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



GALE SWEEPS COAST

Yesterday's Storm Worst in Recent Years and Damage is Heavy

New Breakwater at Dipper Harbor Torn from Foundations and, It is Feared, Will Be Totally Destroyed --- Seas Running at Great Height in Bay and Vessels May Be Suffering---City Streets in Terrible Condition.

St. John yesterday suffered about the worst weather in the memory of the proverbial oldest inhabitant. By no means was the storm confined to the city but reports are coming in from all over the province of heavy damage by wind and storm, approaching the havoc wrought by the famous Saxby gale. 


