

SHEEP HUSBANDRY
Prof. H. S. Arkell, who is well known in Prof. H. S. Arkell, who is well known in this province, and who has familiarized himself with agricultural conditions in the maritime provinces, makes a striking reference to the opportunities for sheep husbandry. It appears in a special article on the future of the sheep industry in Canada, contributed to the Christmas issue of the Farmer's Advocate. Prof Arkell says:

"Upon anyone who has travelled in the partitine provinces there must have been the savings banks was published yesterday. It goes only to the close of last year. 


