Mr. Ogilvie 'asked the chairman to rule if this resolution was in order, when a former Building Committee had not reported and was still in existence.

Moved by Mr. Andrew Leitch, seconded by Mr J. A. McNicol, that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered Miss Maggie Laird and Miss Annie Munro for their services as choir leader and organist respectively in the Mission School.—Carried.

A communication was read by the chairman from Miss Mary Allan asking that remuneration to the extent of \$150.00 a year be allowed her as soprano soloist in the choir.

FIFTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Managing Committee of Knox Church

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1893.

It is with great pleasure that your Managing Board present the Fiftieth Annual Report, shewing the entire property to be free from debt. It is particularly gratifying to have this state of affairs in this, our Jubilee Year.

We would respectfully draw the attention of the congregation to the fact that the envelope system of raising revenue is yielding less income year by year. example: in the first full year of Dr. Fraser's pastorate the average envelope contribution per communicant was a little over 17 cents, while for the past year it was less than II cents. For this state of affairs we account partly by many of the younger members of our families failing to become contributors when they grow up, and by some who join by certificate neglecting to apply for sittings and getting envelopes, and thus becoming regular subscribers. The loose collections for 1886 were \$1,070.51, as against \$907.03 this year. The number of envelope subscribers for this year was 460, as against 464 last year. The average per Sunday was \$103.20, as against \$104.89 last year. The arrears at the close of the year were \$310.75.

We would suggest that notice be given to the managers by any member who is about to leave the church so that the seats may be allocated to others at once, and thus avoid having such seats unoccupied for months as is sometimes the case.

The managers whose term expires this year are Messrs. Dixon, McLaren and Gillespie.

FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

___OF___

KNOX CHURCH SABBATH SCHOOL

For the Year Ending December 31st, 1893.

We are pleased to report to the congregation that our work has continued to progress favorably through the year. Our teachers have been faithful in their attendance—very few having been absent without either providing substitutes, or notifying the Superintendent before hand.

Our scholars have manifested unusual interest, as shown by their regular attendance, good order, attention and by their splendid liberality, as proved by the Treasurer's report, \$941.50 having been raised in the school during the past year: an average of \$17.94 per Sunday for the fifty-three Sundays of the year. Our attendance has fallen off slightly owing to the removal from the city of a number of our families, the decrease being 17. Our average attendance is 443, or a decrease of 25. The small average is largely owing to the fact that each year more are taking advantage of the holiday season, and for two months our school was a very small one indeed.

After paying for our Sunday School papers, and all other expenses in connection with the school, we have raised and allocated for Missions \$330.41. We have also added to our building fund \$618.08, as will be seen by the Treasurer's statement; the amount now held by the Sunday School, contributed by itself for this fund, is \$1335.38.

We regret to say that during the year four of our members have passed away: Miss Gracie Webster, of Miss McGregor's class; Mr. Wm. Gilchrist, of the Young Men's Bible Class; Winnie Simpson and Ernest Shaver, of the Infant Class.

There are on the roll at the present time 219 scholars and 29 teachers and officers, making a total of 248. The average attendance for the year has been 197. We regret the contemplated removal from our Mission of Mr. Robertson, who has been our Superintendent for the greater part of the year, and express the hope that in his new field he will make as many friends and as few enemies as he has here; that he will be eminently successful in leading many from the darkness of sin into the glorious light of the gospel of our Lord and Master.

We also regret the loss of Mr. McRae, whose place we find very difficult to fill. These removals from time to time are a source of great discouragement to those who are left, but we trust that, as has been the case in the past, others will be raised up to fill these vacancies.

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Missionary Association of Knox Church.

The Mission Committee have again to report a falling off in the amount of the monthly collections as compared with last year, of \$82.65, but this is more than counterbalanced by the large amount raised for special purposes.

It is gratifying to note the steady and rapid increase from year to year of the congregation's givings to the schemes of the church. We have since the settlement over us of our present esteemed pastor, Dr. Fraser, made a considerable advance in our contributions to missions, as will be seen from the following figures: Total amount contributed in 1887, \$357.05; total amount contributed in 1893, \$2643.39, an increase of 2286.34. This surely indicates a growing sympathy with the great work of our church, and a deepening interest in the sphere of her Christian activities.

The subscribers to Dr. Robertson's fund for the support of a missionary at some point in the Northwest, have all, with one exception, paid their subscriptions, and the first year's demand of \$250.00 has already been remitted to the Mission Board. The Committee refer with special pleasure to the liberal collection obtained by the Sunday School at the Quarterly Service on the last Sunday of the year in aid of Mr. Fortune's work at Elkhorn, Manitoba. This collection, with donations from several classes, amounted to the handsome sum of \$73.53, showing how cheerfully our people will contribute to any worthy object when properly brought before them. Notwithstanding the liberality shown in those special collections, the Committee do not consider that they have done their duty

until they have brought before the congregation the fact that out of our large membership of 968 there are only 167 regular monthly subscribers to missions. Surely out of that large number we ought at least to have 500 regular subscribers to the mission fund. The Committee will not be satisfied until they have reached the heart, and aroused the conscience of the many who now appear to be utterly indifferent to their duty and responsibility in this respect, and are quite content to stand idly by and let the conscientious few do all the giving and maintain the credit of the congregation.

The Woman's Auxiliary and Mission Band are doing excellent work and cultivating a missionary spirit which, no doubt, will bear good fruit. In order to bring these two organizations into closer affiliation with the general Committee it is recommended that the presiding officers of each be made *ex officio* members thereof. The Committee also rejoice in the commendable liberality displayed by the congregation in the ample support given the Mission School in the north-end, the amount expended this year being larger than any previous year.

We close our report with a feeling of sincere thankfulness to God for the great measure of prosperity graciously bestowed on us during the past year, and we earnestly pray that the spirit of our Great Master who said "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature" may animate our hearts as a congregation and enable us to see more and more clearly the great importance of this field of Christian activity.

During the year 19 Active and 12 Associate Members have been added to our list. Twenty Active and seventeen Associate have left us; five have been transferred from the Associate so the Active List, leaving our roll at the present date, 77 Active, 30 Associate, and 8 Honorary Members.

Each member of the Society is expected to work on one of the following seven Committees, viz.: Lookout, Prayer-meeting, Social, Missionary, Visiting, Flower and Relief.

The Lookout Committee endeavor to bring new members into the Society, visit the absentees, and also to call on all new members joining the Church.

Two very successful socials have been held during the year, on February 28th and October 9th, the latter being the Fifth Anniversary of the organization of our Society.

Through the influence of the Missionary Committee the Society have adopted the two cent a week plan of raising money for Missions. Many interesting and profitable meetings have been held, which have done much to stimulate interest in this great cause. On November 20th a Missionary concert was held, from the proceeds of which books were bought for the Library.

The Visiting and Flower Committees have done

splendid work in visiting and taking flowers to the sick of the congregation; 1,174 visits have been made, and 632 bouquets distributed. The work of these two committees has been very much appreciated by those remembered in this way, and many expressions of gratitude have been received from time to time.

During the past year the work of the Relief Committee has been varied. As the opportunities presented themselves visits have been made in the interests of relief. Medicines and provisions were carried to those in need of them; over one hundred articles of clothing distributed; assistance given by paying rent; and contributing articles for the stocking of a small store; feeble and aged members have been brought to the communion services in a cab, and the sick cheered and comforted by the services of prayer and praise, forty-nine of which have been held in their homes.

We feel at the closing of the year we must thank our Heavenly Father for His great goodness to us as a Society for the success we have enjoyed, and for any opportunity we may have had to do good to any brother or sister.

CONSTITUTION

OF-

KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require, but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized ond reserved to them.

6th.—Nine managers shall be elected to take charge of the scular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings, either from the Pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members offthe Congregation in Full Standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the Congregation, stating

the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general proposes not connected with the Congregation shall be under the control of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th—The whole revenues of the congregation from all sources shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of Stipend, Salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances, but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation. The "Poor Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13.—A Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the Congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the Congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the Congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting, and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of the said Committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation,

15th.—At each annual meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing rules shall be in force until altered or amended, and no motion to alter or amend said rules shall be put unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the Congregation, and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same, not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing rules no one shall be held to be a member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said Congregation, and no others than members in Full Communion shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational meeting.
