London, Aug. 28—Germany probably will declare war on Roumania within wenty-four hours, after which Turkey and Bulgaria are expected to do likewise, says a despatch from the Hague to The Exchange Telegraph Company.

In addition to the many features introduced by the Western Union Telegraph Company, arrangements to extend the popular day letter service to Canada on September 1 have been completed and all offices have been notified.

By this extension patrons will not only enjoy the day letter privilege to all points in Canada but likewise to all points in Canada but likewise to all points in the United states over the Western Union system, comprising over 26,000 offices. Both English and French languages allowable in Canada, English only to points in the United States. All messages must be written in plain language, code words not permissable.

Fifty words constitutes a day letter and the rate is one and one-half times regular day rate for ten words. For every group of ten words over fifty, one-fifth the tolls on fifty words is added.



HALF POUND OF MEAT WEEKLY FOR GERMANS AFTER OCT. 2

Berlin, Aug. 26.—The government has issued a decree providing for the introduction of meat cards for the whole emduction of meat cards for the whole empire on Oct. 2. Families butchering for their own consumption are subject to the card system. They will be required to procure permission from local authorities before butchering animals for household consumption.

The maximum amount of meat provided for under the new card system will be 250 grams (alightly mass than half a pound)



He Was Recognized

Paris, Aug. 24—One of the most remarkable stories of the war is told by Corporal Marcel B. —, of the 1913 class, belonging to a French regiment d'elite, who, inside of the space of twenty-four hours, took part with his comrades in a successful charge and later with a Silesian battalion in a less successful counter-attack. He experienced two furious bombardinents, first from the Germans and then from his own guns, and finally was wounded by a French bomb, while trying to approach an outlying French trench along a German communicating french. Corporal B., who is now in a hospital near Paris, lived with his parents in Munich for five years before the war. He only left there to undertake military service in the autumn of 1918. Badly wounded in the Battle of the Marne, he rejoined his regiment in time for last year's Champagne offensive. He ressed three months at Verdun and has been on the Somme front since the beginning of July.

"Last Thursday evening," he said, "my battalion was moved up to a point just beyond the road from Maurepas to Clery, with orders to assault the line of four German trenches opposite at dawn. Throughout the night it was impossible to sleep owing to the terrific din of French shells exploding over the enemy's position in a continuous roar.

"The first streaks of davlight showed the roaring rattle that announces the heaviest shells. We threw ourselves flat, but it was too near. "For an instant I, felt myself in the heaviets shells. 




