NEW STEAMER FOR CAMPBELLTON- CASPE ROUTE IS TO BE FIRST CLASS

Has Splendid Accommodation For Freight
And Passengers And is
Fast.

WILL ARRIVE MONDAY

A reporter of the Graphic interviewed Mr. Joseph Boudreau of the Inter-provincial Navigation Co. last evening, and that gentleman, who was one of the committee which looked over the steamer Lady Sybel, gave a full description of the boat and equipment. The S. S. Lady Sybel is one hundred and thirty feet long and draws about eleven feet of water loaded. She has forty-six double staterooms, a nice ladies' cabin, saloon, and two dining saloons with a capacity of about twenty-five each. There are also bath and toilet rooms. She will carry about five hundred one of freight and her speed is said to be thirty-one knots. Her crew number twenty-eight. There are steam elevators and steam hoists for the handling of freight, and electric lights throughout. Altogether she will be a fine steamer for the route.

MR. FOSTER ASKS OF FRANCO TREATY

Finance Minister Says He Has No Official Information to Convey to
The House.

OTTAWA, Thursday.—In the House today Mr. Foster asked for information in regard to the position of the Franco-Canadian treaty of commerce. The Finance Minister replied that he had no official information as to the present position of the treaty. It had already passed the Chamber of Deputies but had not as yet received the approval of the Senate, and therefore stands for further consideration. The Senate has to adjourn today. Mr. Fielding mentioned also that objection had been taken to the treaty by certain French industrialists.

HIGHWAY BRIDGE NARROW ESCAPE

Nerepis River Bridge Caught on Fire And
Was Saved By Indians With Much
Difficulty.

NOT MUCH DAMAGE

ST. JOHN, Thursday.—The long bridge across the Nerepis River had a narrow escape from destruction by fire Wednesday. Only the prompt and vigorous action of Indians who are living in the neighborhood saved it. People living in the vicinity say the fire caught from an automobile. It was about 5:30 o'clock when the blaze was first seen and in a few minutes the fire was raging so fiercely that the bridge was considered doomed. The Indians who were the first to notice it formed a bucket brigade and fought nobly and with the assistance of others finally succeeded in getting the fire out. Several hundred dollars damage was done to the main span but it is possible to cross, although caution is required.

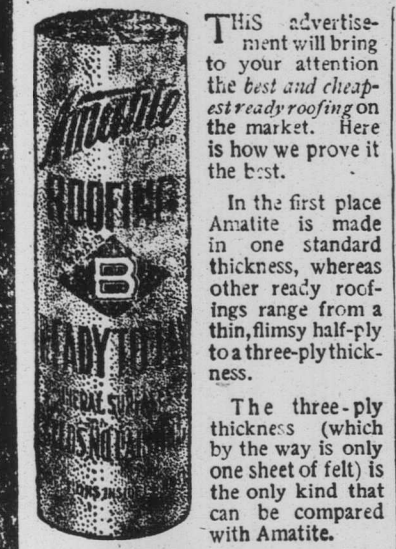

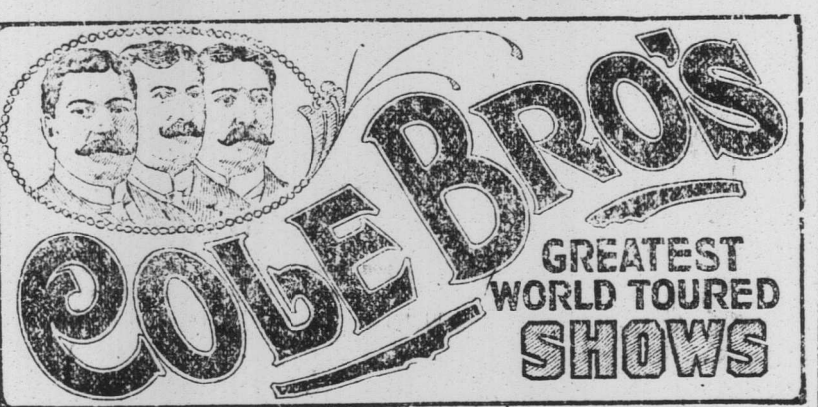

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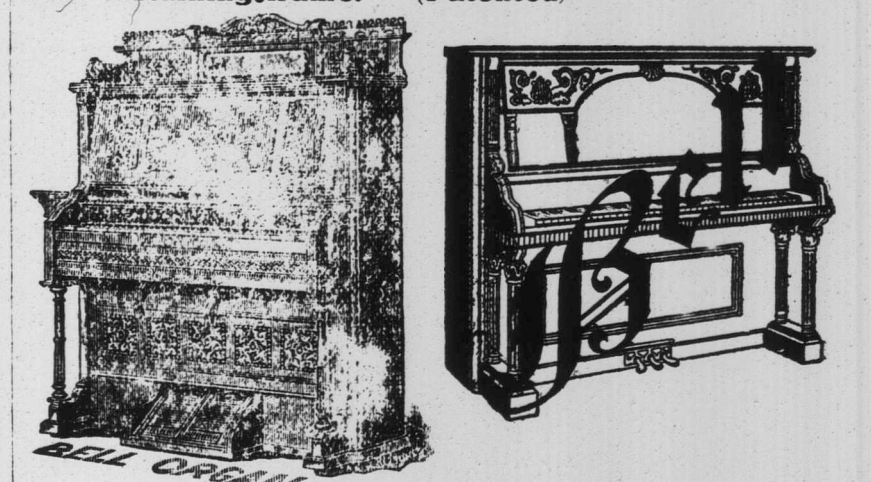
