafton. It is, perhaps, the highest tribute to his memory that, after a residence here of twenty-six years, his great moral worth, the purity of his life, his inflexible integrity, and the unaffected sincerity of his piety, were acknowledged and attested by all classes and creeds of his fellow-citizens. The people of his neighbourhood will not soon forget the long journeys on foot, over bleak hills, and through deep snows, which he made constantly for years, to serve the circuits round about on whose plan he was regularly appointed.

He believed in, preached, and exemplified the doctrine of Christian perfection; and especially during the latter days of his life was often permitted to dwell in the land of Beulah. It was during such a season that the messenger came, and with one short hour of suffering, called him to his rest November 7th, 1882, aged 84 years.

THE REV. V. B. HOWARD.

Brother Howard was born near Brockville, in Jan., 1811. His father was for several years a successful medical practitioner, and a chosen representative of the County of Leeds to the Upper Canada Legislature; consequently the circumstances of the family were such as to give our brother, in his youth, the best social and educational advantages which the country at that time afforded. And these were given him with a hope that he would enter the medical profession; but God had other work for him to do. While he was yet young he was converted, and God in due time gave him a place among His workmen. But he became a workman in this department of work under the most decided opposition. His father told him if he would enter the medical profession he would furnish him with ample means, but if he preferred the calling of a poor Methodist preacher, of which he had received some intimation, he would not give him a cent. Our brother's convictions of duty, however, were such as to make him utterly disregard this parental threat, knowing that a greater than his father had said, "If any man love father or mother, wife or children, houses or lands, or his own life, more than Me he is not worthy of Me." when he was asked by the Church to become a standard bearer, he cheerfully complied. In 1833 he was taken out as a probationer under the late Dr. Anson Green, and appointed to the old Matilda Circuit, where the great Head of the Church gave him many seals to his ministry. The following year he was sent to the back country on the banks of the Ottawa, which was a very different field of labour then to what it is now. The fare was very poor, the salary small, and the labour severe. But our brother had got beyond the "Woe is me if I preach not," to "The love of Christ constraineth me," and this principle sustained him in his long perilous journeys, hard toil, and many privations. Although he was not what some would call a brilliant preacher, yet he was a clear expounder of God's truth, and successful in winning souls to Christ. On every circuit during the 27 years of his active service, he was an instrument in God's hand of adding to the number of Jesus' witnesses. At length the failure of health compelled him to consent to take a superannuated relation. In 1860 he, to secure suitable educational advantages for his boys, such as Cobourg could give, located there, and continued to labour as far as his feebleness would allow, as a faithful Methodist minister, keeping himself free from all pecuniary speculations: having food and raiment therewith, he was content. He continued to the last to evidence his unshaken attachment to our peculiar means of grace—never absent from the prayer-meeting or love-feast only when sickness prevented him. In the August Quarterly-Meeting love-feast of 1862, he stood up, for the last time, to give his usual testimony for the encouragement of his brethren,

that he knew that "the blood of Jesus, God's Son, cleanseth from all sin." The next Sabbath, about four o'clock p.m., he was with the blood-washed before the throne, praising God for salvation gained for ever. To say that our brother had no failings, would be to say that he was more than human. He, however, came down to the grave with a clear record; leaving his family and the Church of his early choice the legacy of a good life, and an unwavering testimony to a full as well as a present and free salvation.

ANDREW LOYST PETERSON

Was born in the Township of Ameliasburg, on the 23rd day of March, 1828. His parents, Samuel and Margaret Peterson, were well known in the early days of Methodism in that township. He was converted to God in his twenty-first year, under the labours of the Revs. Messrs. Jones and Poole. He spent several years in teaching, and studied at Victoria College with a view to further proficiency in that profession. But at a camp-meeting held in Ameliasburg, in 1856, he yielded to what he regarded as the call of God to the work of the ministry, and soon after was sent to Norwood circuit. Afterwards, on Lindsay, Percy, and Farmersville circuits, he fulfilled a satisfactory probation, and was ordained at Kingston, in 1860.

For the next nineteen years he laboured chiefly in Eastern Ontario. Though much of the time in feeble health, and sometimes on circuits which tried the most robust, he succeeded in winning souls, in spreading scriptural holiness, and in promoting the material interests of the Church of God.

His talents were well adapted to pastoral work, and as a preacher he was earnest and pathetic.

In 1879 he was obliged to retire, and eventually settled down on the farm on which he was born. His disease, a species of paralysis, soon confined him to his room and caused much suffering, but was endured with the patience of hope. At the beginning of August last it was evident that his end was near. On Sunday, the 13th, he called his family around him, joined with them in singing, and then most earnestly and affectionately commended them to God. Shortly after he fell into a quiet slumber, which, at seven next morning, gave place to everlasting rest.

THE REV. ASHTON FLETCHER.

Eighty years ago, in the County of Cheshire, England, Ashton Fletcher was born. His father was an Episcopalian; his mother was a Methodist, and the guiding star of his life. "From a child he had known the Scriptures," and been deeply interested in religion. Even while a boy he spent much time in secret prayer. He was converted to God when seventeen years of age. When twenty years old he left a good situation with a wealthy relative because it would have led him into worldly sports on the Lord's day. After this he had to endure much labour and privation, but God soon made him a prosperous business man, and before leaving England he had charge of a cotton warehouse in Manchester.

When twenty-four years of age he was married to Hannah Fletcher (not a relation), who proved a true helpmeet for

him. He came to Canada in 1842, and made his home in the Township of Markham for eleven years, then spent two years in Aurora, and then moved to York Township. During all these years he was an example to believers in faithfulness and zeal, leading class, preaching locally, and doing all good works. After six days of laborious work on his farm he would travel twenty miles on Sunday, preaching two or three times. He earnestly desired to do all the good he could.

While living in York Township there occurred a vacancy on the Stouffville circuit, and he was pressed out into the regular ministry, quite against his inclination, to supply this. His labours, however, were greatly blessed of God. After travelling this and several other circuits he became a supernumerary, and located near Woodstock. During late years his home was in Peterboro' with his son-in-law, Dr. Fife.

Brother Fletcher was a man of great integrity, deep sympathy, and strong common sense. The members of his classes highly appreciated him and loved him, and the whole church held him in high esteem. He was exceedingly severe on the inconsistency of Christians, but of no one did he exact so much as of himself. His high ideal of how a good man should walk often filled him with unreasonable reproaches against himself, and cast a shadow over his spirit. He used to say, "If I am saved at all it must be through the great mercy of God in Jesus Christ, and not through what I have done." Yet he also knew how to rejoice. The last time he led his class he said, "I am as happy as I can be out of heaven;" and a few days before he died he said,

"I am very ill, I think I shall die; and I hope I shall; I want to go."

He had considerable means, which he used well. He opened his hand liberally to the requirements of the Church, the wants of the poor, and the objects of benevolence. To do good and to communicate he forgot not. Nor did he neglect his own family in his interest in others, but constantly sought their present and future welfare.

He was a man of strong constitution, which seemed invulnerable to disease. On December 14th, 1881, however, he was smitten with apoplexy. He gradually recovered, and was able to move about as usual for some time; but in September, 1882, he was taken with paralysis, and died October 8th.

He was buried at Ingersoll, surrounded by a large number of friends, the Rev. W. Williams, President of the London Conference, and the Rev. W. W. Ross, of Ingersoll, conducting the funeral services.

THE REV. R. G. JAMES.

The Rev. R. G. James entered the Methodist Ministry in 1870, and travelled nearly thirteen years. He was stationed in some hard fields of labour, some of which were in the Algoma District; but he laboured earnestly wherever he was sent, sometimes even walking long journeys to meet his appointments.

Brother James was a diligent student, and soon became a minister of more than ordinary acceptability. He was a

faithful pastor, and looked well over the flock over which the Holy Ghost had made him overseer.

The end of our dear brother was sad and tragical. Last September he was a passenger in the unfortunate *Asia*, which foundered in the Georgian Bay, which dreadful calamity cast a gloom over many families both in Canada and the United States. Of the two surviving passengers, one of them testified that she heard Mr. James exhort the people in the hour of extremity, to look to the Saviour who could save to the uttermost. He seemed to be completely regardless respecting himself, but was full of anxiety respecting the spiritual state of his fellow-passengers. His body was never found, but it will be raised again, incorruptible and glorious. His pious life and godly conversation is the best legacy which he left to his surviving friends.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

On the subject of Temperance your Committee request permission to lay before you these aspects of the question :

1. The Prohibitory Liquor Law of the North-West Territories has been infringed upon, and we advise that the strongest possible pressure in the case be brought to bear by our Church on both the Local and Dominion Legislatures, to at once remedy the evil, and prevent its recurrence.

2. A request has been received from the Dominion Alliance that the second Sabbath in October be observed as "Temperance Sunday;" on which day sermons bearing on that subject shall be preached. We recommend that the request be complied with; and we also suggest that at least one Temperance Meeting be held on each Circuit during that week, at which a collection shall be taken to be devoted as the Temperance Committee shall direct, to the furtherance of the cause.

3. We advise that the education of our children in the principles of Total Abstinence be carefully looked after, at home and in our general pastoral work, and that, through the proper channel, the Minister of Education be requested to provide suitable Text-Books on this important subject for use in our Public Schools.

4. It is to us a source of extreme disappointment that so little interest has yet been taken on the subject of Sacramental wine, and we repeat the earnest request that on our Circuits and at our Conference a purer article of this class be placed upon the table of our Lord.

5. It is our firm belief that too much attention to this vital question can hardly be given in our Sabbath School work and in our pulpit ministrations; we therefore recommend that wherever practicable, Temperance Unions be formed amongst the children of our Sunday Schools, and that in many a sermon throughout the year the pastor's faithful warning cry may be heard by all the lambs of his flock.

6. We recommend the appointment of an efficient Standing Committee on Temperance Business, also the appointment of a General Secretary; and we are of the opinion that the Rev. T. W. Campbell, B.D., would, in this capacity, efficiently serve the interests of our work, and ask for his appointment.

7. We would recommend also that the Finance District Meetings be instructed to elect a Temperance Secretary for their several Districts.

8. We desire to assure the Women's Temperance Union that it was with pleasure we received their communication, and that we heartily pledge ourselves to continued co-operation with them in their difficult and arduous toil.

9. We as a Conference earnestly recommend that the sale of all intoxicating liquors be separated from all groceries and other stores.

10. We ask that our brethren, the Ministers of this Conference, speak with utmost earnestness and authority on this most important question, both in the ears of our own people and in the high places of our Dominion.

All of which is respectfully presented for consideration.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The Committee appointed by this Conference to report on the "State of the Work," recognize with thanksgiving to Almighty God the success which has crowned the efforts of our labourers during the past year — enabling us to announce an increase of membership of 668 souls, besides great additions in Churches, Sabbath-schools, preaching places, and workers, and also a gratifying increase in nearly every one of our Connexional Funds.

The extension of the missionary work, and the revival spirit in Bermuda, Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, and Japan are very encouraging. In Japan, especially in connection with the labours of Miss Cartmell, sent out by the Woman's Missionary Society with the concurrence of the Methodist Church of Canada, to labour specially among women, great good is being accomplished among a class of society only reached by one of their own sex.

In Manitoba and the North-west, where the work of evangelization among the Aborigines of the far North began more than forty years ago, thousands have been converted, many of whom, in their dying hour, have witnessed a good confession, and triumphed gloriously; and hundreds to-day are leading holy lives, and are useful members of society in their various localities.

At present there are 13 Indian Missions in Manitoba and the North-west. The mission among the settlers commenced in 1868 by the appointment of the Rev. George Young, D.D. to the Red River. At present there are in this great country 67 missions with about 360 preaching stations, 40 churches, 25 parsonages, and Methodist preachers — including Local Preachers, Supernumeraries and Itinerants — 103, with the prospect of 15 or 20 more to be sent this year. There is a membership of nearly 3,000, with adherents

numbering about 16,000, and a large number of members and adherents who are not reached by any of our missionaries. It is cause of great gratitude that the New Conference, to be organized in August, for Manitoba and the North-west, will begin with 65 or 70 Missionaries. The effort now being made to establish a Parsonage and Loan Fund, with special view to this great field, the Church should heartily sustain, in order that these new settlers may be encouraged to erect houses of worship and parsonages in places where required, and thereby save heavy expenditures on rent and purchase of property at advanced rates.

British Columbia is fast being developed, both in regard to mines and agriculture. The once small farming settlements are rapidly filling up, principally with Canadians, many of whom have been connected with our Church in Ontario, and naturally look to us to supply them with ministers. Here we have 12 charges among the white population, and one among the Chinese, with 14 mission stations among the Indians. There are several thousands of people employed on the Canada Pacific Railroad, amongst whom as yet we have no missionaries. This vast field calls loudly to our Church for the Gospel, especially as many of our people are employed in that sphere of labour. Two probationers have been received by the Conference to work among the Indians in the Port Simpson District. One of these is a native, the first native who has been received as a probationer for our work on the Pacific Coast. Several new fields are being opened among the Indians, many of whom are cared for by native teachers. There are many places to which we could send missionaries if men and means were at our disposal. The Institutions that religion founds, such as the "Girls' Home," which the Rev. Mr. Crosby, and the "Boys' Industrial Training Home," which the Rev. Mr. McDougall are now establishing, call for liberal contributions from the members and friends of our Church through the Dominion, as well as their prayers.

The future of these great countries depends on the action of the Church. Not to Government but to the Church the world looks to found future empires on the basis of the "Righteousness that exalteth a nation;" and the state of the Church of the future will greatly depend upon the action of the Church now—if liberal it will grow, if penurious it will dwindle, and the coming of the millennium will be deferred.

If our work is to progress, your Committee are of opinion greater attention must be given to regular and faithful attendance at the Sabbath services, and to the social means of grace, private and public. By attention to these, buried talents will be disinterred, and dormant powers quickened; the Church will be roused to individual action, and to the cultivation, and attainment, and manifestation of the works of the Spirit. It will rejoice in the sympathy of family relationship to one another, and to its Head. The poor will be carefully looked after, the afflicted visited, the stranger warmly greeted and invited to the Communion of Saints, and sinners will be compelled to acknowledge that religion's ways are "ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace."

We would also press upon parents the duty of taking their children and sitting together in the family pew. Nowhere is the home feeling so unified and strengthened as when a whole family bow at one common mercy-seat in the place where God the Father dwelleth. Nowhere is the brotherhood of the human race so clearly taught; and nowhere is the divine bond uniting humanity so clearly enunciated as in the house of God, from whose pulpits, in manifold forms of illustration, is proclaimed the divine fact—"God hath made of one blood all nations of men," and God's pre-determination to save all. That they should seek the Lord, if haply they might feel after Him and find Him though He be not far from every one of us. For in Him we live and move and have our being. * * * * For we are also His offspring.

Closely connected also with the progressive "state of the work," is the careful study of God's Word. We fear it is possible, in this age of intense "haste to be rich" which seems growing upon us, that the "words able to make wise unto salvation" may be hastily read or entirely unheeded. The neglect of it causes indifference about its relation to education. Let us remember, "The testimony of the Lord makes wise the simple." Without its principles are instilled into the human mind there is no standard within—an authority of appeal on all questions of moral duty. To cultivate a love for the Bible we think is the only way to banish the cheap, trashy, immoral productions of the press, and of insuring its being introduced into our public schools as the only text book on morals.

And allow your Committee to add, that while we have so many causes for gratitude, the Church should be deeply humiliated that we have fallen so far short of wonderful successes within our reach because of our unfaithfulness. The Church is God's; the work is His; the plan of operation is His. It is ours with child-like simplicity, and unquestioning faith, to obey God's commands as revealed in His word. That we may do, be, and have what He requires, let us seek the Holy Spirit's forgiveness for the past, and His unction afresh, that the coming year may be one of universal and unprecedented success in every good word and work, and thus we may cover the shame and disgrace of the past, that, with Omnipotent power at our disposal, we have hitherto done so little for the cause of God and humanity.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Committee met pursuant to announcement, in the George Street Methodist Church, Peterboro', June 15th 1883. Rev. W. Tindal was appointed Chairman, and Rev. J. W. Totten was appointed Secretary.

The Committee adjourned to meet at call of Chair.

June 16th 1883.—Committee met pursuant to announcement. Present—Revs. W. Tindal, L. Rice, D.D., S. Rose, D.D., R. Jones, G. Edwards, J. W. Totten, and T. Cleworth.

The Committee having considered the cases brought before them, report as follows:—

BRAMPTON DISTRICT.

WESTERN CIRCUIT.—Recommend, that permission be granted to the Trustees of Stonehouse's Church to sell said church on condition that a full Board be appointed, and that the Board when so appointed be agreeable to the sale.

ALGOMA DISTRICT.

PRINCE ARTHUR'S LANDING.—Regarding the request of the Quarterly Official Board of Prince Arthur's Landing, asking permission to sell a part of the parsonage lot, we cannot recommend it in its present form; but we recommend that Rev. Dr. Rose be requested to correspond with the Superintendent of Prince Arthur's Landing, with a view to organizing the Board in accordance with our Model Deed.

BELLEVILLE DISTRICT.

The Committee recommend that permission be granted to

the Trustees of the church property in Frankford, to convey to the Central Ontario Railway Company, a small piece of land in the burial lot belonging to the said property, and in the line of said Railway, the said piece of land not containing any graves, and the sale not disfiguring the lot, and the said road being built across it.

Recommended that permission be granted to the Trustees of the parsonage property in Thomasburg to sell the present parsonage, the proceeds of such sale to be applied in erecting a new parsonage.

PETERBORO' DISTRICT.

HALL'S BRIDGE.—Recommend that the Trustees of the parsonage property known as Wesley Church, Hall's Bridge Mission, be granted permission to sell said property, proceeds to be applied to paying mortgage already against the property, the balance to be applied to the improvement of Wesley Church.

CAVANVILLE.—Recommended that permission be granted to the Trustees of the old parsonage in Cavanville to sell the same and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage in the same village.

COLLINGWOOD DISTRICT.

Committee recommend that permission be granted to the Trustees of the old church in Parry Sound, to sell said church, the proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on the new church and parsonage.

WALKERTON DISTRICT.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.—That permission be given to the Trustees of the Portage la Prairie parsonage property, to sell that property and apply the proceeds towards the payment of debt on connexional property in the town. The above permission is granted on condition that it meet with the concurrence of the Superintendent of Missions in the North-west.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have much pleasure in stating that there is a growing interest in the Sunday-school work of the Church, more especially in the funds, inasmuch as there is a net increase of money received by your Treasurer of \$86.87; only four districts reported less than last year, and some have reported an unusually large increase.

In respect to Sunday-school publications, your Committee is glad to find that the Superintendents and Teachers evidently regard them as much improved, seeing that the number reported as taken is greatly in excess of former years; but they beg leave to suggest that while there are 6,000 "other papers" taken in our Schools, whether this number could not be largely reduced by a little effort on the part of the Ministers, who could remind Sunday-school Committees of the superior character and cheapness of our own publications. The pecuniary gain to the Church would not be the greatest advantage, as it is well known that these "other papers" often contain sentiments which are not in accordance with Methodist Theology. Your Committee beg leave to make a suggestion to the Book-Steward and Editor: That there should be a few additional Notes on the Lessons in the Scholars' Quarterly. Your Committee is glad to hear such a good account of the "Hymnal:" would be glad if there were not so many changes in Hymn Books intended for Schools.

being secured in the returns. For this reason the number of Scholars who have signed the Temperance pledge in some districts is not reported.

From the statistics it is gratifying to find that there has been 1,417 conversions in the Schools; 5,708 Scholars are reported meeting in class; but, seeing that there are 41,803 Scholars reported, these numbers should certainly be much larger. The number reported learning Catechism is also much smaller than it should be. Your Committee can only do as they have done before, urge upon the members of Conference the imperative necessity of paying increased attention to this vital question.

Mr. Wesley advised his "helpers" not to mend our rules, but keep them, "for conscience sake." Your Committee would obey this injunction, and respectfully remind their brother Ministers of the requirements of the Discipline, paragraphs 294, 295, which relate to holding District Sunday-school Conventions, and the review of the Sunday-school schedules when the laymen are present. From facts which have come before your Committee, it is clear that these excellent provisions of the Discipline are not always observed.

Lastly, your Committee beg leave most respectfully to recommend the re-appointment of the Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., to the office of Secretary-Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO

The attendance, income, and educational work of the past year have so far surpassed those of previous years, that all connected with the college feel the pulsation of new life and encouragement, and in bringing our college to your notice at this time we feel that we have more claims than ever heretofore on your patronage and assistance.

The average number of boarders throughout the year in regular attendance has been eighty-eight ; day pupils eleven. The average number of boarders for the latter half of the year has been ninety-six.

The income having been larger than that of any previous year, our financial condition has thereby been considerably improved.

This marked success we attribute to the able and energetic efforts of the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, M.A., and the Lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., assisted by a large staff of experienced and efficient teachers, and we believe we have thereby succeeded in affording our pupils facilities in the country for securing a finished second-to-none education in all the departments.

The present large attendance of pupils and the ever increasing reputation of the college are, we consider, the legitimate outcome of our conscientious endeavour to meet the wishes and expectations of our patrons, and to combine comfort and refinement with thorough mental and physical culture.

We are also pleased to report that during the year we have been exceptionally free from any sickness whatever, which speaks well for the healthfulness of our location and surroundings. We refer with pride and pleasure to our beautiful situation, our inviting grounds, our large and elegant buildings, acknowledged by all acquainted with them to be without a rival in Canada. Particular attention is paid to a healthful out-door exercise—all legitimate games being furnished for that purpose.

We take great pleasure in asking the Conference to confirm the re-appointment of Rev. J. J. Hare, as Governor of the College for the coming year.

We mention with very deep regret the death of Mr. Samuel Hatch, a very active and efficient member of our Board, which took place during the past year.

Thanking the members of the Conference for their hearty co-operation in the past, and hoping by a faithful discharge of our duties to merit a continuance of the same, we now commend our college to your favourable consideration and continued patronage.

From the curriculum it was seen that the range of studies was wide, varied, and important. Our limited time made it impossible for us to visit all the classes, but we had the opportunity of hearing several branches taught, including Logic and Botany by the Principal, the Rev. J. J. Hare, M.A.; English Literature and Evidences of Christianity, by Miss Adams; Foreign Languages, by Miss Archer; History, Grammar, Mathematics, and Elocution, by Misses Frain, Phillips, and Webster. In each of these classes we were impressed with the excellency of the system of instruction adopted, and the efficient manner in which the students acquitted themselves.

No small degree of satisfaction was felt on visiting the Fine Arts Department under the superintendency of Prof. E. Shrapnel and Miss Windeat. Our attention was directed to several creditable specimens of china painting and paintings in oil, water-colors, and pencil-drawings, all executed by the students. In the Department of Music great proficiency has been attained by many of the pupils, the result of the eminent abilities and faithful efforts of Prof. Fisher and Prof. Bailey, assisted by Mrs. Hare, Miss Dick, and Miss Wilson.

We took the opportunity of enquiring in regard to the appliances and furnishings of the College for purposes of study, and were gratified to learn that though a comparatively new institution it was not without many advantages, including the possession of a magnificent telescope and many instruments of music. If anything is lacking it is in not having a more complete Standard Library of Reference for the use of the school. Let us hope that, in the near future, this felt want may be supplied through the generosity of some philanthropic persons, who may have an intelligent appreciation.

In conclusion, your Visitors felt that this Conference will do well to continue its interest for the welfare for this seminary of learning. The teaching staff is most efficient.

Great moral safe guards are continually thrown around the students. The building is elegant, spacious, and in every way fitted for the promotion of physical health. There are few schools with finer surroundings and better advantages.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The Rev. John Bredin presented the following Report of the Board of Examiners, which was adopted :—

The Annual Meeting of the Board was held on the 15th of June. There were 20 candidates and 54 probationers, of whom 11 received first-class; 50, second-class; and 2, third-class certificates. There were 11 who partially failed, but who are required to complete their studies during the present year.

The Conference was recommended to authorize the Board to place among the text-books for the fourth year's course of study, "The Book of Discipline,"—that book having been omitted from the Conference course by the General Conference.

The Examiners shall meet the Probationers and Candidates in the Town of Whitby, on the last Wednesday in April, 1884, at 9 o'clock a.m.; and the Certificates shall be issued at a public meeting to be held at the close of the examinations.

The manuscript questions shall be forwarded to the Secretary not later than the first week in February next; but they shall not be printed earlier than the first of April. The Secretary shall supervise their printing and distribution.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Before a Chairman or Superintendent shall propose a Candidate to the Conference to be admitted on Probation, such candidate must have been a member of our Church for one year, and a local preacher in good standing for six months, and approved and recommended by the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission on which he resides. He must also pass a satisfactory written examination, and an oral examination such as the Examiners may deem necessary, on the subjects prescribed by the Conference as the Preliminary Course of Study.

No candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a Certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meetings, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which the young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the Meeting may deem necessary ; which statement shall be signed by him, and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve ; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the Preliminary Course of Study.

2. That inasmuch as the proposed union involves questions of Church Property and other matters having a legal

aspect, this Conference recommends the authorities of the General Conference to obtain the best possible legal advice touching all such points, and submit the same to the said Conference before final action is taken, so that if legal difficulties are found to exist they may be provided for and removed before union is consummated. This resolution was carried by a vote of 137 to 37.

Sympathy with the Woman's Missionary Society.

Resolved,—That this Conference desires to express its hearty sympathy with the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of Canada, as a most valuable auxiliary to our general Missionary operations. Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

The collections in aid of the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz:—

1. CONTINGENT FUND.—In the months of September and March.
2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.—In the month of October or November.
3. EDUCATIONAL FUND.—In the month of February or April.
4. SABBATH SCHOOL FUND.—In the month of September.
5. GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.—In the month of July.

Collections for Connexional Funds.

That it is the judgment of this Conference that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our Churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust or other Fund.

Ministers Removing.

That in case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpit on their old Circuits two Sabbaths, and for the supply of the new the third Sabbath after the Conference.

Ordination Sermon.

That the Ordination Sermon be preached by the ex-President of the Conference.

Application for Additional Preachers, and List of Reserves.

1. That in future no application or recommendation for the appointment of a young man, in addition to the Superintendent in any Circuit, shall be entertained by the Stationing Committee, unless such application is accompanied by a distinct pledge from the Official Quarterly Meeting of such Circuit that, at the end of four years, they will receive a married man in place of such single man.
2. That the Chairmen of Districts are hereby instructed to bring before the Quarterly Official Meeting of Circuits, on which a married and a single man have been stationed for the past four years, the necessity for making provision for two married men at the earliest practicable date.
3. That we recommend the formation by the President and Stationing Committee of a "List of Reserves," upon which shall be placed the names of all young men recommended for the ministry whose services are not imperatively required to supply the work.
4. That when young men are recommended for the work of the ministry, and are placed upon the "List of Reserves," it shall be distinctly understood that their probation shall not commence till they are appointed to a Circuit by the proper authorities.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE, OF THE METHODIST
CHURCH OF CANADA,

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEAR BRETHREN,—

We send you greeting in the name of the Lord by whose grace we have been called to the office and work of the ministry among you. We close our Annual Conference with a deep sense of our indebtedness to our Heavenly Father for His presence with us during the past year, blessing the labour of our hands, and we go forth again to toil with you, and for you, realizing our utter dependence upon the guidance and aid of the Divine Spirit. Our Conference sessions have been pleasant and profitable. While discussing freely and frankly questions of vast importance to our Church, we have received the helpful influence of the Spirit of God. Our decisions have been reached after full and earnest discussion. Unanimity of opinion concerning the great and many-sided questions demanding our attention, was not to be expected, but the aim of all has been to conserve the interests of the Church and advance the Divine Glory. It is needless to say that one of the most important subjects laid before us was the Basis of Union with the other Methodist Bodies. We have given our decision in this

matter in the fear of God, and we commend it to your favorable consideration. Whatever may be the final decision, we devoutly pray that the peace of our beloved Zion may be preserved, and our usefulness as a Church greatly increased.

We rejoice, brethren, that our toil in the Master's vineyard during the past year has not been fruitless. Souls have been saved through the preaching of the Truth, and the devotion of the Church has been deepened. We thank God that, notwithstanding numerous losses, we report a net increase of 800 in our membership.

We recognize you as co-workers with us, and thankfully acknowledge our indebtedness to you for the faithful and zealous assistance extended to us, and we believe that whatever success has attended our labour is largely the result of your loving and helpful sympathy. We are all "members one of another." There is a mutual dependence of which we cannot rid ourselves if we would. We bespeak for ourselves, therefore, your forbearance and help during this year. We come to you in the name of the Lord. Together let us labour in the bonds of the Gospel, making the glory of God in the salvation of souls the object of our effort. This work to which we are called is peculiar, requiring cleanness of hands, purity of heart, and activity of faith. It demands separation from the world. It is not to be accomplished by the adoption of worldly principles and methods. Our success will be proportionate to our faithfulness to the teaching of the Word and Spirit. Consecration to God and His work must succeed. Failure will inevitably follow the admission of the spirit of worldliness. If the Church have holiness she strength, if she have not holiness she has not strength whatever else she may have; and the holiness of the Church is the holiness of her individual members. The devotion of the Church depends upon the devotion of her members. Each of us therefore is responsible to the full extent of our influence for the spiritual life and power of the Church. We are in danger of losing sight of the truth that all our success,

social and financial, as well as spiritual, depends upon the vigor of our spiritual life, and the temptation to resort to various expedients of doubtful character has to be resisted. Our growth as a people in wealth and social influence has also increased the danger of undue conformity to the world in its amusements and practices. We fear that some of our members are tolerating, if not encouraging, the indulgence in those amusements which we have always opposed as pernicious in their influence and tendencies. This is to be deprecated as an evidence of decreased spiritual vitality. It will be a sorry day for Methodism if ever she falters in her denunciation of the theatre, the dance, the card-table, and other amusements of like destructive tendencies. It needs no prophet to predict days of weakness and defeat if we forsake the old land-marks, and sanction in our social life what has always proved enervating to the life of the Church.

Closely allied to this is the question of family religion. The life of the Church is deeply affected by the religious influence of our homes. In every house should be a Church. The duties of parental priesthood should be faithfully discharged. If the Church is to endure there must be a continual succession of father and son—instead of the parents must be the children. No influence, we are persuaded, is more potent in the conversion of our children than the holy influence of a truly religious home. Yet we feel that in the rush of business cares, the sacred ordinance of family worship is either neglected or receives but a formal observance. Send forth your sons and daughters with the memory of many holy seasons of cheerful and blessed family worship. Diligently teach your children the Law of the Lord; counsel them, warn them, invite them, pray with them. Be most concerned about their preparation for eternity. It will be the best preparation for the present life. Wealth of grace in the heart will serve them better than great earthly possessions. Control their recreations, supplanting the injurious by the healthful. Guard your homes against the

pernicious literature with which our land is flooded. In this matter you cannot be too watchful. Impure literature is one of the most effective weapons of the devil in his war upon family religion. Walk before your family circumspectly, and with a sense of your accountability to God for the souls entrusted to your care.

Our attention has been called to the inroads upon the sanctity of the Sabbath. This day of sacred rest is a priceless boon to humanity, and must be faithfully guarded. It is the Lord's day, and must be held sacred. We trust you will not only observe it faithfully yourselves, but that you will give your earnest co-operation to preserve it from the assaults of those who would sacrifice it to their greed of gain.

The important question of Temperance still claims our earnest sympathy and aid. We have a great responsibility in this matter. Be not disheartened into indifference through incidental failures. It is the cause of our social and national interest, of our homes and religion, of God and humanity, against the greed of man and the infernal wiles of the devil. It is a conflict between right and wrong, and the right must prevail. "Total Abstinence and Prohibition" is the watchword inscribed on our banners, and we have nailed our colours to the mast. Let not the curse of Meroz rest upon you, but rather come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty.

We commend to your sympathy and cordial support, our various connexional interests. We regret to find a slight decrease in your contributions to the Missionary Society, but we are glad to report a creditable advance in the other funds. We trust you will fully recognize the claims of these connexional interests upon your liberality, and that none of them will be allowed to suffer. We are pleased to learn that the circulation of the *Christian Guardian* and *Methodist Magazine* have considerably increased. Yet the patronage is not as large as it should be, and we cordially commend these periodicals to your hearty support, believing
