The Presidential Election.
There is the least doubt about the result of the Presidential election that takes place in the United States tomorrow that has been felt over an election of the kind for many years. Every body and his wife know that Gen. Grant will be the chosen ruler. And yet there is a feeling of doubt and hesitancy about the result, just as though the ghost of a chance for success remained. After the victory the Grant party will fire guns, burn bonfires, and rejoice with as much joy as if defeat had been among the possibilities. These peculiarities are ways displayed in these electoral contests. In Maine, Pennsylvania and other States where the result has been indicated by the elections that have been held for State officers, the force of a great contest will be played from the rising of tomorrow's sun to the going down of the evening star. The same apparent reason for this if the President were chosen by a popular vote, which is not the case, and it must be merely for the love of electoral warfare that the forms of war are gone through with when there is no war to be fought, and victories celebrated when there has been no enemy to overthrow. In Great Britain and Canada candidates who are known to have majorities at their backs are usually allowed to walk the course. In the United States the strength of parties, and the chances of candidates properly named, are as accurately calculated in advance than in any other country, and yet no man can be elected without a contest. In districts where one party has nine-tenths of the electors the other still will put a candidate in the field and go to work as enthusiastically as though they expected to elect him. This is one of the peculiar phenomena of the American Republic.
The President is not elected by a majority of the people, nor by a majority of the States, but by electors chosen by each State. It is possible for a minority of the people, as a majority of one vote in any State is as effectual in determining the influence of that State on the selection of the President, as would be the unanimous voice of its people. Neither the candidacy of Gen. Grant nor of Hon. Woodrow Wilson in advance than the people, as a majority in any official record, nor appear on any of the ballots thrown tomorrow. The law and the voters know only the Presidential electors, on whose pledges to vote for or that candidate they are forced to rely. A majority of the Electoral College will elect the President. In other words, they betray the confidence reposed in them, and give the Presidency to any man qualified by birth in the country and the required age to fill the chair, and their action would be legal. A portion of the Grant electors could unite with those of Woodrow Wilson, the philosopher of the White Hat in the White House, and nothing could be done about it. Neither course will, probably, be taken by the electors to be chosen tomorrow, and Gen. Grant will be President for four years more.
Even the *Chronicle*, that sees the evil influence of "Zupper" in all things, now says: "Intellectually and artistically Halifax is waking up out of the slumber of total indifference which has so long weighed it down. It cannot escape the most casual observer that there are decided signs of life in the city, as yet, circumscribed literary and musical circles of the city, and that money-making and money-hoarding are no longer the only things worthy of public attention."
The Conservative party is gaining strength in England. The management of the Alabama settlement, was by the means satisfactory, and much fault is found with the Ballot and Licensing Acts. The working of the clumsy electoral machinery at the elections last week was unsatisfactory, and the process will doubtless be simplified at the next session of Parliament.

NOTES AND NEWS.
Halifax seems to offer peculiar facilities to sailors who desire to desert. Three appeared from H. M. S. "Royal Alfred" last week.
Nova Scotia Indians have begun to operate as road agents. Two of them relieved Mr. Totten of his purse at Folly River Bridge, on the I. C. R. R., last week.
A Halifax paper contains an advertisement of parcels suitable for picnics. The idea and parcels at this season may agree with the climate of Halifax, but are not popular in this region.
At Toronto, on Friday, Frank Mills, aged 17 years, was found guilty of manslaughter. He stabbed and killed Bailey, aged 15 years, in a furious manner, the cause being jealousy of Bailey's winning the affection of a school girl of 15.
About a dozen men have fallen overboard from various wharves in Halifax during the past week, but all escaped with a ducking, except Edward Morrison, a man 70 years of age, who fell overboard and was drowned during Thursday night and was drowned.
Gen. Eaton, U. S. Commissioner of Education, has requested the various State and local Superintendents of Education to meet in Washington on the 13th inst. for devising the best plan for representing the American system of education at the Vienna Exposition in 1873.
London advice of Saturday reports that Lowe and Gladstone oppose raising money to meet the payments under the Guvra award by John, and probably exchequer bonds will be used as a compromise part of the fifteen millions, so as to spread the payments over a considerable period.

THE MISSOURI HORROR.
HARROWING DETAILS OF THE DISASTER FROM SERVITORS AT KEY WEST.
Key West, Oct. 31.—The following particulars of the burning of the steamship "Missouri" have been obtained from the survivors who have arrived here. When the boat which was saved left the burning ship, one boat had two men on it. The rescued boat lay for two hours by a swampy bank containing nine men, including engineers, firemen and the ship's barber. A bucket was given to the survivors of the rescued boat, and they were ordered to be on the alert. As there were no men in the swampy bank, they were unable to properly manage it, and in this condition they were left. It is not likely any of them were saved. No sails had been seen for two days previous to the first. On that day the "Missouri" was in company with a ship from 9.15 a. m. until 3 p. m., when she was lost sight of. Convicted by Interpretation.
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NOVA SCOTIA SKIPPER RISES TO RETURN THANKS.
The Tribune office was this morning honored by a visit from the "Nova Scotia Skipper" whose pointed arguments were published in a recent communication. The Skipper, with a tranquil smile, explained that the object of his visit was to return thanks for the justice with which he had been treated by the paper, and was warm in his praise of the ability and fairness so characteristic of its course. He did not object to have the wrong doing of Nova Scotians hidden, but he objected to what he considered the inhumanities of the press in continually placing the Nova Scotia Skipper in the position of reeling drunk about the docks, sleeping on the sidewalks quarrelling, conducting themselves as thieves, liars, out-throats, vagabonds, vagrants, gawdies, or criminals of any description. They should not be made scapegoats, as it led strangers to believe they were unwholesome birds, and this for his country's honor he did not desire. These were his sentiments and we cheerfully give them publicity.

CONVICTS BY INTERPRETATION.
At the City Police Court this morning, Capt. Nicol Reminstein, of the barque "Colporteur," Norway, charged an articulate seaman, named Christopher Larsson, with desertion. The prisoner, when asked what he had to say, replied in the tongue of his native land that he could not understand, and it was only by the aid of the captain, acting as interpreter, that the deceiver was tried, found guilty and sent to gaol until the ship is ready for sea.

How Farmers are Robbed. A case came up in the Supreme Court of Maine a few days since which is only one, perhaps, of a hundred that are ever brought before a tribunal of justice. A set of sharpers living in the larger cities of the country, send a letter to some well-to-do farmer, or trader, informing him that they are manufacturers of certain agricultural implements such as mowers and reapers, horse rakes, &c. They have been informed, person addressed in a responsible man, who they desire to appoint him their agent, but in order to protect themselves, they must have a small sum of money advanced as a pledge of good faith; however, a note for four months endorsed by some responsible party will do as well. The person addressed is dazzled by the handsome commission of twenty per cent offered on sales and accepts the terms. The note is taken and immediately discarded, the "agent" never sends a reaper or horse rake but he does soon see the bank's notice that his note for such an amount will fall due on such a date.

The report of the discharge of Chief of Police McWilliams and Detective Doyle, on trial for conspiring with the burglars for the robbery of Jersey City Bank, was incorrect. The jury disagreed, and a new trial will be had.

The railway accident at Monmouth Junction, New Jersey, on Thursday night, was due to carelessness in telegraphing as to the running of trains. The engineer on one train did not give signals for brakes, though in full view of the approaching train, and it was miraculous that a right-of-way loss did not occur. No physician was near to aid the wounded, whose sufferings were for a while dreadful. Joseph Ames, the well known artist, was killed. The Governor Merrill, of New Jersey, was buried in the ruins and came near being killed. Tyndall, the engineer, and Quinn the fireman, were killed, leaving large families.

DEATH IN COURT. While Court was being held in District, a Paris of the county of Cork near Bantry, Ireland, the floor of the room gave way, precipitating 200 persons twelve feet below. Several were instantly killed and 40 were injured, some fatally.

The inquiry into the recent Eastern Railroad disaster at Southbrook resulted in finding that the switch was changed by some unknown person, and exonerating the company and its employees from all blame.

At a meeting of the Directors of the European and North American Railroad Company of Maine, held at Bangor, the terms of consolidation with the European and North American Railway Company of New Brunswick for Extension Westward were signed, subject to the ratification of stockholders. The new company will be known as the European and North American consolidated Railroad Company.

London, Nov. 2. Councils 92. John Francis Maguire, the Irish member of Parliament for Cork, and editor of the Cork Examiner, died last night, aged 57.

The Municipal elections throughout England yesterday resulted in heavy Conservative gains, which are attributed to the passage and enforcement of the Licensing Act.

London, Nov. 3. There have been four consecutive days of rain in Great Britain.

The mass meeting at Hyde Park to day in favor of amnesty for Fenians was very large and orderly. There was no attempt by the authorities to interfere. Speeches were made and resolutions adopted demanding the release of the prisoners.

The horse disease has appeared in several places in Devonshire. It is especially severe in Triverton and vicinity.

There has been a serious riot between the population and the gendarmes at Besençon, France.

France threatens to resort to warlike measures toward Hayti unless the just claims of French citizens are paid.

It is reported that the German Ambassador at Paris demands that Gen. Ducrot's army order, in which he speaks bitterly of the Germans, be disavowed.

Late advices from Khiva report that the Khan has built a fort at Djarkik, where he will resist the Russian army. He still refuses to surrender the Russians held as prisoners. The Emperor of China was married Oct. 16th.

New York, Nov. 4. Barques "F. Halbrook" and "Clara Lamb" have been destroyed by fire at St. Thomas.

It is expected that all the horse cars in this city will run to day.

Indians in Guatemala attacked Jalapa, but were defeated and pursued by troops.

MURDER OF A GIRL. Concord, N. H., Nov. 3. The body of a girl named Day, who has been missing in Northwood since last week, was found last night. Franklin B. Evans, who was arrested on suspicion of having been concerned in her disappearance, acknowledged a sheriff to whom near by and pointed out a spot where the body was buried under a stump. An inquest is being held to-day, and it is probable that Evans will make a confession of the deed. The girl was about 13 years of age. Great excitement prevails in the village over the affair.
