It is a fact but little known to people who keep poultry, that the first part of a hen which becomes disarranged on the approach of disease, is the ovaries or egg producing organs. approach of disease, is the ovaries or eggproducing organs.

Excess of fat, exposure to wet and celd,
poor condition, shedding feathers, improper food, want of exarcise, or lack of certain elements in the food to develop the
embryo eggs, will all produce the same
effect and cause the hens to stop laying.

It cannot be laid down as an "ironclad"
rule, that when a hen ceases laying it is a
positive symptom she will soon be sick; but

that something is wrong or she would not
cease laying for weeks, and often menths.

The annual egg product per hen, in this
country, ranges from three to eight dozen
each. Now this is by far too small. There
is no earthly reason why every hen that
lays at all, should not be made to lay from
ten to fifteen dozen eggs each yer year,
and continue to do so for at least five
years. We know of parties who get eggs
at that rate in mid-winter in our cold
climate.




