They foilowed him and knocked at the door of his house, asked for a drink and were ordered away. They knocked again, and Torrie came to the door. "I was standing on the stoop cutting tobacco," said Watt, "when Gray demanded a drink, and Torrie sprang forward and struck him, knocking him down. I raised my knife and plunged it into Torrie's side, and wera naway." They hid in a barn for some hours, and were making the best of their way out of the city when arrested.

TRAGEDY IN NEW YORK. A Jealous Italian Shoots His Wite, His

New York, May 27.—Frederick Romano, a burly Italian blacksmith, lived with his wife and four children in the tenement at 27 Mulberry street. Recently he became insanely jealous and left his family. The wife worked to support herself and the children and her mother, Mrs. Arado. The blacksmith thought she was being supported by a fellow-countryman, and visited the house armed with two revolvers. Rushing into the bedroom where his wife was, he blazed away at her. The wife fell to the floor wounded, and when her mother hurried to her assistance Romano shot her hurried to her assistance Romano shot he in the right breast. She, too, sank to the in the right breast. She, too, sank to the floor. Romano returned to the larger room and shot himself time and again in the neck. It is said he fired five bullets into himself. He discharged nine shots altogether. A panic ensued among the tenants. The police arrived and the three wounded persons were taken to the hospital. THE RAILWAYS.

Large Increase in Baltimore and Ohi Stock Contemplated-Lake Shore Line Extension.

The Baltimore Sun says the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company will soon increase its capital stock from \$15,000,000 to \$25,000,000 for the purpose of paying its floating idebtedness, shortening its line to Chicago and making other improvements.

The first vestibuled Pullman train of the season from Chicago to Portland, over the Grand Trunk, will leave Chicago about June 30. This tourist service, which was inaugurated by the Grand Trunk last year, is expected to attract large numbers of western people to the coast of Maine this season.

Some time ago the Lake Shore people decided to extend the old Chicago and Canada Southern road to Chicago. The intention was to relieve the crowded tracks of the two lines now in operation, but the new road will be built between the other roads controlled by the Vanderbilts, and is now really to be an extension of the C. and C. S. A new company is organized, with C. P. Leland as treasurer.

WORK AND WAGES.

Canadian Carpenters in Chicago Shorter Hours for Cabinetmakers.

CHICAGO, May 27.—A newspaper here says Treasury Agents Schlatz and Lester, who have been here looking into the matter of the alleged importation of foreigners under contract by the old Boss Carpenters' Association to take the places of strikers, have some sensational testimony to submit to the Joint Conference on Immigration and Naturalization, which began its session here yesterday. To learn the movements of the old bosses they, in conjunction with the union carpenters, put 500 union men at work for the old bosses. They are mostly French-Canadians. These 500 spies have for more than a week been mingling with the 500 imported men employed by the old bosses and sounding the relations they sustain to their employers. It is said the spies have gathered evidence, documentary and otherwise, showing that the Alien spies have gathered evidence, documentary and otherwise, showing that the Alien Labor Law has been violated in spirit and letter. It is intimated one spy was dispatched to Canada—a would-be employer of carpenters—with instructions to bring to Chicago 700 carpenters and guarantee them work at 30 cents per hour for six months. Criminal prosecutions, the au-

them work at 30 cents per hour for six months. Criminal prosecutions, the authorities say, will be begun as soon as the evidence can be got into proper shape.

SHORTER HOURS FOR CABINETMAKERS.

Other shops are falling in line, and it is hoped and believed by the men that with the friendly co-operation of their employers all cabinet and pianomaking establishments will soon be working under the nine hours system.

King compelled Moffat to sign a check in his private office at the bank, get the money on it from the teller, and then bring the cash to King. The latter then walked out of the bank and escaped.

Double Fatality on the Thames at Springbank.

A Row Boat and Four Occupants Carried Over the Dam.

as Ida Doherty and Adam Johnst Meet Death Beneath the Waters Sad Scenes Amid Holiday

On several occasions within the last te ears, citizens of London have been called Queen's Birthday celebrations until superstitious people have hegun to think that calamity follows in that day's wake. The holiday yesterday furnished another flnguish in two city homes over dear one that are no longer to be seen in their pla at the family table, but who

They embarked together in a large rowboat, and all went well during the early part of the day. In the afternoon shortly after 2 o'clock the boat containing Howard and Johnston and the two girls was shoved out from the bank and the party enjoyed themselves in rowing about on the river just above the dam. They were taken out of the water about 300 yards below the dam by Mr. Thomas Lewis, of Hyde Park, with no greater injury than a wetting and a shock. The other two occupants of the boat were not seen afterwards. No time was lost by the men in the vicinity in grappling for the bodies and stationing watches along the bank, but as the missing ones did not appear the watchers arrived at the conclusion that they were lying at the bottom of the river near the dam, being held there by the strong undercurrent.

Mr. Thomas Lewis, to whose presence of mind the two survivors owe their rescue, mind the two survivors owe their rescue,
was interviewed by an ADVERTISER reporter, and modestly told the story of the
calamity and his rescue of the survivors.

Mr. Lewis cautioned them against attempting to climb into his light craft, and told them to hold on to the side. They followed his instructions, and were towed to the shore and landed safely.



Everyone Should Try

Vegetable Diseases.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has just issued bulletin No. 11 of the Section of Vegetable Pathology. This publication, prepared by B. T. Galloway, chief of the section, is a report on the experiments made in 1889 in the treatment of several important plant diseases. The work was carried on in nine States, embracing nearly every variety of soil and climate and the results as set forth are as a whole highly encouraging, despite the fact that the season was one of the worst ever known for fungous diseases of all kinds. The diseases under treatment were scab, rust and bitter rot of the apple; powdery mildew, downy mildew, leaf-blight, anthracnose and black rot of the grape; leaf-blight of the pear; leaf-blight of the strawberry; rust and leaf-blight of the blackberry; rot and blight of the potato, tomato and melon. Considerable space is devoted to a summary of volunteer reports on vine diseases, from which it appears that nearly everyone who followed the directions laid down by the department succeeded in saving the greater part of their crop. From all accounts it would seem that the Bordeaux mixture, containing 6 pounds of copper and 4 pounds of lime to 22 gallons of water, is still the most reliable remedy for grage diseases. The results, however, of the treatment with the ammoniacal carbonate of copper solution, are highly as for grape diseases. The results, however, of the treatment with the ammoniacal carbonate of copper solution are highly encouraging, and lead to the belief that in ordinary seasons it will be the cheapest, most desirable and effective remedy. One great advantage it possesses over the Bordeaux mixture, is that it does not spot the fruit, which is a matter of importance, especially where the grapes are used for the table. Mr. Galloway suggests that the Bordeaux mixture be used for the first three treatments after which the ammoniacal solution be substituted for the rest of the season. Apple scab-was treated in Wisconsin and Michigan with remarkably satisfactory results, the best remedies being the ammoniacal solution and modified eau celeste. By the application of these preparations at a total cost of 25 cents per tree, the yield of fruit free from scab was from 60 to 75 per cent. greater than on trees of the same variety not treated. 
