



Apple Dumplings. Sauce.

The recipes for scones and dumplings are as follows:—

Two cups nour.
Four teaspoons baking powder.
Two teaspoons sugar.
One-half teaspoon salt.
Four tablespoons shortening.

One egg,
One-third cup milk.
Mix and sift together flour, baking owder, sugar, and salt. Rub in short-

powder, sugar, and salt. Rub in shortening with tips of fingers, add egg well beaten (reserving a small amount of unbeaten white), and milk. Toss on a floured board, pat, and roll to three-querters inch in thickness. Cut in squares, brush with reserved white, sprinkle with sugar, and bake in a hot oven fifteen minutes.

Apple Dumplings—

Make a crust as for tea biscuits, using suet instead of butter. Roll to a quarter of an inch. Cover with a layer of finely sliced apples. Sprinkle over with sugar and cinnamon. Sew this into cheese cloth as for Rolly-Poly. Fasten the ends. Plunge into boiling water, and boil rapidly forty minutes.





General Mewburn absolutely denies

that he in any way criticized the ad-ministration of Sir Edward Kemp. What he said was that he always What he said was that he always thought that the sending of complete units overseas in 1916 was a mistake; that reinforcing drafts should have been sent overseas instead of complete units. 


