THE COOK-STOVE BLOWS UP

Several Cases, Serious Too, In Recent Cold Snap (Moncton Transcript.)

(Moneton Transcript.)

An explosion occurred this morning at the residence of Manly Renton, I. C. R. locomotive engineer, Dominion street. A frozen "water-front" was responsible for the trouble. The family was in the kitchen when suddenly the big steel range exploded, fragments of iron and steel flying in all directions. Mrs. Renton, who was nearest the stove, received the full force of the explosion and was quite painfully injured, having her head cut by a piece of flying steel and sustaining some slight burns. Mr. Renton, who had been sitting on a chair, had risen to his feet and was standing up when the smash occurred. A piece of iron was driven through the chair on which he had been sitting a minute before!

John H. Wilson, of The Transcript staff, was quite seriously injured, this morning, by an explosion of a frozen water pipe in the kitchen stove. He had lighted the fire, as usual, and before leaving for the office, went into the kitchen to see that everything was all right. He scarcely entered the kitchen, when the whole front of the stove blew out, several of the pieces struck him over the two eyes and also on his arm. He temporarily lost the sight of one eye and the other is slightly affected, and his right arm is badly burned for about five inches, and he was otherwise scorched, his face and forehead slightly injured also. The burning ashes thrown out of the stove set fire to some of the furnishings of the kitchen. His hat was blown off his head.

The water during the night had frozen, and when the fire was kindled an explosion occurred. Besides shattering the range, one of the kitchen windows was demolished, the chimney destroyed, a piece of the stove was blown through the ceiling, the panels of a door smashed, shelves were knocked from the walls and the interior of the kitchen was almost completely wrecked. Luckily none of the people were injured, although they were somewhat affected by the shock. So badly was the range shattered that the remnants were gathered up in a barrel and hauled away. 

Boston Cookies. Cream one cup of butter, add 11ups sugar, three beaten eggs, half cu of seeded raisins, half cup of currants and one cup chopped English walnuts Now add four tablespoons hot water in which one teaspoon of soda has been dissolved, add 81-4 cups sifted flour and one teaspoon of cinnamon. Drop from spoon on buttered tins and bake. Be careful not to make the cookles to large.

CHURCHES NEED ROUSING

Says Congregations are Radiant Only When Sermons End.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16—Novel and entertaining features to brighten the customary formal church services are needed to interest the modern congregation, said Rev. John McNeill, of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Torontohere before the Midwinter International Bible Conference.

"Most church congregations of today," said Dr. McNeill, "are comprised of people whin need awakening from the dead. The only time during a sermon when a person's face is at all radiant is when the sermon ends."

Chief White Cloud, recently appointed head of 2,800 Dakota Indians, is a wonderful linguist, being able to speak nine foreign languages and fourteen Indian dialerts. He is a college graduate and has been a school teacher.

Put 1 pint flour into a bowl, rub into it 2 ounces butter, add half teaspoon salt and one heaping teaspoon baking powder; mix and add sufficient milk to make a moist dough; knead ightly and quickly roll out into a sheet half inch thick. Cut into biscuits about the size of the top of the cups to be used. Put a half of a preserved or canned peach in the bottom of the cup, on top of that one teaspoon some kind of jelly, then on top of this stand your little biscuit of dough. Place these cups in a steamer and steam for fifteen minutes, then run them into a quick oven for about five minutes to glaze. Serve hot in the cups with hard sauce.
