MORE EVIDENCE POINTING TO GERMAN PLOT

Lime-light on Man Charged With Setting La Touraine Fire

COMPROMISING LETTERS

Police Also Secure Photograph Showing Him in German Uniform—Some Belief That He Had Lived in Quebec

Paris, April 1.—The police say they have additional evidence to prove the pro-German sympathies of Raymond Swoboda, charged with setting fire to the steamer La Touraine. Five trunks of his were seized.

A villa which he occupied near Veres, also was searched and papers seized. The police say they included compromising letters and photographs showing Swoboda in German uniform.

M. Ragned, Swoboda's business associate, declared in an interview last night that he believed Swoboda was a Canadian, as he had excellent references from Quebec, where he said his family resided.

HEAVY FIGHTING ALL ALONG LINE IN WEST

In West Flanders, France and Alsace-Lorraine, Mighty Armies Again Are at Grips - Russians Make Enormous Captures of Prisoners

Paris, April 1.—There has been a renewal of heavy fighting all along the battlefield in West Flanders, France and Alsace-Lorraine. Despatches tell of furious attacks and counter attacks in Belgium, in the Champagne district, in the Argonne, along the heights of the Meuse and in Upper Alsace.

French and British armies are showing more activity than at any time since the war started. They have bombarded twenty cities, towns, railway junctions and army camps within the German lines during the past twenty-four hours and the aviators taking part in these aerial raids report that many Germans were killed.

A great amount of heavy French artillery has been transported across the Meuse at Commercy and an artillery duel between French and German guns is in progress between Villieu and Buzerulles in the Woerthe district.

The French say they have compelled the Germans to take up new artillery positions northeast of Verdun, out of range of the other forts.

Paris, April 1.—The French war office reports: "A struggle is going on at numerous points on the front. Opposite the town of Gompierre, to the southwest of Peronne we blew up successfully four mines. Near the farm of Le Choleira north of Berry-au-Bac, we blew up a mine ashead at the moment the Germans were at work on it and we followed up this by a storm of projectiles from our 75-centimetre guns. A German observation position disappeared in the gap caused by this explosion.

Belgian aviators during the night of March 30-31 bombarded the aviation camp at Handzama, and the railroad junction at Cortemarck.

Petrograd, April 1.—It is said by the War Office today that the Russian troops are winning all along the Carpathian front, and that the invasion of Hungary through Dukla Pass was progressing successfully. Russian officials admitted, however, that the Austro-German forces were still offering an obstinate resistance, and that earlier predictions of a general retreat on the part of the Teutonic troops were premature.

Anstrrian losses of the last two weeks in the Carpathians are officially estimated here at more than 45,000 men.

HAVANA REPORT READS AS IF JACK JOHNSON WILL HAVE HARD TIME OF IT

He Takes Willard Seriously While Latter and Friends Are Confident

Havana, April 1.—Arrangements have been completed for the selection of an alternate referee for the Johnson-Willard fight on next Monday. The principals and promoters have agreed to meet late today for the purpose, and unless there is an eleventh hour upset of their plans, they will select M. J. Hinkel of Cleveland. It will be his duty to sit at the ring-side ready to step in to relieve Referee Welch, in case the latter should be knocked out by a stray punch or sunstroke.

Willard and his followers are so confident of the victory of the challenger, that they have planned a triumphal entry into the United States of the "new champion," a few days after the battle.

Outwardly Johnson is all confidence, but in the privacy of his training quarters he views the fight seriously. This is something new in Johnson and causes many of his followers to believe that he looks for a hard match and that he appreciates the enormous physical proportions and powers of endurance which Willard possesses.

The Johnson-Willard fight is set for 12:30 Havana time, or 1 p. m. Eastern time, Monday.

THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Q.—What value of books in the hands of vendors at the close of the year?

Q.—What amount was due the province on the 31st of October, 1914?

A.—The value of books in the hands of vendors on the 31st of October, 1914, was \$16,282.08, but as the books are returned to the vendors, the amount due would only be for books sold and not returned for a statement, and as we do not receive a statement of books on hand from vendors who have not renounced, it would be impossible to give a definite statement as to the amount due, except we send out and check up the books. We are in the habit of doing this from time to time in all cases where vendors do not report within a reasonable time.

Q.—Have any amounts been written off as bad debts, if so, how much and upon whose accounts?

A.—No.

Q.—Does the government intend to insist that the St. John and Quebec Railway Company shall begin construction of the two end sections of the Valley Railway, via, from Rothsay to Centreville and from Centreville to Anderson, this spring or summer?

MUST MAKE OVER HALF TO FAMILIES

Order in Reference to Soldiers' Pay Went Into Effect Today

Beginning today the soldiers who have dependants drawing separation allowance will receive one half of their own pay direct, and the other half will be paid to their families. This applies to non-commissioned officers and men whose families are already receiving separation allowances from the government or who may do so in the future. The payment of 50 per cent had not received specific instructions today, but doubtless will be the next pay checks are issued.

This will have the effect of relieving the Patriotic Fund to a large extent, but until the families receive their share of the pay under the new arrangement no alteration will be made in the payments from the Patriotic Fund.

Checks for the semi-monthly allowance were mailed from the office of the Patriotic Fund last evening. The number totaled 408 and brought the average allowance per family for March to \$12.21.

The checks are issued on the first and fifteenth of each month.

Mr. Allen, the local secretary, has been notified that the C. P. R., the G. T. R., and the Dominion Express Company have decided to continue for at least three months the payment of half salaries, with a minimum of \$30 a month, to all members of their staff who have joined the forces.

Graft in Manitoba; Sensational Charge

Liberals Say Province Defrauded of \$800,000 in Construction of Parliament Buildings—Ask Governor Not Prorogue Till Royal Commission of Judges Appointed

Winnipeg, Man., April 1.—The twenty-one Liberal members of the legislature last night presented a memorial to Lieut.-Governor Cameron, praying him not to prorogue the legislature until provision had been made for a royal commission of three judges to inquire into all matters pertaining to the construction of the parliament buildings, and until such commission has reported to the legislature.

The memorial sets forth the Liberal contention as "that as a result of the 'limited inquiry,' held by the public accounts committee, it had been demonstrated that the province had been defrauded of more than \$800,000."

It was expected the legislature would prorogue yesterday, but at two o'clock this morning when the house adjourned until ten a.m., T. H. Johnson, Liberal, was speaking.

German Raid On England? Amsterdam Reports Great Activity in Air and Sea and Believes Threat Will Be Carried Out

New York, April 1.—A special to the London Daily Express and the New York Herald, from Amsterdam, says: During the last few days, the sky above Holland has been thick with German airships, aeroplanes, and hydro-aeroplanes, while the waters around Holland are swarmed with a cordon of war craft, as proved by reports from Dutch trawlers and fishing smacks, which have returned for the Easter holidays.

There is every indication that the recent German warning to sweep English Sunday was true. Germans are thought really to intend another creek like the Harlepool-Scarborough raid.

FRENCH STEAMER SUNK, 17 DROWNED

London, April 1.—A French steamer was torpedoed in the English Channel on Tuesday. The name has not yet been learned. Two members of her crew were saved, but it is feared that seventeen were drowned. The two survivors were brought into Dover today.

Later.

London, April 1.—It was the French steamer Emma, bound to Bordeaux which was torpedoed on Wednesday in the British Channel off Beachy Head by a German submarine. Nineteen members of her crew were drowned. Only two were saved. No warning of any kind was given. The ship foundered in three minutes from the time she was struck. A British destroyer subsequently picked up two men and also recovered two bodies.

RUSSIAN WARSHIPS WORK

Petrograd, April 1.—An official statement says: Fog in the region of the Bosphorus on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday prevented our warships from continuing the bombardment.

Our fleet has bombarded Zangidjik, Kozlu, Kilitlimi and Ereğli (on the Black Sea coast of Asia Minor) and destroyed the buildings which the Turks have erected in the vicinity of the Bosphorus. We also sank a steamer and captured after previous bombardment many colliers. In spite of a very sharp fusillade our aviators dropped bombs from seaplanes.

CAPTURE 16,000 AUSTRIANS

Petrograd, April 1.—An official note says: "During the period from March 20 to 29 the Russians in the Carpathians, in a sector occupied by three army corps, took as prisoners 202 officers, eight sergeants and 16,207 of the rank and file and captured sixty-two machine guns and ten guns."

TEN SUBMARINES IN CHANNEL

Madrid, April 1.—The Spanish steamer Augustia, at Santander from England, reports ten German submarines operating in the English Channel. U-22 stopped the Augustia, but released her after an examination of her papers.

TURKS MUSTER AT ADRIANOPLE

Sofia, Bulgaria, April 1.—A concentration of Turkish troops at Adrianople interpreted as a precautionary measure in the event of war with Bulgaria on Turkey, also in adding more artillery to the Adrianople fortifications.

UNIFICATION OF COMMERCIAL LAWS

Hon. Mr. Baxter Speaks in Legislature on Vote of \$250

Fredericton, N. B., April 1.—In discussing an item of \$250 in the estimates for uniformity of legislation Hon. Mr. Baxter said yesterday that it was the first contribution by any legislature in Canada towards the simplification and unification of commercial laws. This measure had been very strongly advocated by the Canadian Bar Association and by influential commercial organizations in the western provinces, where some progress in the direction of unification was being made.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that there was uniform law for all provinces for all government bills of exchange and commercial paper, and it was now sought to have identical laws governing other matters passed by the various legislatures, and then made by the dominion authority to apply to the whole of Canada.

The proposed appropriation would be used as part of a fund to retain highly expert counsel, who each year would take up laws of various provinces which were similar but not identical, and frame standard laws to be submitted to all legislatures. This would be of great benefit to business men.

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WULCAN AT GIBRALTER

Has Supplies For Relief of Jews in Palestine; Also For American Warships

London, April 1.—A Gibraltar despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that the American collier Vulcan which carries supplies for the relief of Jews in Palestine, and also for United States warships in Turkish waters, has arrived at Gibraltar.

WAR NOTES

General Sir Arthur Paget, head of a British military mission which recently was in Russia and visited the capital of the Balkan states after a special mission to arouse sympathy in favor of the allies, has arrived in Rome. The German authorities in Belgium are working an old law which holds each community responsible for damage done during public disturbances. Hostilities between Russian and Turkish forces in Persia have been resumed. The Turks lost 12,000 killed, wounded and prisoners, as well as many guns in a battle in which they were beaten on March 22. 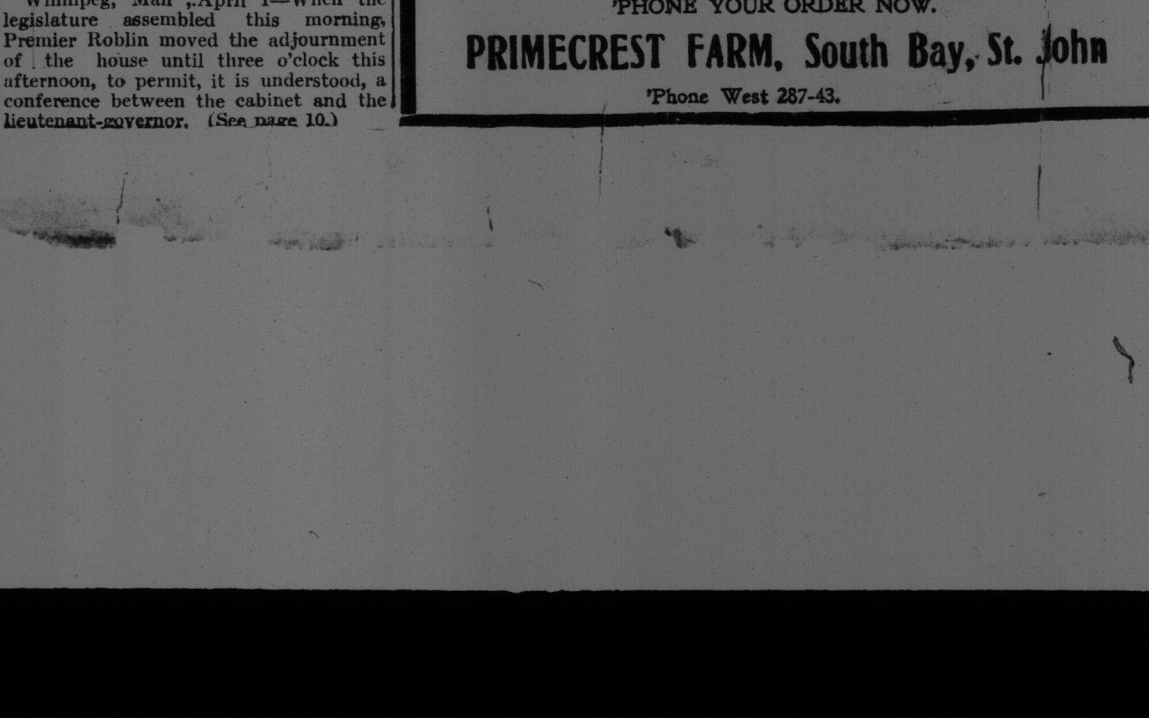

TAX EXEMPTION.

There are two outstanding facts in connection with yesterday's discussion at Fredericton of the St. John tax exemption bill. One was that the city commissioners should have appointed a taxation commission as provided for by the city charter, and the other was that if the business men of the city had pressed their views upon the commissioners as they did upon the members of the legislature yesterday, the journey to Fredericton would not have been necessary. The commissioners admitted that they might have appointed a taxation commission, but had failed to do so. The best that any of them could urge in support of the proposed exemption of incomes was that this would be an entering wedge. Com. Fotts saw, and he does not appear to have been quite alone in making the discovery, that the measure would be sure of a considerable degree of support from one class of the citizens, although there are very many workmen who fully realize that what would be taken off in taxes by the proposed bill would be put on again in the form of rent. The commission went to Fredericton and asked for class legislation. If we may judge from a remark made by the chairman of the legislative committee, the house will refuse its sanction to class legislation.

The agitation and action of the commissioners, or a majority of them, has been around in the case of prohibition in England than is found in the letter sent by King George through his private secretary to the Chancellor of the Exchequer. His Majesty notes the fact that it is largely due to drink that the government is unable to secure the output of war material that is needed in the horrors and burdens of the war are to be shortened. His Majesty therefore announces that he is prepared to abstain entirely from the use of alcoholic liquor himself, and to prohibit its consumption in the royal household. The cables from London tell us that the drink question at the present moment overshadows all others in the public mind, and while doubt is expressed that the government would be disposed to go the length of total prohibition, yet, if Chancellor Lloyd George makes up his mind that is the thing to do, the country in its present temper would probably follow him. This war is contributing very materially to the destruction of other evils than that of Prussian militarism.

UNIFORMITY OF LAW.

The Times recently reviewed the movement in favor of standard laws for the various provinces of Canada which is promoted by the Canadian Bar Association, and has received very strong support from commercial organizations in the western provinces. This movement is to have the support of the New Brunswick legislature, and the estimates include \$250 toward a fund to be raised to engage expert counsel to take laws of the different provinces which are similar, but not identical, and after studying them carefully, to frame standard laws which might be adopted by all the legislatures. A business man in New Brunswick having trade relations in the western provinces would be benefited if the laws affecting his business were the same there as here. Hon. Mr. Baxter, discussing the question in the house yesterday, instanced the compensation acts of the various provinces, and said that there was one case where it might be very desirable to have a uniform law in all the provinces. Child protection is another. The commercial organizations of the country realize the importance also of uniform laws governing industrial and commercial affairs, and the new movement will undoubtedly receive general support. A great deal of progress has been made in the United States in getting uniformity of state laws, and the value of the reform is very generally recognized.

The Liberals of Cumberland County have selected Mr. H. J. Logan ex-M. P. as their candidate in the next federal campaign. Mr. Logan was successful in the election campaigns of 1896, 1900 and 1904, and is personally very popular throughout Cumberland County. The convention which nominated him yesterday is described as the largest ever

Ottawa, March 31—Government operation of the entire eastern section of the National Transcontinental Railway from Moncton to Winnipeg was forecasted in the House today by a resolution introduced by a minister of railways and provided for the contingency which would arise if the G. T. F. refused to take over the lease of the road according to the original agreement.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES. The Liberals of Cumberland, N. S., at an enthusiastic convention yesterday nominated for the next federal election H. J. Logan, M. P., who was elected in 1900 and 1904 as their representative. 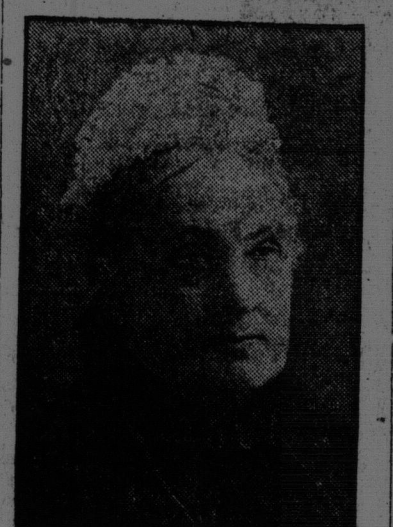

MEDICAL OFFICERS TO PAY FOR MISFEITS
Will be Held Responsible For Unfit Recruits Sent Overseas—\$125 For Each Man Rejected

Montreal, April 1.—Notification has been received by military commanding officers stating that in future any recruit taken on and subsequently found, on inspection in England, to be unfit, would be returned to this country at the expense of the officer who reported him as medically fit, including his passage both ways. This would mean an expense of about \$125 to the officer for each unfit man he passed. It would also mean that in future the medical officers, and commanding officers, will be even more careful than they have been during the last few weeks in passing men, so as to make sure that men accepted shall not only be fit for service physically, but in every other way.

CANADIAN FATHER AND SON IN SAME REGIMENT. THE FATHER IN KILLED

A brief telegram from Ottawa late on Saturday night told Miss Agnes Quinton, 15 Rockingham avenue, North Toronto, that the man she was engaged to be married to, Pte. E. Stanley, of the 4th Highlanders, had been killed in action. In spite of Stanley's reassuring letters which he had been sending frequently ever since he left Canada, Miss Quinton had worried greatly as to his safety, and the shock of his death was too much for her. Today she is confined to her bed in a collapse.

Another who will feel the shock of Pte. Stanley's death, is Pte. Irwin Stanley, the eighteen-year-old son of the dead man, who went with his father, in the same regiment to the front. Father and son enlisted together in the same company of the 4th Highlanders and were together continually all the time the contingent was at Valcartier and Salisbury Plain.

Pte. Stanley was a Canadian and had lived in Toronto for many years. He was forty-five years old and worked as a stonemason.

CANADA AND THE EMPIRE
A Talk on Trade Matters By Commissioner Wickes
London, April 1.—Addressing the London Chambers of Commerce on trade with the Dominion of Canada and the empire, Hamilton Wickes, trade commissioner, expressed the opinion that Canada knew the worst and was now moving forward to better things. He expected the harvest of 1915 would do a great deal to relieve the situation, but the relief would not be fully realized until 1916, hence the watchword for the immediate future should be one of caution. In comparing business methods, Mr. Wickes said the average Britisher was neither inquisitive nor acquisitive as regards available information, and while intensely self-reliant in some directions, he was strangely diffident in his powers in others. As a manufacturer the Britisher was without a peer; as a salesman he was without a knowledge of the markets or the science of selling as compared with his foreign neighbors. After explaining certain difficulties in connection with Canadian trade, Mr. Wickes offered general suggestions for improvement of overseas trade, amongst which were the organization of an intelligence department on a big scale and the registration of firms; also better co-operation between banker and manufacturers. A declaration against the enticement at the present time of skilled laborers to emigrate, which was to the detriment of home industries, was applauded.

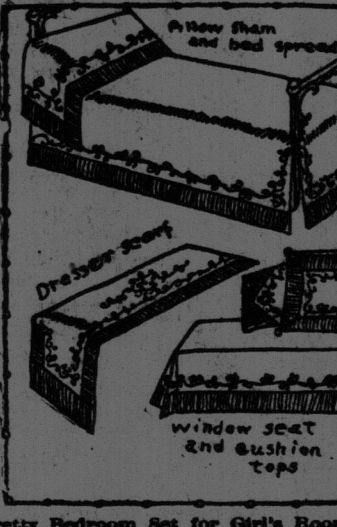

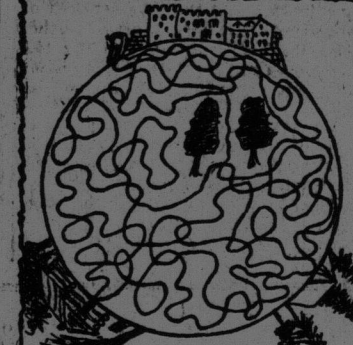

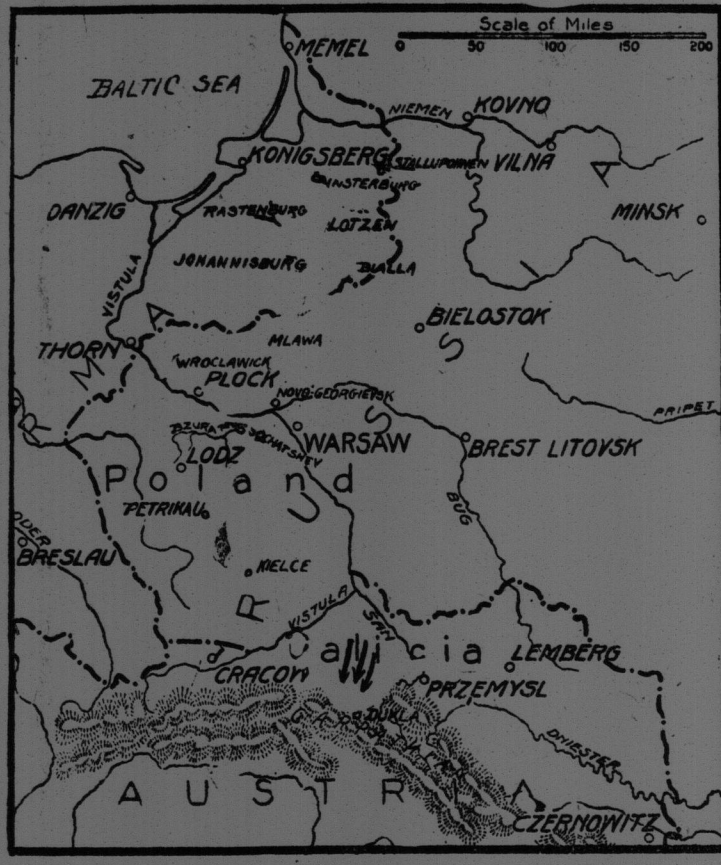

DRINK QUESTION CHIEF ONE OF MOMENT IN ENGLAND; KING READY TO HEAD REFORM

London, 10.35 p.m.—As the destroyers have been unable to round up the submarines operating on the British coast, shipowners have petitioned the government to be allowed to arm their ships.

The king, through his secretary, has sent a letter to the chancellor of the exchequer emphasizing the necessity of taking some action to stop excessive drinking, and has offered, if it is considered advisable, personally to give up the use of alcoholic liquor, and prohibit the use of it in the royal household.

The government has not yet reached any decision in the matter. In order to prevent further delay at the Liverpool docks, caused by the men refusing to work week-ends, it has been decided to incorporate the dockers in the army voluntarily, in which case they will receive both army and their regular pay.

The letter of Lord Stamfordham follows: "Dear Chancellor of the Exchequer: The king thanks you for so promptly letting him have a full report of the proceedings at yesterday's meeting of the deputation of employers. His majesty has read it with intense interest, but also with the deepest concern, and feels that nothing but the most vigorous measures will successfully cope with the grave situation now existing in our armament factories."

"We have before us the statements not merely of the employers but of the Admiralty and the war office, which are responsible for munitions of war and for the transport of troops and their food and ammunition. From this evidence it is, without doubt, largely due to drink that we are unable to secure the output of war material indispensable to meet the requirements of the army in the field, and that there has been such serious delay, in consequence of the necessary reinforcements of supplies to our gallant troops at the front."

"A continuance of such a state of things must inevitably result in the prolongation of the horrors and burdens of this terrible war. I am instructed to add that, if it is deemed advisable, the king will be prepared to set an example by giving up all alcoholic liquor himself, and by issuing orders against its consumption in the royal household, so far as his majesty is concerned, between the treatment of the rich and the poor in this question."

TAX EXEMPTION

Yesterday Afternoon's Proceedings in Fredericton — Some Labor Matters

Fredericton, March 31.—"I would make it a law that every man in the city of St. John should be compelled to make a sworn statement of his property, real and income."

This was the plain statement of W. Barnaby, of Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Ltd. of St. John, to the municipal committee of the legislature, which he addressed at some length this afternoon in opposition to the tax exemption bill sent by the city of St. John.

The matter will require long consideration, for there are the questions of compensation and the finding of employment for the thousands of men who would be thrown out of work.

At a meeting of the Glasgow liquor dealers it was decided to ask Mr. Lloyd George to receive a deputation from them which will suggest a drastic reduction in the hours for the sale of liquor.

King George has offered to give up the use of liquor and forbid it in the Royal Household if it is considered advisable.

MORNING NOTES OF THE WAR

Lord Derby announced in the English house yesterday that the stevedores and other dock workers in Liverpool were to be organized into a battalion, 2,000 strong, under military system, composed of union men for the purpose of facilitating the work of loading and unloading steamers at the docks.

The question of arming merchant steamers is now being considered by the Admiralty, though there is a reluctance to adopt the suggestion because the ships could then be sunk without notice by those on board.

The British cruiser Bristol has captured and taken to Falkland Islands the Norwegian steamer Bengor, from Baltimore, loaded with coal said to be destined for the German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm.

The smallest will on record at White Plains, N. Y., is that of Mrs. May Matland of Mt. Vernon, offered for probate there recently. It is written on a sheet torn from a pocket diary, two by three inches in size. It reads: "It is my wish that Olivia shall have everything I possess. May Matland." Olivia is the daughter.

London, March 31, 10.15 p. m.—The capacity of Great Britain in meeting the financial burdens imposed by the war is indicated in the treasury returns for the fiscal year just ended.

Under \$2,802,500,000, the war accounting for the entire \$1,767,800,000 increase. To meet this \$1,460,000,000 was raised by war loan issues. At the end of the year the balance in hand in the treasury amounted to \$417,204,760.

RUSSIANS SEEK RAILWAY HEADS

Fighting For the Possession Of Lines in Hungary

VIOLENT BATTLES RAGING

Czar's Troops Advancing at All Points Except the Extreme East - Quiet in the North

London, March 31.—The battles for the Carpathian passes continue with extreme violence, this being the only region where, for the moment, fighting on a large scale is taking place. The Russians, who recently regained possession of Dukla Pass, are pushing their way toward Barfield on one side and Srednik on the other, where, if they achieve their object, they will have in their possession the heads of the railroads running southward into Hungary.

Knows Little About War

"Now about the progress of the war. Everyone I write to makes the same complaint. I don't tell them enough of what is going on. What do I know? Nix. On our particular front it is generally raining. It is, therefore, pretty safe to assume that it is also raining on other particular fronts. On our particular front we (and they) are generally chucking shells about, and our snipers (and theirs) are generally busy. Sometimes our particular front becomes a bit noisier than other fronts, and things resolve themselves into a mass of grey-uniformed, yelling maniacs, with saw-backed bayonets fixed on Mauser rifles, and next morning's official communiqué tells the same old familiar tale. 'An attack on a section of our position was repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.' But the horrible thing about it is that the dead lie there; also those poor souls who are too badly wounded to crawl back without any enlarging on this sordid point your imagination can bring something to you of the horrors of 'no man's land' between the trenches.

German Tactics Puzzling

"Anyhow, you can gather from this that the British army has for its present policy the strictly defensive. Later on when the ground is firmer and a gun can be moved without the aid of more than twenty horses we will get a more puzzle is why the Germans never gain anything and always retreat heavily. Our only conjecture is that they have adopted this manner of completing the training of new units by the ordeal of fire—and even that suggestion seems a bit far-fetched."

That Germany will take Paris - 25 to 1 against. That Germany will take Warsaw - 5 to 1 against.

Prohibition In Province While The War Lasts

Premier Clarke Said Today That Government Had Matter Under Consideration

There is a possibility that the province of New Brunswick may be required to do without intoxicants for the duration of the war.

In reply to an inquiry by long distance telephone this afternoon, Premier Clarke informed the Times that the provincial government has the matter under consideration, and that a decision on the subject may be announced before long.

It is understood that the action of the imperial government in intimating that prohibition may be enforced in the British Isles has had something to do with the discussion of the question by the provincial government, and that their decision may be affected by the final attitude of the British government.

Between fifteen and twenty years ago a plebiscite on total prohibition was taken throughout the dominion. At that time New Brunswick went on record in favor of prohibition by a large majority, but no further action was taken.

The fact that many counties in New Brunswick are already under the Scott Act would simplify the problem before the government, and it is understood that the attitude of St. John in the matter might be one of the largest factors to be taken into consideration.

STRUCK BY TRAIN AT GILBERT'S LANE

Alexander Adams Has Close Call at Crossing—Engineer on Alert

Alexander Adams, a well known resident of Gilbert's Lane met with a serious accident this morning when he was struck by a train and as a result sustained a deep laceration of the side of the head, in addition to injuries about the body which will confine him to his home for some time. He was about to cross the I. C. R. tracks at Gilbert's Lane and in passing a large quantity of earth near the approach did not notice a shunting engine coming along. Fortunately the engineer noticed the head above the top of dirt and, after shouting a warning about the brakes.

As Mr. Adams stepped on the track he was struck by a glancing blow which knocked him to the ground with considerable force. He was carried to his home for some time, but not far from Dr. A. E. Macaulay's residence. The latter said that although the wound on the side of the head was serious, the skull had not been fractured.

NO GLASS LEGISLATION

A Straight Tip to St. John Delegations From Chairman of Municipalities Committee

After the various delegations dealing with the John tax exemption bill had been heard by the committee of the legislature yesterday, Donald Munro, M. P., chairman of the committee, said that it appeared from the discussion that if the citizens of St. John had discussed the matter among themselves they might have arrived at a solution. They might have agreed to adopt the Montreal system under which the laborer did not have to pay a poll tax. One thing the committee would not do—it would not pass class legislation. 
