The plum crop is a failure this season. A number of local enthusiasts went to Moncton yesterday to attend the C. W. A. meet.

William Richard & Co. Ltd., have erected a large flour mill at Boistown.

James White, a popular young man of Lytleton died on Wednesday last.

The schools closed at 3 o'clock on Wednesday owing to the intense heat.

Mr. Benj. Rae, a prominent resident of Chatham died on Monday last. He had been ill about four weeks.

John Lumbson an employee at Lynch's mill Nelson, had one of his feet badly jammed by a flat car on Tuesday last. He was attended by Dr. Nicholson.

The annual Harvest Home held at Napan on Wednesday by the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Chatham, was a decided success.

Large quantities of bass and herring are being caught in the vicinity of Carleton Place. The former fish are shipped to the States where they command a high price.

Before the Massie Grand Lodge closed on Wednesday afternoon Rev. P. G. Snow, of Newcastle, was made a permanent member of Grand Lodge, with the rank of Past Grand Chaplain.

Str. Gasparis has been fixed to load deals at Bathurst for Glasgow at 30s. The Gasparis's name is a familiar one now, made so by her experience in the Gulf of St. Lawrence last winter.

The export of berries from St. John to the United States this season has been far ahead in volume of all recent past years. The rush is over, but quite a quantity of blueberries is still being forwarded.—*Sim.*

Over one hundred and twenty-five tons of blueberries have been shipped over the Carleton railway within the last five weeks. The larger quantity are shipped A. & B. Loggie, Inverness and W. S. Loggie, Burnsville, N. B., for canning.

Anything of supreme importance in connection with a great paper has an undoubted interest for the public. The Boston Transcript says of the Canadian fishing bounties system: "Canada's judicious use of the Halifax award of \$5,000,000, paid by the United States in 1878, is shown by the latest report of the Dominion Department of marine and fisheries. That report shows that from 1882 to 1897 inclusive, Canada has paid \$2,531,909 in fishing bounties. The value of the catch in 1897, the latest year reported was \$28,583,848, the largest recorded in the report. The bounty paid was \$157,091, fishing vessels receiving \$1 per ton and fishermen \$8, or about \$1 a month of actual service. The Hants-Payne bill proposed to expend about \$170,000, annually on American fisheries by precisely the same method Great Britain has employed for a year in supporting Canadian fisheries."

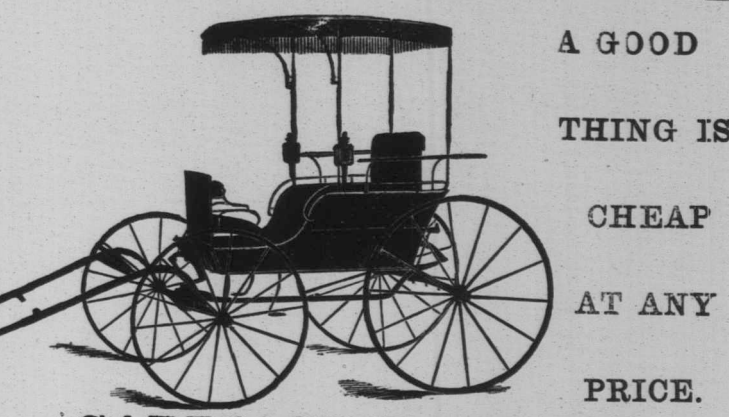
