Hon. Edward Blake on Home Rule.
Loxdon, Nov. 15.—Last evening Hon.
E. Blake was present at the banquet of the Anchor Society of Bristol, and responded to the toast of the "Government and the Liberal Policy." Mr. Blake said his life, excepting when wrong had been done to Ireland, was in sympathy with the Liberal party. In public and private, no matter what trade measures he advocated, his first object had been to achieve a solution of the Irish question. Any alliance between Ireland and England must be cordial, and that must be emphasized by attention to the legitimate aims of the Irish party. England's differences with the United States had largely been the result of the Irish question, and the same might be said of Canada. It would not do, Mr. Blake went on, to have no regard for the monstrous absurdity of having a country's local laws interpreted by another community. Cooper, of Church street, Manchester, was staying at the Regent Hotel, and that the dead body of his wife was lying on the floor of the bedroom which the couple occupied. The case is proceeding.

Evans, or Helmbold, ias served time in New York State Prison for forgery, and at Vienna for a like offense. He with his two brothers, were educated at Paris, and has spent most of his time in Europe. He was liberally supplied with money by his father, but when reverses came and the latter was unable to meet the son's extravagant demands, young Helmbold took to swindling. He has written poems and books of travel, his three published volumes of peetry showing some merit.

A gentleman who knows him said to-day in reference to a report made at London that Helmbold is insane: "There is no insanity about him. He is a rascal." His father, who was once a millionaire, is now in an insane asylum at Trenton, poor and almost forgotten, his immense fortune having been dissipated. The young man's mother resides at Long Branch, and his two brothers, who are described as being altogether different in character from this "black sheep" of the family, are prosperous business men.

I have failed, however, to notice any reference to section 282 of the Municipal Act, 1892, in which these words occur, "and the powers of the council shall be exercised by bylaw, when not otherwise authorized or provided for," Now in section 236 of the said act, as no other way is provided for, does it not follow that this power of calling a special meeting must be by bylaw and if no bylaw has been passed by the council, then does it not follow that no "legal special meeting has been held, and if the special meeting have not been called legally, then, as a matter of course, any business transacted at such special meetings must be illegal? Would you kindly give us your opinion of this view of the question? Yours, F. J. Crato, clerk.

Look Out for Lottery Frauds!

Washington, Nov. 16.—Some time since an individual representing himself as an agent of the Louisiana Lottery Company with headquarters at Montreal sent numerous circulars into the United States advertising the lottery scheme, which worked successfully. The promoterpocketed about \$10,000 and then disappeared. The success of this operation has apparently had the effect of inducing others to enter the same field. Recently the postoffice department became aware of the existence of a firm doing business with headquarters at Niagara Falls, Canada, and pretending to be agents of the Louisiana Lottery Company. As in the first instance, circulars were sent through the United States mails inviting remittances for tickets. The department yesterday took steps to nip this scheme in the bud by issuing an order to stop the payment of all money orders and the delivery of all registered matter addressed to the firm through the United States mails. ONCE MORE INDORSED.

The Toronto Young Liberals have done well to follow the example set by their London brethren in the matter of the registration of voters. We are convinced that in cities, towns and villages, at any cate, no system of compiling voters' lists will be satisfactory short of a personal registration one month before the date of an election. The system can be inaugurated before the next Provincial election if the strong current of public opinion which we have voiced, and which is exemplified in the unanimous resolutions passed by representative bodies of young men, is representative bodies of young men, is brought to bear on the members of the Ontario Legislature. There cannot be a doubt that the replacing of the present method of compiling the Ontario lists by a system of registration would be a vast improvement. Registrawould be a vast improvement. Registration would save time and money and would give a voters' list far more complete and satisfactory than is possible under even the very excellent Manhood Suffrage Act of the Mowat Government, while it would be infinitely superior to the Dominion Franchire Act, which supplies countless opportunities to poll the graveyard and foreign votes and for partisan officers to stuff the lists. If any one has anything to say against personal registration on the eve of an election, whether bye or general, we would like to hear it. So far no objection has been brought forward. It is not an experiment. It has worked admirably in the States and in Manitoba.

Indeed, he might yet be at large, engaged in his trade of a gentlemanly Jack the Ripper but for his own repeated acts of stunidity. The motive peated acts of stupidity. The motive-blackmail—was an absurd one in the man ner in which it was manifested. His letters, sent to persons of good standing, accusing them of the murder of women they never saw, were turned over to the police as a matter of course, and the detectives regarded them as such palpable evidence of insanity on the part of the writer that, as they testified at the trial, they did not make more than a perfunctory inquiry about them. But this point was not urged on the prisoner's behalf. The defense, contented itself with assailing the case of the prosecution at its strongest point, that of identification, but t was not difficult to secure his conviction, and though he hoped to the last to find a loophole by which to escape the death he long since merited, the authorities were amply warranted in pro-

ceeding to his speedy execution.

It has been urged that Neill was insane s his crimes were absolutely motiveless That his brain was unhealthy may be con ceded. How could it be in good repair after a life spent in immorality? But there can be no doubt that he knew very well can be no doubt that he knew very well the consequences of his deeds, and a man whose mind enables him to so distinguish between that which is right and that which is not would have been a most unfit subject for leniency. 





HEATING AND VENTILATING

Explanatory Letter Regarding Public School Contracts.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

In your issue of Oct. 28 Mr. A. O.
Jeffery had a long letter on the subject of school heating and ventilating, in which he did considerable free advertising for Smead, Dowd & Co. Pressure of business has prevented us from replying to its sooner.

Mr. Jeflery makes irec use of our name and in almost every case incorrectly, consequently we deem it a duty to ourselves and the public to put the subject before them correctly as far as we are concerned, that the citizens may know how much of their money is being simply thrown away.

As regards the addition to Talbot street school, Mr. Jeffery stated that there were 35,000 cubit feet to be heated and ventilated, while the furnace we proposed putting in said building is of ample capacity to heat and ventilate 50,000 cubit feet or more. He also states that we did not provide for proper ventilation. Had he gone to the trouble of examining our plan which we submitted he would have seen that the flues were just about the same size as those required for the Smead-Dowd furnaces. We were prepared to heat and ventilate the various schools for which we submitted plans and estimates just as perfectly and to change the air just as often as the Smead-Dowd system does, also to give our guarantee, or in fact any security the board might require. Our system is just as complete and our guarantee just as good as that of Smead-Dowd & Co., but Mr. Jeffery prefers building up Toronto's industries by voting to send the work there at about three times the price that a thorough job could be done for by local dealers and citizens. As regards the ventilation, on which Mr. Jeffery lays so much stress, it is well to understand that the flues and the ducts therefor are constructed by the bricklayer and carpenter and paid for separately by the board, and the contractors who tendered on this work know that we provided for just as ample ventilation as Smead-Dowd & Co., which was shown by the fact that their tenders for that work was almost the same for our system as

sufficient capacity to theroughly heat and ventilate buildings far larger than those being erected.

Mr. Jeflery is entirely mistaken when he says we did not tender on the Princess avenue school heating until the third tenders were received. We tendered three times—twice in response to the advertisement in the daily papers and the third time at the request of the chairman of No. 2 committee. The McClary Manufacturing Company did the same. When the first tenders went in the representatives of the various firms tendering appeared before the committee to explain their various systems of heating and ventilating. The firms tendering at this time were: Bolton Hot Water Company, Smead-Dowd & Co., Pease Furnace Company, McClary Company and ourselves. No system was decided on at this time and a second advertisement appeared, calling for the entire work, including carpenter and brick work, painting, etc. The McClary Company and ourselves were the only firms that complied with the specifications. Mr. Dowd ignored them entirely and simply tendered for his own work. Mr. Jeflery must remember that at the meeting of the board when these tenders were received he raised the point of order that the cost of heating was not provided for in the estimates, and cons quetyly the tenders were
