Roumania Enters War on Side of Allies

Declaration Against Austria-Hungary Made On Sunday, Says Berlin Announcement

Army More Than Half Million; Can Mobilize as Many More

Special Importance in Opening Way for Russians to Get at Bulgars--German Federal Council Gets Rush Call For Meeting

Berlin, Aug. 28.—It is officially announced here that Roumania declared war on Austria-Hungary on Sunday evening. The announcement follows: "The Roumanian government yesterday evening declared war on Austria-Hungary. The federal council has been convoked for an immediate sitting."

Paris, Aug. 28.—Roumania declared war against Austria-Hungary, last night, says a Havas despatch from Bern, Switzerland, which declares that the Wolf Agency at Berlin made the official announcement. Roumania's decision to enter the war was reached at a meeting of the crown council held at Bucharest yesterday morning, says a Havas despatch from Geneva. The Wolf Agency announces that the German Federal Council was convoked immediately after the decision became known.

The motive which prompts Roumania to enter the war is the satisfaction of her national aspirations, described by Take Jonescu, the Roumanian Liberal leader, as the "policy of national independence."

Concisely, this means national expansion. In the southern half of Bukovina, the Austrian crown land, the Roumanians are the dominant race. The mass of the people of Eastern Transylvania are of Roumanian stock. Roumania has been credited with a long-cherished ambition to enter these provinces, and at the same time to bring the Roumanians now under Austrian domination. Recently it was reported that Russia had offered Caernowitz to Roumania as a reward, if she would unite with the Entente. Roumania also covets Bessarabia, the extreme southwestern province of Russia, on the Black Sea, which was taken from her by the Berlin treaty of 1878. Reports have it that Russia also has consented to restore Bessarabia as a war prize, with its population of 2,000,000, mostly Roumanians, and an area of 20,000 square miles. This, Roumanians would give Roumania a total population approaching 16,000,000, and should all her aspirations be satisfied, a territory as great in area as that of England, Scotland and Wales.

Military Situation. Roumania has a border line as long as the whole Russian western war front on which to choose her point of military attack. In what direction her first blow might be aimed is indicated only by her desire to pour her troops through the passes of the Transylvania Alps, and the Carpathians into Transylvania. On the other hand, Austria has been accumulating military forces at Orsova prepared to attempt to force the iron gates, where the Danube river touches the western Roumanian border. Bulgaria is said to have stationed 100,000 or more troops along the southern bank of the Danube to protect her northern frontier from a Roumanian invasion.

Open Gates to Russia. Apprehension in Germany that Roumania intends to permit a Russian army to march through her territory to attack the Bulgarians has been apparent for some time. Military authorities in Budapest assert that the chief factor in the consideration of the Central Powers is not the half million or more men of the Roumanian army, but the opportunity offered for a new Russian invasion of Hungary. Roumanian sympathizers in Transylvania have been kept under military supervision. The Transylvanian Roumanian frontier defences have been strengthened by Roumania as a safeguard against Austrian invasion.

Recent reports from the Roumanian capital have stated that Roumania awaited only the beginning of the Anglo-French offensive in Macedonia before joining her fortunes with those of the Entente Allies. Another reason for delay in her decision, it is said, has been lack of ammunition, according to recent reports, which now has been relieved by large supplies coming from Japan, by way of Vladivostok. Roumania has a population of 6,800,000 and her army has been estimated at 280,000. Some advocates of Roumania's participation in the war have asserted that she could mobilize as many as 1,000,000 men. The mobilization of her army has been in progress for months and a few days ago was reported to be complete.

Sawdon, Methodist minister of Mount Stewart, who came here Saturday to preach in Grace church yesterday, was attacked by two unknown men in Victoria Park on Saturday night, robbed of his money and so badly beaten that he was unable to preach yesterday.

Further Effort to Settle Irish Question; Suggest Queen Mother as Vicereine

London, Aug. 28.—Strong efforts are to be made during the parliamentary recess for resumption of negotiations for settlement of the Irish question, according to reports in Irish political circles. It is understood that both the Unionists and Nationalist parties are inclined to regard these efforts sympathetically. The Illustrated Weekly Graphic puts forward an ingenious proposal that Queen Alexandra become Vicereine of Ireland, with a suitable residence in, or near, Dublin, a suggestion that also would do more in a month than the politicians have done in years toward a solution of the Irish question.

FRENCH AND BRITISH AGAIN PUT QUESTION BEFORE GREEK POWERS

Government's Embarrassment Grows Hourly in Face of Bulgarian Invasion—Germans Hurlled Back Again By French

Athens, Aug. 24 (via London) (delayed)—Bulgarian cavalry has passed through Kastoria in the direction of Coriza, where up to the present the Serbs have arrested their retirement, and are continuing their broad sweeping movement, which evidently intended to crumple up the Serbs on Saloniki. The French and British ministers this evening asked Premier Zaimis how far the Greek government proposed to countenance the Bulgarian advance without resistance, pointing out that it would be of an military interest to the Entente Powers to defend Thessaly from invasion, as Saloniki was supplied from the sea and could not be cut off by land. The embarrassment of the Greek government grows hourly in the face of popular resentment against the Bulgarian invasion.

BRITISH FIRE ON PORTS AT KAVALA. London, Aug. 28.—Despite German assurances to Greece that Sessa, Drama and Kavala would not be occupied by the Bulgars, says Reuters' Saloniki correspondent, "an order" sent on last Tuesday to the commander of the forts at Kavala, said if the Bulgars advanced, the forts were to be handed to them. On Friday the Bulgars entered the town and took possession of the forts. British warships opened fire on the forts, but details of the results of the fighting are not permitted to be made.

ON MACEDONIAN FRONT. London, Aug. 28.—Artillery fighting is in progress along the Macedonian front, but no infantry actions of importance are under way, so far as is indicated by today's official account of the operations on this front. BRITISH CASUALTIES. London, Aug. 28.—The war office has announced the British casualties for the week just finished, totalling 31,272. Of these, 1,047 were officers, of whom 278 were killed. The casualties among enlisted men were 30,225, of whom 4,891 were killed.

DRIVEN BACK AGAIN. Paris, Aug. 28.—The Germans made several attacks on the French positions at Fleury last night but were repulsed, says today's announcement of the war office. Kavala, Greece, Aug. 27.—The effects of the Bulgarian occupation of Doxato, the scene of alleged atrocities which the Greeks accused the Bulgars in the last war, is prodigious. Kavala is the theatre of amazing scenes of disorder. Thousands of refugees are pouring into this port from the hinterland and crowding the steep, narrow streets. Household goods, were flung away by their owners, fleeing from the advancing Bulgarians. The goods were abandoned by the fugitives upon their discovery that means of escape from the city by sea transport are inadequate. Small boats dangerously overloaded with women and children, are rowing aimlessly about the harbor, their occupants seeking asylum aboard any vessel regard less of its destination or the price of passage. Complete panic prevails.

Italian Land Troops. Athens, Aug. 27.—The landing of the first contingent of Italian troops at Chimara (a small sea port of Albania, on the Strait of Otranto), causes gloom throughout all Greece. The Greeks now see not only Eastern Macedonia in the hands of the Bulgars, whom they expelled three years ago, but Northern Spira in the hands of the Italians. Following the landing of the Italian troops, the Greek civil officers were temporarily relieved of their functions and the telegraph wires were cut, but this damage was soon repaired. M. Pachtich, former Serbian premier, has gone to Chalk to pay his respects to King Peter.

GERMAN COMMENT ON ITALY'S DECLARATION. Berlin, Aug. 28.—Virtually all the morning papers with the notable exception of the "Vorwaerts" comment on Italy's declaration of war against the Germans. The Deutsche Zeitung declared that interest in such a declaration always has been exceptionally small in Germany, and now without question will continue so. The Morgen Post calls Italy's action an empty gesture intended to appear heroic, but actually tragic-comical and to be received with an indifferant shrug of the shoulders. The Kreuz Zeitung says Italy finally has given way to the pressure of "its masters."

Another Bremen Report. Berlin, Aug. 27.—According to the Cologne Gazette, as quoted by the Overseas News Agency, the German merchant submarine Bremen is now on her way to the United States with a cargo of dyes. Prices up 70 Per Cent, He Says, and Charges it to "Rapacity of Food Rings"—Resolutions to be Sent to Government. Speech by Ben Tillet. Many notables were present, but the speech of the afternoon was made by Ben Tillet, who recently received the thanks of General Haig and Lord French for invaluable services both in recruiting and stirring up munition workers. "Of the British armies of 5,000,000 men," he said, "460,000 come from the working classes. The proportion of men from the shipping class which have entered the navy is even greater. Yet while these men are risking their lives for the government, it allows their dependents to suffer privation on account of the prices of food which have risen seventy per cent, through the rapacity of the food rings. Soldiers have been shot for stealing food, but that is not a crime comparable to that of these millers, ship owners and monopolists, who are making enormous fortunes out of the hunger of others. The only remedy is that the government should order all food supplies and transport and administer them for the public benefit." Other speakers referred to the fact that the price of a four pound loaf will reach nineteen or twenty cents tomorrow, describing the rise as unreasonable. (Continued on page 3, sixth column.)

Taking up The Proposed Increase in Milk Price

Some 75 Kings County Farmers, in Session Here, Stand Out For Advance—Joint Session This Afternoon

About seventy-five farmers from Kings county arrived in the city this morning to take up the milk price question with local dealers. After some discussion at the Union Depot, it was decided to hold a meeting in the Palmer building, Princess street, this afternoon at two o'clock. L. C. Prime, speaking to a Times' reporter this morning said that he wishes citizens to know that he will not meet the producers from Kings county in any way, shape or form. He said he can supply the vast majority of local consumers with milk for eight cents a quart if they will appreciate the effort. He said he will continue to fight this combine as he is in a position to increase his supply at a very short notice. In addition to a large supply of milk, which he daily ships to Halifax, he says he has new equipment which will be able to go to points where he can collect larger supplies of milk. With this additional supply he can, he said, keep the price at eight cents despite the decision of the farmers. "I have anticipated this trouble," said Mr. Prime, "and I am in a position to cope with it before a large producer myself and having arranged for other sources of supplies. If the public stand behind me, I will give them a service which will give entire satisfaction and the milk will be of the highest quality."

MATTERS IN DISPUTE BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

Washington, Aug. 28.—(Toronto Globe)—Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary for external affairs in the Canadian government, has arrived in Washington to discuss with Secretary Lansing, the alleged refusal of the Canadian government to grant the right to American fishing vessels to get supplies at dominion points. It is understood that before the end of the week, W. A. Fould, Canadian superintendent of fisheries, will also come here to help settle the dispute. Reports so far are that the Canadian fisheries department has refused bait, ships' stores and supplies to American fishing vessels which take their catch to any port where it cannot be shipped over Canadian railroad lines. The object of the Canadian government is apparently to divert the whole fishing trade to the North Pacific into the hands of agents of the British government. At the British embassy it is said Sir Joseph Pope's mission is to take up several points with the American government, but what these are, other than the fishing dispute, is not yet disclosed.

MISS MABEL FINN IN WAR WORK. An interesting letter from an officer of the 11th Battalion reports a visit to Capt. George Keefe in hospital in England, also to Lieut. Arthur Finn. Both are progressing well. Lieut. Finn's sister, Miss Mabel Finn, formerly of St. John, has been given a commission in field comfort association work at Shorncliffe.

WHEAT DROPS AS ROUMANIA GOES INTO THE WAR

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 28.—September wheat dropped 3 1/2 cents in the local grain market today, on declaration of war by Italy and Roumania. December and May dropped two and one cent respectively. The market theory is that this means the opening of the Dardanelles at no distant date, letting Russian wheat into the world's markets. GERMANY HAS MADE ONE MORE BLUNDER. London, Aug. 27.—A Renter despatch from Stockholm says that a German prize crew which early this month took the Swedish steamship Temp, captured by German warships, into the Swedish port of Golland, owing to shortage of coal, has been ordered to quit the vessel. After long negotiations, the decision has been reached that the steamer and her cargo were not legitimate prizes.

THIRD EFFORT TO RESCUE MAROONED EXPLORERS. Buenos Ayres, Aug. 28.—Lieut. Ernest H. Shackleton, Antarctic explorer, left Punta Arenas, Chile, on Saturday on board the ship Yelcho to make a third attempt to rescue his expedition marooned on Elephant Island.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 28, via London.—A despatch received here from Strasbourg says Emperor William has accepted the resignation of Dr. Frenken, under secretary of state in the Alsace-Lorraine ministry.

GERMANY TO DECLARE WAR ON ROUMANIA AT ONCE; TURKS AND BULGARS NEXT

London, Aug. 28.—Germany probably will declare war on Rumania within twenty-four hours, after which Turkey and Bulgaria are expected to do likewise, says a despatch from the Hague to The Exchange Telegraph Company.

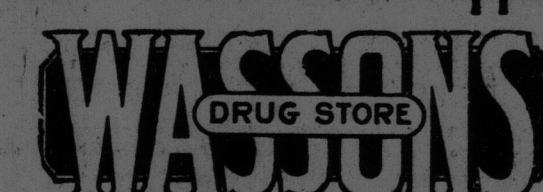



ATTACKED WITH ENEMY TO GET TO OWN LINES

Frenchman Speaking German Fluently Joined in Their Charge

A DARING ENTERPRISE

Recovering From Shock, Politely Dressed in German Uniform—Wounded by French Before He Was Recognized

Paris, Aug. 24—One of the most remarkable stories of the war is told by Corporal Marcel B., of the 1918 class, belonging to a French regiment d'élite, who, inside of the space of twenty-four hours, took part with his comrades in a successful charge and later with a Silesian battalion in a less successful counter-attack. He experienced two furious bombardments, first from the Germans and then from his own guns, and finally was wounded by a French bomb, while trying to approach an outlying French trench along a German communication trench. Corporal B., who is now in a hospital near Paris, lived with his parents in Munich for five years before the war. He only left there to undertake military service in the autumn of 1918. Badly wounded in the battle of the Marne, he rejoined his regiment in time for last year's Champagne offensive. He passed three months at Verdun and has been on the Somme front since the beginning of July.

"Last Thursday evening," he said, "my battalion was moved up to a point just beyond the road from Maurepas to Clery, with orders to assault the line of four German trenches opposite at dawn. Throughout the night it was impossible to sleep owing to the terrific din of French shells exploding over the enemy's position in a continuous roar.

"The first streaks of daylight showed a regular wall of black and white smoke stretching along before us. It was at rapid intervals by bright stabs of flame. Then the cannonade ceased with extraordinary suddenness, but the singing in my ears was so loud that I guessed rather than heard the order the lieutenant was shouting.

"I followed the rush forward, now stumbling in shell holes, now ripping

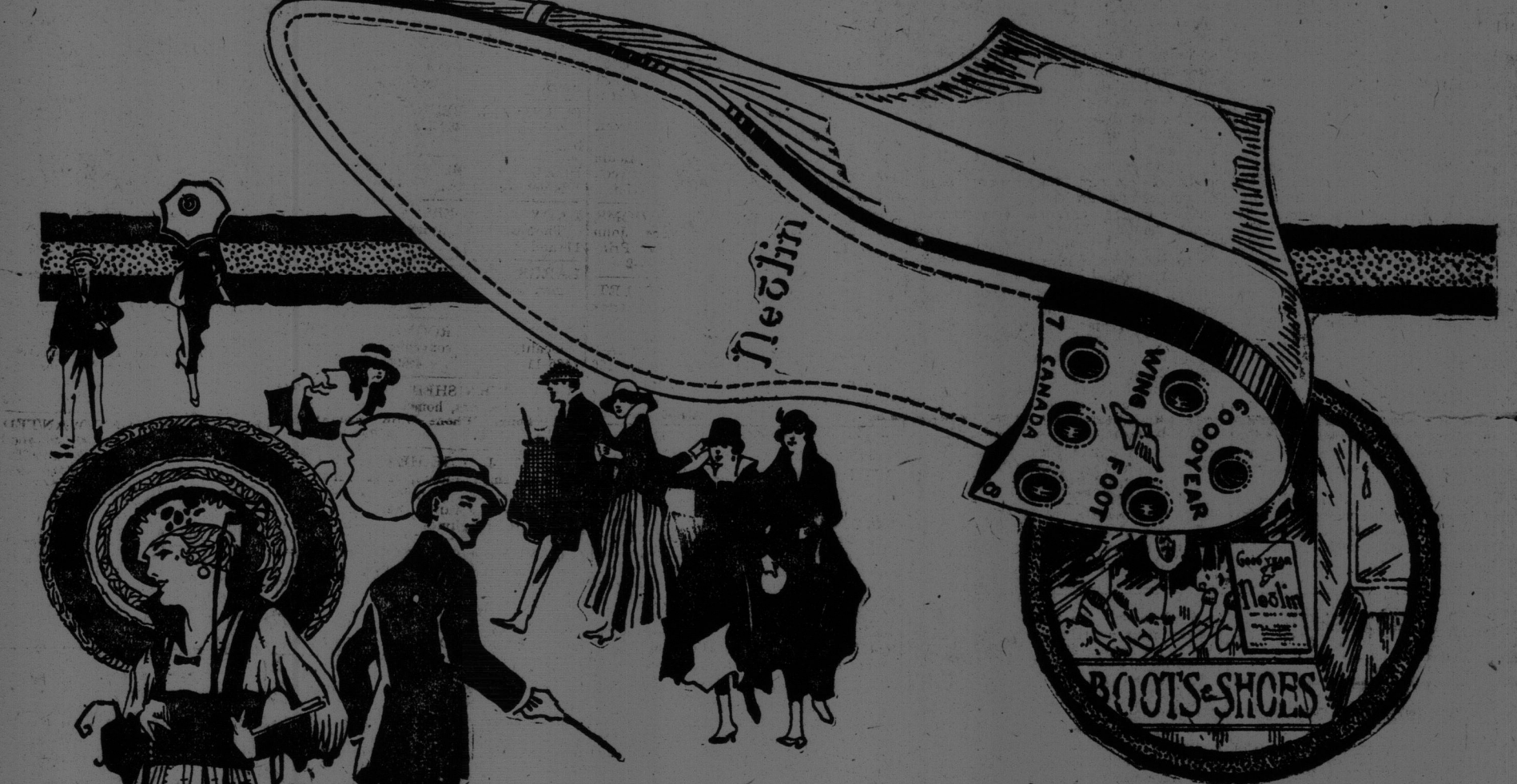




Photo shows kind hearted soldiers helping a wounded German prisoner towards the Red ambulance

BOY'S BRAVE ACT

Maurice Williams, Fully Dressed, Leaps Into River and Saves Friend

Royden Colter, aged twelve years, of Fredericton, had a narrow escape from death in the waters of the St. John River last week, when he was enjoying a swim at Public Landing. He got out over his head and suddenly he found himself in water fifteen feet deep. His cries were heard by little Maurice Williams of this city, who happened along the road. He jumped from the wharf and swam to his troubled friend. Colter was going down for the last time when Williams reached him. Trying to catch his breath he found it was too short and he was forced to reach beneath the water and catch his drowning friend around the neck. It was with great difficulty that Williams finally got Colter to the shore, and there it took two hours to bring him back to normal condition.

Williams is only thirteen years of age. He showed great bravery and pluck, and those who witnessed him rescue Colter from the water should be rewarded with a medal for diving into the water with all his clothes on to save a friend from death.

EVIDENCE TOMORROW IN CHINESE CASE

In the police court this morning fifteen Chinese, who were arrested in a raid on the premises of Lim Hong, in Mill street, last night were arraigned before the magistrate. The charge being the possession of an opium and gambling den in Mill street was read to Lim Hong. He pleaded not guilty. The charge of being inmates was read to the others and they all entered a plea of not guilty.

John A. Barry appeared in the interests of the Chinese. Two deposits, of \$150 each, were offered to be put up by two of the Chinese, but this was rejected by the court, as there were two charges in each case. One of the Chinese taken to police headquarters last night, is being detained as a witness.
