


Nova-Scotia Calendar for 1890.

The Tenth Year of the Reign of His Majesty GEORGE IV



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Mercury is so near the Sun, that it cannot often be seen. It is visible at the time of its greatest Elongation, when it may be about 13 hours before or behind the Sun, being a morning star from the Inferior to the Superior Conjunction, and an evening star from the Superior to the Inferior Conjunction.

Moon's Place.—When the Moon is in the summer signs, viz:— γ , δ , η , θ , ι , and κ , it is more than 12 hours above the horizon, and consequently gives more light than it can while it is in the winter signs, when it shines less than twelve hours in the twenty four.

The influence of the Moon upon vegetation is not now much thought of, but is well known that light is as necessary to plants as heat; grass which grows in the shade, appears to be composed mostly of water, not making half as much hay as that which grows exposed to the sun; nor is it unreasonable to suppose that plants which have moonlight at their first coming up, may have more substantial leaves than those which have dark nights at their first coming up, and may, on that account, be more hardy, and more capable of supporting the inclemency of the season.

Prognostics of the weather.—Sir Humphrey Davy states the following facts. Red clouds, or red tinged with purple, in the west at sunset, portend fine weather, because they show that the air is dry, for the air when dry refracts more red rays. The most certain indication of wet weather is the halo or circle around the moon, which is produced by water, and the larger the circle, the nearer the clouds are to us. Rainbows are always in clouds opposite the sun; and in climates where rains are usually brought by west wind, if a rainbow appears in the west it indicates that the rain is coming, but if it appears in the east, it proves that the rain is passing away. The old proverb is often correct:—"A rainbow in the morning," &c.—When swallows fly high, fine weather may be expected; when they fly near the ground, rain is approaching. They are in pursuit of flies and gnats, which delight in warm air; warm air is moister and lighter than cold air, and when the warm and moist air is near the ground, the cold air flows down into it and produces rain, but when the warm air is high, there is less chance of its mixing with cold air, and throwing down moisture.

For the Bowel Complaint.—Take from a gill to a gill and a half of molasses, mixed with a half a glass of Rum or Brandy, at a draught. Children above four years old may take a quantity in proportion to their age. This will generally succeed, if taken the first or second day. They who have long had the complaint, should use a Decoction of Logwood and live upon very fat broth and toasted Bread. Children from one to three years old should not have this complaint checked, until it has continued 24 hours, unless it is very violent or attended with vomiting, after this time has elapsed, give a drink made by boiling the twigs of oak till the liquor tastes as rough as strong tea, mixed with an equal quantity of milk, in which the powder of bones burnt white has been boiled; it may be sweetened. If they have had the Complaint a long time and their common food brings it on after it is checked, feed them if you can, upon broth made from very fat mutton or beef, seasoned only with salt, and bread toasted and crumbled fine.

To raise cabbage plants.—Choose a situation that is shaded in the afternoon—the insect that destroys them will not sit on damp ground. Sow as early as you can work the ground; make the bed very fine and leave no chips or stones that will be quickly dry on the surface, as they would be occupied by the insects. If you must sow in an open situation, sprinkle a pint of fine salt on a bed, 12 feet long, after your seed is raked in, and water your plants at their first coming up for 4 or 5 days so frequently that the top of the ground may never appear dry. Do not plant Cabbage often in the same ground—the worm which makes it club-footed or turnip-rooted will soon occupy the ground and continue there, as it never becomes a winged insect, like the maggot which eats the roots early in the season. The injury done to Cabbage by the maggot may be in a great measure prevented by watering with a mixture of 5 parts of water, and one of brine in which fish or flesh have been pickled; a pint should be given to each plant within a week after they are transplanted, and the watering repeated the next week. The maggot is produced by a fly which deposits its eggs about the roots of the plants the first warm evenings in June and thenceforward; the salt prevents them from hatching.

 The first will be of the Sun February 28d at 9h. 23m. in the morning, not visible in this Province.

The second of the Moon March 9th, at 10h. 10m. in the morning, invisible here.

The third of the Sun March 24th, at 10h. 30m. in the morning, invisible here.

The fourth of the Sun August 18th, at 7h. 39m. in the morning, invisible here.

The fifth of the Moon September 2d. partly visible.

 Ecliptic conjunction 6h. 28m.

Venus will be the Evening star until the seventh of March; from that time morning star to the twentieth of December.

The Sun's Declination is for Noon at the Meridian of Greenwich, consequently it is the declination for 7h. 46m. in the morning at Halifax.

Married Life.—Connubial happiness is of too fine a texture to be roughly handled. It is a delicate flower which indifference will chill, and suspicion blast. It is a sensitive plant, which will not even bear the touch of unkindness. It must be watered with showers of tenderest affection, expanded with the glow of attention, and guarded by the impregnable barrier of unshaken confidence. It must be kept ensouled by the hand of carelessness, unobscured by selfishness, unconjunctured by neglect. Thus nurtured it will bloom with fragrance in every season of life, and soften the pillow of declining years.

Improvement of Candles.—Steep the cotton wick in lime-water, in which has been dissolved a considerable quantity of nitrate of potassa (chlorate of potassa answers still better, but is too expensive for common practice); and, by these means, a purer flame and superior light is secured, a more perfect combustion is ensured, snuffing is rendered nearly as superfluous as in wax candles, and the candles thus treated do not "run." The wicks must be thoroughly dry before the tallow is put to them.

Hutton the great geometrician was a Coal heaver. Haddart the machinist and mathematician was a shoemaker. Adams and William H. Crawford spent the first years of manhood in "teaching the young idea how to shoot," and Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, and Martin Van Buren spring from poverty.

Best White Wash.—Into a common barrel half full of white wash, put one ounce of sulphuric acid largely diluted with water, stir them together, then apply them to any wood work as common white wash is applied. This coating is an artificial gypsum or plaster of Paris. The coating thus formed is whiter, harder, more adhesive and very little more expensive than common white wash. It forms a better protection of wood from fire than common white wash.

Putrid sore Throat.—They who attend Children in this dangerous disease, should take care to change their clothes before they enter another house where there are children; there is good reason for believing that persons who have neglected this precaution, have communicated the infection after travelling fifty miles.

Timber for Wharves.—The Charleston Courier suggests to those whose business it is to superintend the repairs of wharves, that Poplar timber resists the attack of the worm in a greater degree than any other description, except the Palmetto. An instance is mentioned of a large log of poplar, which had lain for some years in a salt water mill pond, and was found to have entirely escaped injury from the worm, while other kinds of wood in the same water were entirely destroyed by it.

Recipe for the Stone and Gravel.—Take a large handful of the fibrous roots of garden leeks—put thereto two quarts of soft water; let them be very close covered,—simmer gently over the fire till reduced to one,—then strain it off, and drink a pint in the course of the day, properly divided. This is a sufficient quantity for any adult. Children must be managed according to their age. It must be used for many months to carry off the gravel and dilute the stone,

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W. From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please. Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outer most one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E. When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger. When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island. When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15. In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach. There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point. Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

New Light House.—As the Light House on the Tower at the west end of Manger's Beach, at the entrance of Halifax Harbour, is intended only to lead vessels up the harbour, the greater part of the eastern side will be darkened, viz—*from N. E. by N. to S. half E.*—The following directions published by the Commissioners of Light Houses should be attended to:—"Vessels coming from the Eastward must keep Sambro Light open to the southward of Chebucto Head, and until the Light opens on Manger's beach, which will then bear N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.—they will then be to the westward of Thrum Cap Shoals, and may shape a course up the harbour, always keeping the Light on the Beach open, and on the starboard bow. Vessels coming from the westward will see this Light when they are as far to the eastward as Chebucto Head, by keeping it open, and on the starboard bow, it will lead them up to the beach. This Light will appear of a red colour, which will distinguish it from any other on the coast. It is fifty eight feet high from the level of the sea."
